The most horrible allegations are made publicly about the revolting conditions under which the packers do their work. It is asserted that hord is manufactured from hogs which die from cholera—that the meat inspectors are incompetent and overworked—that sanitary conditions prevailing at the packing houses are revolting—that the meat is sold to Americans which is deemed unfit for exportation to Europe.

SUPERVISED PLAYGROUNDS

The Times stated several weeks ago that there was a prospect of getting at least one supervised playground in St. John during the coming vacation season. The Centennial school grounds and basement of the school building could be secured.

THE GREAT NEED OF PLAYGROUNDS

Educational journals all over America are now paying much attention to supervised play grounds and vacation schools. 'Education,' a Boston monthly, says in the course of an extended article: 'Vacation now brings with it much worry and trouble, even to the well-to-do, who make every provision to occupy and safeguard their children—plan country visits and excursions, picnics and parties, supply toys, games and books, and when the vacation is over, send the children back to school with a sigh of satisfaction that nothing has happened, and that the eternal question, 'Mamma, what shall I do next?' will not be heard.

COMPULSORY EDUCATION

The United States congress, which legislates for the District of Columbia, has adopted important measures in the interest of the children of the City of Washington. A despatch of Tuesday's date says: 'Compulsory education for every child in the District of Columbia between the ages of eight and fourteen years is provided for in a measure which passed the house late yesterday. The bill has already

passed the senate. This will prove an excellent supplement to the child labor and juvenile court bills, which have already been passed. In the opinion of the Associated Charities of the district the compulsory education bill is the most important piece of district legislation before this congress. The police census of 1905 shows that there were in the district 48,000 children between seven and fifteen years of age, of whom 7,588 were not enrolled in any school. The house committee made the bill apply to children of six years, but the house changed this to eight years. The bill provides that every parent, guardian, or other person having charge and control of a child between the ages of eight and fourteen years shall cause such child to be regularly instructed in the elementary branches of knowledge, including reading, writing, English grammar, geography and arithmetic in some public, private, or parochial school during the period of each year when such schools are in session. The bill amended provides for the opening of the doors of a special or ungraded school to pupils in the public schools 'who cannot' be controlled by regular school discipline.

TOO MANY DOGS

Another dog was destroyed yesterday, after he had nearly killed a child. The more dogs there are, the more danger there is for children, and older folk as well. A police officer discovered forty-two owners of dogs on St. Patrick and St. David streets yesterday, without going over the whole ground. Some who have dogs about the place do all in their power to conceal the fact when the officers enquire.

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MONEY FOR THE FARMERS

Cheese and Butter Advance Means Quarter of a Million to Them.

(Montreal Herald, Tuesday). The conditions which have prevailed in the Canadian produce market since the factories opened this season while rather unsatisfactory for exporters have brought large returns to the farmers and dairymen.

At the first of the month prices opened about 12% higher than last year and since then prices have been gradually advancing until at present they are from 20% to 120% higher than at this date last year.

It is estimated that as a result of these high prices an extra profit of over a quarter of a million dollars has passed into the farmers' hands since the beginning of the month.

The receipts of cheese since May 1 have been 125,548 boxes. Taking 1 1/2% as the average increase in price for the month, which is a low estimate, this means an extra profit to the farmers of \$18,825.40 for cheese.

The receipts of butter since May have been \$1,186 packages. Estimating the average increase in price at only a cent a pound this makes the extra profit received by the farmers, \$24,184.16.

At these figures the total extra profit for butter and cheese is \$166,009.56. The livestock market is steadily in tone at 20 1/2-22c. for wholesale lots. It is very hard to get more than 21 1/2c. for single packages.

The cheese market is very quiet. Sales were made this morning at 11 7/8c to 12c. for wholesale lots and 17 1/2c. for single packages. Reports from the country state that offerings are increasing and there is a keen undertone to the local market.

BLOOMFIELD MILK

(The Editor of the Evening Times). We have been hearing a great deal lately about Bloomfield milk, and I am aware that the tendency of the public mind is to avoid milk shipped from this place.

I want to call attention to the fact that the fact that because two experienced dairymen of this place got their milk in a bad mess is no reason why milk produced by other dairies should be condemned. We claim that there is no cleaner milk or better up-to-date dairies or supplying the trade at Bloomfield.

We also claim that the milk produced from any given herd in purity and quality is as good as that from any other herd. It is possible to give the names and records of a number of men who have been in the business for a long time, but it would take up much valuable space.

The report of the Young People's work showed a grand total of \$1,022.72 receipts. Following this came a paper on "The Importance of Missionary Education for the Young," which was discussed. This was followed by an address by Mrs. Foster.

The visiting delegates spoke briefly of the progress made by the young people's mission organizations in their respective localities.
