MINUTES

OF THE

FOURTH NOVA SCOTIA CONFERENCE.

HELD IN

PROVIDENCE CHURCH, YARMOUTH,

From the June to the 28th of June, included, 1877.

The fourth Session of the Nova Scotia Annual Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, began at Yarmouth, on Thursday, June 21st, 1877.

The Rev. Robert Alder Temple, President of the Conference, took the chair at 9 o'clock, a.m.

After singing and the reading of the Scriptures, prayer was offered by the Rev. James G. Hennigar and Rev. Joseph F. Bent.

The Conference proceeded to elect by ballot its chief officers, when the Rev. Elias Brettle was elected President, and the Rev. Stephen F. Huestis, Secretary.

The Rev. Jabez A. Rogers was elected Journal Secretary.

The Rev's. Cranswick Jost, Arthur D. Morton and Eben E. England were appointed Assistant Secretaries; the Rev. Jesse B. Giles, Assistant Journal Secretary; the Rev's. John Cassidy and W. H. Evans, Letter-writers, and the Rev. Thomas Rogers, Conference Reporter to the Wesleyan.

QUESTION VI.

Who have died since the last Conference?

ANSWER.

1. Thomas H Davies, who was born in the town of Annapolis Royal: his family were members of the Episcopal Church, and early in life he was one of her most devoted adherents. After receiving his education he removed to the city of St. John, N. B., and soon engaged in commercial life. Among his few associates was a pious aunt, a mother in Israel, who while she admired the integrity and blameless demeanor of her nephew, soon discovered that he was a stranger to the converting grace of God. Her clear and earnest exposition of the way of personal salvation through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, was instrumental in leading him to seek mercy as a lost sinner. In the great struggle for spiritual life, he was greatly assisted through the preaching of the Word in the Methodist Church, which he now on Sabbath evenings attended. He soon obtained the evidence of his acceptance with God, and made the people who had been instrumental in leading him to

Christ, the people of his choice, united himself with the Methodist Church. Soon after this his mind was deeply impressed with the duty of consecrating himself to the work of the ministry; and by a mysterious Providence, his path of duty became so plain, that he could no longer hesitate. In 1823 he was sent to the Sheffield Circuit, and in 1824 he was recommended to the District Meeting, and to the British Conference, and was appointed to the Wallace Circuit. From that time on the various circuits which he occupied in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and P. E. Island, he was successful in winning souls to Christ. He was in very deed a man of God, living in the Spirit, and walking in the Spirit. His continued personal experience, was that of unbroken faith in God, and joy in the Holy Ghost, under all the diversified circumstances of life. After his retirement from the active work, he continued almost to the last, preaching the unsearchable riches of Christ. great peace in Bridgetown, N. S., on the 28th of August, 1876, in the 78th year of his age, and the 53rd of his ministry.

2. MICHAEL PICKLES, who was born in Lower Town, Parish of Haworth, Yorkshire, England, March 29th, 1798. He was in the early part of his life the subject of religious impressions, and yielding to sacred influences, he sought and found peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Soon after his conversion it pleased the Head of the Church to call him to the work of the Christian Ministry; after much prayerful consideration and with the advice of his Christian friends, his name was placed upon the Local Preacher's Plans, and after having made full proof of his ministry, he offered himself to the British Conference and was accepted. In 1827 he was sent out to New Brunswick by the Missionary Committee. He entered upon his great work in the Spirit of his divine Master. In the midst of the discouragements peculiar to a new country, he continued to labour on extensive circuits, both in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, with great success and acceptance. His piety was uniform, and his whole life was replete with deepest sympathy and love for the best interests of his people. His preaching was always a faithful exposition of the Word of Life, aiming to lead his hearers to the immediate acceptance of personal salvation. He was one of the earlier labourers in the Lord's vineyard with some of our most honoured ministers, the most of whom had preceded him to his great reward. In 1863, after filling some of the most important positions in the church, he was compelled through increasing indisposition to seek a supernumerary relation, but he continued in his loved work as health Twelve months since in company with his excellent wife, he visited his native country, from which he had been absent fifty years. After spending a few months with relations and friends continuing to evince his characteristic devotedness to God, and to his work, it pleased his Divine Master to release his servant from earthly toils. During his last hours he continued to give the most pleasing evidence of unbroken confidence in God. His language was, "I have great peace," "I leave all with God," "I know whom

I have believed," and with that deep devotion, and reverential feeling which had ever characterised him, he further said to his wife, "Help me on my knees," and then he poured forth the earnest desires of his departing Spirit for his dear children by name, and for beloved friends. After a short time, evidently contemplating his future home, he calmly slept in the Lord, in the 9th of April, 1877, in the 80th year of his age, and the 53rd of his ministry.

3. Albert Stewart Desbrisay, who was born in St. Andrews. N. B., in Dec. 1840. He was the youngest son of the late Albert Desbrisay, of blessed memory. At the age of eleven years he was led to give his heart to God, and ever afterwards retained a sense of the Divine favor. From an early age he was a lover of the Bible, and his mind was richly stored with its precious truths. In his seventeenth year his beloved father exchanged mortality for life, when he became the stay and staff of his bereaved mother, whom he regarded with filial affection and devotion, until in 1862 it pleased God to release her from her protracted sufferings. Freed then from family ties, with his soul quickened by the reviving grace of God, and having for some time felt it to be his duty to enter the Christian ministry, he was recommended to the Conference as a candidate for the ministry, and being accepted he entered upon his great work, determined by the grace of God to excel as a good minister of Jesus Christ. In all of his circuits his abundant labours were crowned with success.

He was not favoured with a robust constitution, so that he often overtaxed his strength; but his increasing toils were not in vain in the Lord.

His mind was ever stored with useful knowledge. He was a

close reasoner, and powerful as a defender of the truth.

His last affliction was protracted and severe; but the presence of God with him was a continuous source of comfort. He continued in the full possession of his faculties to the last, trusting implicitly in the Redeemer. He is now forever with the Lord, and many will be the stars in the crown of his rejoicing in the day of the Lord. He died in Bridgetown, N. S., October 4th, 1876, in the 36th year of his age, and the 12th of his ministry.

WILLIAM SARGENT, who was born in Barrington, N. S., May 2, 1841. Blest with pious parents, his early religious training was adapted, by the blessing of God, to lead to early consecration to Christ, and fellowship with His Church. When about twelve years of age he began to meet in class, but dated his conversion some years subsequently. Embracing the opportunities of Christian usefulness, and exercising his gifts for a time as a local preacher, he, after much prayer, was led in 1865 to offer himself for the full work of a Methodist minister, and was accepted by the Conference of that year. He possessed those qualities of mind and heart, and that aptness to teach which made his pulpit labours more than ordinarily acceptable and profitable. But his constitution, never strong, was unequal to the incessant labours of circuit work; and

by infirmity he was laid aside for two or three years; still, however,

doing work for God.

At the Conference of 1875, his health having apparently greatly improved, he again entered the work, and laboured successfully on the Lockeport Mission. At the last Conference he was appointed to the Hillsburg Circuit, where he soon became esteemed and beloved; but in a few weeks was laid aside with his former infirmity. It was soon evident that his public work was done. The Master called, and His servant was found with his loins girded and his light burning, and like a servant waiting for the coming of his Lord. "I have no great ecstacy of joy," said he, "but settled peace, calm trust in the atonement. My flesh and my heart fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever."

Thus did he meet death, with Christian faith and triumph. He died at Hillsburg, March 3, 1877, in the 36th year of his age, and

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

The Committee, in submitting their annual Report, do so with feelings of devout gratitude to God for the success vouchsafed in every department of the work. During the year there has been an increase in the attendance at the Class-meeting, and in the number learning our Catechism. They view with pleasure the growing interest which is being taken in the religious training of the young of our church. The seed sown has fallen upon ground prepared for its reception by the good Spirit of God. Convinced of the vast importance of the work, they would commend it to the constant sympathy, prayers and support of our people. They are persuaded

that much more remains to be done to make our schools as efficient as they might be made. With the increased facilities at command, a much larger proportion of our children ought to be gathered into the Church. If the world's wickedness is to be arrested and destroyed it will be done chiefly by preserving the young in the fold of Christ. Our motto must be, "The children for Jesus." Believing as they do, that all our children have been redeemed by the Saviour, and having dedicated them to him in the sacred ordinance of Baptism, our duty is to train them for Him. The Committee regret to notice that in several circuits no school reports the teaching of our catechism. They would affectionately suggest to the officers and teachers the advisabily of restoring it. They would also suggest to the parents that they frequently visit the schools, and thus cheer the teachers and scholars in their work, They would further recommend to the ministers and preachers, that as far as practicable they organize Sabbath-schools on every circuit and mission, and that they report our children attending Union schools, and that greater attention be paid in filling up the schedules, so as to ensure correct returns. REPORT OF THE EXAMINING COMMITTEE OF THE THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS.

FOR NOVA SCOTIA CONFERENCE.

The Committee in presenting their Annual Report, desire to preface it with an expression of their very great satisfaction at the result of the past years' work in the Theological Department of the Mount Allison Institution. The number of students in attendance has been greater than during previous years. The efficiency displayed by the several classes during their examination was very marked and elicited comment as to the increasing efficiency of the department.

There were sixteen students in attendance during the past year. Of these, three, through the demands of circuit work, were sent out to labour before the expiration of the year. The course of study undertaken has been varied and extensive. In addition to branches of Theological Science all the students have taken up the study of either Greek or Latin; two have studied Hebrew, three have sought to ground themselves more thoroughly in Rudimentary English, and five have undertaken the College Curriculum, all the five being in the Nova Scotia Conference. Dr. Stewart in addition to his other work, has given lectures in Systematic Theology and Old Testament Exegesis, which have been much appreciated and must have cost painstaking on the part of the Theological Professor. Other members of the faculty have rendered invaluable service in this work: Dr. Allison in Greek Testament translation and construction; Professor Kennedy in Church History, and Professor Burwash in Sacred Oratory and Elocution. The large classes of these three Professors seemed to appreciate their privileges, as manifested by their ardor.

The Committee elected Rev. D. D. Currie as Chairman, and Rev. R. Brecken as Secretary. The usual questions required by our Church regarding personal piety, and loyalty to our Doctrines and Church Government, were satisfactorily answered, and then the findings of the Committee were deducted from the Report of the Theological Professor, conjoined with their own personal observation. There have been eight students from the Nova Scotia Conference this year, concerning whom the following recommendations were made.

- 1. J. C. Ogden, who has travelled two years and been one year at the Institution, has displayed great diligence, made satisfactory progress, and it is recommended that he be continued on trial, and that his request to return another year to the Institution be complied with.
- 2. W. ARTHUR BLACK, who has taken the college course of study, and has passed very satisfactory examination, is recommended to be continued on trial, and allowed to return to the Institution another year.

- 3 Benjamin Hills, who has taken a College course, and has pursued his studies with marked diligence and success, is recommended to be continued on trial, and that his request to return another year be complied with.
- 4. George F. Johnson has completed the College course and taken the degree of A. B., and appears before the Cumberland District Meeting for Examination, preparatory to re-entering the work.
- 5 George O. Robinson, who has taken the College course, has met with the highest success and commendation, and it is recommended that he be continued on trial, and that his request to return be complied with.
- 6. Byron C Borden, who has been two years at the Institution, and who has this year nearly completed his college studies with much success, re-enters the work, and appears before the Liverpool District meeting for examination.
- 7. John Gee. These brethren were taken out into 8. George Johnson. circuit work at the call of the President, before the year closed, and did not appear before the Committee.

MODE OF EXAMINATION.

Papers prepared by the Examiners upon the books, &c., assigned to them are to be sent to the Secretary of the Examining Board by the first of January.

Each Chairman and Financial Secretary shall meet the Candidates and Probationers in their Districts, on the last Wednesday in April, at some place appointed by the Chairman; lay the printed questions before them, and transmit their written answers to the respective Examiners, who shall immediately report the result to the Secretary of the Examining Board. A meeting of the Examining Board is to be held on the day previous to the opening of the Conference, at 9 o'clock, a.m., in order to be ready to report to the Conference. The Superintendent of the Circuit which recommends a Candidate to be received on trial, is required to give a written statement of his religious character, talents, and usefuncess; educational advantages, acquirements, and other particulars, as required by our Discipline; which statement shall be signed by him, and recorded in the District Book.

No Probationer shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are satisfactorily completed.

The Conference requires Candidates received on trial for our ministry, to preach a trial sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report its opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

Chairmen of Districts are requested to inform the Secretary immediately after the March Quarterly Meeting of those who are to be Candidates for Examination in the Preliminary Course of Study.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

That this Conference hails with great satisfaction the increased impetus, which has been given during the past year to the Temperance cause, within this Province and throughout the Dominion generally.

That we heartily concur in the efforts which are now being put

forth to secure the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic.

That while we rejoice in the success of all those institutions which are striving to promote the temperance cause, we at the same time believe that the church of Christ should ever be foremost in every moral reform. We therefore urge with renewed emphasis upon all our members strict obedience to our rule which forbids "Drunkenness, buying or selling of spirituous liquors, or drinking them, unless in case of extreme necessity." We further suggest the advisability of forming open Total Abstinence societies, in connection with all our churches and congregations; and also that special reference be made to this reform, in connexion with the prayer meetings upon the several circuits, once in each month.

That apart from the question of the use of fermented wine at the Lord's Table, we regard the employment of the drugged and impure compounds bearing the name of "Wine," as being injudicious in connexion with this holy ordinance. We therefore urge upon our people that special attention be given to secure pure wine for use in the Lord's Supper; and suggest that if possible, some agency be instituted to secure the accomplishment of this end.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

1.—METHODIST BOOK ROOM.

Resolved, 1. That the Annual Report of the Book Room and Wesleyan Office having been laid before the Conference, we have great gratification in re-affirming our confidence in the working and usefulness of this important institution of our Church. The Conference would renew very earnestly its recommendation to our people, and to the Superintendents of circuits and the officers of our Sabbath Schools, the exceeding desirableness of our own literature being widely circulated, that the precious doctrines of Gospel truth, so greatly valued by our Church from the beginning, may as much as possible be written on the minds and hearts of our youth and of our whole people.

Resolved, 2. That the brethren of this Conference feel very grateful to Rev. A. W. Nicolson, for the great diligence and success with which he has administered the affairs of the Book Room and Wesleyan Office, and beg to assure him that they have unlimited confidence in his integrity and impartiality.

2.—UNLICENSED PREACHERS.

Whereas from time to time, persons who are strangers to our Conference come among us requesting access to our pulpits and soliciting letters of recommendation from our ministers,

RESOLVED.

That this Conference hereby urges upon each minister and preacher, as well as upon the trustee boards of the several circuits, that all such applications be refused, except to those who produce unmistakable credentials.

3.—REV. R. ALDER TEMPLE.

Resolved, That the very cordial thanks of the Conference are hereby presented to the Rev. R. A. Temple, ex-President, for the able and very satisfactory manner in which he has discharged the duties of his office during the term of his Presidency.

4.—REV. H. PICKARD, D. D.

Whereas we have been favoured during the present session of our Conference with the presence and counsel of our esteemed brother, Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., of the N. B. and P. E. Island Conference, and whereas, we have heard his statement of his intention to request a Supernumerary relation to his Conference at its session in Fredericton; Therefore Resolved, That we express our high appreciation of the very efficient services in different departments of our connexional work of a Brother whose relation to us, especially before the recent division of the E. B. A. Conference, has been so long continued, and earnestly pray that God may direct his future course and crown him with abundant blessing.

5.—THANKS TO YARMOUTH FRIENDS.

Resolved, 1. That the very hearty and cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the friends in Yarmouth, who have so generously entertained its members during the present session, and that the Superintendents of the South and North Circuits be requested to announce the same from the pulpits next Lord's day.

2. That the thanks of the Conference are due and are hereby presented to A. F. Stoneman, Esq., for the use of his hall during the present session.

6.—BOOK AND TRACT SOCIETY.

After very considerable discussion upon the decision expressed last year in respect to the Book and Tract Society, it is hereby

Resolved, 1. That the Conference is fully impressed with the gravity of its position in relation to this subject.

- 2. That the Conference is always willing to justify its decision when requested so to do by any authorized person or persons through its official representative head.
- 3. That though circulars have reached certain members of the Conference, during the year, calling for evidence in the premises, up to this date, no request or communication on the subject has reached the Conference itself, consequently the position of the Conference remains unchanged.

7.—RECOMMENDATION OF MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

Resolved, That this Committee would strongly suggest to the Conference the importance of reaffirming its purpose to be controlled by the law previously in existence among us, that invitations from circuits to ministers, can only be received when accompanied with an official promise to pay the necessary expenses.

2. That it is highly desirable the Missionary Fund should be relieved to the utmost extent in regard to grants to dependent circuits, that the matter should be pressed upon the attention of all our dependent circuits, or missions, that such circuits should be encouraged to rise as soon as possible to a position of independency, that grants to such circuits should be lessened year by year; that this committee recommend to the Conference the necessity of relieving the Missionary Fund of the burden of sustaining circuits that are not in circumstances of great spiritual destitution and that such circuits be apprized that in all probability the next Conference will take steps for lessening the number of our missions, in the hope that circuits of this class will become aroused to liberality in increasing their receipts if they wish the ministerial supply to be continued.

QUESTION XV.

When and where shall our next Conference be held?

FINANCIAL ECONOMY.

The Conference recommends to the Quarterly Meetings of the several circuits, the following plan, by which it is hoped they may the more effectually raise the amount necessary to meet the allowance of the ministers and preachers, and which will make the collection of class and ticket money hereafter unnecessary.

- 1. Let the Quarterly Boards at the beginning of each financial year, estimate the amount needed for the year.
- 2. Then ascertain from each member of the church, and, as far as practicable, from each attendant of the congregation, what each proposes to give as his or her weekly or monthly contributions.
- 3. Let these sums be entered by a steward appointed for that purpose in a book which he shall keep as Treasurer of the Quarterly Board.
- 4. If the total amount of these sums does not equal the amount needed, then let the stewards apportion the deficiency among such as are willing, for Christ's sake, to assume such deficiency, setting down to each person, with his or her consent, the additional amount which they think he or she ought weekly or monthly to pay.
- 5 Let the stewards then adopt and carry out a plan by which every one shall have the opportunity of regularly contributing each week or month, by envelope or otherwise, not grudgingly or of necessity, the sum which has been pledged by him or her. Let these contributions be paid over regularly to the steward appointed to receive them, and be brought up by him to the quarterly meeting. The said steward shall keep an individual account of all the pledges and contributions, and shall pay over the same, under the direction of the quarterly meeting, to the preacher or preachers authorized to receive them.
- 6. That quarterly meetings adopting the envelope system be recommended not to include in their estimates the claims of Foreign and Home Missions, but to provide for these funds as in times past, by special collections and subscriptions.

STANDING ORDERS.

1.—FINANCIAL DISTRICT MEETINGS.

1. The attention of the Chairmen of Districts is called to Sec. VI., p. 49, and Section I., p. 112, of the Discipline. The Conference directs that the greatest care shall be exercised in preparing the estimates of Receipts and Expenditure on the dependent circuits. The expenditure shall in no case exceed \$750, exclusive of the Children's Fund claims and house rent. These estimates, together with a detailed statement of the removal expenses of ministers, shall be forwarded to the Rev. W. H. Heartz, Secretary of the Missionary Committee, who will transmit them to the Central Missionary Board.

2.—CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.

- 3. Missionary and Educational Societies.—Each Superintendent is required to present at the District Meeting, in a form for publication, lists of the benefactors and subscribers to these Societies of one dollar and upwards, all amounts under one dollar to be entered under small sums, with an account of their respective contributions, and all other monies received during the year; and the Chairman of the District shall forward such lists to the Treasurers of the respective Funds.
- 3. Contingent and Supernumerary Minister's Funds.—Superintendents are requested to see that the annual public collections are taken for these funds at the time appointed. For the latter fund subscriptions and donations shall be taken in the classes and among the lay friends of the Church, and the names of all annual subscribers of five dollars or more, shall be forwarded to the Treasurer for publication in the Minutes of Conference.—(Dis. p. 115.)
- 4. Children's Fund.—The Financial Secretaries of the several districts are required to send to the Secretary of the Children's Fund, immediately after the Annual District Meeting, the names of all ministers in their respective districts who are claimants upon the Children's Fund for the current year; and to state the number of children for whom allowance is claimed; and, as far as possible, the name and date of birth of each of the said children.

S .- SABBATH SCHOOL REPORTS.

5. Each Superintendent is directed to see that an Annual Report of the state of the Sabbath-schools in his circuit, is prepared, in tabular form (Schedules Nos. 1 & 2, issued by the Board of Management), and presented to the Quarterly Official, and District meetings.—Dis. pp. 79 & 98.

4.—REPORTS OF RELIGIOUS STATE.

6. Each Superintendent is directed to prepare a Report of the religious state of his circuit or mission, to be read at the Annual District Meeting; at which meeting a summary of such Reports shall be prepared and entered in the District Minutes for the information of the Conference. The condensed Reports of Missions shall also be prepared in a form to be transmitted to the General Secretaries.

5.—BOOK ROOM ACCOUNTS.

7. Every Minister and preacher is peremptorily required to settle his book account for the preceding year at each Annual Conference, and also regularly to transmit the money in his hands, without any reservation or deduction whatever, to the Book Steward, whenever it shall amount to ten dollars. (Journal Gen. Conf., p. 168.)

6.—THE WESLEYAN.

8. Chairmen of Districts are directed to institute enquiry at the Annual District as to the diligence and fidelity of each Minister and Preacher responsible for the collection of subscriptions due for the Wesleyan.

7.—DISTRICT MINUTES.

9. Chairmen of Districts are required to take to Conference three complete copies of the Minutes of the Annual and Financial District Meetings, duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary;—one copy inserted in the District Book for his own use; one for the Secretary of the Conference; and one for the members of the District and of the Conference.—(Dis. p. 49.)

8.—SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

10. Sermons on the Obligations of the Sabbath shall be annually preached on all the circuits on the third Sabbath in the month of January.—(Jour. Gen. Conf. p. 192.)

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

Dearly Beloved Brethren:

One of the foremost of the privileges connected with our Annual Conference is that of addressing you in words of kindly greeting—encouragement, and Godly admonition. Amid our brotherly reunions, the business we meet to transact, and the opportunities for delightful worship which these occasions furnish, our hearts turn with anxious tenderness toward you with whom it has been at once our duty and privilege to labor in the Lord, and for whom our prayers also have been earnestly addressed to the throne of the heavenly grace. With true Methodistic cordiality have we been received by the people of Yarmouth. Our Conference sessions have been characterized by usual harmony, and our public services—attended by large and appreciative audiences—have been blessings to us all.

Our first and most important duty as a Conference is a careful review of the year's toil. The results of this review for the past year are gratifying. While in many instances with timid steps, heart-struggles, and tears we have gone forth sowing precious seed, the Master has been with us in the vineyard, and our labors, directed and blessed by Him, have not been in vain, nor our strength spent for naught. Our sowing in sadness has oftimes been relieved by joyous reaping-while some among us have been as conquerors returning from battle-joyful in abundant spoils. True, we have not been without cause for mourning over some who have not been steadfast in the faith of Christ. But our hearts are filled with devout gladness because of the many who have held fast the beginning of their confidence, and who are the crown of our rejoicing in the Lord. Our returns show an aggregate membership of 8877 with 849 on trial, being a net increase of 310. For these triumphs in the gospel we call upon you to join with us in ascribing all glory to Him whose right arm alone hath gotten the victory

Deeply solemn, also, have been our feelings as we have gone through the review of the year. Death has made sad inroads into the ranks of our Ministry, and his hand has smitten us with unwonted frequency. Four of our members have been called from labor to rest, from the conflict to the triumph. Two fathers—T. H. Davies and M. Pickles—names which are in all the churches, and whose memory is forever fragrant—and two younger men,—A. S. Desbrisay and W. Sargent,—of splendid abilities and unquenchable zeal, have entered upon their reward. We

could ill spare the wise couusels of the former, or the direct energies of the latter. But the Master judgeth best. He hath called them home; and standing reverently by their sleeping dust, and recalling their brave work for the cause of truth, we can but say:—

"Servants of God well done, Rest from your loved employ. The battle's fought, the victory won, Enter the Master's joy."

May their memory gird us with zeal for the conflict.

And now dearly beloved, we exhort you to stand fast in the Lord. Remember that church relations merely cannot guarantee salvation. "He that believeth shall be saved." Salvation is in that look at the Crucified One which means utter helplessness of self and complete dependence upon Christ. To the Christian, Christ is a present Saviour, to whose love the Holy Spirit bears witness enabling him to say with full round utterance "I know." Such trust brings peace to the conscience, light to the mind, assurance to the heart, strength to the whole being. It is the simple weapon with which to oppose the forms and forces of false religion. Give yourselves wholly to Christ. Love like this—dying, yet undying—demands body, soul and spirit. "The blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth from all sin." The Holy Spirit waits to sanctify wholly. Do not fail to lay all upon the altar. Holiness is happiness, it is more—it is power. "Without holiness no man shall see the Lord."

Attach great importance to a consistent life. "By their fruit ye shall know them" is still true You were "created in Christ Jesus unto good works." Your lives are the only bibles which many read. Your children, your neighbors, and "the stranger that is within your gates," will interpret the gospel preached in our pulpits in the light of your lives. You are allowed no undress uniform. You are to be the Christian always and everywhere. Precepts are not so much wanted as patterns. Your influence was born with you; you cannot shake it off—use it then to the glory of God. The influence of one consistent life has been an anchor to hold men from drifting out on the sea of doubt; while the harsh, reckless words, and inconsistent acts of members of the church have not seldom cut adrift men whom the infidel had in vain assailed. Live as in the sight of God.

The great want of the church to-day is an intelligent, ardent, uniform godliness in her members. Profession we have in abundance. We want the practical power of religion lived *into* the world around us. If you would cultivate this there must be close attention to religious duties. These duties attended to ultimately become helps and privileges which shall be highly prized. First among these duties is that of private devotion. The nervous haste in which we live sadly interferes with this exercise, abridging the time for secret communion with God, if not robbing us of it all. "Enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to

thy Father which is in secret." In these days of much work and incessant hurry there is more need than ever of the enforcement of this command. The claims of the world, of the family, or even of the church must not be allowed to interfere with this duty. With the busy multitude there is forgetfulness of God. His voice is drowned in the chatterings around us. Withdraw from busy scenes. Shut yourselves up with God.—

"In the spirit of devotion Musing there alone."

In solitude with God only do we obtain robustness in the Christian life. By filial and fervent communion with Him only is thoughtful and practical piety promoted. Only men of prayer are men of power, and prayer must be powerful to give power. Follow the examples given in the holy Scriptures. Indeed, Christ, Himself hath given us a pattern that we might follow his steps—' who in the days of His flesh offered up prayers and supplications, with strong crvings and tears, unto Him that was able to save Him from death, and was heard in that he feared." At all costs attend to this important duty, so shall you not only advance the life of God in your own souls, but become powerful instruments of good unto others.

"Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy." Never was there greater need for the authoritative declaration of this divine law than there is to-day. With zeal worthy of a better cause many are putting forth every effort to set this law aside With a false plea for liberty they ruthlessly strike at our dearest liberties, and with false patriotism they lay violent hands on the glorious bulwarks of our country. Resist them. And to make your resistance more effective let your Sabbaths be such in reality and truth. Make the day sacred. Consecrate its every hour to God, and use it in His service, thus shall—

"The Sundays of man's life
Threaded together on Time's string,
Make bracelets to adorn the wife
Of the eternal, glorious King."

Closely related to the foregoing duties is another,—"Search the Scriptures,"—and let the search be systematic, devout, thoughtful, and thorough. "Let the word of God dwell in you richly in all wisdom." What the axe is to the woodman, the oar to the boatman, the press to the printer, the compass to the seaman, the rifle and well filled cartridge box to the soldier, all that is the Bible to the believer. The young converts whom God has entrusted to our care we would specially advise to study the word of God." "Thy word have I hid in my heart that I might not sin against thee. This is the only weapon for both defence and attack. It is both sword and shield. Use it. It will give victory in conflict and safety in danger. Read prayerfully. The Book and its Author must be studied together. While consulting the one lift the mind upwards for

illumination from the other. He is wise whom God teaches, and strong whom God helps.

Another duty we would remind you of relates to your families. Take special care of the children. Do not fail to dedicate them in the Sacrament of Baptism to the Lord. Make no concessions to prejudice or error which would deprive them of this birthright privilege. Then seek for them the purchased blessings of the evangelical covenant. promise is to you and to your children." Let all your plans, purposes and counsels be directed to their early conversion. Let your homes be pervaded by cheerful religious influences. Let your practice and precepts, your life and profession all pull the same way. Do not let them gather from the tenor of your lips and lives that gain is more than goodness; that the gospel is a fiction and the world fact. The impressions you make on them will be permanent. Be careful that outside influences do not counteract home religious training. Children can serve Christ as early in life as they can serve Satan. See that they accompany you to the services of the Sanctuary, and help them from the first moments of life to decide for Christ. The welfare of our children is menaced on every hand. Guard them we'll, kindly-but firmly-lead them in the truth. Eli's latter days were clouded, and the clouds deepened into a sad night. Why? "His sons made themselves vile and he restrained them not." Are the morning and evening sacrifice regularly offered? A home without a roof were safer than one without the family altar. Do not allow these family devotions to become formal acts, but make them means of grace and seasons of instruction to your households.

While cultivating the gifts of the Spirit, and filling the opportunities for usefulness which everywhere open around you, forget not that the cause of God needs your continued and enlarged financial support. More of our circuits should be self-sustaining. The Missionary fund should be relieved from burdens which we are well able to bear. We are persuaded that a careful study of the question—"How much owest thou unto my Lord?" would result in placing many of our circuits above the need of support. Understand your duty in these things, and see your calling, brethren. The Jewish rule was ten per cent. We whose privileges are greater should not come below this at least. Indeed, the New Testament regulation is this,—"Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom." When David remembered how God had prospered him, he planned to build the most glorious temple the world ever saw. When Zaccheus-little of stature, but great of heart, had received Jesus under his roof he felt that he was distinguished forever. and his first remark was,—"I shall increase my contributions. I have given tithes; now I shall bestow half my goods to feed the poor." Let us measure our gifts in money by receipts in grace. Let the gift of the one be as the gift of the other, spontaneous, abundant, sovereign,

free. "God loveth the cheerful giver." Not by miracles does God sustain His work in the world now; nor does he now commission the ravens to feed His ministers. He commits this work to the hearts He has blessed and the hands He has filled. As good stewards of God's property see that ye be not recreant to your trust. Suffer not the ever-expanding dimensions of the work to overmaster our financial resources. Wherever the head of the church opens doors of usefulness let not the advance of His kingdom be imperilled or retarded by lack of funds for successful working. He knows our ability, and will apportion our work to that. In this respect as in others, "see that ye receive not the grace of God in vain."

Under the management of Brother Nicolson our Book Room affairs together with the Wesleyan have steadily improved. We are glad to learn that our Sabbath schools are finding it to their advantage to obtain their libraries from the Book Room at Halifax. This is as it should be. Our Methodist literature is second to none. In theology we are scriptural, and in biography there are no purer examples of Christian character than are found in the lives of our sainted dead. The annals of our Church are thronged with heroes and noble ones whose names cannot die. Study to become familiar with our own records. In reading, as well as in habits and conversation, let a Methodist atmosphere pervade your households. Let Methodist authors find a place in every Methodist home.

We again commend to your patronage and liberality our Educational Institutions at Sackville. To meet the growing and subtle scepticism of the day, our sons and daughters need sound religious as well as mental training. This the scholarly and thoroughly qualified men and women in these Institutions are prepared to furnish. In our pulpits, at the Bar, in the halls of Legislature, as well as in other positions of trust, are found worthy graduates from that seat of learning, and under efficient management, and with the assistance of the whole body of Methodists in these Provinces it will yet become powerful in moulding public thought. The opportunities there furnished for mental and religious training are not excelled by any other Institution in the country.

And now, brethren, "we commend you to God, and the word of His grace." While it shall be ours to seek the baptism of the spirit that we may be fitted to labor among you in the Lord, be it yours to seek the same baptism that ye may receive us as from the Lord. We seek to be workers together with Him, and conscious of our weakness we place our hand upon His arm of power. We expect to succeed only as our Ministry among you is directed and blessed by Him. Though dark are the clouds now closing over the world, the prostration of commerce, the marshalling of armies for war, yet our God liveth and reigneth forever, and our faith in the ultimate triumph of His truth, and the universality of His dominion shall not be shaken. "Though the earth be removed, and the

mountains be carried into the midst of the sea," yet shall the word of God abide forever. While the darkness thickens the day-dawn is at hand, and the falling of earthly thrones shall but hasten the erection of the throne of the Prince of Peace. This only duty lies before us—to give ourselves anew to God and His cause. Let us mutually seek the gift of power, and cultivate the grace of activity, earnestness, and thoroughness in Christian work. The day shortens. With the flying hours let us speed in the Master's service. Opportunities for usefulness abound on every hand, and into every ear the voice rings—"Son, go work to-day in my vineyard." To every one of us is committed a dispensation of the gospel. Let our influence be all, and always on the side of Christ, and let this description apply to all of us,—"Sons of God, without rebuke, shining as lights in the world, holding forth the word of life."

APPENDIX A.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY AUXILIARY SOCIETY, FOR THE NOVA SCOTIA CONFERENCE. 1877.

The last Annual Meeting of the Central Board of Missions was held in St. John, N. B., in October of last year. There were present representatives from all the Conferences, and the meeting was the most important yet held in connection with the Missionary work of our Church.

The entire field of the Society's operations, embracing the Dominion of Canada, Newfoundland, Bermuda and Japan, was most carefully surveyed; the number, location, necessities and general character of all the Missions were considered, and the present condition of the Society engaged the closest and most prayerful attention of the Board.

The Anniversary of the Society was held in Centenary Church. The Rev. Dr. Wood, Senior Secretary, read an abstract of the Report for the year ending June 1876.

The Report has been printed and circulated, but as its circulation is limited to subscribers of *Five* Dollars and upwards, we deem it right to copy from it a few facts for the information of another class of contributors. The Report embraces in the first section—

THE INDIAN MISSIONS.

Of these there are in British Columbia 5 Missions, and 4 Missionaries. In the North-West Territory there are 5 Missions and 5 Missionaries with 1 assistant. At White Fish Lake, one of the five stations, a day school has been established with an average attendance of 36 pupils of the Cree nation.

In Manitoba there are 5 Missions, and 4 Missionaries with 1 assistant,

In Ontario the Society has 25 Missions, and 2 in the Province of Quebec.

The total number of Indian Missions under the care of our Church is 42; with 31 Missionaries, 6 native Teachers, and 6 Ministers who aid the Missions near the circuits upon which they are stationed. Upon these Missions there are 3,334 members, an increase within the year of 305. During the year now closing the "Missionary Notices" have contained letters full of interest and encouragement in relation to this department of christian work. We give a few extracts from these letters:—

From the Rev. Thos. Crosby, dated Fort Simpson, British Columbia, Nov. 1st, 1876

As we are closing our last mail for this year, I feel that I must give you a few more items, although I have written you so recently. I think I told you in my last letter how our way had been opened to the Stickeen Indians, about 160 miles north of us, at Wrangel, Alaska Territory. Some of our young men working there had commenced to hold services, and upwards of three hundred were in attendance, and the work became so promising that I made a visit there about a month ago I preached in a large Indian house to a crowd of people, the Captain of the garrison and many other white men attending. A subscription was made towards putting up a building for church and school, and near \$500 were subscribed. I left two young men there to carry on the work, and they write me that there are fifty attending a school they have begun. Now I have no doubt but you will say that we cannot commence a Mission in Alaska Territory. I know that, but what can we do, we must help to save souls, when we have an opportunity, no matter where found, and I am hoping that some whole-souled Missionary from the United States may be led to

A word about home and I will close. Our church is finished at last, and we intend opening it next Sunday. I had hoped we should have some one to help us in the dedicatory services, but, no, we have had to work alone, and we are still to go on alone. But God is with us, blessing us at every step, so, confidently, we do what we find to do.

In our own country there are many calls. The Naas people have asked and asked again for a Missionary. I go to visit them (D. V.) next week. There are four bands of these Indians within about 30 miles, including, it is said, not less than 1,500 people. Then to the south of us is the Skeena River, with a similar number. Why is it that we cannot get more help where the field is so large and so ripe for harvest? I fear that if something is not done speedily, the opportunities may pass forever.

Last night we had a meeting to raise more money, hoping that the amount asked for by the District Meeting to finish the church might be thereby lessened. Our poor people went to work with a will, and I have seldom been in a more spirited Missionary Meeting. There were speeches and singing, and then came the subscription, which ran up to near \$400, most of it paid on the spot.

I hope soon to send you a complete account of our expenditure.

Pray for us, that many souls may be saved during the coming winter. Miss Knott is at her work with cheerfulness and zeal. All well.

Again we find in another letter from the same, dated Jan'y 31, 1871, the following interesting statements:—

"Our public means of grace are well attended. I had to form two new classes, so we nave six in all now. I baptized twenty adults a few weeks ago and more are desiring baptism. There are many of them eager to take the word of life to the heathen around us. When I go to visit other tribes my crew is always composed of volunteers, and the only expense I incur is the board of the men for the time. I am obliged, however, to take large canoes and good crews. Two weeks ago, with a crew of ten men, we were wind-bound for forty-six hours, not able to move either way—and cases have occurred in this part of the coast where canoes have been delayed thus for two or three weeks.

Miss Knott has had good attendance at the school all winter, (it has been as high as one hundred and sixteen,) but now the people are begin ning to scatter hunting, &c. Quite a number of houses have been built during the last year, and we expect many more the coming summer.

Feb. 14th.—I have just returned from my Naas visit; had a crew of eighteen; we made the run up in one day. Next day we called the chiefs and principal men together, and wished to hear what they had to say. J. J. Robertson, J. P., was present. Some very interesting speeches were made: one and all wishing to give up the old way and have a Mission School among them. One said, "we are very bad—dark, dark; we just see a little light now since you came to visit us; we think we see the stars. It has been a long night of darkness; now, do let us have the great light as the people at Fort Simpson have it. We do wish to have a white Missionary. Our people are very dark, very bad. Do not expect to change everything in one day. You see that mountain all covered with snow and ice—hard, very hard; but by-and-bye the sun comes, and slowly the snow melts away, and so it will be with our people, only give us the warm sun.

I know the Society has had hard struggling, but no people need one more than the Naas people. It is supposed that there are 1,200 or 1,500 people up there perishing for the bread of life, and not as they were two years ago, when I first visited them, opposed to the truth; but they are begging for it. I must send a native teacher up there at once, and do let us have a Missionary. I cannot go back to see those people in a few weeks and tell them there are thousands of people in old Canada and other parts of the world who pray for them and who long to hear of their salvation, but there are no funds, or there are not men enough who are willing to teach them the way of life. No, no, never. I would be ashamed to say that, when I know there are friends at home who could support a teacher there over and above their ordinary subscriptions and feel none the worse for it, but a thousand times happier.

Then, in the name of the God of Missions, we will enter these open doors!"

From Beren's River, in the Red River District, we find an interesting letter, dated March 6, 1877, from which we give the following extract:—

"Before coming to this Mission, I had read much of the hardness of the Saulteaux heart, and of the viciousness of their heathen practices. They were always represented to me as a generation of vipers, wholly given to idolatary, joined to their idols. I entertained the popular feeling against them, and did not suppose that much positive good was likely to be accomplished suddenly, however much of evil might be presently prevented. It seems that the Master-worker proposed differently, and I feel quite enough humbled to give Him all the glory.

Some few days ago, an old man, with raven locks and a poisoned face, came in to see me. I had often seen him before, and supposed that he was to plead poverty and crave charity as such; but to my surprise and delight he began to talk about spiritual matters. And this is the sum of what he said:—

"I have lived many years and have spent them all in sin. I have served the devil, and that faithfully. I have practiced every form of wickedness known to me. In witchcraft I was chief of all the people about here. In conjuring and in medicine work I have long led the van. My pagan countrymen look up to me as the priest of their tribe. Many a time I have extolled the gods in their hearing and u ged the claims of our idols upom them. They follow me as I follow the devil; but," and here he drew a long breath, "I want to put evil from me now and learn wisdom ere I die. My children and my wife are baptized. They go their way and I go mine, but my heart tells me that I alone am wrong. Long have I listened to Scriptural teaching, the truth dawns upon my soul and I am anxious to be saved after the gospel fashion. It seems my only hope. Perhaps the Indians will follow me in right-doing as they have in sin. At any rate I will try, by help divine, to set them a good example, and I will offer to God whatever influence I can command. I come, humbly trusting in Jesus' merits, hoping that through God's great mercy I may at last attain unto everlasting life," and then looking up at me he said, "Now, you have heard my story, will you baptize me to-morrow?" With all my heart, I replied, and proceeded to speak sure words of encouragement, as seemed necessary. So old "Sowinas," or South Wind, as his name implies, was on the 4th of Feb., 1877, baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, and since that time his outward deportment has wholly changed. God grant that the conversion may extend to even the thoughts and intent of the work.

I mention this circumstance at length, because I regard it as a gleam of that dawn which yet shall ripen into day. Sowinas has in some notable instances hindered my work hitherto, and now, with him on the side of right and God over all, surely the cause of truth must go forward.

I have made several long trips to outposts this winter, and been well encouraged and blessed in so doing. Congregations, ranging from twenty five to one hundred and thirty, have listened gladly and reverently to the word of God. Thirty adults, and as many children, have been baptized during the year. Ten have been added to the church, and others are, I verily believe, pressing into the kingdom of God."

The Rev. John McDougall, of the Saskatchewan District, in a letter dated Feb. 1st., 1877, makes the following remarks in reference to the White Fish Lake Mission, which are equally true of other Indian Missions:—

The next morning we went out on to a rise behind the Mission premises, to look at a spot to which it is proposed to move the church. From this we looked around upon the scene, and the sight was gratifying. Here was a village of native Indians dwelling in houses, cultivating plots of ground; their condition in this life being bettered every year; their children going to school; the "sound of the church-going bell" ever and anon echoing through the village; the majority of the people members of the Church; all peaceful citizens and well conducted towards their fellow-men. How changed! Was not this a wilderness? Were not

these men savage heathens? Yes, but the Gospel has been at work, its power has been felt, and we can stand and see the result. True, it has taken long years to effect this. The work has been slow. Well-nigh twenty years have gone since Bro. Steinhauer came among this people; and a Rundle had preached to them before. Sacrifice, time, money, life had been spent in the effort, and this is the result; but not all. Away out on the plains, among the roving tribes, the influence of this Mission is felt, and that for good. Of this there was marked evidence given at the Treaty, which took place this summuer at Fort Pitt."

JAPAN.

In this far distant Empire we have now four Missionaries, two of whom arrived there in September 1876. Upon the arrival of these brethren the first District Meeting was held, at which three converted Japanese offered as candidates for the Christian Ministry. Up to that date seventy-eight baptized converts had connected themselves with the church. The Rev. Mr. Eby, in reference to the converts, says:—

"Oct. 4, 1876.—The work of the brethren thus far has been largely amongst students and teachers, and a remarkable proportion of the converts are anxious to preach Christ, whom they have learned to love. Nearly a score are already local preachers, and more are coming on. Most of these, if the way opened for them, would become evangelists and preachers of the most promising class. They are nearly all graduates or undergraduates of the Imperial University, and some of them, of eminent scholarly attainments. They are thoroughly versed in Chinese classics and Confucian philosophy, but they are babes in Christian theology. In no country is thoroughness and depth so necessary as in Japan. Great blunders have already been made in working with half-baked clay. We fear to lay hands hastily on any man, and the very fact of their previous culture makes the further thorough training in Christian doctrine absolutely necessary before they can be entrusted with the great work of the ministry; for these men must be, to a great extent, the foundation stones of our future Church in Japan. They are poor, as they are a class peculiarly affected by the recent revolution, and if they are taught, they must also be supported. But, after suitable buildings are once provided, the expense would be small, and the Japanese, though poor, would help somewhat. We could then have a number of young men under our care all the time, and have them sent out certain months of the year in evangelistic work, until they could be entrusted with the full work of the ministry. Japan is to be taken by evangelistic work, and the sooner we are at it the better. Now, what's to be done? May God open some generous heart or hearts to endow an institution and put this matter on a sound basis—\$5,000 would effect the purpose, purchase land, build suitable houses, school room and lodgings."

Every communication received from this Mission reports cheering progress; the brethren are constantly meeting with tokens of the divine approval. At the Anniversary of the Society, J. McDonald, Esq., M. P., our liberal-hearted Treasurer, made the following allusion to Japan:—

Of all the interesting fields of Missionary labor in the world, none is so full of promise to-day as Japan; no people more anxious for the Gospel. The church commenced by us, it may be said but yesterday, has a membership of sixty—three gathered from paganism, and with an outspreading field, white unto the harvest, a field in which, during a short period, not less than six hundred Bhuddist temples have been closed as places of worship and appropriated to other purposes.

We have the fruits of this Mission brought to our very door, for at the Centennial, and connected with the Japanese department, are those who have been converted through the instrumentality of our own Missionaries, and who are filling important positions in connection with the department of their own work at the Exhibition. * * * * * * * * * *

Never, in the history of Missions, has any field yielded fruit so rapidly, or given such promise for the future, and if we are to improve the openings, if we are to be made a blessing to that interesting people, we must send them more Missionaries, and the day is not far distant when the whole of that field will be worked with a native agency.

GERMAN AND FRENCH MISSIONS.

These are next referred to in the Report. Of the former there are 5 Missions and 5 Missionaries; and of the latter 9 Missions and 7 Missionaries. The Evangelistic work among the French Romanists is assuming greater importance. A distinguished French Minister, formerly connected with the M. E. Church of the United States, has joined the Montreal Conference, and is laboring most successfully among his fellow countrymen in Montreal. Brighter days are dawning upon this portion of our Mission field.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT.

In additions to the Missions already enumerated the Society has under its care prosperous Missions among the English speaking population of British Columbia, Manitoba and Algoma. From all these Districts we have encouraging reports of the progress of true religion, and of the cause of Methodism.

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

The last section of the General Report refers to the Domestic Missions of the different Annual Conferences. Of these there are nearly 350, with 383 Ministers and 36,472 members.

GENERAL RECAPITULATION.

Missions, 422; Missionaries, 458; Members, 41,145. There are 30 day schools, with teachers, and 21 interpreters, the total number of the paid agents of the Missionary Board being 515.

I therefore contribute Fifty Dollars to be appropriated by the Committee to any destitute Indian Mission in the North West Territory, earnestly hoping that the praiseworthy example of this youthful and unpretentious Mission may lead many others of unquestionable ability to go and do likewise." Tho above sum was expended in assisting to support 42 Ministers with families, and 19 who are unmarried; giving to the

former an anticipated salary, exclusive of children's claims, of \$536.00 each, and to the latter about \$350.00.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion we would strongly impress upon the attention of our people, that the urgent appeals which are coming from portions of our work that are purely Missionary, and the desirableness of at once entering the promising openings now presented call for earnest effort in sustaining the Society's operations. Assistance towards these objects may be materially rendered by our Domestic Missions and dependent circuits, aiming steadily to enlarge their circuit income, so that these Circuits and Missions may, at the earliest period possible, cease to be a charge upon the funds of the Society. There are many circuits in our Province, especially in the agricultural districts, now receiving a Missionary grant, that ought to be self-supporting, and at the same time liberally aid in the extension of the cause of Christ in other fields; and we would urgently entreat our friends in such favored localities duly to consider their obligations in this respect. We are also certain that if the claims of the world's evangelization were more generally and more prayerfully considered, there would be on the part of many, such liberal responses, even in these times of monetary pressure, as would place the aggregate amount from our Conference to the Missionary Society considerably in the advance of the sum now contributed.

We are hopeful that no long period will elapse ere we shall be permitted to witness the attainment of this very desirable object; and in proportion as our hearts are enlarged in the exercise of Christian zeal and love, so will the Lord give us his blessing. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY.

Your Committee acknowledge with profound gratitude the favor with which a Divine Providence has crowned the Society during the past year, enabling it to report an increase in its finances and a growing conviction among the churches that not only should every Minister be a workman not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth, but that every encouragement and all needed aid, should be given to the young people of our congregations to avail themselves of the advantages offered by our Institutions of learning. By increasing the number of educated men and women in our church we will greatly add to our interests as a denomination and advance the cause of Christian civilization.

The pecuniary needs of the Society however have not yet been met. At its last annual meeting the Board of the Educational Society found a large deficit and in their Report appeal to the Methodist public for \$16,000 as necessary to meet present exigencies. Our Institutions have been founded by the intelligent liberality of many to whom the Lord has said, "Come up higher." Shall we, their successors in the responsibilities of life, allow these Institutions to languish? God forbid. Let us practice a little more self-denial. Set apart a larger amount of our income for this work, equally as important in its influence upon the future as any other work of the Church. APPENDIX C.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE WORK OF GOD.

The work of God throughout the bounds of our Conference, during the past year, although not characterized by that widespread revival influence which so graciously marked the year previous, has nevertheless, been attended by a steady and general progression. The labor of consolidation and conservation, which is often more difficult than that of ingathering, and unattended by which, the most powerful revivals, will prove of little worth, appears to have largely engaged the attention of the brethren; while the large number of those reported as "On Trial" for church membership, indicates, that in the absence of extensive revivals in large numbers, due attention has been given to the regular means of grace, for the carrying forward of the various interests of the Redeemer's Cause. A prominent and much to be desired feature in the spiritual Reports of the various Superintendent Ministers, is that of the special interest, which is being manifested in Christian work, by the Lay Members of our Church,-an interest which cannot fail of being followed with gracious results.

In the Halifax District, there has been a marked advancement on nearly every Circuit; but this is especially true of the various churches composing the Halifax north, Halifax south, and Windsor Circuits,

Cumberland District reports like manifestations of Divine power, particularly in the River Philip and Amherst Circuits. In the latter field, 85 have been brought to Jesus.

The Guysboro and Cape Breton District reports hindrances and discouragements, but withal, general success.

Delightful seasons of prosperity have been experienced in

some portions of the Annapolis District; notably in the Annapolis, Bridgetown, Wilmot and Aylesford Circnits. This District has been visited during the year, with severe affliction, in the removal by death, of several of our most devoted ministers; but while the workmen have thus rested from their labors, the work itself, has in the good providence of God, been carried steadily forward.

Long-continued and bitter opposition, by which our cause in the *Liverpool District* has been assailed, is dying out; to prove in its ultimate results to ourselves that the wrath of man, is still overruled by the Lord, to the advancement of His praise.

The numerical results of the labors of the past year, show a nett increase of 249 full members, with 849 on trial. We need scarcely remind our own people that, contrary to the practice of every other denomination of Christians, in our Province, our Church does not receive her converts into full membership, until they shall have manifested, by a period of probation, the genuineness of their change; otherwise our increase would now be reported as 1098.
