### THE WAR NEWS


A victory for the Roumanians on the Transylvanian frontier, and the repulse of the enemy with heavy loss is reported from Bucharest. There is no change in the situation in Dobrudja. This favorable news encourages the hope that the Teutonic and Bulgarian forces may be prevented from overrunning Roumania, and if they fail in that there is no part of the whole battle front where they can hope to do other than assume the defensive

Nothing of importance has transpired on the western front or in Macedonia. The Russians claim to have made some gains in Volhynia. The deadlock on the Italian front continues. The Russians have gained further success over the Turks in Armenia and Persia. The whole war news is favorable for the Entente Allies


Linburgh. In an interview the gallant piper was reluctant to say anything about his own achievement, but spoke with pride of the bravery of the men of his batta-
