Put in a cup and soak in cold water, mough to cover it, until it becomes soft. Cake four tablespoonfuls of cocca, mix with a cup of white sugar, dissolve in a cupful of boiling water to make a quart n all, and let the cocca boil gently for 15 and the sugar of the sugar.

in all, and let the cocoa boil gently for 15 or 20 minutes. Take a dozen macaroon's and crush to powder on bread board with rolling pin. When the gelatin is softened sufficiently, put it in a dish large enough to hold com-fortably all the ingredients, and pour on it the boiling cocoa. Stir thoroughly and when the gelatin is completely dissolved set away to cool. When jelly begins to stiffen, take the whites of two eggs and beat them to a stiff froth. Beat them in-to the jelly, adding to it the powdered macaroons, and set away to harden. Serve with whipped cream sweetened to taste with one or two teaspoonfuls of powdered sugar. If preferred, a small quantity of the

powdered macaroons may be saved and mixed with the whipped cream. Also, if one prefers to serve the jelly with cream and sugar, a smaller quantity of sugar, about three-quarters of a cup, may be used in the making.
