**"MILLION FOR MANITOBA"**

Big Emigration Campaign is Being Boomed in the Old Country

(Times' Special Correspondence.)

London, April 23.—The "Million for Manitoba League" (what attractive slogans come out of the west!) is being very actively pushed here by Henry B. Twiss, chief of the food and dairy division, Winnipeg, who is doing valuable work and has succeeded in directing great attention to the province. Dairy farming and market gardening are what he advocates for intending settlers.

"What growing on a large scale," he says, "has so long been the staple industry of the province, that the wheat raisers have got into the habit of regarding wheat as the one thing to rely upon. The result is that many of them come to grief through trying to tackle a bigger proposition than they can handle. The scarcity of labor at harvest time is one considerable risk, and the possibility of early frosts in the autumn is another."

"Up to now the dairy industry in Manitoba has been operated mainly as a side line; very little mixed farming is carried on sufficiently near to Winnipeg to get the advantage of the market. The result has been that the great majority of the wheat raisers do not understand any other department of agriculture, and when they do attempt it, frequently make a failure of the whole business, get discouraged, give it up, and discourage others."

**GOOD BYE TO COUNCIL; ENTER COMMISSION**

The retiring common council is meeting for its last session this afternoon. The meeting marks the close of the old regime. The new council will be sworn in at eleven o'clock tomorrow morning in the committee room at City Hall. The oath will be administered to the mayor by the common clerk and he in turn will swear in the commissioners.

THE FEAR OF WAR

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon one thought very clearly expressed on Saturday evening by the Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in his brilliant address before the Women's Canadian Club. It was the thought of what could be accomplished for human welfare and the world's betterment if the arms of war, whether between nations in the Channel or in industrial disputes, could be eliminated.

The old city council system in St. John expires today. May its ashes rest in peace and never need a sprinkler to keep them down.

The Liberals of St. John county are not to be caught napping. Meetings are called to choose delegates to the party convention.

The Kings county tory leaders would like to drop Mr. Fred M. Sprout, but Mr. Sprout naturally desires to fall in a soft place—or remain where he is. Where will the axe fall?

If the location of the breakwater farther down shore at Courtney Bay will improve the chances of providing a safe and securing a great steel plant, the citizens should get busy and urge the government to make the change.

The Colossus of Rhodes was one of the seven wonders of the ancient world. The world only remembers the existence of Rhodes, ancient Greek state and present Turkish dependency, when some such announcement is made as that the Italians have landed and seized the island.

Eleven arrests for drunkenness in one day in St. John is a disgraceful record. It indicates that a large number of persons must have been intoxicated on Saturday, for only a small proportion of the total ever fall into the hands of the police. If eleven were arrested many times eleven probably had a narrow escape.

The Moncton Transcript says:—'It speaks well for Canada and her future when young statesmen of the type of Mr. Mackenzie King, as evidenced by the broad grasp displayed in his discourse, have dedicated their talents and ability to the service of the Confederation and the Empire.'

Referring to Mr. Foster's visit to Australia in search of larger trade for Canada, the Hartland Observer asks if the farmers of Canada are to be asked to consent to an agreement that would help the agricultural implement manufacturers of Canada while at the same time it would give the farmer more competition. The Observer says:—'Only last September we were told by Conservative orators that the trade agreement with the United States because law our farmers would suffer because Australia would demand free entry of her meats and butter. Now Mr. Foster arranges the very thing his party professed to fear, and benefits nobody but the manufacturers.'

Who supplied the government with these goods in the name of J. P. Macaulay?

RELIGION IN JAPAN A remarkable religious conference was held in Tokyo, Japan, in February. The Home Minister in the Japanese government invited representatives of Shintoism, Buddhism and Christianity to meet together and about seventy of them assembled. He told them he desired to have their co-operation in bettering social conditions and promoting healthy spiritual progress. The conference, after a two days' discussion, adopted a series of resolutions, expressing their appreciation of the policy of religious freedom, and pledging themselves to promote the welfare of the state and to contribute to the development of national morality, while always adhering to and teaching their own respective creeds. They expressed the hope that the authorities would respect religion, think of the relations between the state and the promotion of international politics for the world's betterment.

Each of the three religions in Japan is a trial. Each has the fullest opportunity to prove in the life of its members its moral and spiritual power to uplift the people. The government stands apart, and not only encourages each to show the best fruits of its power, but urges each to respect the others, and all of them to exert their influence to improve social conditions. That is a condition of affairs which should appeal very strongly to those interested in Christian missions, and it is not without its lesson to Christian countries where differences in creed sometimes have a tendency to prevent Christians from co-operating in a whole-hearted way for social reform. The Japanese are a remarkable people, and their contribution to religious development in the world may be more significant than is dreamed of by other nations.

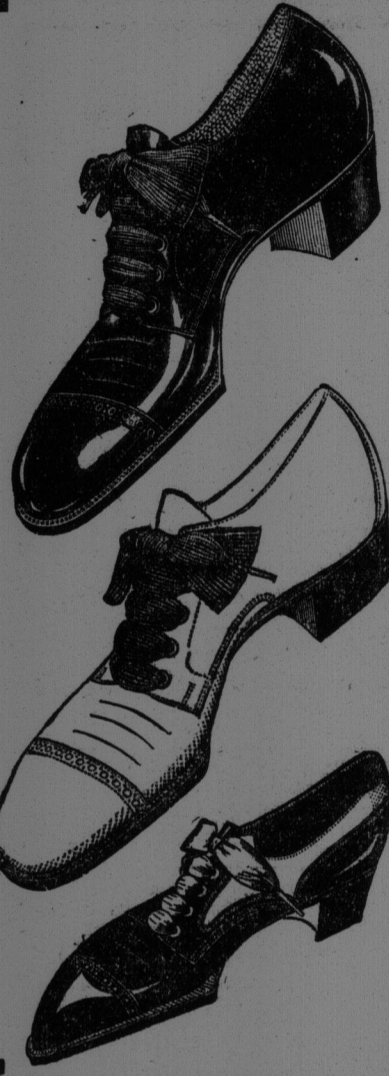

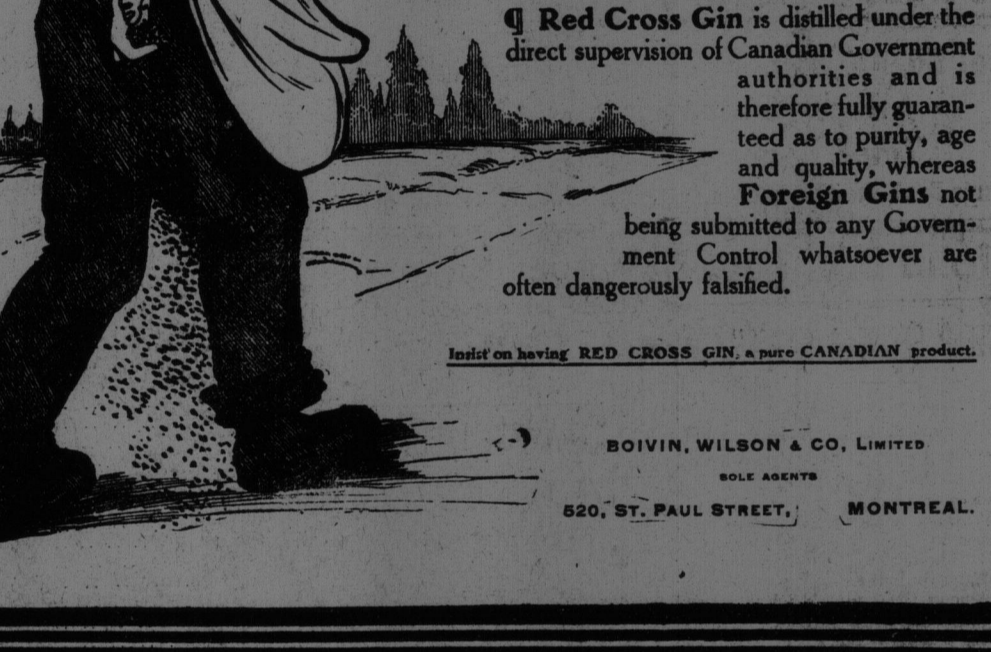

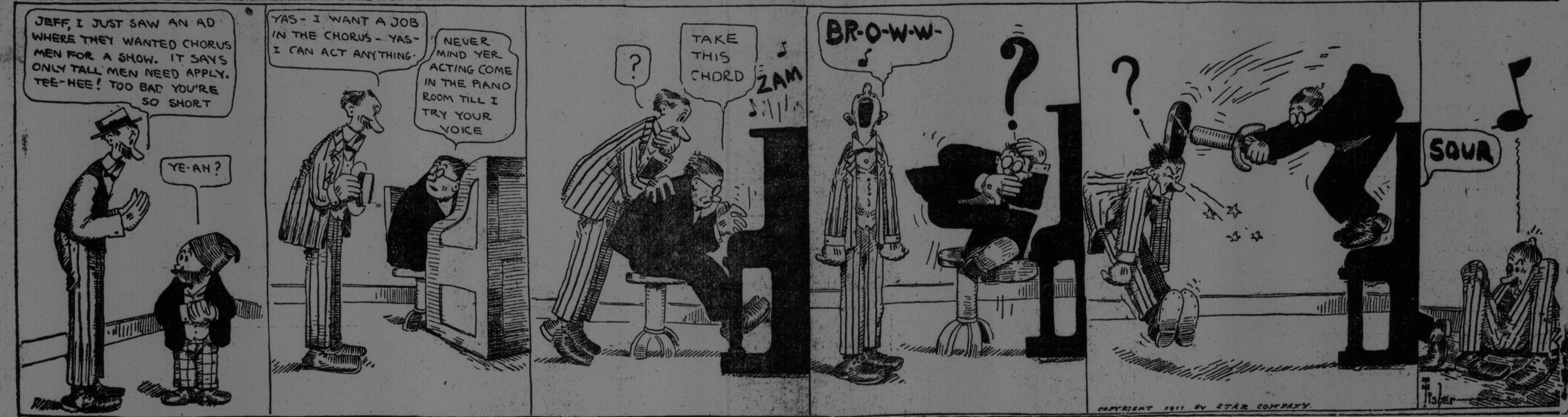

**SAYS TO BURN THE GARBAGE IN KITCHEN FIRE**

Timely Words by Doctor G. G. Melvin in April Health Report

**THE BEST WAY TO DO IT**

Serious Danger in Accumulation of it in Yard, Especially for Children — April Deaths 72 — More Than in March, But Fewer Than April 1911

The April report of Doctor G. G. Melvin, health officer is as follows:—

The following cases of contagious disease were reported from the city during the month. The figures for the preceding month and for the corresponding month last year are given for comparison.

**The Disposal of Garbage**  
Garbage may be said to be the refuse of the kitchen and dining-room. It consists of two principal classes of matter—vegetable and animal. The former is made up of the parings and scrapings of potatoes, carrots, apples, onions and such like, and the parts of vegetables which are rejected as unsound or not suitable for food, as the outer leaves of cabbage heads, the "hulls" of strawberries and so forth.

Animal refuse is of much greater importance as an insanitary product than is vegetable. It is hardly necessary to specify its varieties. Bones and particles of meat mainly compose its solid materials, and soups and gravies, its liquid.

But vegetable and animal matter are subject to the same law of nature—decomposition—the animal very rapidly, and vegetable much less so. Decomposition is the breaking up, or separating of a substance into its original elements, and, in decomposition, is always a disagreeable process to those close at hand, and, very often may become a dangerous one.

Garbage, therefore, should be carefully looked after by the householder, and should not be permitted to accumulate to any extent either within the house, or in the yard outside.

Many plans have been devised and put into operation for the removal and permanent disposal. Most of them are more or less effective, and all, somewhat expensive. By far the cheapest, most satisfactory and easiest way to get rid of it is to burn it in the kitchen range, day by day, as it is produced. This is not a difficult matter in all ordinary families. Where the number of people composing the household is large, as in hotels and boarding houses, some other way must be adopted, practicable to burn the garbage of a medium-sized family in the very room in which most of it is produced.

If put in a wide and shallow pan and placed behind or upon the bank of the range for a couple of hours, a great deal of the moisture will dry out, and the material will burn quite readily in a brisk fire. In fact, so treated, it will do something to save fuel.

**Save Lives of Children**

If this plan were generally adopted, it would, itself, save the lives of many young children each summer. Nothing more readily and quickly poisons the soil of a yard than decaying meat and greasy liquids, and it is from the poisoned soil that most of the digestive diseases come which are so fatal to children in the hot weather.
