Who's Who

WHEN Karl Manne George Siegbrahn of Sweden was in high school, he was rated as an ordinary student. Now, at 39, he is the winner of the Nobel prize in physics, the only prize to be given out in 1925. Even in physics, a favorite subject, his grade at the school in Hudiksvall, in northern Sweden, was not high. Yet he is one of the youngest men to receive a Nobel prize in any line.

He originally intended to follow a military career, but finally decided to study physics at the University of Lund, in southern Sweden, instead of going to the military academy. At 26 Siegbrahn won his doctor's degree in physics and was appointed an instructor. Four years later he became assistant professor at Lund. At 34 he was a full professor there after having refused a full professorship at the German University of Prague the year previous. At 37 he became head of the physics department of the old University of Upsala, the highest academic honor in Sweden.

Professor Siegbrahn was given the prize for research work in the X-ray field and the inner structure of the atom.
