

THE SYNOD

OF THE

UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

I. SEDERUNT.

Hamilton, Tuesday, June 3, 1856, 7½ o' clock, P. M.

The Synod of the United Presbyterian Church in Canada, met, and, after sermon by the Moderator, the Rev. Robert Torrance, from Ps. xx. 5., "in the name of our God, we will set up our banners," was constituted.

The Presbytery of London reported that they had licensed Report of Lon-Mr. John Fotheringham, to preach the Gospel, on July 4, don Presbytery. 1855: that they had accepted the Rev. Mr. Fraser's demission of the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Chatham, on July 4, 1855; and Mr. Logie's demission of that of Brucefield, on January 2, 1856; that they had inducted the Rev. Mr. Fraser, into the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Goderich, on July 18, 1855; and had ordained Mr. John Fotheringham to that of Hibbert and Flat Creek, on February 26, 1856. Further, that they had organised the Congregation of West Nissouri, of persons previously in connexion with the Congregation of London, on July 4, 1855; the Congregation of Grey, on October 3, 1855; the Congregation of Thames Road, of persons previously in connection with the Congregation of Warrensville, on November 14, 1855; and the Congregation of Grant County, Winconsin, of persons formerly in connection with the Congregation of the English Settlement, on April 2, 1856.

Report of Flam-

The Presbytery of Flamboro' reported that, on the 10th of boro Presbytery. July last, they had ordained Mr. John Lees, over the Congregations of Ancaster East and Ancaster West.

Report of Toronto Presbytery.

The Presbytery of Toronto reported that, on July 3, 1855, they had inducted the Rev. Peter Glassford to the pastoral charge of the Congregations of Albion and Vaughan, and added his name to the Roll. That, on the 7th August last, they received into the Church, by certificate from the Board of Missions of the U. P. Synod, Scotland, the Rev. Messrs. James Caldwell and Thomas Watson, and also, on the 4th of September last they received the Rev. Walter Inglis, and reported their names to the Committee of Distribution, to be put on the list of Probationers. Also, that, on the 6th of May last, they had received the Rev. W. Fraser's demission of the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Tecumseth. The Presbytery, at the same time, agreed to record their satisfaction with the state of mutual respect and affection so long existing between this Congregation and Mr. Fraser, and with the fact, that this demission had taken place, by consent of both parties, in order to extend the operations and influence of the Church.

Report of Canada Eest Presby-

The Presbytery of Canada East reported that the Rev. Walter Scott had demitted the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Lachute, and that his name had been taken from the Roll of Presbytery; and that, on the 30th of May last, the Rev. Alexander Lowden, of New Glasgow, had been removed by death.

Report of Lanark Presbytery.

The Presbytery of Lanark reported the following congregational changes since last meeting of Synod, namely :-In January, 1855, certain members of the Congregation of Pakenham, residing in and around the Village of Arnprior, were, at their request, disjoined from the said Congregation, and with others, members of the United Presbyterian Church were congregated under the designation of the United Presbyterian Congregation of Arnprior, and this Congregation, thus organized was separated from the Congregation of Fitzroy Harbour and Torbolton, was formed into a new charge and declared a vacancy.

Alexander Henderson, the Minister of those Congregations, by whom they had been formed, chose to continue in the pastoral oversight of the Congregations of Fitzroy Harbour and Torbolton. These latter congregations engage to pay, as stipend, £60 a year, which, in the opinion of the Presbytery, is the utmost, that under present circumstances, they can raise; and being purely Missionary Congregations, are, together with the Station of Riddellstown, about five miles from Fitzroy Harbour, lately opened by Mr. Henderson, and which engages to pay £10 a year, recommended to the fostering care and support of the Synod.

The Presbytery of Durham reported that, on the 17th of Report of Durham Presbytery. April last, they had inducted the Rev. Robert Monteath into the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Prince Albert;—said Congregation having been constituted by the Presbytery in the month of March; and that they had disjoined the Columbus section of the Congregation of Whitby, and constituted it into a Congregation on the 16th February last.

The Presbytery of Wellington reported that, on the 17th Report of Wellington October, 1855, they had ordained Mr. Robert Dewar, to tery. the pastoral oversight of the Congregation of Lake Shore, Sydenham; that they inducted the Rev. Alex. Steart into the charge of the Congregation of Garrafraxa, on the 1st of January, 1856; and, on the 17th of April last, had ordained Mr. James Caldwell over the Congregation of Esquesing.

The Presbytery of Brant reported that they had licensed Mr. William Clarke to preach the Gospel, on the 24th of Presbytery. July, 1855; and had organized a Congregation, in connection with the United Presbyterian Church, at Shakspeare, on on the 6th May, 1856.

The Roll of Synod being completed, from the Rolls fur-Roll called nished by the several Presbytery Clerks, was now called and marked.

Proceeded to the election of a Moderator, when the Rev. Election of Moderator.

Messrs. Duff, Kennedy and Drummond were, successively, nominated and seconded. The name of Mr. Kennedy was, at his earnest request, allowed to be withdrawn from the list of candidates, and a vote being taken, the Rev. John Duff, Mr. Duff chose

of Elora, was chosen Moderator. Mr. Duff took the chair and addressed the Synod.

On motion of Mr. Jennings, it was agreed, nem. con. that,—
Devotional exer- inasmuch as to-morrow is to be held generally, as a Day of
Public Thanksgiving, because of the restoration of peace between the Allied European nations and Russia, the first Sederunt of this Synod be devoted to religious services suitable
to the occasion.

Persons to Conduct.

The Moderator then appointed the Rev. Drs. Taylor and
Ferrier, and Messrs. Fotheringham and Caldwell, to conduct the services of to-morrow forenoon.

The Rev. Messrs. Torrance and Ormiston were appointed to examine the accounts of the Synod's Treasurers, to report to-morrow evening.

Closed with the benediction.

II. SEDERUNT.

Hamilton, Wednesday, June 4, 1856, 10 o'clock, A.M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Duff, moderator.

Religious services were conducted, in accordance with the resolution agreed upon last night, by the Rev. Messrs. Fotheringham and Caldwell, and by Drs. Ferrier and Taylor; an

address on the subject of the late restoration of peace being, in the course of the services, delivered by Dr. Ferrier.

The Roll was called. The Rev. John McCurdy, of Chatham, New Brunswick, Rev. J. McCurdy one of the Ministers of the Presbyterian Church of Nova-pond. Scotia, was introduced to the Synod by Mr. Fraser, and was invited to take his seat, as a corresponding member.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Duff, moderator.

The Roll was called, and the minutes of the two former sittings were read and approved.

The Presbytery of Flamboro' reported that during the Flamboro' last year, they have had one Student under their inspection, that he had appeared once, only, during that period, when he was enjoined to re-write the discourses which he had just delivered, and informed that unless there was marked improvement in his exercises, the Presbytery could not, in faithfulness, recommend him to proceed with his studies.

The Presbytery of Toronto reported that they had, during Toronto. the last year, six Students under their inspection, viz:—
Messrs. Fletcher, Chesnut, Moffat, Donald, Hall and Hume; that they had three several meetings with them, at which the Students were examined, or read and delivered exercises, according to the Synod's scheme for Presbyterial examination of Students.

The Presbytery of Brant reported that Mr. Moffatt deli-Brant vered several exercises, to their satisfaction, and was transferred, at his request to Toronto Presbytery, Feb. 5, 1856; also that, after examination, they had recommended Mr. Joseph Whyte to the Divinity Hall.

The Presbytery of Durham reported that they had under Durham. their care one Student, namely, Mr. McFaul. Owing to the lengthened attendance of the Students at the Hall, in Toronto, only one meeting was held with him, when the exercises, appointed by the Presbytery, were satisfactorily performed.

The Presbytery of Canada East reported that there had Canada East. been one Theological Student under their care, Mr. Stephen Balmer, who had attended the Divinity Hall of the U.P. Church, in Edinburgh, two years. He passed the usual examinations to the satisfaction of the Presbytery.

The Presbytery of Wellington had not had any students Wellington under their inspection.

The Committee for the distribution of Preachers gave in Committee Return their report of the following purport, namely:—

The Committee for the distribution of Probationers report, that from July to September, 1855, there were nine Proba-

tioners on the list, viz :- The Rev. Messrs. Caldwell, Carruthers, Clarke, Dewar, Fotheringham, Monteath, Muir, Stuart and Watson, to supply 23 reported vacancies, giving little over one-third supply. At the end of this quarter Mr. Dewar's name was taken from the list, he being settled in one of the vacancies within the bounds of the Wellington Presbytery; and Mr. Carruther's name was withdrawn in consequence of being incapacitated, by ill health, for the

From October to December the number of Probationers The Rev. Mr. Inglis having been received and his name placed on the list. There were 23 vacant congregations reported, giving still only one-third supply. At the end of this quarter, the names of Messrs. Fotheringham and Stuart were taken from the list, the former having accepted a call within the bounds of the London Presbytery, and the latter to a congregation within the bounds of the Presbyrery of Wellington. During the next quarter, viz: from January to March, 1856, there were 6 Probationers, and 24 vacant congregations, giving about one fourth supply. At the end of this quarter, the names of Messrs. Caldwell, Inglis and Monteath were taken from the list, at their own request, these brethren having been called and about to be settled. Mr. Carruthers having applied to have his name placed again on the list of Probationers, his request was complied with, but in a very short time, he was again incapacitated by ill health, so that there were only 3 Probationers during the months of April, May and June, to supply 18 vacancies, giving only one-sixth supply. There have been six preachers ordained, or inducted into pastoral charges, during the past twelve months, and one became unable for the duties of a preacher. There are still three on the list; one of whom is now under call, and will likely be settled at the end of June. There is very urgent need for more preachers. There are still about 21, or 22 vacant congregations and stations, which very much require a settled Ministry.

Whereas, in the second question of the Formula for Ministers and Elders, at Ordination, and for preachers at license, the following words occur, viz :- 'It being understood that you are not required to approve of anything in these documents,' (i. e. the Confession of Faith, the Catechisms, Larger and Shorter) 'which teaches, or is supposed to teach, compulsory, or persecuting and intolerant principles in religion: "-And whereas, said words, in the opinion of the Presbytery, are indefinite, as they seem to give, or imply the negative, or silent sanction, or permission of the Church, to hold and approve of compulsory, or persecuting and intolerant principles in religion :- It is therefore overtured that the Synod alter and amend this Section of the Formula, by erasing the words are not required to approve of, and inserting in their stead, disapprove, condemn, or some such synonyme or, sentence of like import."

Mr. Kennedy was heard in support of the Overture.

It was moved by Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Dunbar, Motion. that the amendment on the Formula, proposed in the Overture, be adopted by the Synod.

It was moved in amendment, by Mr. Jennings, seconded by Amendment. Mr. Cross, that it is not expedient to entertain the prayer of this Overture.

A vote being taken, 25 voted for the amendment, and 13 for the motion. The amendment was therefore declared to be carried, and the Synod did, and do resolve in terms thereof, that it is not expedient to make any change in the Formula for Ordination.

Adjourned, to meet to-morrow morning, at 9 o'clock. Closed with the benediction.

Alexander Lowden, of New Glasgow, in Canada East, so suddenly and unexpectedly removed from amongst us by death, hereby recommend the case of the family to the people of our respective congregations, in order that, by collections or subscriptions, they may express their interest in their welfare.

Agreed to request Dr. Taylor, of Montreal, and the Synod of Elder from his church, Mr. Laird Patton, to take charge of any funds which may be raised for the above purpose.

Adjourned to meet again this evening at half-past seven o'clock.

Union Commit-

The Rev. Dr. Taylor, of Montreal, Convener of the Committee on Union with other Evangelical Churches, gave in a report of the action of the said Committee, to the following purport:—On behalf of the Committee on Union with the Presbyterian Church of Canada, it was reported by Dr. Taylor, the Convener, that he had received a very friendly letter from Mr. Ure, the Convener of the Committee appointed by the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, suggesting the "expediency of calling a joint meeting of the two Committees." Dr. Taylor replied in the same spirit, and proposed that a joint meeting should be held in this City, on the 4th of June. Said meeting had been held, and was followed by

two adjourned meetings, in all of which there had been so much harmony of sentiment, and cordiality of feeling, as furnished matter of devout thankfulness to God. The Committees had agreed to present the following Minute to the respective Synods:—

"Having had lengthened conference together, in the conducting of which the Committees have reason to believe that they have enjoyed much of the presence of the Great Head of the Church, they are gratified to find, that, apart from the question pertaining to the power, obligation, and duties of the Civil Magistrate, they are perfectly at one on all the great doctrines laid down in the Westminster Confession of Faith; and further, that, on the special question above referred to, and the points involved in it, or connected with it, such as the exclusive Headship of Christ over the Church, individual liberty of conscience in religious matters, and the obligation of all men, in all the relations of life, to be governed by the authority of the Lord Jesus Christ, there was such a measure of harmony of sentiment manifested as to warrant the hope of its being found practicable to frame some declaration on these points which might be mutually satisfactory, and calculated to prepare the way for a Union of the two Bodies. They therefore agree to ask their respective Synods to reappoint a Committee to take additional steps to advance the Union of Churches holding so many great principles in common, and especially to prepare a Declaration which might be afterwards used as a basis of Union, in which the exclusive Headship of our Lord Jesus Christ over his Church, and the freedom of conscience, on the one hand, and the obligation of all men to be goverened in all their public and private relations, by the authority of Christ, in his word, on the others may be fully maintained."

Clergy Reserve Commutation

Called for the Report of the Committee, appointed near report of Com- the close of the last meeting of Synod, to memorialize the the Governor General, in Council, on the settlement of the Clergy Reserve question, and with reference especially to the Commutation clauses introduced into the Act of settlement.

> Dr. Taylor, the Convener gave, verbally, a statement of the action taken by the Committee, on the matter referred to them, and said further, that in consequence of the paper containing the resolutions which had been agreed upon, being mislaid it had not reached him for some months after the meeting of Synod, and then wanted, for certain reasons, the name of one of the members of Committee; that in consequence of this defect and the long time which had elapsed, he came to the conclusion that the proper time had gone by, and that he had not forwarded the paper to the Governor General, and now laid it on the Synod's table.

onvener's conluct approved.

The conduct of the Convenor of the Committee was approved, the thanks of the Synod were given him, and the Committee discharged.

The resolutions, to the purport following, as reported by Dr. Taylor, were then unanimously adopted by the Synod, and the Clerk was instructed to transmit an authenticated copy of them to the Governor General, in Council.

Resolved,—1. That this Synod learned, with the utmost Resolutions-satisfaction, that a Bill, to settle the long-pending question of the Clergy Reserve Lands, was introduced into the Provincial Parliament, under the auspices of the Government; and especially as that Bill, according to the terms used in the Third Section, was designed "to remove all semblance of connection between Church and State" in this Province, and was therefore adapted to allay the contentions on this subject by which the Country has been so long agitated; contentions not only injurious to its prosperity, but calculated to endanger the connection happily subsisting between it and Great Britain.

- 2. That their hopes have been grievously disappointed, by the introduction into the said Bill of the Commutation clause, and especially by the manner in which it has been carried out; inasmuch as it makes an invidious distinction between different Religious Denominations, and inasmuch as, by removing the moneys arising out of the Commutation from the control of the Legislature, it is calculated to perpetuate all the evils of a State Endowment, in even a more aggravated form:—All which the Synod firmly believe to be opposed to the well-known wishes of the people, and fitted to re-kindle those dissensions, social and political, which it was trusted the Bill would terminate for ever.
- 3. That in the opinion of this Court any settlement under the Commutation Clause, with any parties whatever, which is inconsistent with the declaration already quoted from the third Section of the Act, ought not to be considered final, and should therefore, be held subject to the revision of any future Parliament.

A question being raised as to granting a synodical certificate Certificate to the Rev. Mr. Devine, it was agreed to instruct the Clerk, and he is hereby instructed to give to Mr. Devine, on his application, a historical certificate of his relation with and disjunction from this Church, embodying therein the substance of the proceedings of Synod in his case, at this Session.

It was moved by Dr. Ferrier, seconded by Mr. Jennings, and unanimously agreed,—That this Synod having listened, with much satisfaction, to the addresses of our brethren from Nova Scotia, and to Mr. Geddie's letter,—Resolve, to institute, as soon as practicable, a Mission to the South Seas, to be conjoined, should it be agreeable to the Synod of Nova Scotia, with their Mission; and that as soon as sufficient funds are realized, and a suitable Missionary obtained, they shall be happy to co-operate with the Sister Church in their zealous, and, through God's blessing, already successful labours, in that interesting field.

Dr. Ferrier and Mr. Jennings were then appointed a Committee to take such steps as may be requisite to excite an interest in this object among our congregations in this country.

The Clerk was instructed to send, with all convenient despatch, a copy of the proceedings in regard to this matter, to the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Nova Scotia.

Ordered,—That 400 copies of the Minutes of this meeting of Synod be printed for the use of Ministers and Sessions.

Ordered,—That the sum of £2 10s be paid to the Church officer for his attendance and services at this meeting.

The thanks of Synod were given to the office-bearers and congregation of Hamilton for the accommodation furnished by them to this meeting of Synod.

REPORT OF THE MISSION COMMITTEE OF THE UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA, FOR THE YEAR 1855-56.

Your Committee have to return thanks to the Giver of all Good, by whom they have been mereifully preserved during the past year, and are now permitted to lay before you a report of the proceedings which they have taken on those matters which were brought under their consideration in connection with the Missions of the Church. "Bless the Lord O my soul! and all that is within me bless his holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul! and forget not all his benefits, who forgiveth all thine iniquities, who healeth all thy diseases, who redeemeth thy life from destruction, who crowneth thee with loving kindness and tender mercies."

Your Committee for reasons similar to those which influenced them last year, appointed a Sub-commonitie to take action on cases which might arise during the intervals of meeting, requiring of course, the sub-committee to give in their report, and reserving to themselves the right of approving or disapproving of the same as they might see proper. By this arrangement the business of the General Committee has been greatly facilitated, and in no instance have they seen it necessary to challenge the decision of the sub-committee.

At their meeting in July last, held in the Village of Ancaster, a letter was read from the Rev. Dr. Somorville, Secretary of the Board of Missions in Scotland, intimating that the offered services of the Rev. Messrs. Todd and McGowan, both of whom had been in pastoral charges, had been accepted for Canada, with those of the Rev. Mr. Inglis, and of Messrs. Caldwell and Watson, Probationers of the Church. Dr. Somerville farther stated in his letter that as this completed the number of ten Preachers asked from home by this Synod, some time back no efforts would be made by the Board in Scotland to engage any more unless at the request of the Synod here. The Convener was instructed to write to the Board, tender them thanks for the kindness already shewn them in

procuring missionaries for this Province, to give, so far as he was able, an account of the state, wants and prospects of the Church; and to solicit an increase of labourers for the vacancies which still exist, and for the fresh fields which are opening up. Two of the above named ministers did not come out, but your Committee are gratified to have to state that in a letter received during the month of May, Dr. Somerville men-tions that the Board had accepted the services of the Rev. Messrs. Gibson and Stevenson; we hope that these brethren will soon appear in the midst of us and show themselves disposed to go up to the high places of the field. For, with all the supply that has come from Scotland, and with the addition of those who had been trained and licensed in the Province, the wants of the church are numerous and are more increasingly press-Large tracts of country which have long been settled, are without Gospel ordinances administered by an educated ministry. Many members and adherents of the United Presbyterian Church, have gone into parts whither they have not been followed by our ministers, because of the work they have had to do in other quarters. In many places that were but lately a forest, and which have been settled by an enterprising population, cultivation is going forward, families are growing up, and souls are ripening for eternity; but our Church is unable to send in the word of life to them, for she has none by whom to send it. Help from home will be required for a time, at all events, and your Committee bearing in mind the promptitude and cordiality with which the Church at home has responded to past applications that have been made, for men and money, cherish the confidence that help will be still afforded from the same

Your Committee, during the year, have passed applications from Probationers and Ministers, in discharge of engagements with the Home Board to the amount of £371 7s. 8d. In all cases they have required reports of their labours within the bounds of Presbyteries to be transmitted and certified to them. Several of these reports have been sadly defective; and although the Committee have taken no action farther than to characterize them as they were read ; yet they think it strange that Presbyteries have allowed them to pass through their hands, and their certification to be affixed to them without comment or qualifi-In particular, your Committee would specify the matter of family visitation. Probationers give very little attention to this. Some of them, indeed, plead their inability to visit because of the short period they are within the bounds of any congregation; but more than one of the members of your Committee have found it practicable to visit as many as seven or eight families, and that at a busy season of the year and yet make their way to the next station on the following To the Synod we would respectfully recommend that instructions be issued to Presbyteries to see that the law of the Church on this point be faithfully complied with.

Three Congregations have received supplement in the course of the year. The whole sum granted and drawn by them is £125 19s. 9d.

Mr. Frazer, Catechist, has still been prosecuting his labours with the same Christian diligence and zeal for which he has all along been characterized. Your Committee have much pleasure in being able to state that he has not had occasion to draw any supplement from the Fund for the past year. The stations among which he has been labouring have prospered and given proof of their appreciation of his services and of their religious principle by contributing the amount, and more than the amount promised him as stipend. To Mr. Frazer himself it must be a gratification to witness these ovidences of success. To the Presbytery of London, whose Catechist he is, it must be a source of gladness that he has not laboured in vain nor spent his strength for naught, while the

Synod must be pleased with this other instance of the profitable expenditure of funds raised to help those who were unable by their own contributions to obtain the administration of the word of God among them.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

The Committee on Theological Education beg respectfully to submit to the Synod the following Report:—

The Committee, agreeably to instructions, printed and circulated the address approved of at last meeting of Synod, relative to the raising of a Fund for aiding and encouraging Students in Divinity; and a number of the congregations were visited by Dr. Taylor, with reference to the same object. The reception he met with was, in every instance, cordial and kind, Ministers giving their efficient and valuable co-operation; and the contributions obtained were, generally, liberal, in some cases, deserving to be called munificent, when the size and circumstances of the congregations are considered. The entire sum received amounted to £287 13s 9½d cy.—being from the Congregation of Hamilton £81 5s 0d;—of Eramosa, £30 2s 6d;—of Caledonia £4 6s 3d;—of Indiana, £4 17s 6d;—of Oilenda, £7 2s 6d;—of Caledonia £4 6s 3d;—of Indiana, £4 17s 6d;—of Oilenda, £7 2s 6d;—of Caledonia £4 6s 3d;—of Beverly £5 13s 9;—of Esqueing, £35 5s 0d;—of Guelph, £64 0s 8d;—of Beverly £5 13s 9;—of Esqueing, £35 5s 0d;—of Newcastle, £11 5s 0d;—together with the sums of £1 5s 0d, from Mr. Robert Rodgers, West Dumfrics, and 5s, from Mr. James Gray, of Perrytowa.

The Session of the Divinity Hall was opened on Tuesday 16th October. In the absence of the Moderator, the Rev. Dr. Ferrier commenced with devotional exercises, followed by an address. The Rev. Dr. Taylor read the Introductory Lecture. The Rev. William Ritchie, of Dunse, Scotland, who was present, being requested, delivered an address, and the Rev. Mr. Dick concluded with prayer. The Rev. Alexander Kennedy was also present. The number of students who entered was ten, viz: of the fourth year, Mr. F. Tisdell of the the third year, Messis. A. McFaul and R. C. Mossi, of the second year, Messis. T. G. Chesnut, W. Fletcher and D. Waters; of the first year, Messrs. W. Donald, R. Hull, R. Hume and J. White.

The Committee agreed that the Grants from the Fund for Students should be made in the form of Exhibitions, of £11, £10, and £9 each, according to merit; and that with the view of ascertaining merit, an examination of the Students, by means of written papers, on the subjects appointed by the Synod for examination in Presbyteries, should take place; and a sub-committee was appointed for carrying out this arrangement. On three successive evenings, accordingly, examinations were conducted; and the Sub-Commtitee afterwards gave in the following report of their procedure, which the Committee agreed to sanction and approve, viz :- "Toronto, 12th Dec. 1855. The Sub-Committee on Theological Education have carefully considered the papers given in at the Examinations on the 17th, 18th, and 19th October last and feel highly satisfied with them upon the whole, taking into account the circumstances of the case. The following is their award :- Fourth year, to Mr. Tisdell, £11; third year to Mr. Moffat, £10; second year, to Messrs. Waters and Chesnut, who are bracketed, £11, and to Mr. Fletcher £10; first year, to Messrs. Hume and Donald, who are bracketed, £11, to Mr. Hall £10, and to Mr. White, £10. Those bracketed are regarded as of so nearly equal merit that no attempt is made to distinguish them. The others in each year are regarded in the order of merit, as named above, or where there is only one in any year, his rank is indicated by the sum awarded to him. The Sub-Committee consider all to be of such respectability that they have not thought it necessary to award to any only £9. Mr. McFaul did not submit to any examination, but very respectifully begged to be excused on the ground that he did not know of the examination. The Sub-Committee regret that he did not take the same course as the others, especially as no direct intimation was given to any, and as the subjects of examination were all just those on which Presbyteries are required by the Synod to examine. The Sub-Committee, nevertheless, agree to give him £10, which, however, they do not wish to be regarded as a precedent. Dr. Taylor stated to the Sub-Committee, before the cons deration of the Papers, that Mr. Waters was absent from one of the examinations, but had been allowed, on application, to write his papers afterwards in Dr. Taylors' house, and presence in doing which he had been held in all respects strictly to the same conditions, as at the public examinations. The Sub-Committee agreed to accept these Papers, but to declare that this shall not form a precedent, as they regard it of importance that the examinations shall be simultaneous and public. (Signed)

The Committee felt much gratified by receiving so favourable a report, and are of opinion that such examinations are fitted to be exceedingly beneficial, and ought to be continued.

After the sums above specified as paid to students, together, with £4 13s 9d, as expenses of printing, postage and travelling are deducted from the amount received for aiding and encouraging Students, there remains, in fund, £178 0s 0½d, which will bear interest at 6 per cent. from 16th October last.

Dr. Dick's Lectures having been gone over in the three preceding Sessions, no Systematic Theology was taught during the Sessions last closed, but, instead, the attention of the students was occupied with the Evidences of Christianity, Butler's Analogy being used as Text Book, and made the subject of examination from beginning to end; and the principles and chief features of the other departments of the evidences were also brought under consideration. The Epistle to the Ephesians was critically read in Greek, selected passages of the Old Testament, regarded as specially Messianic, were read in Hebrew, together with the corresponding portions in the Septuagint. The Students were examined on Mosheim's Church History from the beginning of the 16th Century, to the end of his work. They also each delivered a discourse and gave in three written exercises on subjects prescribed to them.

The Committee expended on Books, for the Theological Library, the sum of £19 15s 11d, leaving the balance of the amount received from the Treasurer to be laid out by Dr. Taylor, in Britain, on Books which may be there more advantageously obtained. The Committee also received from the Missionary Society in the Congregation of the Rev. Mr. Jennings, a valuable donation of Books for the Library, and resolved, that the thanks of the Committee be returned to the Society, through Mr.

Jenning

The Committee have been gratified to learn that the Students were engaged during the Session, in distributing Religious Tracts, which the Commmittee of the Upper Canada Religious Tract Society had the liberality to furnish gratuntously.

The Committee would respectfully recommend that the mode of distributing the aid to the Students adopted last year be continued during the present, and that the Synod appoint two members of the Com-

mittee as examiners with the Professor.

The Committee, in fine, beg to congratulate the Synod and the Church, on the success which has attended the first session of the Divinity Hall, on the new plan. The number of Students has been larger than in any preceding year, and, under a kind Providence, they have enjoyed such health that they have all been enabled to give regular attendance till the close of the term. Let it be the prayer and the hope of all who wish well to the interests of religion and to the prosperity of our own denomination in particular that the number of able, pious and zealous youths devoting themselves to the Ministry amongst us may be greatly increased; and that by the Divine blessing on the means used for their training, they may come forth workmen who need not be ashamed and may be rendered abundantly successful in the furtherance of the glorious Gospel of the blessed God.
