The fact is that a young girl with a common school education such as is open to the daughter of a laborer in the cities, or of the poorest farmer in the rural districts, can obtain a certificate as an elementary teacher with less study and instruction than would make her thoroughly competent in all kinds of domestic work. When she takes the school at 15 per month she is nothing more than an apprentice. The girl teacher takes the lower pay expecting that something better is in store, while her sister who goes out to service has little hope of promotion.

THE COMING SESSION

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TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 25.—The Toronto Globe's Ottawa special says that from present indications the bill of fare for the coming session of parliament will not be a very formidable one. The question of granting provincial autonomy to territories will be reported on by a sub-committee of the cabinet, and it will then devotve upon the government to say whether the situation calls for immediate action by parliament.
