OF THE MINISTERIAL SESSION OF THE LONDON ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH,

JUNE, 1893.

The MINISTERIAL Session of the London Conference of the Methodist Church commenced in the Sarnia (Central) Methodist Church, on Wednesday, the 31st of May, 1893, at 9 a.m.

Rev. JOHN G. Scott, President of Conference, occupied the chair.

The session opened with devotional exercises.

QUESTION—What Ministers or Probationers have died during the year? GEORGE BOYD.

The Rev. George Boyd was born in Stirlingshire, Scotland, February, 1847, and died in London, Ont. December, 1892. He received his primary education in the public school and the grammar school of Glasgow, subsequently attending Mount Allison College, Sackville, N.B. In early life he chose the profession of a practical engineer, and for several years earnestly pursued that profession.

At fourteen years of age he was converted to God in the Methodist Church, Glasgow. Leaving the Presbyterian Church in which he had been brought up, he united with the Methodist Church, continuing therein until called to enter the church on high. He soon exhibited more than usual ability for a youth of his years, and was in due course appointed a local preacher in his loved city of Glasgow. Impressed with a conviction that God required him for the full work of the ministry, he like Paul, reasoned not with flesh and blood, but unhesitatingly abandoned his secular profession with all its bright promises of distinction and remuneration, and gave himself up to the less lucrative and more toilsome calling of a Methodist preacher.

When a little more than twenty-one years of age, he came to this country and for a time attended college. At the age of twenty-five he was received as a probationer in the Newfoundland Conference, where he spent the succeeding eighteen years of his active and successful ministerial life, when he was transferred two years ago to the London Conference, and subsequently was elected Chairman of the London District.

He had conferred upon him a full share of honors in the Conference he served for nearly a score of years. He was elected its President, twice its Secretary, twice its Representative to the General Conference, and several times its Representative to the General Missionary Board. On his transfer to this Conference in 1890, he entered upon his work with great fervency and zeal, and was eminently successful in building up believers and in the conversion of sinners. Like Wesley, he was "a man of one Book." frequency and appropriateness of his Scriptural quotations impressed his hearers with the conviction that he drew his inspiration from the infallible Word "that liveth and abideth forever," rather than from the emasculated essays of self-styled "advance thinkers." To him a "Thus saith the Lord" was sufficient, and everything opposed thereto was rejected. He was a man of one work, as well as a man of one book. Whilst giving more time than most men could afford to do to all the benevolent and philanthropic enterprises of the day, his dominant and soul-absorbing work was the salvation of men. This was manifest in every sermon he preached and in every service he conducted. This he never lost sight of, not even in his frequent and fervent advocacy of the cause of temperance when his best powers found ample scope, nor when pleading the cause of missions, or urging the claims of education, in each of which he was profoundly interested, yet never forgetting the salvation of souls. He had a passion for souls, and this absorbing passion often led to the consecration of the needed hour of rest to earnest private prayer for the salvation of souls. Thus was the midnight hour not unfrequently consumed, and even two and three o'clock in the morning found him in the same employ. He

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loved to be at the foot of the cross. There he found the greatest joy for his heart and the needed strength for his labors. Offering the cross to others for acceptance, he himself dwelt under its shadow. In his active ministry, in his final illness, and in his dying hour, Paul's motto was his, "God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of the Lord Jesus Christ." The evening before his death a few choice friends were present. "Rock of Ages," a hymn he greatly loved, was sung. When the singing was ended he remarked, "You omitted the second verse; please sing it!" He joined his voice with the others and sang, "In my hand no price I bring, Simply to thy cross I cling." On a later occasion, when too weak to sing, the vibrations of his hand told that the soul sang, "Simply to thy cross I cling." Bro. Boyd was a generous man. Not content with giving a tenth of his income to God, his liberality exceeded that proportion. On his death-bed he bequeathed a tenth of the insurance on his life to the cause of God. He was a man of heroic courage, that never shrank when duty called for action or for utterance. With equal fidelity he honored the claims of the least as well as those of the greatest. On the last Sabbath of his useful labors he did full work. On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday he conducted services as usual, when with a good conscience he might have rested. From the Wednesday evening service he immediately retired to his bed, to be borne therefrom some five weeks later to the house appointed for all living. During these few weeks he at times suffered much pain, and his increasing weakness made the suffering all the more difficult to be borne, but "he endured as seeing Him who is invisible." God was eminently present with the sufferer, and the soul of the man of God was enriched with largest measures of grace, and joy, and love. Retaining his consciousness to the last, happy in the Lord, surrounded by his family and loving friends, he passed peacefully away from earth to heaven. to be "forever with the Lord."

Queen's Avenue Church, whither in due time the body was conveyed, was filled with a vast and a weeping audience. A large number of ministers of the Methodist and other churches from the surrounding country, as well as from the city, attended. Suitable addresses were delivered by prominent Methodist ministers. The music was befitting the occasion, and hundreds, some unused to weep, shed many tears during the solemn and tender services. Resolutions expressive of appreciation of the spotless character and useful labors of Bro. Boyd were passed by the Queen's Avenue Official Board, by the George Street Church, St. John's, Nfld., by the preachers' meeting of London and St. John's, and by the Ministerial Association of London. One who knew him well has said: "In the pastorate he was very faithful, ever on the alert in soul-winning, firm in the maintenance of discipline, diligent in visitation of the poor and the sick. Indeed he may be truly said to have worn himself out. His strenuous and eager soul overleaped the limit of judicious, physical and mental exertion, and a naturally splendid physique gradually but certainly succumbed to the inroads of a malady, which for years slowly sapped his strength. By those who knew him intimately, the sense of public loss will be increased by the warm remembrance of a friend true as steel, and of an intercourse, hearty, frank and generous. With much strength of character, and some bluntness of manner and speech, he possessed extreme sensitive. ness and had a heart as tender and sympathetic as a woman's. "The memory of the just is blessed."

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THOS. COSFORD

Was born in the village of Hardingston, Northumberlandshire, England, on June 15, 1813. In 1818 he came with his parents to America. a brief stay in New York they came on to Canada. For six years they resided in Toronto (then Little York), but in 1825 they moved out on Yonge Street, near Aurora. It was here that the family seem first to have been brought under the influence of Methodist preaching, and it was here that the change took place which was to exert such an influence in shaping the whole after-life of the subject of this notice. Under the preaching of the Rev. Wm. Ryerson both his parents were converted, and at once united with the Church. It was the custom in those days for parents to take their children to class-meeting with them. Shortly after the conversion of his parents, young Thomas was brought under conviction while listening to a sermon preached by the late John Wilson. In the classmeeting which followed the preaching service those convictions were deepened, till at length his grief became so keen that he abruptly left the church and hid himself in a dense swamp near his home. There he remained in earnest prayer with God, till the darkness and sorrow were dispelled by the light and joy of forgiveness.

In 1832, while residing on the Albion Mission, he felt drawn by the Spirit of God to devote himself to the work of the ministry. At first he resisted, but instead of getting rid of the impression it was deepened. He finally decided to leave himself in the hands of the officials of the mission. In 1837 they gave expression to their opinion by licensing him as an

exhorter, and the year after as a local preacher.

In 1839 he was accepted by the Conference as a candidate for our ministry, and appointed to the Murray Circuit, under the superintendency of the late Rev. Cyrus R. Allison; and then commenced that long series of trying experiences through which he in common with all the pioneer preachers passed. The country being new the roads were bad, which often necessitated long journeys on foot. The settlements were scattered, and hence large circuits. The people were few and poor, and as a consequence the stipend was small. But none of these things moved him from his purpose or caused him to regret entering upon the work. During the forty-four years he spent in the active work of the ministry, he was stationed on the following Circuits: Murray, Grimsby, St. Catharines, Simcoe, Nelson (twice), Guelph, York, Seneca, Drummondville, Bowmanville, Stratford, Goderich, St. Mary's, Yonge Street South, Millbrook, Whitby, Strathroy, Mount Forest, six years Governor of Mount Elgin Institute, London West, Lucknow. He was elected Chairman of District eight times, and was a delegate to the General Conference in 1874 and again in 1878.

Bro. Cosford possessed a manly presence, which combined with a most cheerful manner were very material aids in his work. Having great courage and an indomitable will, no difficulty or danger ever deterred him from prosecuting his chosen and loved work. His consecration to the service of God was entire, every power and faculty he regarded as the Lord's, and hence he never consulted his own ease or comfort if they lay in the way of duty. This devotion to the cause of God, together with his natural energy of character, enabled him to accomplish an amount of work that ordinary

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men were incapable of doing. He possessed very superior executive ability, so that both as a Superintendent of a Circuit and Chairman of a District he planned wisely and administered successfully the great interests committed to his charge. He was a fearless and untiring advocate of temperance principles, and by his voice and vote supported in both municipal and parliamentary elections only those who were pledged to use the influence of their position in furthering that cause

influence of their position in furthering that cause.

As a preacher he was practical and earnest; a firm believer in Methodist doctrine, he continuously and faithfully proclaimed it. In all his teachings he impressed his hearers with his sincerity and anxiety for their conversion. Making no pretentions to eloquence, yet the clearness of his expositions and the force and vigor of his thoughts commanded respect, and made him an acceptable and highly appreciated minister of the Gospel. From the notes of his ministerial life, left by Bro. Cosford, we learn that a revival of religion was the object aimed at on all his Circuits, and he rarely failed to witness it. The work prospered in his hands, and on every Circuit the

Church was strengthened and built up.

He was pre-eminently a man of transparent honesty of purpose. He scorned all that was mean and crooked, and was an example of unimpeachable rectitude of conduct. In his removal our Church has lost another of her veterans, a workman who did her noble service, and much of whose work still remains a monument to his wisdom, energy and devotion. His death, though not unexpected, was somewhat sudden. A brief ten days sufficed for the Destroyer to do his work. The sturdy, well-knit frame, which had often endured the strain of hardship and toil, speedily succumbed to the attacks of a most painful and incurable disease. But in the midst of his sufferings his mind was sustained and comforted by the presence of the Master whose he was and whom he for so many years had served. Even in moments of delirium when the name of Jesus was mentioned he became quiet and calm, and earnestly proclaimed his implicit confidence in Him. On the morning of July 7th he entered into rest.

The funeral took place on Saturday, July 9th. Revs. J. G. Scott, President of Conference, J. C. Antliff, D.D., J. R. Gundy, S. Bond, George Boyd, Thomas Crews and C. E. McIntyre took part in the services, which were held in the Askin Street Church, of which Bro. Cosford had

been a member for nine years.

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On August the 9th, 1843, Bro. Cosford was married to Miss Hartman, whose parents were among the early settlers of the township of White-church. Their home was one of the stopping places and their house one of the preaching places of the pioneer Methodist ministers. She proved in every sense of the word a helpmeet to our brother.

Of a family of ten children, five preceded him to the home beyond. The survivors are: Mrs. (Rev.) D. E. Brownell, of Toronto; Mrs. (Rev.) W. W. Sparling, of Elora: Mrs. W. J. Saunby, of London; Miss Ella Cosford, at home, and Joseph, a civil engineer, of Marquette, Mich.

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EPHRAIM EVANS, D.D.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Rev. Ephraim Evans, D.D., was born on the 30th day of June, 1803, at Kingston-upon-Hull, and entered into his rest on Tuesday evening, June 14th, 1892.

His father, James Evans, was for several years a captain in His Majesty's transport service.

In 1820 our brother emigrated to this country, and settled in Lower Canada, removing in 1824 to Upper Canada, where he followed the profession of teaching.

At the age of twenty-three he was converted to God, and in the year 1827, at the age of twenty-four years, he entered the ministry of the Methodist Church. He was ordained a deacon in 1830, and in 1833, was ordained an elder by Bishop Hedding.

In the same year he was appointed agent of the Upper Canada Academy. During the years 1835-37, he was editor of the Christian Guardian, and during these exciting times, while conducting the journal with great prudence and judgment, he was true to his country as he was true to his church, and voluntarily armed himself and marched out to meet the rebels at Montgomery's Hill.

During 1838-40 he was Chairman of the London District, and 1848-56 was General Superintendent of Missions in the Maritime Provinces. Four years of this period were spent in Halifax, N.S., two at Charlottetown, P.E.I., and three in the college at Sackville, N.B.

The following resolution passed by the Eastern Conference and presented to him on the occasion of his removal to the Canada Conference, expresses the esteem and appreciation of his eastern brethren: "That the Conference hereby expresses its unfeigned and deep sense of the loss our work, in Eastern British America, will sustain by the removal of so valuable a brother as Dr. Evans, one who has rendered us such efficient service in the different positions he has so honorably and usefully filled during his nine years' residence in these provinces, not only more recently in his connection with our academic institution, but also while filling the chair of a large and important district. The brethren cannot allow Dr. Evans to separate from them without their unanimous expression of their high appreciation of his Christian character, and of his effective and ministerial business-like capabilities as evidenced in the prudent counsels and valuable aid afforded by him in our new position as a conferential organization; and while the ties between him and them as members of the same Conference are now to be severed, their earnest prayers will follow him to his intended destination, that in the sphere of labor, and wherever in future his providential lot may be cast, he may still be extensively useful in the work of the Lord, and that when the toils of earth are past, we may have the ineffable delight of greeting him in the heavenly rest."

In 1857 he was stationed in Kingston and was appointed chairman of that District.

In 1859-65 he was stationed at Victoria, Vancouver Island, being chairman of that District in 1866-67.

Upon his return to Ontario he was stationed at Hamilton, being chairman of that District in 1868-69, and of Toronto District in 1870-71.

From 1872-74 he was in charge of the Mount Elgin Industrial Institute, after which he took a superannuated relation, locating in London, where for fourteen years he performed the duties of Permanent Secretary of the

Western Ontario Bible Society.

The last year of his life was spent in the quiet of his own home. While increasing infirmity of body and physical prostration indicated the gradual approach of death, his mind remained clear and his confidence in Christ unshaken to the last. To his ministerial brethren whose privilege it was to visit him, he spoke without any hesitation of his trust in the Saviour and of his full assurance that "The blood of Christ cleanseth from all sin." His pastor, Rev. George Boyd, who has since joined him, was with him on the evening of his death, and had left him only a few minutes when the messenger came and he "was not, for God took him."

The funeral services were conducted by the President of the Conference, Rev. J. G. Scott, in Queen's Avenue Church, where, besides the Methodist ministers of the District, were Revs. Bishop Baldwin, Dean Innes, Canons Richardson and Davis, and ministers of other churches.

Besides the address of the President, the venerable Dr. Sanderson, who for half a century had been associated with Dr. Evans in Christian work, paid an affecting tribute to his memory, while Rev. Mr. Boyd referred to some touching scenes and incidents, illustrative of his Christian character.

Dr. Evans was a man of great natural ability, a strong debater, a keen writer, and a clear and eloquent preacher. In his palmy days the pulpit was his throne, and in this, his chosen sphere, he had few equals.

A sound gospel preacher, he did much to overthrow error in the various fields of his toil and usefulness, and to him and those associated with him must ever remain the honor of laying the foundations of Methodism in this Dominion.

Few men can boast of a record of sixty-five years of service in the Master's vineyard, few have had greater diversity in their fields of labor and few have accomplished more for the Church of his love than he.

Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is run,

ABRAHAM HEYWORTH.

Abraham Heyworth was born in the north of England about the year 1833, was converted to God when a young man, and at once connected himself with the Methodist Church. His Christian conduct, natural abity and spiritual growth soon won the confidence of the Church, and he was appointed a local preacher, and labored in that capacity with marked success. Soon after his marriage he came to Canada and settled in Lon-

He labored zealously and faithfully for some time, and in 1860 was recommended and received as a probationer for the ministry, and in 1864

was received into full connection and ordained.

He travelled on several circuits and missions with a fair share of success, erected several churches, and on some wrought with his hands on the building in order to save expense and put the trustees in easy circumstances. In 1878 he retired for a term to England, some family and business matters requiring his attention. Coming back again to Canada he was stationed at Walsingham, where his health failed, and he sought superannuation and retired from active work about 1883. At the Windsor Conference the writer of this obituary visited him, and was pleased to find that in declining health and suffering much pain he was enjoying the comfort of the Holy Spirit, and quietly waiting the coming of the Master. In these later years he had much trouble of a very painful and trying character, but we doubt not he has reached the land from which all troubles are excluded, and where he is forever at rest.

He died at Chatham on Sunday, April 23rd, 1893, and was buried at Windsor on the 25th. Rev. J. W. Annis, M.A., Chairman of the District, conducted the funeral services, assisted by several brethren of the District.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE.

CHURCH PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

The Church Property Committee met at the call of the Convener. Rev. Dr. Sanderson was elected to the chair and Rev. R. Redmond, Secretary.

IT WAS RECOMMENDED.

1. That the Trustee Board of the old parsonage, Port Stanley, be granted permission to sell the same and apply proceeds on the new parsonage.

2. That the Trustees of lot on which the old church at Northwood. Louisville Circuit, stood, be granted permission to sell the same, proceeds to be applied to the newly acquired church property.

3. That the Trustees of lot No. -, Kent Bridge, Louisville Circuit, be empowered to sell the same, proceeds to be applied on the new lot.

4. That the Trustees of the parsonage on Richmond Street, Amherstburg, be permitted to sell the same.

5. That the Trustees of the Lake Road Church, Amherstburg Circuit be permitted to sell the same, proceeds to be applied on the debt of the Malden Methodist Church.

6. That the Trustees of the old Methodist Church, Harrow, be permitted to sell the church and lot on which it stands, proceeds to be applied to the Building Fund of the new church.

7. That the request of the Trustees of the parsonage situated at Mount Carmel, Mount Brydges Circuit, asking permission to sell the same, be granted, proceeds of sale to be applied as follows: \$200 to Mount Brydges parsonage, \$140 towards the erection of a church shed at Mount Carmel, the balance to be applied upon a new church at the same place.

8. That the Trustees of lots Nos. 1 and 2, on the north side of King Street, Adelaide Village, be permitted to sell said lots, proceeds to be applied to the erection of a new parsonage.

9. That the Trustee Board of the old church, Oil Springs, be permitted to sell the same and apply the proceeds on the debt of the new church.

10. That permission be granted the Quarterly Board of the Wilkesport Circuit to hand over the old Methodist burying ground to the newly formed company.

MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee, having considered the communications referred to them, report as follows:

1. In regard to the memorial from the Prisoners' Aid Association, we recommend that their request to set apart one Sunday in the year as Prison Sunday, for the offering of prayers for prisoners, and the cause of

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ssociation, we the year as the cause of Prison Reform, and for calling attention to the crime question, and the duty of the Christian public with reference to it, be adopted, and that the day be the fourth Sunday in November.

Regarding their request that a standing committee on Prison Reform be appointed, we recommend that all communications from the Prison Reform Association be dealt with as heretofore by the Memorial Committee

2. Touching a communication from the Women's Protestant Association, as that communication was without signature, we do not deem it wise, however much we may sympathize with the principles of the association, to recommend any action.

COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee beg to submit to the Conference the following report:—
1. While we regret a small decrease in several of the Connexional Funds, we rejoice in the encouraging increase in the contributions to the Woman's Missionary Society. The large increase also in the amounts raised for Circuit purposes indicate progress along the line of church and parsonage.

improvement.
2. We desire to express gratitude to God for an increase of nearly one

thousand in the membership of the Church.

3. The gracious revivals of religion during the year have resulted in an increased and more thoroughly consecrated membership, greatly enlarged congregations in many cases, many additional weekly prayer-meetings, a larger attendance at class-meetings, an increase in the number of Epworth Leagues, and also a gratifying increase in the number of conversions in our Sunday Schools, so that both pastors and members have reason to thank God and take courage.

4. We have been glad to notice that District Meetings have called special attention to the importance of pastoral visitation and the instruction of the young, and we urge that, wherever possible, more time be

devoted to this work.

5. In view of the extent to which false teachings are gaining ground around us, and even in our midst, we consider it of special importance that our pulpits should give no uncertain sound in regard to the authority of the Scriptures and the doctrines of our Church, and that as a Church we should contend more earnestly than ever "for the faith once delivered unto the saints."

6. As the prosperity of the work of God among us depends very largely upon the loyalty of our ministers to our Church, and their steady devotion to their work, we strongly disapprove of the growing tendency to withdraw irregularly from our work, and we recommend the Conference to take action with a view to its discouragement.

7. While we gratefully acknowledge the good accomplished by special evangelistic agency, we, nevertheless, are of opinion that the work of God on our circuits is, on the whole, best promoted by pastors and members

working earnestly together in the name of the Lord.

8. As superintendents of Sunday Schools, in many cases, make no report of the number of scholars who have taken the Total Abstinence Pledge, supposing the schedule to refer only to pledges taken during the year, we

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no report e Pledge, e year, we would call their attention to the fact that the whole number of scholars in the school who have taken the Total Abstinence Pledge should be reported. At the same time we gratefully note the large increase this year in the number of scholars who have taken the pledge.

9. While making reference to this department of our work we gladly direct attention to the high character of the literature of our Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues, and the largely increased membership of the Leagues; and while we are grateful for the large addition to the number of Sunday School scholars, we strongly recommend a much more extensive study of our catechisms in the schools.

TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee respectfully begs to submit the following:-

1. In reference to the memorial from the London District, we would recommend the Financial District Meeting to appoint a committee composed of three ministers and two laymen in each District to co-operate with other organizations in assisting to secure a strong vote for prohibition in the coming plebiscite, and where no such organizations exist to initiate efforts in this direction.

2. We would also recommend that in our Sabbath Schools we have special service for temperance once a quarter, and that these District Committees be urged to try and secure the adoption of the same course by other branches of the Christian Church.

3. We would call the attention of our ministers and Sunday School superintendents to the falling-off in some of our Sunday Schools in the number who have taken the Total Abstinence Pledge, and recommend that there be extra efforts made to have all our Sunday School children pledged, specially taking advantage of the Sabbaths devoted to temperance.

4. We would also recommend that the committees appointed by these District meetings make examination of the number of licenses issued in each municipality, and that where they are in excess of what the law allows, they shall take action to secure their reduction to the lowest possible number.

5. In view of the coming plebiscite on prohibition, we would recommend Conference to appoint Sunday, December 17th, as Temperance Sunday, and that our ministers from their pulpit urge upon our people their moral responsibility to record their votes in favor of prohibition.

6. Your Committee would ask this Conference to memorialize the Department of Militia of the Dominion Government to abolish the canteens now existing in connection with the military schools and volunteer camps, because we believe they are sources of demoralization, not only to the men in attendance, but also to the communities where these are held, and we also believe they prevent in many cases the enlistment of moral and Christian men.

7. We would call attention to the proposition of the Temperance Committee of last year, that the Conference Temperance meeting be held some evening when the laymen are present, and recommend the adoption of this course.

9. Also, resolved, That it be an additional instruction to the District Temperance Committee to see that the law requiring temperance instruction in each public school for one hour each week is enforced, and where such instruction is not given, to take steps for the enforcement of the law.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Remembering that the Sabbath was appointed by God, and is one of the fundamentals of our religious life and prosperity as a nation, your Committee realize the importance of guarding its sanctity with all diligence from the encroachments by which it is threatened.

Where the Sabbath is neglected religion loses its vitality and influence upon a community or country; where the Sabbath is honored and its claims properly observed, religious life, other things being equal, rises to its full strength, and serves and conserves the best interests of the country. It is with profound gratitude, therefore, that we find Church courts and other religious organizations passing upon its proper observance. But while the various religious denominations formulate resolutions and utter protests, it must not be forgotten that in order to accomplish the end in view our legislators must formulate and enforce legal enactments pointing in the same direction. We do, therefore, suggest that every proper means be employed to encourage the noble few who have manfully sought in the House of Commons to bring about the better observance of the Lord's day. Among them Mr. John Charlton deserves honorable mention.

As to the attitude of the authorities of the World's Fair: as touching this subject, we find any further utterance unnecessary, as the Conference has already pronounced with no degree of uncertainty.

We would utter our solemn protest as a Church against the prevalent custom of running unnecessary trains, boats, mills, manufactories or other business concerns, whether operated for the pleasure or profit of those concerned—pleasure driving and Sunday visiting and parades included—not only on account of the fact that God's law is thereby set at naught, but also that a demoralizing influence is exerted upon the youthful minds of the country.

Another point to be emphasized is the importance of closing business establishments at seasonable hours on Saturday night. By keeping stores and offices open to unreasonably late hours on Saturday night the Sabbath is itself encroached upon, and its proper observance rendered almost if not absolutely impossible.

We suggest also that some action should be taken as to Sunday funerals. We observe with pleasure the attitude of certain ministerial associations as touching the matter in question, and would put ourselves on record as opposed to the practice which so widely prevails, especially in our rural districts, of unnecessarily fixing the dates of funerals on the Sabbath day, thus deranging our regular Sabbath services, misappropriating the Lord's

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y funerals. ciations as record as our rural obath day, the Lord's day, and diverting the attention of the immediate community into improper channels. "Six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work."

We would also call attention to certain books surreptitiously carried into many of our Methodist homes by men "full of all subtlety and all mischief," containing strange doctrines as to the proper day to be observed as the Sabbath, as well as certain baptismal absurdities by which children and untaught persons might be most readily led astray. And, as a Committee, we would recommend that our ministers read carefully any books they may be requested to endorse before turning any unorthodox book agent loose upon his innocent and unsuspecting people.

In conclusion, we would suggest that sermons be preached, children taught and laws enforced as far as possible in order to bring about through-

out our country the proper observance of the Lord's day.

SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report that the Sunday School is doing a grand work for God and humanity. Wordsworth says, "Children are fragile beginnings of a mighty end." Those godly men and women who are training the youthful mind, moulding moral character, stimulating Christian thought, and begetting religious life and devotion, are working out a bright and happy future for the Church and the world. This is a work that God honors, that angels might covet, and that true Christians love—a work that is not even second to that of the Christian ministry, but a work that requires sympathy, patience, ability, tact, earnestness and consecration. Too much cannot be said in praise of the personal sacrifice, Christian zeal and spiritual results of these co-workers with us in the Master's service. Our brightest converts and best Christians come from the Sunday School and we pray for a deeper interest and greater enthusiasm in this department of church life and work.

We would urge greater attention to the Total Abstinence Pledge and the study of our catechism, which we fear is lamentably neglected.

By all means let the publications of our own Book Room have precedence over all others. They are undoubtedly the cheapest and best, all things considered.

EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Vour Committee, having examined the state of the Epworth League work in connection with our Conference, are pleased to report an increase in the number and efficiency of Leagues. Statistics: Total number of Leagues, 113; increase, 34. Members, 5,798; increase, 1,685.

1. Your Committee find that there are forty three circuits in the Conference that either have no young people's societies, or have failed to report them, and we would recommend the formation of Leagues in

connection with all our circuits and appointments.

2. We would also recommend that a Sunday School and Epworth League convention be organized in connection with each District, and that a secretary be appointed to have charge of the Epworth League work in each District.

3. Also, the organization of local unions, wherever practicable, in all our cities, towns, and circuits, believing that thereby a stimulus will be given to the work and an opportunity be afforded to enlarge the acquaintance and fellowship of our young people.

4. The adoption of the Epworth League name by all the young peo-

ple's societies in connection with our Church.

5. And that Junior Leagues be formed wherever practicable.

6. The systematic study of the Scriptures by the Leagues. And that each League take a copy of the *Methodist Quarterly* and give its members the benefit of the presentation of the Sabbath School lessons by the inductive method; and that special attention be given to the monthly consecration service, and the necessity of having all our services permeated with the religious sentiment, and that in the literary department of the Society, the study of Methodist history form a prominent part of the work. Also, that our societies be requested to patronize our own publications, and that we suggest the advisability of the Book Room reducing the price of *Onward*.

COMMITTEE TO DRAFT A CONSTITUTION FOR THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

CONSTITUTION.

I. NAME.

The name of this Fund shall be "The Sustentation Fund of the London Conference of the Methodist Church."

II. OBIECT.

The object of this Fund shall be to secure salaries of not less than \$750 for ordained married ministers; \$400 for ordained unmarried ministers, and \$350 for probationers.

III. INCOME.

The Fund shall be maintained by annual collections and subscriptions, to be taken up in the month of March, in all our congregations on every Circuit and mission throughout the Conference; also by bequests and donations for this purpose.

IV. CLAIMANTS.

All ministers on circuits whose salaries are lower than the following

amounts shall have their claims upon the Fund considered, viz.: Married ministers, \$650, including salary, board and fuel; single ordained ministers, \$250, and probationers, \$200—these amounts to include salary only.

V. MANAGEMENT.

1. The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each District, appointed by the Annual District Meeting, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Conference on the nomination of the Committee, who shall distribute to the several claimants the funds in hand during the sessions of the Conference.

2. No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the May District Meeting immediately preceding such distribution, and all Quarterly Boards presenting claims shall declare their

utter inability to meet their net deficiencies,

3. The Committee may estimate the prospective aggregate deficiencies on circuits and missions, and suggest the amount desired from each

District to meet such deficiencies.

4. The Financial District Meeting shall each year inquire into the financial condition of each Circuit reported as having paid less than \$650 the previous year, and if deemed necessary a special deputation shall be appointed to visit their Quarterly Board, so as, if possible, to develop a more liberal support to their minister.

5. The Financial District Meeting shall, where necessary, appoint deputations to visit the various circuits in the interests of the Fund; and each minister shall bring the matter fairly before his people, and earnestly

endeavor to secure for it their liberal support.

6. No minister or probationer who has not taken up collections and solicited subscriptions on behalf of the Fund shall be entitled to any claim upon it.

7. The Committee shall present a report to the Conference annually, including an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions deemed necessary in the interests of the Fund.

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PROPOSED SUPER-

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

The Annual Meeting of the Examining Board of the London Conference was held in the Queen's Avenue Methodist Church, London, on the 18th and 19th of April, 1893. All the members of the Board were present.

Seven candidates presented themselves for examination. Five passed on all the subjects except Greek Grammar, securing a record on the subjects passed equal to a Second Class Certificate, and two secured Second Class Certificates.

Three probationers and two candidates wrote on the First Year's Course of Study; three probationers wrote on the Second, and one on the Third Year's Course. Six probationers deferred their Greek to be taken at College, securing a record of standing on the subjects taken equal to one First and five Second Class Certificates. Three secured Second Class Certificates, and one failed to complete the course.

A public meeting was held on the evening of the second day, at which the President of the Conference presided. Addresses were delivered by Rev. A. L. Russell, M.A., B.D., and the President, and certificates and records of standing were presented to the successful students.

It was resolved that the Board meet next year in the Front Street Methodist Church, Strathroy, and that the Secretary arrange the time table for the examinations to cover three days instead of two, in order that the candidates and probationers may have more time for their work.

The Board thanks him for the valuable services rendered, and will not speedily forget how greatly the anxieties of the Examiners were lightened by the wise and careful arrangement of programmes and the unfailing courtesy of the Secretary to all the members of the Board and the probationers. Our continued love goes with him to his new sphere of labors and responsibilities.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

Beloved Brethren,—From our Conference assembled we address you upon the themes of our mutual faith and hope, experiences and interests—themes which concern us in our various civil, social and religious relations, and covering the whole area of our activities, whether relating to time or eternity, to man or to God.

Another year has passed away. Let us now seriously, earnestly, solemnly, as in the presence of God whose we are, and whom we profess to serve with our spirits, review the year gone down into the abyss of the past. The year opened with wondrous possibilities—possibilities of thought, of sympathy, of endeavor, of words to be spoken for the Master, of prayers to be offered, of money to be consecrated, of deeds to be done in His name. What in the light of eternity and in the sight of God have been our achievements, realizations, and the world's betterment? "And this I pray," said Paul to the Philippians, "that your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all judgment; that ye may approve things that are excellent; that ye may be sincere and without offence till the day of Christ; being filled with the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ, unto the glory and praise of God." (Phil. i. 9-11.)

There has been nothing of a very exceptional or striking character in our own Conference during the year. Churches have been erected and dedicated to the worship of God, thus bearing testimony to the fact that "man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God," that God is the basis of human nature, that man lives by revelations of God and commandments of God. Witness to this fundamental fact and need of human nature is given, when by toil, gifts and sacrifices, suitable and appropriate places are consecrated to Divine worship.

On many of the Circuits and Missions within the bounds of the Conference, the Holy Spirit has been graciously poured out, and times of refreshing have been realized. Members have been quickened, and sinners have been made conscious of sin forgiven, and of their sonship with God. "Take heed brethren, lest there be in any of you an evil heart of unbelief in departing from the living God; but exhort one another daily, while it is called to-day, lest any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin, for we are made partakers of Christ if we hold the beginning of our confidence steadfast unto the end." (Heb. iii. 12-14.) The ringing words of Paul to the Corinthians are for us to-day as for them, "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong."

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It has been said that, "the Churches are now face to face with the gravest questions that have confronted Christianity since her life beganquestions not simply doctrinal, political or social, but fundamental and final-whether men are to be Christians any more, or indeed in any tolerable sense theists. These questions exhale, as it were, difficulties which diffuse themselves everywhere, stealing into the best disciplined homes, pervading the most vigorously organized and jealously guarded Churches, pervading the atmosphere in which thought lives and breathes. touching our finest spirits with the slow paralysis of doubt, or the hesitancy which is the death of all enthusiasm. The men have not created the difficulties or raised the doubts; they have sought and found the men; they are the creation of the time, and spring from the characteristics and achievements of its thoughts, its wider knowledge, its vaster outlook, its methods of interpreting nature and history, its deeper insight into the way of Nature's working, and into the affinities of man and his universe.' You will see how imperative it is that the Church shall rise in her might of intellect and spirituality to meet the exigencies and perils of the times. Men are wanted who are filled with all the fulness of God; magnanimous Christians who are superior to vulgar prejudices, and incapable of smalljealousies or resentments; large-hearted Christians in full sympathy with all progress, inspired with hopefulness which would be a help and incentive to others, with faith simple and strong enough to sweep away every cloud of doubt, and nerve him with the courage to be a loyal servant of the truth, even when the service it demands is full of difficulty and peril. There must be the absolute and undisputed supremacy of the will of God over the entire life. The world to-day needs a Church that shall realize, or at least shall honestly seek to realize, the fulfilment of Paul's prayer for the Colossians, "For this cause we also, since the day we heard it, do not cease to pray for you, and to desire that ye might be filled with the knowledge of his will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding, that ye might walk worthy of the Lord unto all pleasing, being fruitful in every good work, and increasing in the knowledge of God; strengthened with all might, according to his glorious power, unto all patience and long-suffering with joyfulness." (Col. i. 9-11.)

We affectionately but strongly urge upon you to be true and loyal to the Discipline of our Church. Lax discipline means disorganization, and disorganization means weakness and death. There are, perhaps, but few pastors who have not been pained at the indifference or disrespect cast upon the Discipline and institutions of the Church by a large number of her members, and by some, too, who occupy official positions, and who thereby are as solemnly pledged to maintain the order, Discipline and institutions of the Church as are her ministers. Men who will respect and deem of importance the by-laws of a secular or benevolent organization—who, if dues are not paid, or there be any infringement or violation of its rules, would feel no compunction in dropping or expelling the offender, or resentment if it were himself—will neglect, or violate, hold, and incite opposition to the rules and institutions of the Church, and would appear to claim superior ability and importance by so doing.

There is another matter upon which we deem st necessary to utter a word of warning, as it affects not only the individuals and the local Church,

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o utter a Church,

In some churches and localities there has been but the whole Connexion. developing and manifesting itself an intense congregationalism. The spirit of it is anti-Christian, and is therefore condemned. It is corporate selfish-The Church that lives and works for itself, that does not look beyond itself, that isolates itself from the great army of the Cross, that does not share its burdens, its toils and triumphs, is self-doomed. It will die of a withered heart. The two great forces by which Christianity moved the world in its first and most glorious days were the preaching of the Gospel of the Grace of God, and the manifestation of the transforming power of that grace on personal character in the creation of a Christian brotherhood. Do not, brethren, seek to wrap yourselves in selfish isolation, but in the spirit of a broad, healthy, generous, universal, Christ like charity, "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ." Remember that all of our denominational institutions and enterprises, having an outlook upon the future welfare of our country and the needs of the world, are dependent upon your unceasing sympathy, prayer and liberality. Forget not, brethren, that a word spoken, a deed done in your society, small and obscure though it may be, is linked to all the words spoken and acts performed in the name of the Lord Jesus by every worker in the Master's cause. We are comrades in a great war, comrades in a weary pilgrimage, comrades in a work overwhelming in its magnitude, pressing heavily in its responsibilities. We are fellow-workers with God, we are fellow-helpers of the truth, we are fellow soldiers in the kingdom of God.

One of the most important events of the past year has been the opening of the new "Victoria" in Toronto. All who have any sympathy with higher education (and who has not?) cannot but feel grateful and rejoice in the great and grand work accomplished in Victoria College. Her cultured sons are scattered far and wide, carrying with them fragrant memories, and diffusing healthful and inspiring influences which are telling upon the world's weal. But what may we not hope now to be accomplished, under more auspicious circumstances, and with wider and more generous recognition and support by the Church. Brethren, may we suggest, with all frankness and earnestness, that you avail yourselves of the increased educational advantages within your reach, and give your sons and daughters, who soon must take your places in the work of the Church and the business of the world, the best and highest culture possible. They will be the better qualified for the responsibilities of life, the Church will be the better, the future homes will be the better, and the world will thereby receive another uplift.

One among the many hopeful signs of the day is that of the increased interest taken by the young in the work and Word of God, and in the various social, benevolent and Christian enterprises of the time. Perhaps the most significant and hopeful of these is the Epworth League of Christian Endeavor, with its concretely Christian motto and its aims, at once so human and Christ-like. Let every encouragement be given to this Society, and may it become the training school for a noble army of true, pure, strong and heroic soldiers of Christ in the battle against the ignorance and selfishness, the lusts and carnalities, the suffering and sorrow, the misery and crime of the world. And what we say of the Epworth League we say of all kindred societies.

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And now may we exhort you, from the least even unto the greatest, to renew your diligence, your devotion and your consecration to the moral and spiritual interests of all who come within the scope and sweep of your influence. In your homes show piety. Treat reverently persons and things connected with the work and kingdom of God. "Search the Scriptures." Read them devoutly and prayerfully. Ponder the exceeding great and precious promises. Keep the fire burning on the family altar. Cultivate spirituality. Seek to translate from mere names into conscious certainties for your deepest life and experience "the things which are not seen but eternal." Put a Christianized conscience into all your activities, whether civil, social or religious. Adorn the doctrine of our Lord Jesus Christ in all things. "Let your conversation be as becometh the gospel of Christ." "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." Pray, and toil to realize an answer to your prayer, "Thy kingdom come." multitudes are doing nothing but living and dying for themselves, by selfdenying, self-sacrificing effort, may you co-operate with your pastors, and with every earnest and sincere worker in every department of Christian activity, to fulfil faithfully your stewardship. If an office-bearer, realize the honor and feel the responsibility; if a teacher in the Sabbath School, think of the souls committed to your care, and watch for their souls as those who must give an account; if only a member, the purity and honor, the dignity and beauty of Christ, the consistency and sincerity of your profession, and the name, position and influence for good of the Church is in your keeping. Let this be the aspiration of every member of the Church for the coming vear:

> "Jesus, Master, whom I serve, Though so feebly and so ill, Strengthen hand and heart, and nerve All Thy bidding to fulfil; Open Thou mine eyes to see All the work Thou hast for me."

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund, for the year ending July 31st, 1892:

We have pleasure in being able to state that the income for the Annual Fund has increased from Circuits, \$1,443.16, and from Ministers' subscriptions \$435.41; thus enabling us to meet the claims in full, notwithstanding the increased expenses, as shown in the financial statement, and yet keep within the estimates for the year.

There has also been an addition of \$12,373.91 made to the capital account in the item of legacies, being an increase over the preceding year of \$5,936.66. This shows a very commendable disposition on the part of our friends to contribute in this way for the permanent benefit of the Fund.

It has been found very difficult to secure safe investments for our funds at present rates. We have therefore been under the necessity of keeping a larger amount in the bank than we thought to be desirable. It was, however, considered better to do this than to invest in doubtful securities. This has led to a falling off in our interest account of about \$340.

On account of the unusual mortality among our aged ministers, the expired claims will about balance the new claims placed on the Fund.

THE WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE.

Dear Brethren,—The Executive Officers of the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, affiliated to the McGill University, respectfully submit to you the following brief report of the work and general interests of the institution:

1. Educational.—We are prepared to offer the widest range of suitable curricula for young men in training for the ministry. In Arts, the whole equipment of McGill University is available to this institution. This University, in extent of endowment and appliances, now ranks as one of the strongest in America, and it is a conspicuous and gratifying fact that it is so decidedly permeated with an evangelical spirit. Methodist students do credit to themselves, their Church and their Theological College, in mingling here in a common University arena with representatives of other denominations. Students are prepared for University Matriculation as well as for the Conference Preliminary Examination.

In Theology some students confine themselves to the ordinary course for probationers. Provision, however, is made for a much heavier course for Licentiates in Theology, requiring three years' attendance at Lectures, and including one-half (the most useful part) of the pass work in Arts, namely, Logic, Mental Philosophy, Moral Philosophy, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Geology, Hebrew (two years preparatory to the B.D. course), and French (obligatory on Montreal Conference students). These are taken in McGill University. In addition the student takes Algebra, Geometry and three years in English. Accompanying this Arts work there is a full course in Dogmatics, Apologetics, Greek, Latin, History, Homiletics, Church Polity, Elocution and Vocal Music. There is also the higher course in Divinity leading to the Degree of B.D., which is thought to be as serviceable as the B.D. course of any other Theological College in Canada.

The number of students the past Session was as follows: Undergraduates in Divinity, 18; in Arts, 10; Licentiates' Course, 28; Conference Course, 10; Preliminary and Matriculation, 6. Total 72.

2. Financial.—The assets of the College are over \$120,000 in buildings and endowment. The administration is marked by rigid economy, and a constant effort to avoid debt. To meet the demands of the rapidly increasing work there is pressing need of enlargement, both of endowment and of buildings. For the endowment a special effort is now being made by the direction of the Montreal Conference by the Rev. W. Harris, who has secured during the past eleven months subscriptions of \$17,000. The Boarding Department is conducted on the principle of the entire income being spent for supplies and service (apart from fuel and gas). There is thus secured most comfortable residence at the lowest rates of charges. The current expenses of the College are about \$6,000, and of the Boarding Department \$4,000.

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ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the President and members of the London Annual Conference in Conference assembled:

Dear Fathers and Brethren,—There have been 227 students enrolled at Albert College during the present College year. We are thus again able to report the largest attendance in the history of the College. There has been a steady increase in the attendance since 1884-85, when the enrolment was 125, so that in eight years the attendance has nearly doubled. Many things have contributed to this exceedingly encouraging showing, but nothing more so than the thoroughness of the teaching done as shown by the unbroken record of successes made by the students in their examinations.

This year there are 10 Senior Matriculants, 3 Senior leaving candidates, 34 Junior Matriculants, 4 Junior leaving candidates, and 7 Primary candidates; so that every class of High School and Collegiate work is represented. The reputation of the College in the preparation of candidates for Victoria University is well known. It is greatly desired that the ministers, when opportunity offers, make it known that Albert College has facilities for the preparation of candidates for all grades of teachers' certificates, equal to those of the very best equipped Collegiate Institutes in Ontario. It is believed that this class of students would be largely increased were the fact more widely known. There were twenty-three students who wrote on the Conference Preliminary Examination held at the College in April last. Every Conference in Ontario was represented in the number. There can be no question that Albert College offers just the opportunity which these young men require.

The Departments of Music, Fine Arts, Commercial Science and Elocution have fully maintained their high reputation during the past year. The College offers superior advantages in these departments. The students of these departments have carried off honor after honor in competition with the students of other colleges. The round of successes has been a most flattering one. During the past year a change has been effected in the Musical Department, through the positions of Professor of Music in the College and of Organist of Bridge Street Methodist Church being combined. It is believed that this will work to the mutual advantage of both the College and the Church.

It is with profound thankfulness to God that we record a year of great spiritual blessing. Many of the students have been converted to God. The missionary societies have made advances in their work. The young men have now \$1,100 in hand to be applied to the support of Mr. F. J. Livingstone, as a medical missionary in Africa. He will enter upon his work at the end of the coming year. This undertaking was entered into some years ago. The students, by ballot, unanimously chose Mr. Livingstone to be sent to the foreign field. Mr. Livingstone had felt for years that his life work should be in Africa, and chose that field of labor. For some time the students have been collecting money for the purpose, and they have been blessed in their endeavors. The Young Ladies' Mission Band have undertaken to maintain a Chinese girl in the "Crosby Home."

During the year the general health of the students has been good. We mourn the loss of Mr. George Hillyer, of the Senior Class, through injuries

The death of Rev. James Curts, the financial agent of the College, before he had fairly commenced his work, has, without doubt, considerably affected the financial interest of the College during the year. It was hoped that he might be able to relieve the College of its financial embarrassment. We mourn his loss as a brother beloved, and as a faithful and true man.

Considering number of students, thoroughness of work done, in fact all that pertains to the College work proper, this year has been pre-eminently the best in the eight years of my principalship. We thank God and take

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ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE.

To the members of the London Conference of the Methodist Church.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—The school year about closing has been marked with large attendance, taithful work on the part of the students and teachers, and a gratifying measure of success. The enrolment to date has reached 176, 150 resident students and 26 day pupils. These were enrolled in departments as follows: Preparatory, 41; academic, 40; collegiate, 26; musical, 55; fine art, 36; elocution, 42; commercial, 20.

Thirty-three students came from various parts of the United States. The Christian churches were represented as follows: Methodist, 100; Presbyterian, 33; Episcopalian, 27; Baptist, 13; Friends, Disciples and Roman Catholics, each one.

Kind Providence has preserved the health of the students and, with one exception, the teachers have shared the same blessing.

The graduating class numbers 19, as follows: Commercial, 2; fine art, 4; elocution, 6; M.L.A. (Mistress of Liberal Arts), 2; M.E.L. (Mistress of English Literature), 1.

The religious interests of the school have been conserved by daily worship, weekly Bible classes, prayer services and addresses, Young Men's Christian Association meetings and monthly missionary services. In this connection you will be pleased to learn that during the past year another of our students, Miss Alice Maybee, has entered the foreign missionary field, devoting herself to the work carried on by Bishop Taylor in Africa. This is the fourth student of Alma who has chosen the foreign missionary work.

The voluntary religious services of the College have been well attended. Nearly twenty students and inmates of the College have professed conversion during the year and united with the various Christian churches. A large majority of the Methodist students regularly attend class and fellowship meetings of the city churches.

The principal, during the latter part of the year, has visited as far as College duties would allow, a number of circuits and stations, in the interest of the Relief Fund. Over \$1,100 has been added in this way to the Fund, which now amounts to over \$8,000.

It is the intention of the College Executive to prosecute the canvass for this fund with earnestness, economy, and with increasing efficiency during the next year.

The Executive would ask for the continued co-operation of the Conference in the matter of the College agency, and would suggest the appointment of a special committee to consider the subject and report before the rise of Conference. The Advisory Committee appointed at last Conference met with the College Executive in London on the 27th January last, and also again in April. We would suggest the continuation of this committee during the ensuing Conference year.

Thanking the Conference for the excellent appointments made heretofore in its representatives on the College Board, we would ask an appointment for the current year.

Columbian Exhibition and Sunday Closing.

That this Conference has heard with surprise, not unmin gled with indignation, that the Columbian Exhibition was opened to visitors last Sabbath day, notwithstanding the law of Congress prohibiting the opening on that day, and the acquiescence therein of the Directors in accepting \$2,500,000 on the express condition that the Exposition should not be opened on the Lord's day; notwithstanding the gross injustice to all such as erected buildings and forwarded exhibits at an immense expense which would not have been done had not the law of Congress, and the concurrence therein by the Commissioners, given the assurance that the gates of the World's Fair would not be opened on the Sabbath; and notwithstanding the earnest protests of hundreds of thousands of the best citizens of the nation, as soon as it was ascertained that the authorities in Chicago contemplated the iniquitous wrong doing-notwithstanding the foregoing, the Exposition has been opened to visitors on the Lord's day, the nation has been dishonored, God's laws set at defiance, and God-fearing exhibitors deceived. 'Against this shocking outrage, this London Conference lifts up its voice in earnest and solemn protest.

2. That this Conference expresses its gratification in learning that the authorities in Washington did not countenance this flagrant outrage, but kept every part of the National Departments during the sacred Sabbath closed, as did the authorities of the British Empire and all its colonies, with all their buildings and exhibits, as did also fifteen States and Territories of the Republic. It is earnestly hoped that the Federal Government will immediately take such steps as are necessary to wipe away this national reproach. Until such is done this Conference respectfully, but earnestly, recommends all its people to decline attending the Exposition so dishonor-

ing to God and to Christianity.
