## BAD RUNAWAY AT DALHOUSIE SUNDAY

**Five People Thrown out of Rig on Way to Church—One Lady Seriously Injured**

Dalhousie, N. B. June 25—There was a bad runaway in Dalhousie on Sunday. Five people on way to church were thrown out and injured. John McEwen, government road commissioner, with three children and Miss Mary McNair, daughter of Wm. McNair of Eel River Cove, when on their way to forenoon service in St. John's Presbyterian church, had an experience never to be forgotten. At the top of the hill above Renfrew street, the harness broke, the young horse took fright and Mr. McEwen who is an expert with horses was thrown out of the carriage. The team went down the big hill like lightning and Miss McNair fainted and fell out in front of the old Delaney hotel dragging one of the children she was holding in her arms with her. Miss McNair fell on her face and was seriously injured. She was quickly picked up by Policeman Boudreau, who saw her fall, and carried to the Nadeau boarding house, and later removed to the home of Mrs. Wm. Wallace, sister of Mr. McEwen, where she was most kindly treated. Doctors Ferguson and Disbrow were quickly on the scene and are now hopeful of saving the young girl who is a great favorite and the only daughter at home. The horse continued on the run to the corner of Water street and up to William street running towards the station when the wagon struck a telephone pole freeing the horse from the rig. Mrs. Daniel McNeish, who resides opposite the Post Office, rescued the only one who held on to the rig a young boy who saved himself by remaining under the wagon seat. He was found dazed and with a bad cut on his face. The three children were able to return to their homes on Monday, but it will be some time before Miss McNair can leave the town if she does get better.


This certificate is a new departure in the school and is given to the pupil making the highest average in their examinations. In Grade I and Grade IX, two pupils were equal and two certificates granted.



W. H. Mechling Will Report on the Micmacs History and Habits

Word has been received here of the coming of a geological survey to work in New Brunswick besides some officials who are to engage in special work. The field work of the department is to be somewhat curtailed owing to many of the officers being engaged with the geological congress, a section of which will also visit St. John but a field party in expected there in a few days. The members of the survey detailed for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia include W. A. Bell, E. R. Faribault, J. W. Goldwaite, A. O. Hayes, J. E. Hydes, W. J. Wright, R. Harris, A. Mailhot, J. Keele, J. Stanfield, M. E. Wilson, most of whom are already known here.

L. D. Burling is to have headquarters at St. John, for general work, and E. N. Kindle will be in the three maritime provinces. W. H. Mechling will make a study of the Micmac Indians and their history in New Brunswick. L. A. C. T. Sheppard, who conducted the topographical survey in the vicinity of the city last year is in charge of a similar party in the Crows Nest Pass area this year.

### WILL ORGANIZE LUMBER PROTEST

Association to be Revived and Government Asked to Modify Legislation

The Lumbermen & Limit Holders' Association of New Brunswick is to be revived if the plan outlined at a meeting of provincial lumbermen in the Royal Hotel St. John on Monday, are carried out. A committee will arrange the details and the reorganization meeting will likely take place in Newcastle during the last week in June.

Hon. John P. Burchill, of Nelson, who was president of the organization several years ago, said that timber limit leases were discussed, but no action will be taken until after the meeting of the association.

The visiting lumbermen did not remain over to present their case to the government meeting, as was expected might be done, but after the organization meeting the government may be approached at their July meeting. The chief object of the association is understood to be the securing of better terms for renewal of crown land leases, which expire in 1918, than those outlined in the recent act by which a bonus for renewal is required.

Among the outside lumbermen attending the meeting were: Hon. John P. Burchill, Nelson; R. A. Lawlor, of Chatham; Allan Ritchie, William M. Sinclair, A. Kulinder, James A. Rundle, and David J. Buckley, of Newcastle; Angus McLean, Bathurst; F. D. Swim, Doaktown; C. S. Hickman, Dorchester; Sheriff John O'Brien, Nelson; James Robinson, Miramichi; J. W. Brankley, Chatham; C. L. Fenderson, Jacquet River, and John Kilburn, Van Buren. In addition to these gentlemen, local lumbermen were also present.

### MILITANTS BEGAN A HUNGER STRIKE

Say They Will Compel The Authorities to Release Them

LONDON, June 18.—The six leaders of the militant suffragette organization who were sentenced to long terms of imprisonment on a charge of conspiracy at the Central Criminal Court yesterday, began a "hunger strike" immediately after reaching the jail. These prisoners, Miss Harriet Kerr, Miss Agnes Lake, Miss Rachel Barrette, Mrs. Beatrice Saunders, Miss Annie Kenney and Miss Laura Lennox declared when sentence was pronounced, that they would refuse to eat and would compel the authorities to release them.

### A WARLIKE PRINCE

The Kaiser's Son Started Berlin With His Book

Something like a sensation was caused in Berlin by the publication by the German Crown Prince of a book called "Germany in Arms." The book, which is "most reverently dedicated to the German Emperor and the Prussian King," contains the following motto: "The world does not rest more safely on the shoulders of Atlas than does Germany on her army and navy."

The Imperial editor asserts that Germany, more than any other land, has to trust to its armaments, and that as its geographical position is unfavorable, and as all nations do not regard Germany with affection, the country has the sacred duty imposed on it always to maintain its army and navy in a state of readiness. "Only in this way, relying on our good sword, can we maintain that place in the sun which is ours, but which will not be voluntarily conceded to us."

The Crown Prince goes on to say that diplomacy may delay the conflict for a season, but those in responsible positions must know that once a gigantic conflagration is lighted it is not so easy to extinguish.

Speaking of the delight of riding to an attack, the Prince says there is one delight still greater—namely, that of meeting the enemy at the end of the gallop, and the fight for life and death.

A new electric tanning process, invented by the Swedish scientist, Dr. A. Groth, and applied on a practical scale in an English works, is attracting much attention, and one of the prominent electrical firms is to take it up for commercial use. With this method, the hides are put in special vats along with metal conductors, so as to carry out an electrolytic action, and this will tan the hides in much less time than usual, for instance, six weeks as compared to several months. Leather of better quality is produced in this way, and the method gives a perfect and solid tanning. Inspector's Six Months' Penance for a Round of Champagne Dinners

How a man worth nothing contrived to live at the rate of \$10,000 a year was related by the chief constable at Lincoln Police Court, when Arthur Lionel Ashton, aged twenty-seven, was charged with obtaining food and lodging from the Waverley Hotel, Lincoln, by false pretences.

"I have never encountered a man before with such self-assurance," added the chief constable. "He is a man of considerable education and quite an accomplished criminal. He has defrauded twenty hotels at least in Liverpool."

The evidence showed that the accused invariably represented himself as Ernest Sband, the comedian. He arrived at the hotels in hired motor cars, had the best of everything, and gave champagne dinners to his acquaintances.

At one hotel he robbed the box for the Commercial Travellers' Children's School. He was convicted in Ireland, and had been deported from Canada for false pretences. Sentence of six months' imprisonment was passed.



A BIG MENAGERIE KEPT FOR PLEASURE

Animal Lover Makes Friends With His Pets and Plays With Them Fearlessly

Few people visiting Cobtree Manor, Maidstone, a stately old country house, in quiet and beautiful surroundings, would imagine that they had alighted on the largest private menagerie of caged animals in England. Yet this is the case, for Mr. T. R. G. Tyrwhitt-Drake has for some years been assiduously adding to his collection of wild animals, until now it is by far the most remarkable private menagerie in the country. Mr. Tyrwhitt-Drake, who is the hon. secretary of one of the strangest clubs in existence—the Amateur Menagerie Club—an exclusive organization, with Lord Lilford as its president and the Earl of Altamont as vice-president, which is devoted to the purpose of encouraging the keeping of wild animals and birds by private individuals, has always been passionately fond of animals of all descriptions. At present the menagerie includes over eighty animals, including two lions, two lionesses, four bears, three leopards, five wolves, four dingoes, two wolf-dog hybrids, two jackals, two caracals, two foxes, a spotted hyena, a sacred Indian bull, a three-legged duck, and any number of strange cattle and birds.

An interviewer who called at the Manor discovered Mr. Tyrwhitt-Drake and a somewhat fierce-looking lion seated together on a garden chair enjoying the sunshine. "I beg your pardon," said the journalist humbly; "I had no idea you had company," and prepared to retire. "Please don't go," observed Mr. Drake; "I'm just going to bring a leopard out."

There was no escape from so pressing an invitation. When the lion had been taken back to its cage a very beautiful young leopard came out and, after a spasmodic effort to seize a little white domestic cat that was purring in the neighborhood, held a sort of private and whispered conversation with its master. One of the prettiest sights is provided by two benevolent-looking lion cubs, who share a cage with a retriever dog. The animals play together all day long, but the little retriever has established a complete mastery over the young lions, and is an acknowledged "boss" of the cage.

Joseph Lavigne, of Campbellton is One of Them

Portland, Me., June 26—Four men have been arrested here charged with committing robberies in various parts of Maine. They are Joseph Lavigne, of Campbellton, John Devoe, of Carbou, Me.; Geo. Levalley, of Magog, Quebec, and Harry Gallagher of Limestone, Me. The New Brunswick man was sent to jail in default of bail. He was charged with breaking into railroad depots and with stealing beer. Joe Devoe and Joe Lavigne were arrested on suspicion of breaking and entering the Maine Central R. R. stations at Bangor, Passadumkeag and Olamon, and they are brought to Bangor on the midnight train Monday. Lavigne was arrested on suspicion. Devoe was with Lavigne at the time but he escaped and was captured afterwards.

BRANCH LINES WILL BE ACQUIRED

I. C. R. Likely to Receive Two in New Brunswick.

Ottawa, June 25—It is understood that one or more of the branch lines of railways in the Maritime Provinces will be required by the Government. Among the railways likely to be acquired are the Cape Tormentine Railway, to give a connection with Prince Edward Island; the International Railway of New Brunswick, both in New Brunswick, and the Halifax and Southwestern Railway extending from Halifax to Yarmouth.

WEDGE IS SENT UP TRAIL NEXT TERM

Preliminary Hearing Before Police Judge Matheson on Thursday

The preliminary hearing of the case of Joseph Wedge who was captured in St. John the other day was held before Police Judge Matheson on Thursday Mr. E. R. Richard prosecuting. It will be remembered that Wedge was implicated in the burglary at Jos. Duncan's store by two others who were remanded to jail but made their escape. After evidence had been heard for the prosecution Wedge gave evidence on his own behalf, and he was remanded to Dalhousie jail to await trial at the first sitting of the court.

A St. John dispatch says:— Joseph Wedge, aged 28 years, wanted on the charge of entering and stealing from a store in Campbellton last year, and who made the bold escape from Chief Hughes a few months ago by jumping across fifteen feet of water from the deck of the Calvin Austin to the dock, was re-captured late yesterday afternoon by Deputy Chief Jenkins and Detective Killen, who located him in a vessel lying at North wharf.

The police had captured the man in Boston, it will be remembered, and were bringing him to the city. As the boat was docking, the detective became interested in the work of the crew and his attention was disengaged from the prisoner. Detective Killen and Deputy Jenkins were waiting at the head of the landing to receive him. The man seeing his opportunity leaped from the deck dashed down Water street and was freed.

The local police had been working in the case ever since. The information was received that the man was articulated with one of the small coastwise steamers and a search was made, with the result that Wedge was arrested yesterday afternoon. The local police do not know the particulars of the robbery in Campbellton, but it is said that Wedge is charged with being implicated with several others about twelve months ago in entering and ransacking a leading store there. Chief Hughes will probably come to the city and take the man to Campbellton.

TO DOUBLE TRACK SECTION OF I.C.R.

Ottawa June 24—Important plans for the improvement of the Intercolonial Railway are under consideration, following the visit of the Hon. Frank Cochrane to the Maritime Provinces. These plans involve the double-tracking of the line from Moncton to Halifax.

The Hon. Mr. Cochrane and Mr. F. P. Gutelius, the new general manager of the Intercolonial Railway, have been making as thorough a study of the conditions of the road as the time at their disposal would permit, and it is understood that the decision to have a double line of railway from Moncton to the new terminals at Halifax has been reached.

Before this work is begun the road will be improved in respect to grades, so that when the present plans have been carried out the Intercolonial will be in a first-rate position to take care of the increased traffic which the officials of the road expect.

The Hon. Mr. Cochrane will return from the east this week.

Another batch of English suffragettes has been found guilty of conspiracy to break the law in the London Central Criminal Court. They were sharp and defiant in their utterances while in the dock; and they may not complete the sentences imposed upon them. Their experience, however, will tend to discourage their kind. The law is a hard enemy, and popular sympathy is with those whose duty it is to enforce it; and popular sympathy was long ago divorced from suffragetteism.
