### Mr. Blair's Nomination Speech.

### Serious Fire.

The Williams Sewing Machine Factory at St. John's, New Brunswick, was burned on Saturday night last. The fire began shortly before 7:30 o'clock, and before the firemen could reach the scene, the building was a mass of flames. There was a great loss of work and the interior of the factory being packed with all kinds of machinery. The wings were saved. The building was a brick one and cost \$125,000 and the stock \$100,000. Insurance about \$80,000. About two hundred men were thrown out of employment. The Company was represented in this city by Mr. O'Brien.

The passenger car No. 12 of the New Brunswick Railway has just been repaired and refitted, and is now about ready to be again placed on the line. It is one of the handsomest cars in the world, and is painted in light yellow, with black striping and bordered bottom. The letters "New Brunswick Railway" are of black, shaded with scarlet; the sides are of oak, the trucks dark with scarlet and yellow striping, the doors, yellow, blue, purple, corners, with gold stripes. The painting was admirably executed by Mr. W. H. Sutherland, of this city. The workmanship of the interior of the car is of a high order. The upholstery was done by Mr. Eben Miller, of this city.

### Fire and Bomb Building Destroyed.

About eight o'clock last Monday evening, fire was discovered in the barn in the rear of the Deaf and Dumb Institute, Hawthorne Hill. The fire had got well underway before it was discovered, and was not until the flames had reached the main building. It was then seen that there was no chance of saving the building, and the friends who had come to render assistance, at once commenced to remove the furniture, which was done carefully. The building was totally destroyed. It was erected by Geo. Rotford, Esq., about 20 years ago, and at the time of the fire was owned by Senator Rotford, of Westmorland. It was insured in the City of London Insurance Co. of Black, agent, for \$1,000. The loss of the Institute just now is unfortunate to the public. The Institute had been doing good work, and was in a way of meeting, at an early date, with the success it merited. At the time of the fire, the Principal, Mr. Woodbridge, was absent in Charlotte County.

### Attorney General Blair Declared Elected by a Majority of 782.

### HON. MR. BLAIR AND MR. ESTABROOKS THANK THE ELECTORS.

### Messrs. Wetmore and Colter Fail to Appear.

### The White-Collar Dispute Settled—Mr. White Triumphant.

### Yesterday was Declaration Day, and a large number of the electors assembled at the County Court House to hear the official announcement of the election returns, as well as to hear what the Attorney General and Mr. Estabrooks had to say regarding the result of the contest.

### A few minutes after eleven the Sheriff appeared and announced the returns. We add to the statement the total vote polled in each district, with the number of double ballots deposited—

### Hon. Mr. Blair.

then came forward. He was not sure that he ought not to make acknowledgment to his opponents for placing his friends in such a position to achieve a splendid victory on his behalf. The intention of his opponents in this contest was to demonstrate their strength. They have done so. The result is not a surprise to him. He had fought the battles for his constituents for years, and now that his efforts had culminated in success, it was not reasonable to suppose that this constituency would bury those efforts in political oblivion, and call upon another to discharge the duties that had fallen upon him. There is a sense of fairness in this. This contest was not between Mr. Estabrooks and him; Wetmore and Colter were his opponents, and the contest showed that neither of them was so great an extent the opponent as Mr. Wetmore, who was leader of a party that expects to override the people.

Since the election, however, their tone has been changed. Messrs. Wetmore and Colter tell the people that they never expected to elect Estabrooks; that they were merely deceived by the result. Here, Mr. Blair, to the amusement of the audience, explained that Mr. Estabrooks in gentle words the exact position in which his friends of the opposition had placed him. Mr. Wetmore's course has not only damaged him in his country, but it has damaged his standing in the Legislature inasmuch as it must divert him of any influence he might have. So far as he (Blair) is concerned, this election has given him a standing in his country, but it has not given him a standing in the Legislature, and the Province which he could never of himself have attained. Poor Estabrooks has been sacrificed. Not only that, but Mr. Wetmore has carried his Kewick friends to his political grave. Mr. Blair then went on to show how Colter had secured a seat on the House in the first instance. It was because Mr. Thompson had carried him. Mr. Colter had deceived the Government in every parish he visited, but after his election he deserted his friends, went over to the Government, and now his friends have deserted him.

In concluding Mr. Blair's speech, he said that the electors for the support they had given him. He did not know in what terms he could convey to his friends the gratitude he owed them. The grand support he had received was not in his country, but in the divisional standing, but it was because the people were opposed to the now defunct Government. (Cheers.)

### Mr. Estabrooks.

Considering the exceeding length of his speech, he did very well; he showed more manliness than those who put him forward, Mr. Blair, or those who sought to defeat him.

### Lumber.

It is impossible at present to speak with any certainty of lumber prospects for the coming season. Builders are beginning to make enquiries for spring stock, and appear to expect to pay smaller prices than they did last year. Dealers are, however, holding off for better figures, as the cost of operating in the woods was much heavier than in previous years. Reports from abroad are not in favor of the purchaser, and if the prospects in the European markets do not brighten—there is hardly to be expected—there must be a general decline in our home market. The changes in the American tariff has certainly not been in our favor, and no marked increase of our trade in that direction can be expected. Prices remain unchanged.—St. John News.
