On this aggregate indebted-ness of \$375,003,446 an immense tribute in gold has annually been paid, chiefly to England. The interest charge on the national debt amounted to \$16,024,532. With a decline in imports, the duties upon which are the Government's chief source of income, it has required more than one-fourth the annual resemble to most the interest.

BOUND FOR BEHRING SEA.

Scalers Visited by the U. S. Cutter Rush—They Take Little Stock in the President's Proclamation.

SAY POINT UNGA, Alaska, July 28.—The cutter Rush arrived here yesterday. She boarded all the vessels lying here and distributed the President's proclamation regarding the Behring Sea, but would give no information as to whether the vessels were to be seized. The biggest part of the sealing fleet has already sailed for Behring Sea, and the rest follow to-day. They all say they will go regardless of the proclamation though it is known that many instead of taking the short road through Quinamak Pass to the sealing grounds are going by the northwest pass hoping to clude the cutter.


