Quebec, Oct. 22.—Yesterday afternoon, Manager Dumoulin, of the Banque du Peuple, deposed that Philippe Valliere came to him to have a note for \$20,000 signed by him and payable to Pacaud discounted. IN CHINA.

Contradictory Reports from the Celestia Empire — A New Revolution Started.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 22.—Shanghar advices state that details have been received of a revolution in the Province of Fukir. The center of disturbance is in the city of Thlma. The leader of the insurgents is named Chen, and he has a force of 3,000 men. The loss on both sides is heavy. It is said the insurgents butchered all the prisoners who fell into their hands. One unfortunate fell into the hands of the insurgents, who nailed his hands and feet to a board and cut him up by piecemeal. Advices from Amoy tell of a terrible epidemic of cholera prevailing there. Hundreds of people have died, including many European's.

SARNIA, Oct. 23.—The stone work is connection with the tunnel approaches on both sides of the river was fully completed Wednesday night. The contract for the work was in the hands of William Gibson. He also spoke of the abuse of the borrowing power of the Government as a means to retard the development of the country, from the borrowed money being squandered on unprofitable works and in excess of the needs of the country too often in the interests of partisans and friends, while the community were burdened with heavy interest. This power ought to be revoked and borrowing replaced by the issue of just such money as was actually necessary of a non-bearing interest character. That the land and all natural resources were the heritage of the people and actual use should form the only title; and that all taxes should be raised for the expense all taxes should be raised for the expense of the Government by a direct land tax; that by a judicious development of our mines and forests, with needful encouragement of the surplus population in towns and cities to settle on wild lands, a greater demand

the surplus population in towns and cities to settle on wild lands, a greater demand would be created for the wares of our manufactories. He referred to the satisfaction that the postal system gave and argued from that, that railways, telegraphs, telephones and all transportation should be done in the interest of the nation, by the Government controlling the same. Mr. Marks also advocated free education, free books with the necessary safeguards for preservation from wonton or careless destruction. He also advocated obligatory yoting—one man one-vote, and the adoption of the Swiss referendum as a check on legislation that might be dangerous. 



THE STORY OF THE COTTON

MILLS. The high tariff encouraged men with money all over the country to rush into manufacturing as a means of earning a living. As advised by Sir Leonard Tilley, they "clapped on full sail." Then came the downfail, bankruptcy and idleness for the employes, and as a sequel, combinations to shut up mills and force the consumers to pay as high prices as the high tax policy would permit. How far this result of the "N. P." operated to lock up capital that might have been much better employed in the natural development of the country can be gathered from the statement of the Kingston Cotton Mill directors. They were encouraged to start in that city by an offer of exemption from taxation, though why these wealthy men should not be as able to pay their share of the taxes as the wage-earner or the mer-chant, it is hard to tell. But the mill men are not satisfied with their exemption to They alleged that they ran an "infant" industry a number of years ago, but despite the fact that the infant has been fed at municipal expense and fed at national expense, they wish to have the exemption from paying taxes continued They base their application on the ground that cotton manufacturing does not pay, and they tell the City Council that in recent years five Canadian cotton that in recent years are Canadian cotton factorios have gone to the wall, no less than \$1,630,000 being sunk in the endeavor. The story of the manufacturers, we learn from the News, a local Conservative paper) is that the "cotton mill has increased the weapon." the "cotton mill has increased the populaion and added to the business of the city.'

To this the News trenchantly replies: To the News trenchantly replies:

"That it has brought a certain number of people to the city is true, but as far as bottering business is concerned is it not tree that there have been new businesses established even more than proportionately to the increase of population and that competities is business is now keener than

their tenure of that means of existence has been. As far as the operatives are concerned the attempt to keep afloat a precarious and uncertain industry is scarcely less than cruelty. We cannot see any ground on which exemption should be granted the cotton mill more than to any other concern. If, as we said before, it is so unprofitable that the amount of taxation remitted is of importance in its annual financial statement, it will be closed one of these days anyway, and all that we can do will not prevent it or save its employes from inevitable loss of employment sooner or later. The quicker all the cities in the country get their industries on a rock bottom basis by the abolition of bonuses and exemptions, even if the closing of a few industries were to make some reduction in the population of several of the cities, the better for Canadian prespecity."

This is the view of a journal that has hitherto supported the idea that one set of industries in a country should be maintained, in part, at the expense of the taxpayers as a whole. It will be an eye-opener those Conservative journals which yet support the National Policy to find a newspaper of this stamp so effectively exposing the fallacy on which that system is based. The avowed intention of the high tax policy was to give the "infant industries" a chance, though in every constituency many of the most progressive manufacturers were opposed to the game of grab. These independent men rightly argued that even as members of "combines" their last state might be worse than their first. And so it

has been proved.

Legitimate industry has been crippled, the purchasing power of the people has been impaired, employment has been rendered increasingly proparious, and millions of dollars that might be used in the natural industries of the country have been locked up in useless brick, lime and machinery, as confessed by the Kingston Conservative journal. Have the "infants" reached manhood by this process? Let the same Conservative authority be the witness. The infants, far from reaching maturity, are, as we have seen, confessedly more helpless and dependent than ever. And their wet nurses—the high tax editors who are still in league with the Red Parlor continue to traduce every one who wants to bring about a change for the better. The confession from Kingston is, however, a sign of the times. It will soon be impos-sible to find an intelligent man willing to face his fellow citizens and to plead for a continuance of the reign of high taxation and its woeful results.

ANOTHER BLOW FOR POLITICAL PURITY.

Some inconsiderate public men have at various times taken the ground that a man's character is of no account in the halls of legislation, provided he is a "good politician." The ADVERTISER believes in the old fashioned view that you cannot disassociate a man's private character from his public character. If he is a thief in private, should he be left in charge of public property? If he condones wrong-doing in private, can he be trusted to rule righteously in public? Is he immoral in his social relations, can he be trusted to formulate or to support righteous measures in the councils of the nation?






