Rome, Aug. 30.—Austrian counter-attacks in force were made yester-day against the new Italian positions on the front above Gorizia, the war office reports. Everywhere the Austrians were driven back, and at some points the Italians made further gains, The announcement follows:

'On the Bainsizza plateau and east of Gorizia, the enemy attempted by counter-attacking in force, to retake positions recently captured. He was driven back everywhere. Our lines were held firmly and advanced at some points. We captured 560 prisoners.'
