### **CANADA'S EXPORTS** WENT TO FRANCE

Great Britain and U.S. Are **Only Better Customers** of Dominion.

Montreal, Dec. 6.—Approximately oneeleventh of Canada's exports in the
twelve months ended October 31 went
to France, according to a summary of
trade returns issued today.

Next to Great Britain and the United
States, France stands at the present
time as the best customer of Canadian
goods. The possibilities for holding this
trade will depend for the time being on
Canada's willingness to establish credits for France here, until financial and
commercial affairs are fully back on a
peace basis. Normally, France is a
producer of many commodities, for
which there is a good market in Canada. But France's ability to supply
these commodities in the war period
was restricted by the diversion of her
man power to prosecute the war. As a
result, Canadian imports from France
have dwindled, and relatively speaking
the balance of trade in favor of Canada has become of huge proportions.

# **ESTABLISHMENT**

Of 23 Injured, Some May Die -Disaster at Dupont Plant.

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., Dec. 5.-Eleven men were killed and 23 injured here late today by four exjured here late today by four explosions which destroyed the detonator assembling building of the Du Pont Cap Works and shook the countryside for miles around. Fire which followed the explosion was confined to the one unit, and the property loss was said to be slight. It is feared that four or five of the injured may die.

Officials of the company said tonight they believed an employee at work assembling French fuse detonators had dropped one of them, causing the explosion.

### **NGERSOLL LANDS** TWO NEW PLANTS IN **BIG ONE-DAY DRIVE**

Everybody Out Hustling and Pleased With Results.

INGERSOLL, Dec. 5.—Sulting action to the thought that more smokestacks and a greater population are desired here, this has been a day of exceptional activity, and it is generally admitted, big results, for the no small army of workers who have ralled under the industrial expansion banner. Citizens as a whole are gleeful, as they believe they are practically certain of obtaining two large and very important industries, while it is mentioned that a third is no remote possibility. The facts disclosed have centred interest on a file works, known at present as the Port Hope File Company, but which, it is expected, will soon be known as the Ingersoll File Works.

Steel Rolling Mill.

The second proposed industry is a steel rolling mill. The file company, which is regarded as a very flourishing concern, with large orders ahead, propurposes to take over the plant of the Ingersoll Nut Company, and to add to it by 100 feet of similar construction. They will within one year agree to employ 100 hands. Their total investment will be \$125,000. They ask from the town a loan of \$10,000 for ten years free of interest and exemption from taxation.

The Ingersoll Rolling Mill Company proposes to take over the plant of the Noxon Company. They will invest \$200,000, and they will agree to employ 125 men. They ask a loan of \$50,000, free of interest, this loan repayable, beginning the sixth year at the rate of \$10,000 per year. They also ask exemption from taxation.

#### NATIONAL SELF-DETERMINATION.

THE POINT in which the coming Peace Con-I ference will most starkly contrast with the Congress of Vienna in 1814 is that of national self-determination. The royalties restored to control after the overthrow of Napoleon, when, as Mrs. Browning says, "kings crept forth again to feel the sun," used the peoples of Europe as so much grass growing upon the lands to be arbitrarily divided and shared around It is the kings who are nobodies in 1919.

The French Revolution had made its appeal peoples against arbitrary rulers. The French Revolution seemed defeated and crushed in 1814: but it rose again in the plebiscites of 1848 to 1860 in France and Italy. The popular vote will have to determine as far as possible the government of regions like Galicia, Transylvania, Dalmatia, Ukraine and Livonia.

The trouble is that diverse peoples are all mixed up together in parts of Macedonia, in Asia of Ulster and South Ireland is paralleled more or reaching of fair and just agreement in other bowels, which become clogged up with points. difficulties in Ireland being mainly religious and historical, those in the continental regions named rather national and linguistic. In some cases the national boundaries when possible to be drawn do not coincide happily with natural geographical frontiers, as, e.g., in Transylvania. It is clear that awkward limits will be found even in 1919 to the application of the ideal principle of selfdetermination. The only conditions that will supplement the imperfect drawing of national lines are mutual forbearance, local home rule in wide measure, and ultimately that internationalism and federation of the world towards which we are tending slowly but surely, which will wash out the hatreds of national opposition and bring at least a confident peace.

### SUBMARINING SANTA CLAUS.

W HILE TALK of punishment is rife, let us keep in mind not only the Hun, but the kill-joy who instructs children against the belief in Santa Claus. Particularly to choose this month of the year in which to spread among innocents the devil's gospel that the fairies all are dead or never lived-what punishment would Dante have devised such villainy? And what of the school teacher who picked the first day of December as the proper moment to enforce the ill-tidings to her primary class of little illiterates that not Santa, but a mere ordinary dad or mamma stuffed their stockings at Christmas? Was it her function to interfere with a harmless mythology any more than with the religion of her small charges? What sort of sympathy with childhood has such a teacher? To her school would "crawl unwillingly like snail" the whining

Such sin as this does not seem to have occurred to Dante's mind as humanly possible. At any rate, there is no special mention of it in Inferno. Perhaps it was included in a general way under "offences against God and Nature" But it is a modern sort of naughtiness, a sodom-apple growing dustily out of a dull heart. There are still people about who have no mind for anything but Facts, the gradgrind type, for whom there is no distinction between a lie and a fiction, between superstition and a myth or legend, who perhaps detest an organ as a "kist of whistles." Such people, especially if school teachers, are goblins that "get ye, ef you don't

It is not a good thing to destroy the child's little pleasures of the imagination. That is not at any rate what teachers are engaged to do, and doubtless not one in ten of them does it. The ordinary good teacher is no Hun autocrat, cramning down children's throats a hard and narrow kaltur. To torpedo the Santa Claus myth of other people's children would be an attack not only upon them, but upon their parents, who enjoy almost equally with the little ones their Christmas dream. If children are not to be allowed to be brought up in the Santa Claus faith sill 7 or 8 years of age at least, without pedantic

outside interference, such a poem as that old nursery classic, "The Night Before Christmas," will soon have to be censored out of print.

Let mother and child, man and boy, still have a few fancies left. A sudden cold douche on infant beliefs before they are gradually and naturally outworn jars a young mind into precocious doubts and skepticism that may not be altogether wholesome. Especially this year, when we are planning a royal, old-time Christmas, we want no kill-joys officiously submarining young delight. If there are any, away with them and the guilty Huns to trial and judgment!

#### VS. BOLSHEVISM.

A certain amount of warning and denunciation, vigilance and force is necessary, no doubt, but generous and sensible measures of prevention are also in order.

Children often suffer from earache because of obstruction in that part of the ear called the eustachian tube. Though if the attack is ordinarily not of long duration, it is, ne vertheless, painful. A bit of moist heat applied to the throat and the ear should usually give relief. Steam the throat and sip or gargle with hot water and sip or gargle with hot water will relieve this disturbance so frequent during teething, and when adenoid growths are present.

Another cause of earache among children as well as adults is due to inflammation of the middle ear where the mucous lining of the hollow tube which leads directly to the external part of the ear, the eustachian canal, is involved, together with some of the mastoid cells.





# THE BEDSIDE OF EX-KAISER

Fate May Be Sealed in More Ways Than One.

CLEMENCEAU COMMENTS

Crown Prince's Interview Draws Fire of British Press.

LONDON, Dec. 5 .- A German physician, summoned from Berlin on Tuesday by the former German emperor, arrived in Holland today on a special train, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam. Three members of the former emperor's staff, the dispatch adds, have left Amerongen for Berlin. They are carrying many documents concerning the former emperor's private property.

HIS FATE IS SEALED. PARIS, Dec. 5 .- There is complete agreement between the Allies on all questions, particularly that concerning the former German emperor, declared Premier Clemenceau on his return from

London last night. He expressed deep satisfaction over the important results obtained at the conference. The premier said he had been deeply moved by the magnificent reception given him by the British.

"I quarrelled with my father in regard to Great Britain," he continued. "I told him the British would be against us. He never believed this, and would not take into account that possibility."

WHY BE CONTENT WITH MAKING A LIVING, WHEN

YOU COULD BE MAKING A LIFE INSTEAD?' It was a speaker at a meeting in the city the other day who raised this question about making a life. Today, with the snow falling gently, steadily, if damply, to earth is just the kind of a time to make one forget that the "world do move," and move terribly quick in this day and age, the kind of a day to recall Christmas cards, pictures of old times, leisurely winter days when people went sleighing to the jingling of bells, and folks really had time to know and

to see one another in a comfortable, sociable way. Granted that these are strenuous days (can anybody doubt it?), with a tremendous lot of important things to be done right away quick, does there eem much sense in the way the majority of people are dashing about everywhere, attending to half a dozen or so things at once, and never getting time for one real, deep breath of pure, fresh air to ventilate the lungs, and chase

away the stale vapors from the brain?

Driving in a high-powered automobile may get one through the country in a hurry, but one loses a lot of the most exquisite bits of the scenery en route. Remember the story about Mr. B., who found the darkey painting his chicken coop at a furious rate?

'What's all the hurry about, Uncle Sambo?" asked Mr. B. "Foh de Lawd's saks, don't talk," replied Uncle Sambo, "I got to finish paintin' mah chicken coop befoh mah paint gives out."

One is inclined to wonder if there ever was a time in the world's history when so many Uncle Sambos and Aunt Chloes, not to mention the young Mr Sambos and the young Miss Chloes, were trying to beat Father Time at his

t is all very well to 'live more in one hour than in years do some, whose fat blood sleeps as it slips along their veins." But there is such a thing as missing a great deal of the rare scenery along the road of life, the fragrant flowers that grow by the wayside. One can't go back to pick them up, because the road of life doesn't turn back, but insists upon running on.

CONSERVING LIFE.

Just now we are considering the subject of conservation. Doesn't it seem a shiftless, thriftless thing to dash past and thus completely lose the soul-refreshing vistas and the pleasant resting places set along the pathway of life? Doesn't it seem wasteful to ignore the things intended for the sweetening. enrichment and adornment of life, simply because one is so occupied rushing for a goal, or scurrying after tasks in the Micawber-like hope that something

will turn up some day that they will all be done? What are you doing, anyway, "intelligent reader," just making a living chasing madly past your milestones, or making a life, rich and well rounded? THE MISSING PLANK.

There is one important plank missing in that imposing and altruistic program of work planned for the new London Chamber of Commerce as published in the press a few days ago. Perhaps it is included in "education and

Anyway, in view of events of the past few years, the wastage of life, and permanent injuries resulting from the war, not to mention the appalling toil of the grim reaper in the recent influenza epidemic, "Public Health" seems sufficiently important to be given a place in that platform all its own. Mr. George M. Reid, president of the reorganized board of trade, otherwise the London Chamber of Commerce, in an interview given to The Advertiser a few days ago, emphasized the importance of health in making prosperity possible for a munity or country.

Why shouldn't London be a healthy place? Why should any slum conditions exist in a country which has all the territory going to waste that Canada has? It isn't the fault of the climate if people in this section of the country aren't

Considering conditions which actually exist in the city as discovered by in estigation, "Public Health Propaganda" is important enough to be given a conspicuous place all its own in the program of the London Chamber of Commerce. The latest figures obtainable for London re infant mortality, compiled and analyzed by Dr. H W Hill then director of the Institute of Public Health, and medical officer of health, gave the death rate for bables as eighteen per cent of the birth rate. In other words, according to these authentic statistics, eighteen out of every hundred babies born in this city previous to that time, in other words, in the year 1916 for example, died in their first year.

As soon as possible statistics to date will be obtained for publication in this

In any case, is it anything short of a scandal that numbers of little future citizens should be allowed to lose their lives from preventible causes every year in a city, claiming to be as intelligent, humane and civilized as London undoubtedly thinks itself to be

In four years and three months of war, about fifty thousand Canadian soldiers of the 450,000 who actually saw active service gave their lives in the war.

They gave their lives to set the world free from tyranny and injustice. During the war, less than twelve per cent of the men who saw active service in a period of almost four years lost their lives. In one year of that time in London EIGHTEEN per cent of the bables born

and of the year than a baby born in London. And yet they talk of the wastage meone says. "But consider the men who have been maimed, the men whose health has been permanently undermined by the war."

Consider the parallel case of the child. Experts who have made a thorough study of the subject state that for every one child that dies in infancy from preventible causes, five grow up to be handlcapped through life by physical disabilities that might have been prevented or overcome in the first few years. Even that distinguished town-planning expert, Thos. Adams, who addressed the Western Ontario United Boards of Trade in this city last week, declared that the citizens were more important than the city, and the sanitary conditions amid which they lived more important than the kind of buildings which they called their homes. If this be the case, then isn't public health sufficiently important to be one of the planks in the platform of London's Chamber of Commerce, the plank to be called that name?

NOT CRITICISM BUT SUPPORT

The foregoing has not been written with any idea of criticizing the London Board of Health, any of the officials thereof, or any of a number of agencies working for public health. The wonder is that with the amount of funds at their disporal, lack of backing by the citizens as a whole, and lack of co-ordination, that they have been able to achieve as much as they have done.

This isn't a suggestion that the Chamber of Commerce should step in and

usurp the functions of the board of health. The idea is that the most powerful and representative body in the city, organized for the avowed aim of promoting the welfare of the city and district, industrially, commercially, socially, etc., is the ideal organization to get behind a movement to assure for London the most up-to-date and efficient public health service obtainable. Efficiency in this repect demands enlargement of the department, and centralization and co-ordination of the various activities working to promote public health. Such efficiency will demand adequate endowment. It will demand not only adequate financial support, but support for educational work, support in the way of helping the



Here Are Three Ways To Make Mincemeat For Pies. If a mince pie-mind you, a home-4 cupfuls of choped beef made mince pie—is among the list of things you want to prepare as a holiday remembrance to some dear epicure away of the mincemeat now?

If made correctly, it will keep at home for a considerable time before use. Indeed, some kinds of mincemeat have to stand for a while to develop their full flavor. You can have your choice of meatless mincemeat, or, if the pie is for one of the "boys." you may justifiably

one of the "boys," you may justifiable include meat in the ingredients. A delicious mincemeat is made without the use of meat, but with tongue instead.
