New York, Dec. 7 .- A special cable to the Herald from Athens, via London dated Wednesday says:

Encouraged and applauded by Princess Ypsilanti and other women royalists, regular troops have thrown Athens into a state of terror. Officers, under orders of one general wearing the grand cordon of the Redeemer, are imitating the Prussians in an effort to strike fear into the hearts of the sympathizers of Venizelos. Elderly men are being driven from their homes and tortured, as they are marched through thoroughfares. Two Greek Red Cross nurses were locked up in a filthy latrine and assaulted by their guards. REAR GUARD OF RUMANIANS FIGHTING OFF THE TEUTONS

Petrograd Reports Bucharest Evacuated and Ferdinand's Troops Retiring To East ward—Berlin Reports the City of Campino Captured.

Petrograd, Dec. 7 .- Via London. - Bucharest, the Rumanian capital, has been evacuated by the Rumanian troops, says the Russian official statement issued today, and the Rumanian forces to the south of the capital also have retired. In Wallachia the Rumanians are retreating towards the east under hostile pressure and holding the Teuton forces by rearguard actions.

The opinion is expressed that not less than three Labor members will be included in the cabinet. The Labor members have been invited to meet Mr. Lloyd George at the war office to discuss the matter.

GUESSES AS TO CABINET.

London, Dec. 7 .- It having been decided definitely that David Lloyd George will undertake the formation of a ministry, political circles today were interested chiefly in the personnel of the new cabinet and the prospects of the new premier for getting together a combination that will have the support of a majority of the House of Commons. Few, if any, of the members of Mr. Asquith's cabinet are likely to accept office under M- Lloyd George, and some of the Unionist members, like J. Austen Chamberlain and Lord Robert Cecil, are likely to stand aside. However, it is assumed that at the conference at Buckingham Palace they assured the new premier of their benevolent nen-

trality, thus making his task much simpler. THE PREMIER'S PROSPECTS. Provincial Liberal newspapers like the Manchester Guardian and the Liverpool Post made a plea to the Liberals to give the Government a fair chance, as it is generally assumed that it is the embodiment of British determination to win the war. According to one estimate, Mr. Lloyd George can rely on the support of virtually all the Unionist mcmours and of 70 Liberals, and hopes to obtain the backing of the Labor members, who will come to a final decision at a meeting today. It is a'so represented that Mr. Lloyd George believes he will be able to offer concessions to the Nationalists which will bring them into line.

NUCLEUS OF CABINET. As far as the cabinet is concerned, the new premier has a uncleus in A. Bonar Law, Lord Derby, Lord Curzon, Sir Frederick E. Smith, and Sir Edward Carson, while Viscount Reading, the lord chief justice, is likely to join the ministry. Other Liberal members may be drawn from men such as Sir Frederick Cawley, member of the House of Com from the Prestwick division of Lancashire, and Sir George Pollard, memper from the Eccles division of Lancashire, who although the public has heard little of them, have done efficient work in committees. Dr. Christopher Addison, parliamentary under secretary for munitions, is almost certain to have a place in the cabinet, and Col. Winston Spencer Churchill, former first lord of the admiralty, is stated for a high office. COMPLETED BY MONDAY.

Under the circumstances it is believed the construction of the cabine will be a matter of only a day or so, and that by Monday the new Government will meet the House of Commons to learn what manner of reeption will be accorded it. A test of its strength can be made on the vote of credit which must be moved immediately.



WINNIPEG, Dec. 6 .- The combined farmers' organizations of all Canada, representing 60,000 affiliated farmers, known as the Council of Agriculture, has adopted a political platform for the bringing about of economic, political and social reforms. The platform was formulated in Winnipeg last week,

and announced today. The reforms aimed at include the amendment of the tariff laws by reducing the duty on goods imported from Great Britain to half the rates charged under the general tariff, and further reductions in the remaining tariff, such as will insure complete free trade between Great Britain and Canada within

More Radical Than 1911 Pact. It also urges that the reciprocity greement with the United States e accepted by the Parliament of nada, and that all foodstuffs not duded in the reciprocity agreeent of 1911 be placed on the free list, that agricultural implements, farm machinery, vehicles, fertilizers, coal, lumber, cement, illuminating, fuel and lubricating oils be placed on the free list. The farmers ask that the customs tariff on all the necessities of life be materially reduced, and that all tariff concessions granted to other countries be extended to Great Britain.

Direct Taxation Urged. For the purpose of raising an additional revenue to make up for the reduction caused by the pro-posed tariff reforms, direct taxation on certain things is proposed. These include a tax on unimproved land values, on all incomes over \$4,000, an inheritance tax on large estates, and a tax on the profits, over ten per cent, of corporations. 




