HURRICANE LEAVES **DESTRUCTION ALL** ALONG ITS PATH

Vessels in Key West Harbor Left in a Tangled

BUT FEW DEATHS

Survey of Situation Is Being Made by People in Damaged Areas.

Key West, Fla., Sept. 11.—With day-light today, following the storm of yesterday and a night of darkness, the people of Key West and surrounding territory were able for the first time to survey the destruction wrought by the hurricane that swept through here Tuesday night. Not a house in the city had escaped damage and many were totally wrecked. The harbor presented a tangled mass of fishing vessels and other small craft, but latest reports failed to show deaths other than those on the dredge Grampus. Of the fourteen men on this craft, ten were rescued last night, one body was recovered, and three are missing. The British tanker Tonawanda, which bad to be scuttled to save the liner Comal after that vessel had broken her moorings and gone aground, was reported not in a bad position. The steamer St. Gougal also broke loose. No vessels had left port early today, nor had any trains come in over the Florida East coast railway. In addition to the temporary stoppage of gas and telephone service were suspended. Florida East coast railway. RUMANIA'S REASONS FOR REFUSING TO SIGN AUSTRIAN PACT

Objects to Clause Call For the **Adjustment of Territorial** Concessions.

Paris, Sept. 10.-The Rumanian delegation to the peace conference, in explaining its attitude in refusing to sign the peace treaty with Austria today holds that since Rumania acquired nembership in the league of nation through signing the treaty with Germany, the league must be the tribunal which will eventually consider its claims and decide whether Rumania can be forced to accept a treaty "providing for foreign interference in her domestic affairs."

Rumania's objection to signing the viding that nations receiving territory from the former Austro-Hungarian Empire must provide for the protection of racial and religious minorities residing Rumania might nave acquired Buko-

wina under the Austrian treaty, but as her delegation failed to sign, the supreme council holds that the signa-ture of other powers does not make the transfer possible until Rumania accepts the treaty. Under the proposed treaty with Hungary, Runania would acquire Transylvania, but under the same terms relative to minorities in that region. Rumania, for this reason, is expected to refuse also to sngn the convention.

REPORTS ARE DENIED. Boston, Sept. 11.—The third day of the police strike opened with a casualty list of three persons killed and nearly a score, including four women, injured, as a result of the activities of state as a result of the activities of state troops in policing the city last night. The military forces, 5,000 in number, were under orders to restore lawful conditions to the point of using the ball ammunition with which they were proammunition with which they were provided, if necessary.

These tickets would be presented to the Government vendor, and the required lictor obtained. The cards are to be issued under Government regulations, and in his opinion should be non-transferable, allowing no loophole for those wishing to abuse the privilege

for those wishing to abuse the privilege and inflicting heavy penalties on any infringers apprehended.

Time Limit.

The "wet" ration cards could be issued monthly, to be utilized in a stipulated time, otherwise they become void, thus cutting off all possibility of some persons hoarding their cards for a big time. The cards for liquor should be optional, and those not availing themselves of the opportunity of obtaining same, would not thereby give others a chance to reap a further supply.

Only Heads of Home Eligible.

In obtaining the booze, card-holders would have to prove identity. In case, giving every adult a ration card, would be opposed on the ground that too much liquor would be dispensed for the welfare of the province, the former hotelkeeper suggests, that only the heads of the house be allowed to draw cards, thus limiting each family to perhaps one quart of whiskey monthly, and eliminating the necessity of doctors' prescriptions.

Thus, by means of motion pictures, the peoples of the earth are made better acquainted with the Dominion of Canada, and they learn something about our national life and vast resources and industrial activity.

Students are present from Kenora on the west, and Ottawa on the east. Places of all sizes are represented from the little village of Harrow to the city of Toronto. Twenty of the students are receiving training in order to qualify for positions in the Toronto public library.

Jail Commitments for drunkenness alone decreased from 6,235 in 1915, the year preceding the Act, to 2,595 in 1918. It is believed the present year will show an equal, if not great-

All Commitments for drunkenness decreased by 3,640 in 1918 compared to 1915. And yet, unlike former laws, this Act makes drunkenness in public places a "prima facie" offence, punishable by fine or imprisonment, whether accompanied by "disorderliness" or not. And further the Ontario Temperance Act is more strictly enforced than was the Ontario License Act, and arrests for drunkenness are therefore proportionately greater in comparison.

The number of commitments for drunkenness in Ontario in 1918 was the lowest in seventeen years, although the population of the Province increased during the same period by nearly 550,000, or over 27 per cent.

Some jails, including those of Bracebridge, Cayuga, Napanee and Orangeville-received no drunkards in 1918 at all. Others show well nigh unbelievable decreases since 1915, notably in the cities and larger towns.

Drunkenness has decreased under the Ontario Temperance Act to the point where a drunken man on the street has become a rare sight.

Crime in general has decreased as shown by record of jail commitments.



CATHERINES, Sept. 10. — The coroner's jury investigating the recent elevator disaster at Port Colborne, in which ten men lost their lives, concluded its inquiry this afternoon, returning a verdict that the accident was unavoidable, and that no person was to blame, put recommending on the evit dence of experts given this afternoon that "better attention be given to all parts of the elevator when it is reconstructed," that circuit breakers be installed in all the lofters and sprinkler systems in all lofter heads, and that open granaries be eliminated in rebuilding.

Superintendent Fawcett, who was recalled pointed out that cleaning the construction of the property on South street, which has already been surveyed.

Confirmatory expert testimony was also given by Dr. Brown of the United States department of agriculture, Washington, who has been present during all the sittings of the inquest. He was asked, after hearing the testimony, if he could put his finger on any person who had been guilty of negligence. His reply in the negative was quite positive. He considered the accident unavoidable. He laid some stress, however, on the desirability in the future of having circuit breakers in order to quickly check any danger from sparks resulting from friction.
