



Funds Voted for Operation of the I. C. R.—\$250,000 To Be Added to Territory Loan.

Ottawa, Oct. 1.-In the House of Commons this morning a third reading was given to the bill to lend \$250,000 to the Government of the Northwest Territories in addition to the regular grant of \$1,046, 979. The loan is without limit as to time, and will be qharged up against the Territories in any future arrangement regarding the political status of the Territories. The house then went into committee of supply on the item of \$47,000 for a deep-

water wharf at Sorel, Que. The day was taken up almost entirely in considering the estimates. The items passed during the afternoon were \$47,000 for a deep-water wharf at Sorel; \$6.500.000 for working expenses on the I. C. R., and \$236,000 for the Prince Edward Island on the Intercolonial altered, by abolishing the capital account and charging all expenditure to reserve, and also to afford some means of ascertaining which sections of the road pay and which do not. The Government declined to accept the

suggestion. The evening was spent largely in a dis cussion of the items for litigation in con-

nection with the canals. Mr. Fitzpatrick stated that, although the amount of litigation has increased, the law costs have materially decreased because much of the work formerly done by outside counsel was being now done by the Department of Justice.

Several items in connection with the canals were passed, and the house adourned at 10:30 p.m.

THE SENATE.

Senator Scott moved the second reading of the bill to amend the act relating to ocean steamship subsidies. This bill provides for a subsidized steamship service between Canada and France. He explained that this law was rendered necessary by the treaty, which stipulated that Canadian goods should be carried direct to French ports.

Sir Mackenzie. Bowell expressed the hope that this bill might tend to increase the trade between Canada and France. He explained the Little-French treaty, requiring direct shipment of Canadian wreck at Jarvis on Good Friday, 1902, goods in order for them to enjoy the French minimum tariff. Although the advantages would accrue to Canada, the lines so far had never been sufficiently successful to justify the expenditure of the subsidy. The subsidy was now increased, and if this caused the development of a good freight trade the expenditure would be justified. He spoke of the Australian line subsidy as being justified on opening a market for agricultural implements, British Columbia lumber and at times for Northwest grain. He hoped a good trade would spring up between Canada and France. There was no reason to the contrary. He hoped there night be sufficient subsidies offered to pen up a good trade with South Africa. To Light Tunnels. Phosphorescent tunnels and stations are now suggested for insuring public safety in the Paris tube. A company the walls, on exit doors, etc., which den extinguishing of the electric, petroleum or other lamps in case of fire or cence is produced by a coating of calcium monosulphide, obtained by mixing sulphur and oyster shells, or calcined outlefish bones, and therefore costing very little. Besides lighting tunnels and stations sufficiently for emergencies, the phosphorescent paint could be used for inscriptions by engraving the latter on glass, and filling the lines of the letters with the calcium monosulphide. Thus indications, as "This way out," would become luminous in the event of failure of the ordinary lights. The paint remains phosphorescent for a considerable time, as oxidation, transforming the substance

into non-luminous sulphate of lime, only sets in very gradually.—N. Y. Commercial Advertiser.
