RUSSIANS BURNED AN TUNG. The Russians were forced to abandon An Tung yesterday. They burned the town and retreated to Feng Wang Cheng. The Japanese now hold the estuary of the Yalu River.

A FIVE DAYS' BATTLE.

After five days' fighting, largely with artillery, the first Japanese army, under Gen. Kuroki, has forced a crossing of Gen. SILENCED RUSSIAN GUNS. It began its preparations on Friday by driving the Russians from their position on the bank of the river opposite Suikochin, which is eight miles above Wiju.

Tokio, May 2—7 a.m.—A report from Gen. Koro, covering Sunday's fighting, says: The Russians made two stands. The enemy's strength included all of the third division, two regiments of the sixth division, one cavalry brigade, about 40 quick-firing guns and eight machine guns. We have taken 28 quick-firing guns, many riffes, much ammunition, more than twenty officers and men as prisoners. I am informed that Major Kashtalinsky, commanding the Third East Siberian Rifles Brigade, and Lieut-Gen. Zassaof Kinteito, and under Chiu Tien Cheng. The Credit Company, however, suspended payment Friday afternoon and a little card any other for the purpose. tacked on the door of the company's office in the Imperial building notified RAILWAYS AND NAVIGATION the creditors that it had stopped doing business. The announcement that th company had suspended payment spread rapidly and within an hour hundreds of laboring men and women were gathered around the offices of the company, demanding the money they had deposited in the company But there was no one to pay them their money, and while the vaults of the company were opened by order of the court, it was found that there

would not be any money to go to the creditors. The Credit Company of Canada has been doing work in the city since last June, and in return for small weekly payments undertook to pay interest at a rate of 500 to 600 per cent. At the

Since starting business it is calculated that the company took in close to a million dollars and had 15,000 members. The company advertised to quite a large extent in most of the French-Canadian papers and by making various announcements warded off all attacks.

At the opening of the Provincial Parliament in March the question asked by one of the members as to whether the company had a right to do business as it was doing, started an investigation and the papers started to warn the public against the company, but it found it was then too late, for thousands had lost their sav-

WILD SCENES AT TORONTO JUNCTION

Closing of Barrooms Signal For Riotous Revelry.

THREATENED WITH RIOT ACT

10,000 More or Less Drunken Men Parade the Streets-Liquor Given Away.

Toronto Junction, Ont., May 2. - At o'clock Saturday night the scenes consequent upon the final hours of liquor selling in the town assumed riotous indications. Fully 10,000 people hronged the streets in the vicinity of the hotels. Thousands of people came from Toronto, where the hotels were all closed tight owing to the bye-elections, looking both for drink and excitement, and such a disgraceful spectacle as that presented has probably before been seen in Canada. When the factories closed at 1 o'clock many of the men remained around the streets to see, and some to participate in the revelry. Then each succeeding street car from the city began to add scores to the crowds, bringing out a portion of the most undesirable element. The six hotels of the town were jammed to the doors. At 5 p.m. drinks were being sold at one-third the usual price. Three glasses of beer or spirits were being disposed of for 5 cents, and in the last half hour, prior to 7 o'clock, when Chief Royce ordered the liquor

given away free.

Just before 7 o'clock the police attempted to make an arrest. Sympathizers attacked the constables and attempted a rescue. Chief Royce finally drew his revolver and threatened to read the riot act, and then use drastic means to quiet the mob. 





Chicago, April 30. - The decision of he National commission in the case of Patsy Donovan, the manager outfielder of the St. Louis National League team last season, is more significant than appears on the surface. In his petition Donovan prayed for release from reservation, holding that as the St. Louis club was in arrears in salary to him to the amount of \$3,600 he was free to sign where he pleased under an article of the National League constitution, which provides that a player shall be released from reserva-tion in case the club for whom he had obligations to him. The Robisons an swered that a note of \$1,000 which had been given Donovan covered a portion of the money he claimed was owing him and that the other \$2,600 was less than the amount which Donovan really lost by being ill a goodly portion of that Donovan was right in his contention, and so ordered him released from reservation by St. Louis. 


