## Eclipses.

There will be no Eelipse of the Moon this year.
There will be two eclipses of the Sun during the year, neither of them, however, visible in North America.

On the 23d of February, an annular Eelipse of the Sun takes place. It will be visible in Africk, South America, and Southern Europe.

On the 18th of August there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, visible in Australia, Southern Asia, and also in Eastern Africa.

## Appearances of the Planets, 1868.

Venus will be an Evening Star, until July 16; after that day a Morning Star. Until 2nd January, and after the 13th November, Mars will be an Evening Star, between these two dates, it will be a Morning Star. Until March 10, Jupiter will be an Evening Star ; from that date to the 4 th of July, it will be a Morning Star. Until February 24, Saturn will be a Morning Star, and from that date to the 29 th November, it will be an Evening Star. Mars will come to the Meridian during the daylight for the first nine month's of the year, but will become an object of interest toward the end of the year. On the 8th of April, Jupiter will be very close to Mars,

Height of the Atmosphere.-Observations on several bright auroras in 1865, occurring at a very early morning hour, lead to the belief that these phenomena in the upper air were modified by the light of the rising sun, tinging them long before it came near the earth's surface. Yet these auroras, as well as the incandescence of aerolites or shooting-stars, oceur, as repeated observations prove, at heights varying from a few miles above us up to 100 or more ; and as they are all believed to prove the existence of an atmosphere where they occur, they appear to prove that too low a limit has been fixed for the earth's atmosphere, which is commonly regarded as terminating at the height of about fifty miles. The mean altitude of the shooting-stars of November 13, 1863 , observed at Washington, Philadelphia, ete., was 92 miles. Prof. Newton thinks that none have been observed at a greater height than 125 or 150 miles.

## CUTTING AND COOKING FOOD FOR CATTLE.

Experiments, conducted over a series of years, show that there is a saving in cutting fodder for stock. The food is more completely eaten, and with less waste, than when fid in the ordinary way without being cut. We apply machinery to lessen the labor of mastication, and thus save in the animal economy a certain amount of waste of the system resulting from this labor. Food could be further improved for stock by cooking. Heat is the great solvent in nature. Straw subjected to 120 degrees of heat beeomes solvent or a pulp. By cooking food, a greater amount of nutriment may be secared,as repeated experiments have shown. Two bushels of steamed hay, with nothing added except water, equal three bushels unsteamed. Experiments with different animals show that they liked the steamed food and kept in better condition upon it. Other experimesters have found 33 per cent. saved by cooking the food.

Experiments generally show that for feeding swine the cooking has donbled the value of corn, and in no case has the grain fallen到'bw ose-third. In steaming hay or straw it is absolutely necessary to wet it. To apply steam at low pressure to dry hay only dried it the more, and high pressure steam burned it and made it worse. But wet the hay and it absorbs the steam. Hay or straw cannot be cooked to advantage without first adding two gallons of water for every five bushels of hay, Another saving is that you can mir poor and good food together, such as hay and straw, and the steaming makes it equal to the unsteamed hay. It should be mixed before the operation of steaming. Pea and bean straw may be thus mixed with hay and steamed, and if this kind of straw is cut early it makes
a most valuable food. Two quarts of middlings are equal to one quart of Indian meal, and for * feeding, bran is equal to Indian meal for keeping up the animal, but not for laying on fat. There is 18 per cent. of gluten in the bran of wheat, wbile corn meal has only 11 per cent.; therefore for building up the frame, bran is one of the most valuable kinds of food if properly prepared.
In feeding, steamed fodder has a remarkable effect. It is like pasturage, giving a sleek coat. Cows fed upon it are contented and no more restless than upon their native pastures. It has a remarkable effect upon horses, curing a cough or incipient heaves.

Roots when fed in the winter should be steamed with the straw, and by diffusing them through the mass, it is rendered more palatable. The steaming apparatus need not be expensive ; one for fifty head of cattle could be made for $\$ 50$. If not to be subjected to pressure, a pan with steam box attached could be set upon an arch. The pan may be got up very cheaply with wooden sides outside the arch and a sheet iron bottom. But the best way is to have a steam boiler, and conduct the steam through a pipe to the steam box, so that pressure may be applied which would soften their food more perfectly. Such on apparatus with capacity for steaming the food of one hundred cattle can be purchased for $\$ 250$-a paltry item in comparison to the saving it effects.

There is another advantage in steaming food, the manure is always ready for use. It undergoes fermentation so rapidly that it does not differ from well-rotted manure. By cutting and steaming the food the manure is fine, and of course more easily spread over the whole surface-a matter of great importance, as all practical farmers understand.Utiça Herald.

## BUTTER AND CHEESE FAOTORIES.

Forty years age, the State of New-York grew a surplus of Grain (Wheat) for exportation, and "Genessee Flour " was known and prized in many foreign markets. Ca-nal-boats took in Wheat at almost every storehouse from Syraeuse westward and brought it to Troy, Albany, and this. City, for manufacture and sale. Now, all is changed. The Genessee valley is no longer mainly devoted to Wheat ; even the counties west of Cayuga Lake no longer grow their own Grain. Sheep husbandry, once popular, is now no the wane. Dairying is rapidly supplanting all other farming in our rural districts: and we judge that the next census will return thrice the number of cows in our State reported in that which preceded it by a decade. And even Dairying itself is undergoing a decided and rapid transformation, through the introduction and multiplication of factories for the systematic and wholsale production of Butter and Cheese.

These factories are located near the centre of each radius of three or four miles wherein grass and cows abound-usually but one in a township as yet, though they are being rapidly "multiplied. A millstream and water-power often determine the site, though we believe a small engine and boiler (four to ten horse) are preferred to water-power. A cold and copions spring is well nigh indispensible; a good stock of ice, well stored and saved, is desirable. $\Lambda$ large reservoir (like a cellar) is dug in the ground and tightly walled with planks ; board platforms extend into this, floating on two or three feet of water, constantly, renewed from the spring. In this reservoir, deep pails or cans are set and filled three. fourths full of milk-they sinking and floating in a like depth of water. The milk remains here 24 to 36 hours, when the cream is taken off and churned by steam or water-
power-six to twenty-four churns being operated at once, with no draft on human musele. The Butter thus made each day, from cream in the very highest condition, is of such uniform and superior quality as to bring from five to ten cents per pound more than fair farm dairies will command. And the milk, thus skimmed, is then made into Cheese, rather mild in flavor, but palatable and of very fair quality. We never wish to eat better than some of this, made wholly of skimmed milk, and sold by the makers at ten cents per pound to their en. tire satisfaction. It is cheaper than Pork, and may be substituted as a staple article of diet for laboring men, to their great advantage and comfort.
The milk is brought in by the farmers of the vicinage, weighed as received, and placed in the cooling vat as aforesaid. The farmers generally receive a dividend of the proceeds ; but the better plan is fast gaining ground of paying the cash for it as fast as received: it being speedily turned into Butter and Cheese, which are cash articles. We estimate that the Dairy product of our State will be increased at least one-fourth by the general introduction of these factories, and that the value of our grass lands will thus be enhanced at least $\$ 10$ per acre. $-N . Y$ Tribune.

Chsanise Kxives.-A correspondent of the Country Gentleman says ; A small, clean potato, with the end cnt off, is a very convenient medium of applying brick dust to knives, seeping it at about the right maisture, while the juice of the potato assists in removing stains from the surface. We can get a better polish by this method than by any other we have tried, and with less labor.
