FARTHER POINT, Sept. 25. The Canadian Company's screw steamer North American, which left on Wednesday, 14th inst., at 11.30 a.m., passed the point at about 2 o'clock this morning, on route to Quebec. The news by the North American is highly important.

GREAT BRITAIN.—The steamer Baltic for Halifax, took a brief announcement that the explosion of some of the boilers of the Great Eastern. The following are the details. It appears that in the afternoon of the 27th, when off Hastings, a feeding-pipe coming in the forward funnel, was found to be leaking, and the ground of engine in heat, and to keep the heat of the funnel from the cabin, exploded with terrific force, blowing the funnel into the air, and tearing to pieces the lower deck cabins, through which the funnel passed, and otherwise doing great damage to the internal fittings. Great consternation prevailed on board, and prompt measures were made to get at the unfortunate men in the engineering department, who were either killed by the rubbish or prostrated by the steam. Three firemen were found in a dying state, and others were more or less injured, two of whom subsequently died. One fireman was lost overboard, having either fallen into the water or jumped into it to escape the burning.

One on "The Roman Empire of Life Assurance," gives, within a brief compass, a sketch of the rise and growth of a company for this purpose, and shows the funds which they have at various times been subject to. It closes with the following remarks:
