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



MAJOR-GENERAL GEORGE STRACEY SMYTH, PRESIDENT.

FREDERICTON, THURSDAY, the 11th day of JANUARY, 1816.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY having been Prorogued by several Proclamations until this Day, then to meet for the dispatch of Business. The House met.

Xenophon Jouett, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, delivered the following Message :---

His HONOR the PRESIDENT commands this Honorable House to attend him in the Council Chamber immediately; accordingly the House went up to attend -His HONOR the PRESIDENT in the Council Chamber; and having returned

Read a first time, " a Bill to ascertain Rateable Estates in this Province and " for other purposes therein mentioned."

The Speaker then reported that the House had attended His HONOR the PRESIDENT in the Council Chamber, and that he was pleased to make the following SPEECH to both Houses; a copy of which he read in his place, and is as follows:---

" Gentlemen of the Council; and

"Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"THE most important objects that I have to recommend to your deliberation (after what concerns the Revenue, and the ordinary exigencies of the Province) are the renewal of the Militia Law,---the permanent establishment of Schools in the several Counties, for the Instruction of Youth,---the opening and amending of the Roads,---and the improvement of the navigation of our principal Rivers.

" I shall not dwell upon the evident importance of the establishment of such a "Militia Law as will enable the Loyalty of the Province to be brought forward

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" in its defence upon any sudden emergency, however apparently unnecessary it " may be to anticipate such a call in our present state of Peace.

"The great advantages resulting to every Country, from those habits of tem-"perance, industry and loyalty, in the people at large, which are generally the re-"sult of an early, and well directed education, are so obvious, that I need not "press this important subject on your consideration.

"There are few things which will more essentially contribute to the speedy and "permanent settlement of the Province than the establishment of good Roads; "this object, therefore, will, I have no doubt, meet with your cordial support; in "the mode, however, hitherto pursued, of appropriating Monies for this purpose, "there is reason to apprehend that the Sums voted have not been so productive "as they might have been under different arrangements, and I therefore recom-"mend the adopting some general plan, which your wisdom and experience will "point out, for giving greater effect to any future grants for this service."

"With the establishment of Roads is intimately connected the improvement of "the navigation of our Rivers, not only as it concerns the general convenience "and advantage of the Inhabitants, but also as the means of facilitating and ex-"tending the Commerce of the Province.

"Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"The Treasurer's account, and such other documents as may be necessary for "your information, shall be laid before you; by these you will find that the flou-"rishing state of our Commerce, and the consequent increase of the Revenue, "have been such as to put into your hands ample means of laying a foundation "for great and permanent improvements, in points intimately connected with the "future prosperity of the Province."

"Gentlemen of the Council, and "Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"After a contest so long and arduous, so obstinate and sanguinary, as hardly "to have a parallel, a contest in which the nation, to which it is our pride and "happiness to belong, has borne a most distinguished part, Europe at length re-"poses in a secure and honorable Peace.

"During the continuance of our long warfare, the successes of the Enemy have "at times been such as to excite the most serious apprehensions; but a final "stroke was given to his illegitimate power in the great and mighty Battle of "Waterloo---a Battle fought by our matchless HERO, the DUKE of WELLING-"ron, and in which most sanguinary contest, the bravery and discipline of the "Army under his command were eminently conspicuous; and while, with the "deepest feeling of thankfulness, we acknowledge the signal mercies that have "been vouchsated to us, amidst surrounding desolation, let us not forget the "glory of the British Nation has been raised to such a brilliant height, and the "best interest of mankind so nobly preserved.

"It must be truly gratifying to every generous mind to witness the prompti-"tude, with which the nation has stepped forward, to relieve, by their liberality; "in theonly way practicable, the sufferings of those brave Men who have survi-"ved, and the Families of those who fell in the Field of Battle. In so laudable an "exertion of Patriotism, I trust this loyal Province will not be surpassed by any "part of the King's Dominions.

"I sincerely congratulate you upon the increasing prosperity of the Province, "which, while other Countries have been groaning under the distresses incident to "war, has been wholly exempted from any of those calamities; and when we "consider that, under the favor of DIVINE PROVIDENCE, it is to the British Con-"stitution that we are principally indebted for the many advantages we now

"possess ; it must confirm our steady and zealous attachment to that Sovereign "and that Country which has extended to this Colony a Constitution so nearly re-"sembling the pre-emminent original."

On Motion of Captain Agnew, Resolved, that an Address be presented to His HONOR the PRESIDENT in answer to his Speech.

Ordered, that Captain Agnew, Mr. R. Pagan, and Mr. Street, be a Committee to prepare the same.

Ordered, on Motion of Mr. Street that the Reverend James Somerville be Chaplain of this House in the room of the Reverend James Bissett, deceased.

Captain Agnew gave notice of his intention to bring forward, at an early day, a motion respecting the expenditure of public Money.

Ordered, that George Kilman Lugrin, King's Printer, do forthwith strike off Fifty Copies of His HONOR the PRESIDENT'S Speech to this House.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at eleven o'Clock.

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FRIDAY, the 12th day of JANUARY, 1816.

PRAYERS.

The House in Committee, Mr. Cambbell in the Chair, went into consideration of His HONOR the PRESIDENT'S Speech.

The Speaker resumed the Chair---the Chairman reported, that the Committee had gone into consideration of His HONOR the PRESIDENT's Speech, and that it was their opinion that a Committee should be appointed to examine what Laws have expired or are near expiring, and to report thereon.---And also, that a Committee be appointed to revise the Militia Law.

Ordered, that Mr. Leonard, Mr. Johnston, and Mr. William Pagan, be a Committee to examine what Laws have expired, or are near expiring, and that the Attorney General, Mr. Campbell, Mr. Humbert, Major Ward, and Major Allen, be a Committee to revise the Militia Law.

Ordered that the Journal of this House be daily, or as soon as a copy of the same can be prepared by the Clerk, printed by the King's Printer, and that he furnish fifty Copies thereof, for the use of the Legislature.

Mr. Humbert gave notice that he intended to bring forward to-morrow, a Motion respecting the House being deprived of the use of the room adjoining that in which the House sits.

Ordered, that the further consideration of His HONOR the PRESIDENT'S Speech, be postponed until to-morrow.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

SATURDAY, the 13th day of JANUARY, 1816.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Humbert, by leave, brought in "a Bill to regulate the exportation of Plais-"ter of Paris otherwise called Gypsum, from this Province," which was read a first time by its title.

Mr. Humbert, by leave, brought in "a Bill to provide for the relief of sick "and disabled Scamen in the several Sea Ports and Harbors within this Pro-"vince," which was read a first time by its title.

Mr. Humbert gave notice that he should postpone his motion respecting the Room adjoining the House of Assembly Room, until Tuesday next.

Mr. Belding, by leave, brought in "a Bill for increasing the number of Mem-" bers to represent the County of Northumberland," which was read a first time by its title.

The House adjourned until Monday morning next, at 11 o'Clock.

MONDAY, the 15th day of JANUARY, 1816.

PRAYERS.

Read a second time " a Bill to ascertain Rateable Estates in this Province, " and for other purposes therein mentioned."

Ordered that the said Bill be committed on Monday next, and that twenty copies thereof be immediately printed for the use of the Members.

Captain Agnew of the Committee appointed to prepare an Address in anewer to His HONOR the PRESIDENT's Speech, reported a draught thereof, which he read in his place, and the same being delivered and read at the Clerk's Table was on motion of Mr. William Pagan committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Leonard took the Chair of the Committee.

The House in Committee went into consideration of the Address in answer to His HONOR the PARSIDENT'S Speech, and having gone through the same, paragraph by paragraph

The Chairman left the Chair of the Committee.

The Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported that the Committee had agreed to the Address with amendments, which was read as amended, and is as follows :---

"To His Hunor Major-General GEORGE STRACEY SMYTH, President "and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Bruns-"wick, Bc. Ec.

" The Humble Address of the House of Assembly.

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR,

" The House are highly pleased with the Speech of your HONOR at the open-"ing of this Session of the Legislature.

"Sensible of the importance of the objects recommended by your HONOR, "the House will, without delay, take them into their serious consideration.

"Their utmost endeavours will be used to frame such a Militia Law as they "trust will, on any sudden emergency do justice to the loyalty of the Province,

" and be suitable to its present peaceful situation. "To cultivate the advantages resulting from habits of temperance, industry. and loyalty, alluded to by your HONOR, as the effects of an early and well directed education, is a duty the Legislature owe the Country too obvious to "be neglected.

"The House will readily provide for the improvement of the Roads, and under the suggestion of your HONOR, endeavour to give greater effect to their Grants for this service, by providing a different arrangement in the expenditure---and, convinced of the importance of the Navigation of our Rivers this latter subject shall also have their serious consideration.

"The House will pay every attention to the Treasurers Accounts and such other Documents as by your HONOR's direction, may be laid before them; and are highly gratified to understand that the increase of the Revenue will enable them to lay the foundation of such improvements as may promote the

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" future prosperity of the Province.

"The House most cordially congratulate your HONOR on the signal Victory "obtained in the great and mighty Battle of Waterloo, achieved by our match-"less Hero the DUKE of WELLINGTON: by whose unparalleled skill and exertions, and by the bravery and discipline of the Army under his command, the glory of the British nation has been raised to such a brilliant height. Europe at length reposes in peace, and under DIVINE PROVIDENCE the best interests of Mankind have been nobly preserved

"With the deepest feeling of sensibility the House notice the promptitude "with which the nation has stepped forward to relieve by its liberality, the "Sufferers in this memorable, but sanguinary conflict; and they rejoice to "find the loyal Province of New-Brunswick following so laudable an example.

"That the increasing prosperity of this Province (whilst other countries have "been suffering under all the calamities of war) is a blessing under DIVINE PRO-"VIDENCE derived from our happy Constitution, the House are truly sensible : "And in the due appreciation of the benefits and advantages they enjoy, are, " and will ever remain steadily confirmed in their uniform and zealous attach-" ment to their King and Country."

And being read a second time, resolved unanimously that the same be engrossed, signed by the Speaker and presented to His HONOR the PRESIDENT by the whole House.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

TUESDAY, the 16th day of JANUARY, 1816.

PRAYERS.

Ordered, that Captain Agnew and Mr. Street wait on his HONOR the PRESIDENT to know when he will be pleased to recieve this House with their Address.

The Speaker stated to the House that during the recess he had recieved a Letter from Lewis M. Wilkins, Esquire, Speaker of the House of Assembly of the Province of Nova-Scotia, respecting the Plaister of Paris trade, which was read, and ordered to lie on the Table.

Captain Agnew from the Committee appointed to wait on His HONOR the PRESIDENT, to know when he would be pleased to receive this House with their Address, reported that His HONOR said that he would receive the same on Thursday next at one o'Clock, in the Council Chamber.

Ordered, that Mr. Botsford be of the Committee to revise the Militia Law, in the room of Mr. Humbert, who has leave to withdraw from the same.

Mr. Leonard from the Committee appointed to enquire what Laws have expired, or are near expiring, reported, that

"An Act for the better regulation of Licences to Inns, Taverns, and Houses "for selling strong Liquors by retail," will expire on the 7th of March, 1816, or "at the end of the present Session of the General Assembly.

That "An Act further to continue for a limited time, an Act intituled an Act "for regulating, laying out, and repairing Highways and Roads, and for ap-"pointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways within the several Towns "and Parishes in this Province," will expire at the end of the present Session.

That "An Act to empower and authorize the Justices of the County of "Westmorland at their General Sessions of the Peaceto regulate the grazing and "depasturing of the several Marshes, low Lands and Meadows within the said "County," will expire on the 7th of March, 1816, or at the end of the present Session of the General Assembly.

That "An Act to continue for a limited time an Act to provide for the more "effectually repairing the Streets and Bridges in the City and County of Saint "John," will expire on the 7th of March, 1816, or at the end of the present Session.

That "An Act to continue an Act for raising a Revenue in this Province, "and the Acts in amendment thereof," will expire on the 1st of April, 1816.

That "An Act for laying additional Duties on certain Articles imported into "this Province," will expire on the first of April, 1816.

That "An Act to continue and amend an Act, entituled an Act, for regula-"ting the Militia," will expire at the end of the present Session.

That "An Act for the preservation of Oysters in the Counties of Westmore-"land and Northumberland," will expire at the end of this Session.

That "An Act to provide for the accommodation and billeting of His MA-"JESTY'S Troops and the Militia when on their march," expires at the end of this Session.

That "An Act for the more effectual prevention of Desertion from His MA-"JESTY'S Forces," and an Act in addition to an Act, entituled "An Act for the "more effectual prevention of Desertion from His MAJESTY'S Forces," expired in the year 1815, and that that part of an Act, entituled "an Act for encou-"raging and extending Literature in this Province," which provides for the establishment of County Schools, will expire on the 5th of March next.

Mr. Humbert gave notice that he should postpone bringing forward the motion respecting the Room adjoining the Room in which the House sits, until Friday next.

Read a second time "a Bill for increasing the number of Members to repre-"sent the County of Northumberland," and ordered that the further consideration thercof be postponed until Tuesday next.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

WEDNESDAY, the 17th day of JANUARY, 1816.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Attorney General from the Committee appointed to revise the Militia Law brought in a Bill under the following title, viz. "A Bill for the organiza-"tion and regulation of the Militia of this Province," which was read a first and second time and ordered to be committed on Friday next.

Mr. P. Fraser presents a petition from James Kidston, praying that duties to the amount of $\pounds 44$: 10s: 3d exacted from him as a transient trader, may be refunded to him, which was received, and

Ordered to lie on the Table.

On Motion of Mr. Attorney General, ordered, that the House do go into Committee of the whole House in further consideration of His HONOR the PRESI-DENT'S Speech.

The Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Campbell took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Campbell left the Chair of the Committee.

The Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman of the Committee reported that the Committee had directed him to report progress, and that it is the opinion of the Committee, that a select Committee be appointed to prepare a Bill for the permanent establishment of Schools throughout the Province.

Ordered, that Mr. Attorney General and Mr. Botsford be a Committee to prepare a Bill for the permanent establishment of Schools throughout the Province.

Mr. R. Pagan presents a Petition from the Inhabitants of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, and others, praying assistance toward the erection of a Grammar School in Saint Andrews which is ordered to lie on the Table.

Resolved, on motion of Mr. Attorney General, that an humble Address be presented to His HONOR the PRESIDENT praying that his HONOR will be pleased to order that this House be furnished with Copies of such parts of the Royal Commission and Instructions as may be necessary for the information and guidance of the House.

Ordered that Mr. Attorney General and Mr. Humbert be a Committee to present the same.

Read a second time "a Bill to regulate the exportation of Plaister of Paris otherwise called Gypsum, from this Province; And ordered to be committed on Saturday next.

5. The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

THURSDAY, the 18th day of JANUARY, 1816.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Speaker communicated to the House a letter which he had received from A. L. Lockwood, Maritime Surveyor, Royal Navy, on the subject of a Light-House on South Seal-Island, and of a Survey of the Bay of Fundy, which was ordered to lie on the Table.

Mr. Robert Pagan presented a petition from Hugh Johnston and Son, and John Ward and Son, praying for an additional draw-back on Rum by them exported in 1813, which was ordered to lie on the Table.

The House waited upon His HONOR the PRESIDENT with their Address in answer to His HONOR'S Speech, and being returned, the Speaker reported that the House had presented their Address, and that his HONOR was pleased to make the following reply, viz:

"GENTLEMEN,

" I thank you for this Address, and I hope that your exertions for the "welfare and advantage of the Province, in which I shall most heartily co-ope-"rate, will be crowned with success."

Mr. Leonard presented a Petition from sundry persons of King's County, praying a sum of Money to lay out and make a Carriage Road from Gondola Point to the City of Saint John, which was ordered to lie on the Table.

Mr. Attorney General, by leave, brought in a Bill to erect into a Town or Parish the settlement on the Washadamoiac River, commonly called New-Canaan Settlement, which was read a first time.

A general statement of the Treasurer's Accounts by order of His HONOR the PRESIDENT, was laid before the House, and ordered to lie on the Table.

Mr. Campbell presented a Petition from the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of St. Stephens in the County of Charlotte, praying aid towards erecting a Church in that Parish. Ordered that the same lie on the Table

Mr. Humbert presented two Petitions from the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, the first praying an increase of Firemen in said City; the other praying an increase of Constables in said City, which were ordered to be laid on the Table.

On Motion of Mr. Agnew, resolved that an humble Address be presented to His HONOR the PRESIDENT praying that he will cause to be laid before the House, the Accounts and Vouchers which have been transmitted to the Secreta-

ry's

ry's Office, from the several and respective Persons who have been intrusted as Commissioners with the expenditure of Money on the Roads and Bridges throughout the Province, under the provisions of any Act or Acts of the General Assembly, passed in the years 1812 and 1814, and also, that His HONOR will be pleased to order to be laid before the House an account of the expenditure of the sum of ± 300 granted at the last Session for the purpose of assisting the Indians of the Malacite Tribe, in making settlements on, and cultivating and improving any Lands which may be granted them, or for their use.

Ordered, that Mr. Agnew and Mr. Taylor do present the same to His HONOR the PRESIDENT.

Mr. Humbert, by leave, brought in a Bill to increase the number of Firemen in the City of Saint John, and also a Bill to increase the number of Constables in the City of Saint John, which were read a first time.

Mr. Botsford, by leave, brought in a Bill to prevent the cutting or breaking down the Bank of any River, Sea Bank or Dykes, and for the preservation of the same, which was read a first time.

The Committee of Correspondence laid before the House several papers which . were ordered to lie on the Table.

Mr. Humbert presented a Petition from the Justices of the Peace for the City and County of Saint John, praying to be reimbursed for expences incurred for the support of frozen Seamen, which was ordered to lie on the Table.

Mr. William Pagan presented a Petition from the President and Directors of the public Grammar School in the City of Saint John, praying for their aid, which was ordered to lie on the Table, together with Books of Accounts presented with the said Petition.

Mr. Botsford presented a Petition from the Roman Catholics residing in the City of Saint John, praying for aid to enable them to finish their Chapel, which was ordered to lie on the Table.

Mr. Solicitor General presented a Petition from William Harris praying farther aid towards establishing himself on the Miramichi Portage. Ordered to lie on the Table.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

FRIDAY, the 19th day of JANUARY, 1816.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Speaker presented several Letters and Papers from Nathaniel Atcheson, Esquire, and the Province Agent, which were ordered to lie on the Table.

Mr. Humbert presents a Petition from Elizabeth Tilton, Widow of Clayton Tilton, praying for further aid. Ordered to lie on the Table.

Ordered that the Order of the Day for the House to resolve itself into a Committee upon the Bill for the organization and regulation of the Militia of this Province be now read, and the said Order being read accordingly, the House resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Humbert took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Humbert left the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman of the Committee reported that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the Bill before them, had made some progress, and asked leave to sit again, which the House agreed to.

Mr. Attorney General reported that the Committee appointed to present the

Address to His HONOR the PRESIDENT, praying for Copies of certain parts of the Royal Commission and Instructions, yesterday attended to that duty.

On motion of Mr. Botsford, resolved that a Committee be appointed to enquire by what authority this House is deprived of the use of the Committee Room now occupied by the Secretary of the Province. Ordered that Mr. Botsfood and Mr Humbert be a Committee for that purpose.

The House then adjourned until to morrow morning at 11 - o'Clock.

SATURDAY, the 20th day of JANUARY, 1816.

PRAYERS.

The Order of the Day being read. Ordered that the further consideration of the Gypsum Bill, be postponed until Tuesday next.

Mr. Humbert presented a petition from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, praying for "an Act to establish and provide for " the support of a nightly Watch within the City of Saint John," which was ordered to lie on the Table.

Mr. Humbert, by leave, brought in a Bill to establish and provide for the support of a nightly Watch within the City of Saint John, which was read a first, time.

Mr. Humbert presented a Fetition from John Munro, praying relief from the House for work done on the Roads under a Contract with Charles I. Peters, Esquire, a Commissioner. Ordered that the said Perition be not received.

Mr. Humbert, presented a Petition from John Munro and other Inhabitants of Saint John, praying aid in opening a Road from Frog-Pond to Loch-Lomond,, which was ordered to lie on the Table.

On motion of Mr. Bliss, resolved that the House do go into Committee in further consideration of His HONOR the PRESIDENT's Speech.

The Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Campbell took the Chair of the Committee.

The Chairman left the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported that it is the opinion of the Committee, that a Committee should be appointed to prepare and bring in a Bill to establish and regu-late the great Roads of Communication in this Province, and for improving and repairing the same, and that a Committee should be appointed for the purpose of ascertaining what sums are wanted for the bye Roads and Bridges in the several Counties in this Province. Which report was received Ordered, that Mr. Attorney General, Mr. Botsford, and Mr. R. Pagan be a

Committee to bring a Bill to establish and regulate the general Roads of Com-

munication in this Province and for improving and repairing the same. Ordered that Mr. Agnew, Mr. Street, Mr. Leonard, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Campbell, Mr. Chapman, Mr. Belding, and Mr. Attorney General be a Committee for the purpose of ascertaining what sums are wanted for the bye Roads and Bridges in the several Counties of this Provinte.

Mr. Solicitor General presented a Petition from Jane M'Pherson, Widow of the Jete Door Keeper of this House, praying relief. Ordered to licon the Table.

Mr. Attorney General gives notice that he shall move that the order of Monday last for going into the consideration of the Assessment Law, on Monday next, be postponed until Wednesday following.

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The House then adjourned until Monday morning sext at 11 o'Glock.

The papers requested by the Address of the 18th inst. were laid before the House, by order of His Honor the PRESIDENT. Ordered that the same do lie on the table.

Mr. Botsford from the Committee, appointed to inquire by what authority this House is deprived of the Committee-Room, now occupied by the Secretary of the Province. Reported as follows:---

That your Committee in pursuance of the order of this House, have made the necessary inquiry. In the course of which, they were informed by William F. Odell, Esquire, Secretary of the Province, that he had fitted up the above alluded to Room, and had occupied the same as the Secretary's Office, in conformity to an order of His MAJESTY'S Council, made the 12th day of August, 1814.

That the said order, as your Committee were further informed by the Secretary of the Province, had been made upon the suggestions of some of His MAJES-TY's Council, which were to the following effect:

That the many and very important public Papers, that were of necessity deposited in the Secretary's Office, would be less liable to accident and loss by having the Secretary's Office in the Province Hall, than if kept in any private Dwelling House.

That as it was necessary for His MAJESTY'S Council to have frequent reference to, and occasion for public Papers on file in the Secretary's Office, and great delays had arisen in transacting the Public business, owing to the distance of the said Office from the Council Chamber. It was thought that the fitting up, and allotting the Room above alluded to, for the use of the Secretary's Office, would greatly tend to the dispatch of the Public business.

That your Committee have caused a copy of the order of His MAJESTY'S Council above-mentioned, as also a copy of another order relating to the said Room, entered in the Council Books the 15th day of March, 1810, to be made, which they beg leave herewith to submit.

And your Committee beg leave further to state, that they find that the Room the subject of this inquiry, had previously to its being allotted for the use of the

Secretary's Office, been used by the Judges of His MAJESFY's Supreme Court of Judicature for this Province for their accommodation.

That your Committee have made a number of extracts from the Journals of the House, which in their opinion, have a relation to the subject of this inquiry, and which they beg leave to submit to the House. The Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, delivered to the two Houses in their Session, held in the year 1791, contains the following paragraph:---

"It is also highly requisite that some provision be made for the decent accom-"modation of the General Assembly and the Courts of Justice; I have therefore "directed a plan for this purpose, to be prepared and submitted to your consi-"deration." That the House in their answer to the said Speech, as entered on their Journals, replied in the following words: viz. "We shall pay all due at-"tention to the plan which your Excellency has directed to be prepared and laid before us as the decent accommodation of the General Assembly, and "the Courts of Justice, are objects exceedingly desirable." That your Committee also find the following entries made in the Journals during the said Sessions; and that a select Committee be appointed to inspect and examine the Plan and "Building referred to in His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor's Speech, and "report to the House therein."

"Ordered, That the said report be accepted, and that Mr. Dixon, Mr. Glenie, "Mr. Rogers, Mr. Hardy and Capt. Lyman, be a Committee to inspect and exa-"mine the Plan and Building referred to in His Excellency's Speech, and re-", port thereon."

"Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that Commissioners be appointed by the House to prepare and report at the next Session, a Plan and "Estimate of the expence of proper Buildings for the accommodation of the "General Assembly, and the Courts of Justice; and that the sum of £100, be granted to the said Commissioners, to purchase such Boards and Plank there-"for, as may require seasoning before they are wrought up. Ordered that the "said report be accepted."

That your Committee find the following entry on the Journals of the House for their Session, held in the year 1792.---Viz:

"The Commissioners appointed last Session, to prepare a Plan and estimate "of the expence of proper Buildings for the accommodation of the General As-"sembly and Courts of Justice. Reported a Plan and Estimate thereof, which "was ordered to lie on the Table."

That in the Speech delivered to the House, on the opening of the Sessions in the year 1793, your Committee find the following words: "A Plan of a suita-"ble Building for the decent accommodation of the General Assembly and the "Courts of Justice, and for which a convenient situation in the Town of Frede-"ricton has been allotted, was recommended to the consideration of the late "House of Assembly." That the answer of the House of Assembly to His Excellency's Speech, contains the following paragraph: "We are fully satisfied of "the importance of the objects so particularly and earnestly recommended by "your Excellency, that some plan of a suitable Building for the decent accom-"nodation of the General Assembly and Courts of Justices, should be adopted "and provided for."

That your Committee on searching the Journals of the House, for the Session in the year 1793, find the following entry.---Viz:

"The Honorable John Saunders, Esq. by order of His Excellency the Lieu-"tenant-Governor made a report of the expenditure by him, of a part of the sum granted in the last Session for the purchase of Boards and Plank for Building a House for the accommodation of the General Assembly and Courts of "Justice." "Ordered, That it lie on the Table."

That in the Journals of the House for the Session in the year 1801, your

Committee find the following Message from the Lieutenant-Governor to the House of Assembly.

" Message from the Lieutenant-Governor, to the House of "Assembly, 4th February, 1801.

"THOMAS CARLETON.

"The Lieutenant-Governor informs the House of Assembly, that from the "several sums granted to him by acts of appropriation of the last Session for "defraying expences of the Province, together with the amount formerly ap-"propriated to the purchase of materials for erecting a Building for the accommodation of the General Assembly and Courts of Justice, he has been able to apply to that important Service nearly *five hundred pounds*, which with other sums amounting to about *five hundred* more, have been expended in erecting a "suitable Building for that purpose in Fredericton, and that the further expence "for finishing what has been thus begun, will probably not exceed seven or eight *hundred pounds*, for which the Lieutenant-Governor recommends the requisite "provision to the consideration of the House."

That your Committee find that in the year 1792, the sum of one hundred pounds, was granted in the following words, viz. "To such persons or persons "as His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor shall be pleased to nominate for "that purpose, the sum of one hundred pounds to purchase such Board and Plank "as may require seasoning before they are wrought up, for the building of a "House to accommodate the General Assembly and the Courts of Justice, at "such place as his Excellency shall point out," and also that the further sum of three hundred and fifty pounds was granted in and by a Law of this Province, entituled an Act, for appropriating certain monies for defraying the expences of the Province, passed the 21st day of February, 1801, in the words following, viz. "To His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, towards completing the Build-"ing for the accommodation of the General Assembly and the Courts of Just' "tice in Fredericton, the sum of three hundred and fifty pounds."

That your Committee by a reference to the original Plan of the Province Hall, find that the above alluded to Room is designated and marked on the same as a *Committee Room*, and for which purpose they also find it was used by a Committee appointed by the House in the Sessions during the summer of 1808.

That the Committee appointed to take into consideration the recommendation of His HONOR the PRESIDENT'S Speech relative to the improvement of the Navigation of the Rivers of the Province, have gone into the consideration of that subject, and beg leave to report to the House

That viewing the River Saint John as the principal or Chief River of the Province, and the Navigation of that River as having the first claim to their attention, under the recommendation contained in His HONOR the PRESIDENT'S Speech at the opening of the present Session, they have therefore given full consideration to its Navigation between the City of Saint John and Fredericton. It appearing to the Committee that that part of the River Saint John is much injured in its navigation by sunken Logs and Trees, which, at present obstruct the Channel in many parts of the River, where at present it is Navigated by Vessels of burthen,

That the Shoals known as the Oromocto Shoals greatly interfere with the navigation of the said River at particular seasons, and that the Channel in front of the town of Fredericton, is also interrupted by sunken Logs and not of depth sufficient for the Vessels employed in carrying freight between Fredericton and Saint John, or for the Vessels which have been built and are now building at Fredericton.

That the Committee are of opinion that the establishment of one or two Ballast Lighters with proper Windlasses, Drags, and other necessary apparatus will be proper for the improvement of the navigation in that part of the said River above referred to, and beg leave to submit to the House the propriety of granting a sum adequate to such a purpose. which the Committee are of opinion, might be carried into effect by a grant of $\pounds 200$.

That the Committee also regard the said River above Fredericton and its Branches, as capable of great improvement, by removing a part of the Rocks in its several Rapids, and opening a clear passage of from 4 to 6 rods in width, so as to facilitate the passage of rafts of Timber downwards, and also to promote a flat-bottomed navigation by tracking.

The expence which would be incurred in the last mentioned service, would in the judgment of the Committee, require a grant of the sum of $\pounds 435$ or thereabouts.

That the Committee not being at present informed as to the claims which any other of the Rivers of the Province may have to their consideration; they have it not in their power to make any specific report as to them, until they receive information as to the state of such Rivers respectively, and the nature and present state of their navigation.

On motion of Mr. Attorney General ordered that the Extract from the Royal Instructions laid before this House by His HONOR the PESIDENT, on the 22d day of January last, in answer to their Address, be inserted in the Journal of this day.

Extract from the Royal Instructions to Sir GEORGE PREVOST, Bart. dated the twenty-second day of October, 1811,

11th. And whereas by our Commission to you under our Great Seal of our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, you are authorized and empowered, with the advice and consent of our Council to summon and call General Assemblies of the Freeholders, Inhabitants of our Province under your Government and with the advice and consent of the said Council and Assembly or the major part of them, to make, constitute and ordain Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances for the Public peace, welfare, and good government of our said Province. Lyis our will and pleasure, that the following regulations be carefully observed in the framing and passing of all such Laws, Statutes and Ordinances, as are to be passed by you with the advice and consent of our said Council and Assembly.---viz:

That the style of enacting the said Laws. Statutes and Ordinances, be by the Governor, Council and Assembly and no other.

That each different matter be provided for by a different Law, without including in one and the same Act such things as have no proper relation to each other.

That no clause be inserted in any Act or Ordinance which shall be foreign to what the title of it imports and that no perpetual clause be part of any temporary Law.

That no Law or Ordinance whatever be suspended, altered, continued, revived or repealed by general words, but that the title and date of such Law or Ordinance be particularly mentioned in the enacting part.

That no Law or Ordinance, respecting private property, be passed without a clause suspending the execution until our pleasure be known, nor without a saving of the right of Us, our Heirs and Successors, and of all Bodies Politic and Corporate, and of all other Persons, except such as are mentioned in said Law or Ordinance, and those claiming by and under them; and before such Law or Ordinance is passed, proof must be made before you in Council, and entered upon the Council Book, that public notification was made of the Party's intention to apply for such Act in the several Parish Churches where the Lands in question lie, for three Sundays, at least successively, before any such Law or Ordinance shall be proposed, and you are to transmit and annex to the said Law or Ordinance a Certificate under your hand, that the same passed through all the forms abovementioned.

That in all Laws or Ordinances for levying Money or imposing Fines, forfeitures or penalties, express mention be made that the same is granted or reserved to Us, our Heirs and Successors, for the Public uses of the said Province, and the support of the Government thereof, as by the said Law or Ordinance shall be directed, and that a clause be inserted declaring that the Money arising by the operation of the said Law or Ordinance shall be accounted for unto Us here in this Kingdom, and to the Commissioners of our Treasury, or our High Treasurer for the time being, and audited by our Auditor-General of our Plantations or his Deputy.

That all such Laws, Statutes and Ordinances be transmitted by you within three months after their passing or sooner if an opportunity offers, to Us by one of our principal Secretaries of State, and Duplicates thereof to the Committee

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of our Privy Council for Trade and Plantations, for their information, that they be fairly abstracted in the Margins and accompanied with very full and particular observations upon each of them, that is to say, whether the same is introductory to a new Law, declaratory of a former Law, or does repeal a Law then before in being ; and you are also to transmit in the fullest manner the reasons and occasion for enacting such Laws and Ordinances, together with fair Copies of the Journals and Minutes of the proceedings of the Council and Assembly which you are to require from the Clerk's of the said Council and Assembly.

12th. It is our will and pleasure that you do not give your assent to any Act or Acts for raising Money by the institution of any public or private Lotteries whatsoever, until you shall have first transmitted unto Us by one of our principal Secretaries of State, a Draft or Drafts of such Act or Acts and shall have received our directions therein.

13th. It is our will and pleasure that you are not to give your assent to any Bill for ascertaining the duration of Assemblies, the fixing or altering the qualifications of the Electors or Elected, or establishing any regulations with respect thereto until you shall have transmitted the Draft of such Bill or Bills unto Us by one of our principal Secretaries of State, and shall have received our pleasure thereupon, or that a suspending clause as aforesaid shall be inserted therein.

14th. And whereas great mischiefs may arise from passing Bills of an unusual and extraordinary nature and importance in our Plantations, which Bills remain in force there from the time of enacting until our pleasure be signified to the contrary. We do hereby Will and require you not to pass or give your assent to any Bill or Bills of an unusual and extraordinary nature and importance, wherein our Prerogative, and the Property of our Subjects may be prejudiced, or the Trade and Shipping of this Kingdom any way affected, until you shall have first transmitted unto Us, by one of our principal Secretaries of State, and to the Committee of our Privy Council for Trade and Plantations, for their information, the Draft of such Bill or Bills and shall have received our Royal pleasure thereupon, unless you take care that there be a clause inserted therein, suspending and deferring the execution thereof, until our pleasure shall be known concerning the same.

15th. And it is our further Will and Pleasure that you do not re-enact any Law to which our assent shall have been once refused, without express leave for that purpose first obtained from Us, upon a full representation by you to be made to Us by one of our principal Secretaries of State, and to the Committee of our Privy Council for Trade and Plantations, for their information, in order to be laid before Us of the reasons and necessity for passing such Law, nor give your assent to any Law for repealing any other Law which shall have passed in your Government, and whether the same has or has not received our Royal approbation, unless there be a clause inserted therein, suspending and defering the execution thereof, until our pleasure shall be known concerning the same. 16th. And it is our express Will and Pleasure that no Law for constituting

16th. And it is our express Will and Pleasure that no Law for constituting any Court or Courts of Judicature, or for establishing the Militia, shall be a temporary Law; and that no Law for granting unto Us any sum or sums of Money, by Duties of Impost, Tonnage or Excise be made to continue for less than one whole Year, as also that no other Laws whatsoever be made to continue for less time than two Years, except only in cases where it may be necessary upon any unforeseen emergency to make provision by Law for a service in its nature temporary and contingent.

17th. It is our Will and Pleasure that you do not on any pretence whatsoever, give your assent to, or pass any Bill or Bills in our Province under your Government, by which the Lands, Tenements, Goods, Chattels, Rights and Credits of Persons who have never resided within our said Province shall be liable to be attached for the recovery of Debts due from such Persons in any

manner

manner inconsistent with the usage and practice within this our Kingdom of Great-Britain until you shall have first transmitted unto Us, by one of our Principal Secretaries of State the Draft of such Bill or Bills, and shall have received our Royal Pleasure thereupon, unless you take care upon the passing such Bill or Bills that a clause be inserted therein suspending and deferring the execution thereof, until our Royal Will and Pleasure shall be known thereupon.

18th. It is our Will and Pleasure that you do in all things conform yourself to the provision contained in our Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of our Reign intitled, "An Act to prevent paper Bills of credit hereafter "to be issued in any of His MAJESTY's Colonies or Plantations in America "from being declared to be a legal tender in payment of Money and to pre-"vent the legal tender of such Bills as are now subsisting from being prolong-"ed beyond the period limited for calling in and sinking the same." And also an Act passed in the thirteenth year of our Reign to explain and amend the above recited Act, passed in the fourth year of our Reign as aforesaid, and you are not to give your assent to, or pass any Act whereby Bills of Credit may be struck or issued in lieu of Money or for payment of Money either to you our Governor or to any other Person whatsoever, unless a clause shall be inserted in such Act, declaring that the same shall not take effect until the said Act shall have been approved and confirmed by Us, our Heirs and Successors.

19th. You are not to suffer any public Money whatsoever, to be issued or disposed of otherwise than by Warrant under your hand, but the Assembly may nevertheless be permitted from time to time to view and examine the accounts of Money disposed of by virtue of Laws made by them as there shall be occasion.

21st. It is our Will and Pleasure that you do not upon any pretence whatsoever on pain of our highest displeasure give your assent to any Law wherein the Natives and Inhabitants of the Province of New-Brunswick are put on a more advantageous footing than those of this Kingdom; or whereby Duties shall be laid upon the Shipping or upon the Product or Manufactures thereof, upon any pretence whatsoever.

22d. It is our Will and Pleasure that you do not give your assent +0, or pass any Act whatsoever, for imposing Duties on the importation of any Felons from this Kingdom into the Province under your Government.

50th. And it is further our Will and Pleasure that no Person be allowed to keep a School in the Province under your Government without your Licence first had and obtained, in granting which, you are to pay the most particular attention to the Morals and proper qualifications of the Persons applying for the same, and in all cases where any School has been founded, instituted or appointed for the education of Members of the Church of England, or where it is intended that the Schoolmaster should be a Member of the Church of England, you are not to grant such Licences except to Persons who shall first have obtained from the Bishop of Nova-Scotia or one of his Commissaries, a certificate of their being properly qualified for that purpose.

53d. It is our Will and Pleasure that you do not, upon any pretence whatsoever, give your assent to any Bill or Bills that may hereafter be passed by the Council and Assembly of the Province under your Government for the naturalization of Aliens, nor for the divorce of Persons joined together in Holy Marriage, nor for establishing a title in any Persons to Lands, Tenements and Real Estates in our said Province originally granted to or purchased by Aliens antecedent to naturalization.

The above written Extracts from the Royal Instructions to the Governor of New-Brunswick, are laid before the House of Assembly, by Command of His HONOR the PRESIDENT----22d January, 1816.

Read an engrossed Bill in addition to, and to explain an Act, entitled "An "Act, to explain and amend the Laws now in force, for regulating the expor-

" tation of Fish and Lumber."

Whereupon ordered, on motion of Mr. Bliss, that the following proviso be added as a rider to the third section of the said Bill.

" Provided always, that nothing in this Clause shall be construed to extend to any part of the River St. John, or its branches above the Falls at the mouth thereof;" and the said Bill being read as amended. Resolved that the said Bill to pass.

Ordered that Mr. Cambbell and Mr. Taylor, do carry the Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

The House in Committee. Mr. Agnew in the Chair, went into the further consideration of the Plaister of Paris or Gypsum Bill.

MESSAGE from the COUNCIL.

Mr. Agnew left the Chair of the Committee. Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair. Mr. Odeil delivered the Message.

Mr. Speaker,

The Council have agreed to the Bill to give two additional Terms for the sittings of the Interior Courts of Common Pleas in Northumberland,---

The Bill to prevent the cutting or breaking of Sea Banks, &c .---

And the Bill to constitute the Island of Grand-Manan into a distinct Town or Parish. And then Mr. Odell withdrew.

The Speaker left the Chair. Mr. Agnew took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Agnew from the Committee reported that he was directed to report progress and ask leave to sit again, which report was ordered to be received.

^o Mr. *Botsford* from the Committee appointed to enquire respecting a suitable residence for the Commander in Chief, reports as follows :---

The Committee of the House of Assembly appointed to enquire whether the House at present occupied by His HONOR the PRESIDENT can be hired for any, and what term of years, and at what rent; and also, whether the same is for sale, and at what price, and to report thereon---

Report that they find upon enquiry, that a Lease can be had of the House and Premises now occupied by His HONOR the PRESIDENT for a term of five years or less, subject to the payment of a rent of *two hundred pounds* per annum, and to the repairs that may be necessary.

That your Committee inanswer to the application made by them to Colonel Hailes, the Agent for His Excellency Lieutenant Governor Carleion, with the view of ascertaining whether the said House was for sale, and if so, what would be the price for the same, received a communication from that Gentleman which they beg leave herewith to submit; by which it appears that the House and Premises comprising thirty-six Acres of Land are offered for sale for the consideration of three thousand five hundred pounds currency.

That your Committee on finding that the above premises were for sale, proceeded to an examination and survey of the House and out Buildings in which they were attended by Mr. *Robert Smith*, whose knowledge of the Premises enabled him to point out to your Committee, the real state and condition of the whole.

That your Committee for the information of the House, beg leave to state that the Foundation Walls with the exception of a small part appears to be substantial, and in excellent repair; that the Walls and ceilings of the upper parts of the House will require repairs, as also the Roof; the tops of the Chimnies it will be necessary to take down and rebuild. The out Buildings in general with the exception of the Stables are in good condition.

That your Committee have obtained from Mr. Smith an estimate of the necessary repair, which they also beg leave herewith to submit, and by which it

will

will appear, that the House and out Buildings, will require a sum, at the most, of four hundred pounds, to put the whole in good order.

That your Committee are informed that of the Grounds proposed to be sold with the House, are twenty acres subject to a rent of *five shillings* and *two pence* per Acre, that ten acres are subject to a rent of *seven shillings* per acre, and that the remaining six acres upon which the Buildings are erected, are rent free, the absolute title in fee, being vested in His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor.

That your Committee are informed that of the Premises, that part only which comprises the ten Acres, will be sold subject to the payment of the rent of seven shillings per Acre. W. BOTSFORD.

Gentlemen,

I feel it incumbent on me to explain the principles upon which were founded the terms; which, as the Agent for His Excellency Lieut.-Governor CARLETON, I offered upon your application on the 3d inst. to Sell or Lease for the residence of the Commander-in-Chief of the Province, the Dwelling House, Out-houses and Grounds, now occupied by His HONOR the PRESIDENT. These buildings were erected, and have been kept in repairat so very heavy an expence, within my own knowledge, that I considered the sum of £5000 as a bare equivalent for them, without taking into the estimate any consideration for the very valuable tract of Land contemplated to be included in the purchase; and upon this calculation, I conceive that a rent of £200 per annum, exclusive of repairs, could not be thought unreasonable.

I am well aware that the nature and situation of this Property, are such as to render it fit for no other use, comparatively, than that for which it was designed and to which it has been hitherto appropriated, and that if the present opportunity should not be embraced of disposing of it for that purpose, the eventual loss that would ensue from the decrease of its value, would fall very heavily on His Excellency, whose interests are committed to my care; but at the same time, I feel a just confidence that the Honorable House would never suffer the Government of the Province, to avail itself of such a circumstance in the present negotiation, more especially to the injury of one whose exertions and sacrifices for the public bencfit, in promoting the settlement of the Country, in the infancy of the Province, were almost without example, and could not easily be surpassed.

It would be unbecoming in me on this occasion, to call to the recollection or knowledge of the Honorable House more than one circumstance, namely, that His Excellency during the eighteen years of the administration of the Government, never suffered to be taken one farthing of the Fees payable to him on Grants of Land, on Commissions of any description, on Marriage Licences, or any other public instruments, nor any other than the small Fees due at the Custom-House on Registers of Vessels.

Waving, however every consideration of this kind, I have inquired of the very competent judge in matters of this sort whom you took with you in the examination of the Premises on Saturday, the value of the Buildings as they now stand, who assures me that they could not at this time be erected for the sum of $\pounds 4000$. I have also procured a plan of the grounds proposed to be included in the sale, which will herewith be delivered to you for the information of the Honorable House, in which the Garden and upwards of thirty Acres of the most valuable portion of the grounds belonging to his Excellency are included; and being duly sensible of the importance to him, of this occasion, I now take upon myself the responsibility of offering the whole for the sum of $\pounds 3,500$ humbly trusting if this sum should be thought too great, that it will not be materially diminished in the expression of the opinion of the Honorable House, upon the H

subject, to which, whatever it may be, I shall feel it my duty without any farther reserve, most respectfully and cheerfully to submit.

III. "And beit further enacted, That all Lands, Tenements, and Heredita-"ments already granted or hereafter to be granted to the several and respective "Rectors, Church Wardens and Vestries as herein before mentioned, for the use "and benefit of the Rectors or Ministers of the said several and respective "Churches for the time being, shall be held subject to the sole management and direction of such Rectors or Ministers, and shall be used, occupied and enjoy-"ed by them severally and respectively, for the best benefit and advantage of "themselves and their Successors in like manner as the Glebe Lands belonging "to any Rectory or Parsonage in that part of Great-Britain called England, are "there usually held, occupied and enjoyed." and further, that, "should the amend-"ments now proposed be adopted by the House, it would be expedient to alter "the Title of the Bill by adding the words 'to amend' making it read 'A Bill to "explain and amend an Act, &c."

The Manager further stated "that he was directed by the Council to deliver "the Bill and amendments to the Committee of the House."

The Speaker left the Chair. Mr. J. Fraser resumed the Chair of the Committee. The Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. J. Fraser from the Committee reported progress and asked leave to sit again. Ordered that the report be received.

The House proceeded to take into consideration the amendments made by the Council, to the Bill sent up for concurrence, to continue and make perpetual two Acts of the General Assembly that are near expiring, and the said amendments being severally read, were, upon the question severally put thereupon, agreed to by the House. Ordered that Mr. Leonard and Mr. Taylor do carry the Bill to the Council and acquaint them that this House hath agreed to the amendments made by the Council.

' A Message from the Council.

Mr. Justice Saunders delivered the Message.

Mr. Speaker,

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The Council have directed me to return the Bill to ascertain ratable Property, &c. with amendments; to which amendments; the Council desire the concurrence of this House; and then Mr. Justice Saunders withdrew.

Read, a Petition from William Hazen, Esquire, Province Treasurer, praying an increase of Salary, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

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Read, a Petition from Wm. Pagan & Co. praying Drawback on Wine and Rum re-shipped, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

On Motion of Mr. James Fraser, made and seconded, the House resolved itself into Committee of the whole.

Mr. Campbell in the Chair.

The House went into consideration of the report of the select Committee, appointed to inquire whether the House, at present occupied by His Honor the PRESIDENT, can be Leased for a Term of years, &c.

MESSAGE from the COUNCIL.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Justice Chipman, delivered the Message.

Mr. Speaker,

The Council do agree to the conference requested by the Assembly on the subject of the amendments to the Saint John nightly Watch Bill, and that Mr. Justice *Chipman*, be a Committee for managing the same; and then Mr. Justice *Chipman* withdrew.

Ordered, that Mr. Attorney General and Mr. Agnew, be a Committee to manage the conference on the part of this House with the Committee of the Council, on the subject of the amendments to the Saint John nightly Watch Bill; and that they prepare reasons to be laid before the House, for not concurring with the same.

Mr. Attorney General, from the Committee, appointed to prepare reasons to be offered in the conference requested of the Council, upon the amendments made to the Saint John nightly Watch Bill; reports the following draft of Instructions, which were read as agreed to, and are as follows, viz:

The Committee appointed to manage the conference with the Council upon the subject of the amendments made by them to the Saint John nightly Watch Bill, are instructed to state to the manager on the part of the Council, that although it is at all times with extreme regret that the House engage in discussions with the Council on questions relating to privileges, they cannot, consistent with their duty to their constituents, forbear to remonstrate, whenever the undoubted rights and privileges of the House are infringed, as, in the present instance they conceive them to be, by two of those amendments.

That the House do claim it as their undoubted right to be the sole judges of the extent and duration of the burthens to be imposed from time to time upon the people; and they cannot therefore help viewing the amendment which goes to limit the sum to be assessed upon any one person, for one year, in support of the nightly Watch, to a sum not exceeding *five pounds*; providing at the same time for the excess of that sum by a Tax upon the Funds of the Corporation of the City, (a Tax in no shape contemplated by the Bill)---and also the amendment restraining the existence of the Act to four years, thereby limiting the duration of the burthen, as altogether unparliamentary, and an infringement of the rights of the House.

That the House are by no means disposed to consider the exceptionable amendments as proceeding from a deliberate intention to interfere with their privileges, but originating in misapprehension, and they therefore entertain full confidence in the readiness of the Council to withdraw those amendments, that the House may signify their concurrence with the Council in the others, to which the House have no objections.

Mr. Campbell resumed the Chair of the Committee.

The Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Campbell from the Committee, reported that it is the opinion of the Committee that it be

Resolved, that it is highly expedient to make a purchase of the Mansion House, Out-houses and Grounds, now occupied by His HONOR the PRE-SIDENT, for a residence for the Governor or Commander-in-Chief of the

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Province for the time being, provided the same can be obtained for the sum of #3,500, and an addition made to the Ground of two small Fields, next adjoining to the Garden to the westward, containing about ten Acres : and provided further, that a title to the Lot of ten Acres next adjoining the Town, can be obtained from the Governor and Trustees of the College (in whom the legal title now is said to be) subject to the Rent of 7s per annum or the redemption of the same Rent by the payment of a sum in gross.

Ordered, that the said report be received, and that Mr. Botsford, Mr. J. Fraser and Mr. Allen, be a Committee to carry the said resolve into effect.

Read a second time, a Bill in addition to an Act, intitled "An Act for erecting a Court-House, &c. in Northumberland, and ordered to be committed.

Mr. Botsford, by leave, brought in a Bill to exclude ignorant and unskillful persons from the practice of Physic and Surgery, which was read a first time.

Mr. Street presented a petition from the Sheriff of York, asking reward for extra Services, which was referred to the Committee of Supply.

The Committee of conference of this House on the subject of the Saint John nightly Watch Bill, went to the conference, and being returned, the Attorney General reported, that they had given the Committee of the Council the reasons for disagreeing to the said amendments, and left the Bill and amendments with the Committee of the Council.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

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The House in Committee, Mr. Dunn in the Chair, went into consideration of a Bill in addition to an Act, for erecting a Court-House and Gaol in the County of Northumberland.

The Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Dunn from the Committee, reported that he was directed by the Committee to report that the Committee had agreed to the Bill under its title, and he de-

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livered the same at the Clerk's Table; and the Bill was read and ordered to be engrossed.

Resolved, that the House do now go into consideration of the amendments sent down by the Council to the Bill to ascertain Ratable Property, &c.; and the said amendments being severally read, resolved that the House do go into Committee on the said amendments.

The Speaker left the Chair.

The House in Committee, Mr. Attorney General in the Chair, went into consideration of the said amendments.

The Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Attorncy General from the Committee, reports that he was directed to report that the Committee have agreed to the first and sixth amendments, namely, Sec. I. at A, dele " together with," and insert " and of;" at Sec. VIII. at F, dele " next preceding" and insert " sixth;" and as to all the rest of the amendments, the Committee have not agreed. Ordered, that the said report be nowreceived.

On motion made and seconded, resolved that the House request a conference with the Council on the subject matter of the said amendments by them proposed to the said Bill; and that Mr. R. Pagan and Mr. Street, do acquaint the Council therewith.

Message from the Council, by Mr. Justice Chipman.

Mr. Speaker,

The Council do request a conference with the Assembly on the subject of the last conference respecting the amendments to the Saint John nightly Watch Bill, and that Mr. Chipman communicate the same to the Assembly; and then Mr. Chipman withdrew.

Resolved, that the House do agree to the conference, requested by the Council on the subject of the last conference on the Saint John nightly Watch Bill; and that the Committee appointed on the former conference, do acquaint the Council therewith, and manage the same on the part of the House.

Mr. Robert Pagan from the standing Committee, appointed to examine, liquidate and report on all public and private Accounts, reports that they had examined the several Accounts submitted to them, which were read and are as follow, viz.

The Committee on Public Accounts, beg leave to state that

No. 1, Is report of the expenditure of the sums of #22:6 by the late Mr. Edwin Hazen, on the Road leading to Martin's Head, accompanied with satisfactory vouchers---the sum of *twenty pounds* was allowed on this Road; therefore, the sum of #2:6 is due by the Province, to Mr. Hazen's Executors.

No. 2, Is John Mount's report with vouchers and affidavit, of monies laid out by him on the Road and Bridge between Mahogany and Musquash, amounting to ±153---he annexes a list of Tool's received from Major Menzie.

No. 3. Is John Chapman Esquire's report with vouchers, of monies laid out on the Road between Memramcook and Peticodiac, amounting to ± 200 .

No. 4, Is John Williamson's affidavit and vouchers of the expenditure of $\pounds 175$ on the Road from Sherman's to James Blakeney's.

No. 5, Is the report of Solomon Trites, one of the Commissioners for the Road, from the Bend of Peticodiac River to Sherman's, accompanied with vouchers and his affidavit; it appears he has expended to the amount of $\pounds 178:8:3$, and only received $\pounds 175$ from the Treasury; but the balance of $\pounds 3:8:3$ is charged in the account of David Mills, another of the Commissioners for that Road.

No. 6, Is the report of *David Mills*, one of the Commissioners for the Road from the Bend of Peticodiac River to Sherman's, accompanied with his affidavit and vouchers; it appears he received $\gtrsim 175$, and expended $\pounds 167: 16: 10$, including $\pounds 3: 8: 3$ paid to Mr. Trites, the other Commissioner, and that $\pounds 7: 3: 2$ remains in his hands unexpended.

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No. 7, Is the account with affidavit and vouchers, of *Michael Ireland*; for the expenditure of 2200 on the highway between the Pine Ridge and *James Blakeney's*; in this amount is included 219:16:8 charged by him for six weeks and four days of his time, and seven days with a Team.

No. 8, Is an account of Wm. Reed's, with affidavit of the expenditure of $\pounds 42:15$ on the Road leading from Hopewell to Hammond River; in this account a blank charge is made of 14 days work, overseeing and measuring the Road. No credit is given for any money received.

No. 9, Is Jabez Upham's account and affidavit, with vouchers of the expenditure of $\pounds 50$ on the Road from the Head of Hammond River to Hopewell.

No. 10, Is Joshua Upham's account and affidavit, with vouchers of the expenditure of #30 on the Road from the Widow Upham's Farm to the Head of Hammond River.

No. 11, Is *Ichabod Lewis's* account and affidavit with vouchers, of the expenditure of $\pounds 163: 18: 4$ on the Road from the Bend of Peticodiac to Shediac; in this sum is included $\pounds 25: 5$, for actual labour and superintendance---he gives Credit for $\pounds 250$, leaving a balance of $\pounds 86: 1: 8$ not expended.

No. 12, Is John Killor, Esquire's account and alfidavit with vouchers, of the expenditure of $\pounds 199:9:4$ on the Road between M'Eachram's Bridge and Shediac--Credit is given for $\pounds 200$ received; leaving a balance of 10s. 8d. due to the Province.

No. 13, Is Jacob Powell, Esquire's account and affidavit with vouchers, of the sum of $\pounds 218:8:3$ expended by him; $\pounds 90$ of this sum was laid out on the Road from Buctush to Richibucto, and $\pounds 128:8:3$ on the Bridge across Gaspereau River; only $\pounds 150$ has been received, leaving a balance due to him of $\pounds 68:8:3$ as stated in his memorial submitted to the House.

No. 14, Is William Burnett's account with his affidavit of the sum of $\pounds 46:15:3$ laid out by him in the year 1813, between Mr. Guthrie's and the head of Belisle; and of the sum of $\pounds 159:2:6$ also laid out by him on the same Road in 1814--no Credit is given in the account for monies received for accomplishing this work.

No. 15, Is William Burnett's account with vouchers of monies expended, (including $\pounds 12: 10$ charged by him for 25 days working and superintending,) amounting to $\pounds 115: 1:3$ for labour done between 20th June and 23d July, 1814, on the Road between Mr. Guthrie's and the head of Belisle; accompanying this report, is a letter from the Honorable Judge Saunders, explaining the situation of Mr. Burnett's transactions, and stating, that $\pounds 320$ had been laid out by the Commissioner on the Road, and warrants obtained only for the sum of $\pounds 265: 3: 6$, leaving a balance due him of $\pounds 55: 15: 6$ ---we refer to Judge Saunders's letter for further information relating to Mr. Burnett's account.

No. 16, Is George Harding's account and affidavit with vouchers, of monies expended on the Road leading from Belisle to Washdemoack, amounting to $\pounds 147: 16: 2$, in which is included $\pounds 16: 3: 9$ for his own work and superintending--he gives Credit for $\pounds 150$ received, a balance of $\pounds 2: 3: 10$ remains in his hands due to the Province.

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No. 17, Is an account and affidavit of Jesse Gillies, of monies expended, (including £8 for 16 days work and superintending by him), the whole amounting to f52:17:6 for monies expended on the Road leading from the Belisle to the Kennebeckacis. Another paper accompanies Mr. Gillies lists of Receipts for f139:4 for work done on the same Road between the 26th September and 31st October, 1814; one of these Receipts is Mr. Gillies's for f14:5, for his work and superintending on the Road---and another accompanying Receipts for f52:17:6including Mr. Gillies's for £8 for work on the same Road, from 27th June to 27th July, 1814. A third accompanies Receipts for f42:15 for clearing out the Road; in which sum is included Mr. Gillie's Receipt for f7:5 for work and superintending. No statement is furnished of monies received by Mr. Gillies.

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No. 18, Is James M'Nab and Thomas Fraser's account with affidavit and vouchers, of the sum of ± 125 received and expended by them on the Road between the Nashwack and Miramichi.

No. 19, Is John Henderson's account with vouchers, of the sum of $\pounds 149:7;8$ expended on the Road from the Miramichi Court-House to the Richibucto River, in which sums is included $\pounds 10$ for his trouble and attendance; he gives Credit for $\pounds 200$ received, leaving a balance due by him to the Province of $\pounds 50:12:4$.

No. 20, Is Wm. Segre's account with affidavit, of the sum of $\pounds 50$ received and expended in repairing the Highway, from Sunbury Line towards Fredericton.

No. 21, Is Samuel Smith's account with affidavit, of the sum of $\neq 99:17:6$ received and expended on the Road between Richard Kimball's in Burton, and Daniel Smith's, South Branch Oromocto.

No. 22, Is S. Agnew and Caleb Fowler, Esquire's Report with affidavit and vouchers, of the manner in which the sum of ± 100 received by them was expended towards improving the new Road, from the mouth of the Nashwack to the upper Line of Sunbury.

No. 23, Is Daniel Morchouse's statement of a Contract made under his direction in the Parish of Queensbury, on the Road to Mactuquack, for the sum of $\pounds 50$ received by him, and the faithful performance of that Contract by James Parent.

No. 24, Is a stated account current with affidavit, of *Peter Fraser*, Esquire, in which the sum of ± 625 is credited as received by Warrants, from May to December, 1815; and the sum $\pm 281:8$ paid for work done by different parties (including $\pm 43:19$ for Tools of different kinds) on the Roads at different places; a balance of $\pm 343:12$ remains due to the Province.

No. 25, Is W. F. Odell, Esq. and R. Smith's stated account with affidavit, of the sum $\pounds 171:9:10$ expended on the Bridge below the Town of Fredericton; credit is given for $\pounds 50$ received from the Treasury, and for $\pounds 68:6:5$ collected as fines in the Parish of Fredericton; a balance of $\pounds 53:3:5$ is due to the Commissioners.

No. 26, Is report of W. F. Odell, Esq. and Robert Smith, stating their appointment as Commissioners for building a Bridge over Garden's Mill Stream; that they have received $\pounds 55$ out of the Treasury; that they have made a Contract for Stone during the winter; that the length of the Bridge is 160 feet; and that the probable expence of building a durable Bridge will be six hundred pounds.

No. 27, Is account of W. F. Udell, Esq. and Robert Smith, with affidavit of the expenditure of 2121:4:2 on the Bridge at *Phillis's* Creek---credit is given for 2100 received, leaving a balance due to them of 21:4:2: in this account a blank charge is made for "allowance to Commissioners, 42 days each."

No. 28, Is *John Allen*, Esqr's. account, of the sum of L.50 paid by him to *Ecnjamin Ried*, in consequence of his fulfilling a contract for work to that a-mount, between the villages in York County.

No. 29, Is Charles Duff's account with vouchers, of the sum of L.49:4:6 expended by him on the Road from burnt land Brook to Betts'; he credits the sum of 15s 6d remaining in his hands.

No. 30, Is Mark Turner's account with affidavit and vouchers, of the sum of L.49 expended by him on the Road between Chamcook and Bockabuk; he credits the sum of 20s remaining in his hands.

No. 31, Is Joseph Porter, Esquire's account with affidavit and vouchers, of the expenditure of L.50 granted for Road from Bass-wood Ridge, towards the settlement of St. Stephen's.

No. 32, Is a statement by Aaron Upton, one of the Commissioners for building a Bridge across Dennis's Stream, of their having contracted for Timber, &c, to be ready on the spot by the Spring, and informing that the sum of L.50 allotted, will be far short of the Provincial assistance necessary to complete that extensive Bridge.

No. 33, Is a report of Robert Pagan and John Dunn, two of the Commissioners for opening a Road from Le Etang to Musquash, stating that Mr. Vernon. the other Commissioner, has been employed in exploring the nearest and best Road from Le Etang, to communicate with the Road leading from Dipper, to the Bridge on Musquash river---that men have been employed under his direction in opening a Bridle Path, which was early in January completed to within two miles of that Road, and that a sum of L.128: 18: 9 expended on that service, and that a contract has been made for the sum of L.130 for building a Bridge across Le Proa River, at the head of Macey's Bay, to be completed in all January. The balance of L.41: 1:3 will be expended in improving the Road.

No. 34, Is report with account, affidavit and vouchers, of *Christopher Hatch* and *Thomas Wyer*, Jun. of the expenditure of L.160 on the road from D. Bradfords to Connecks---they Credit L.150 received, and state, that it was necessary to expend L.10 more to complete the particular spot, which they pray may be repaid.

No. 35, Is account with affidavit and vouchers, of *Thomas Wyer*, junr. and *Peter Christy*, Esqrs. of the expenditure of L.100 on the Road from *Samuel Connecks* to Pleasant Ridge.

No. 36, Is report of *Hugh M Kay*, Esq. accompanied with plans of Bridges, &c. stating that Warrants in his favour for L.600 have been issued, but that only L.200 has been yet received by him, which is intended in payment of a Contract entered into, to build a Bridge across Magagaudavic River for that sum, which contract, he sends a copy of,---that he found the monies granted for Bridges, &c. in that quarter, come so far short of the sums necessary to erect and complete them, that he has declined making further Contracts, till his statement of the necessity of further aid can be taken into consideration by the Legislature. The report states, that different proposals have been made to him, in explanation of which, he refers to different plans of Bridges which accompany his report. For further particulars, we beg leave to refer to the report, in which, much pains is taken to give full information on the subject.

No. 37, Is account with affidavit and vouchers, of Nathan Smith, of L.25:4:6 expended by him towards improving the Road from Nathan Smith's House in Burton to the Causeway; a balance of 4s. 6d. over-paid, is due from the Province.

No. 38, Is account with affidavit and vouchers, of Samuel D. Street, Esqr. of expenditure of L.99:15:6, on Burton Causey---credit is given for L.150---a talance remains of L.50:4:6 due to the Province.

No. 39, Is account with alfidavit and vouchers of *Gershom Bunnel*, of expenditure of L.25:1:6 on the Road between Nathan Smith's and Burton Causey----No credit is given for Money received for this purpose.

No. 40, Is account with affidavit and vouchers, of Samuel D. Street, Esq. of the expenditure of L. 50 on the Burton Causey.

No. 41, Is account with affidavit and vouchers, of Samuel D. Street, Esq. of expenditure of L.25:6 on Burton Causeway; it is stated, that a balance of only L.24:11:4 remained in his hands, and that therefore, the sum of 14s. 8d. is due to him by the Province.

No. 42, Is account with affidavit and vouchers, of Calvin L. Hatheway, of the expenditure of L.49:13:8 on the Road in Burton; in which sum is included a charge of 11 days superintending, at 15s per day, L.8:5; there will from the account thus stated, remain a balance of 6s. 4d. due to the Province.

No. 43, Is account with affidavit and vouchers, of Gabriel De Veber, of the expenditure of L.35:18 on the Road from the Lower line of the County of Sunbury, towards Edward Burpey's House--Credit is given for E.50 received; the remaining balance of L.14:2 it is proposed to lay out when the weather will admit, the ensuing season.

No. 44, Is account with affidavit and vouchers, of Calvin L. Hatheway, of the expenditure of L.56: 18 on the Road in Gage-Tows, in which is included

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L.8:5 for superintending the work 11 days; by this statement, a balance remains of L43:2, as credit is given for L.100 received.

No. 45, Is Samuel Scoul's account with affidavit and vouchers, of the expenditure of L.150 received by him, on the Road between the Jemseg and Washademoac.

No. 46, Is account of the Commissioners for expending L.300 for the Indians of the Milacite Tribe, stating the purchase for that sum, of a Tract of Land in the Parish of King's Clear, for the use of the Indians, adjoining a Lot belonging to them. In this account reference is had to an order of the President in Council, a copy of which accompanies it, and to which we beg leave to refer.

No. 47, Is J. Murray Bliss and John Allen, Esq. account current, with affidavit and several vouchers of the expenditure of L.786 on the Main Road, from the French Village to the Grand Falls, in which sum is included L.60 for Tools; the sum of L.950 is credited as received, a balance of L.164 therefore remains in the hands of the Commissioners due to the Province.

Which was read and ordered to be received.

The House in Committee, Mr. Campbell in the Chair, went into further consideration of the great Road Bill.

A MESSAGE from the Council.

Mr. Campbell left the Chair of the Committee. Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Chipman delivered the Message.

Mr. Speaker,

I am directed by the Council to inform this Honorable House, that Judge Chipman is appointed a Committee to meet the Committee of the Assembly in conference on the subject of the last conference on the amendments of the St. John Nightly Watch Bill, and that he notify his appointment to the Assembly; and then Mr. Chipman withdrew.

Mr. Campbell resumed the Chair of the Committee. The Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Campbell from the Committee, reported progress and asked leave to sit again. Ordered that the said report be received.

Mr. Attorney General from the Committee appointed to conduct the conference with the Committee of the Council on the subject matter of the last conference on the Saint John Nightly Watch Bill, reported that they had conferred this day with the Committee of the Council thereon, from whom they had received the following reasons in support of their amendments, to wit.—

Council Chamber, 13th February, 1816.

The Council instruct their Committee appointed to manage the conference with the Assembly upon the subject of the last conference to state to the managers on the part of the Assembly in answer to their communication of the 12th instant, upon the same subject, that the Council have no wish nor inclination at any time, and that they had no intention in the present instance, in any manner, to infringe or interfere with the privileges of the House in Bills imposing any Tax or Burthen upon their constituents,---That the Council do not conceive it necessary on this occassion, to enter into any discussion of the nature or extent of those privileges, as they observe, with great satisfaction, that the House do not, merely on the grounds of their being Bills of this description, object to such amendments of them made by the Council, as are consistent with the views, intentions and meaning of the House in the clauses to which such amendments are proposed; and that the amendments now objected to by the House, appear to the Council to be principally of this latter description.

That the Council conceive the limitation in the amendment to the second section of the Bill, of the sum to be assessed upon any one Person for one year, to a sum not exceeding *five pounds*, to be merely declaratory of what was tacitly implied in the concomitant provisions in the same section of the Bill; because

the Council could not suppose it to have been the intention of the House in an indirect and what the Council conceived would have been an improper manner to enlarge the jurisdiction of the City Court of the City of Saint John to an indefinite extent; and because it has been, as the Council believe, the invariable practice in all Acts of Assembly authorizing an assessment of any Tax upon the Inhabitants in any part of the Province, in some manner to limit the amount of the sum to be raised under and by virtue of any such Acts; and could it have been the intention of the House, either in this indirect manner, to enlarge the jurisdiction of the City Court, or to leave the sum to be assessed upon that portion of the Inhabitants of the City, in this regard, contemplated in the Bill without any limitation or controul, it would have been, in the opinion of the Council, a ground that would render it their duty altogether to reject the Bill.

That with regard to that part of the amendment which provides for the excess in that behalf mentioned, by what the House are pleased to call a Tax upon the Funds of the Corporation of the City; the Council conceived, that consistently with the grounds set forth in the petition of the Common Council of the City, to the several branches of the Legislature, upon which the Bill in question was founded; this part of the amendment merely explained, rather than provided the obvious means to be resorted to for such excess. The Council, however, have no objection to the striking out of this part of the amendment, if the House should continue to think it of any importance.

That with regard to the amendment, restraining the existence of the Act to four years, the Council direct it to be distinctly stated, that in all cases where the nature of the provisions in any Bill appears to them to be such as to require the test of some experience before they become the subject of a perpetual Law, of which nature they conceive the provisions in the Bill in question to be, they shall feel it to be their indispensable duty to annex a clause providing such test; nor do they conceive, that in so doing, they infringe any of the privileges of the House; be this, however, as it may---the Council have an undoubted right to reject any Bill that they may deem it inexpedient to pass; in the present instance they conceived the Bill to be of too great importance to be rejected on the ground of this or of any of the other objects of amendment, without disclosing to the House the nature of their objections to it.

Ordered, that the Committee who requested the conference on the above Bill, do manage the conference on the part of the House, and prepare reasons to be laid before the House, why the House do not agree to the amendments proposed by the Council to the said Bill.

The Speaker left the Chair. Mr. Campbell resumed the Chair of the Committee. The Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Campbell from the Committee, reported progress, and asked leave to sit again, which report was ordered to be received.

Mr. Attorney General, brought in a Bill to revive and continue, and also to explain two Acts of the General Assembly, for the more effectual prevention of Desertion from His MAJESTY'S Forces, which was ordered to be committed.

Read a first time, a Bill to amend and continue for a limited time an Act, entitled "An Act, for regulating, laying out and repairing Highways and Roads, " and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways, &c."

Mr. R. Pagan from the Committee, appointed to prepare reasons to be laid before the House, upon the subject matter of the amendments proposed by the Council to the Bill to ascertain Ratable Estates, &c. reported as follows:

The Committee appointed to manage the conference requested of the Council upon the amendments made to the Bill " to ascertain Ratable Estates in this " Province and for other purposes therein mentioned," are instructed by the House to state to the manager on the part of the Council; that the House are ready to agree to the first and sixth of those amendments, to wit, to strike out the words " together with" and insert the words " and of" in the first section, and to strike out the words " next preceding" and insert the word " sixth" in the eight section of the Bill; those being merely verbal or literal amendments, and such as appear to the House very proper,---That as to all the other amend-ments, if they were such as would be deemed expedient to be made; (which the House do not admit) yet they go " to limit, qualify and alter" the said Bill, and are of such a nature as, in the opinion of the House, strike directly at the root of their indubitable privilege "to originate all Bills imposing Taxes or burthens " upon their constituents, and to be the sole judges of the extent and duration " of those burthens"--- that the effect of the objectionable amendments is evidently to take the Tax or burthens from one description of Persons, and impose it upon another: as for instance, to relieve the owners of large and valuable Tracts of unimproved land, which are constantly growing in value by the labors of the owners of small Tracts of but little comparative value, from any part of the assessment, and thereby necessarily to impose additional burthens upon those of the latter description.--- This effect of the amendments will, the House are persuaded, be admitted by the Council; and if so, the single point remains to be decided, namely, whether it is, or is not, the privilege of the House " to be the " sole judges of the extent of the Tax or burthen to be imposed" or laid upon their constituents. That Parliamentary usage and the constant practice of the Legislature of this Province, having so fully and firmly established the claim of the House to this right, they indulge a hope that the Council will not resist it.

The Committee are further instructed to state that the Bill was prepared and passed with great deliberation and after the fullest discussions of the subject, and with an ardent desire to equalize as nearly as practicable the public burthens, according to the circumstances of the people---that such a Law has been long in contemplation, and in the general expectation of the Province; and as it is limited in its duration to the short term of four years, the House hope and and trust that the Council will not persist in the amendments which are objected to, as they must be fully convinced it is utterly impossible for the House to yield ahe privilege claimed by them, which is equally indubitable with the right of the

Council

Council to reject this, or any other Bill passed by the House, if the Council deem it expedient so to do.

Which report was read and ordered to be received,

Mr. J. Fraser presented a petition from William Bannerman, praying relief from payment of a Bond given to the Deputy Treasurer of Northumberland, for the payment of Duties, which was referred to the Committee of Supply.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

The Council deprecate the idea of calling in question or infringing, at any time, any of the constitutional privileges of the House, and are therefore willing, in this instance, without further discussion, to take it for granted that the present may be a Bill of the description contended for on the part of the House; but even under this view of the subject, the adoption of the amendments objected to by the House, appeared to the Council essential and indispensable to prevent the The amendments proposed to the first and second sections rejection of the Bill. of the Bill, which are objected to by the House, are founded upon different, though, as the Council conceive, fundamental principles, which ought not to be departed from; the amendment to the former is indeed of such a nature that the Council cannot wave it --- if therefore the House should continue to be of opinion that any Bill for the purposes contemplated in the present, must contain a clause similar to that now under consideration, unqualified with the proposed amendment, the Council fear that all efforts to relieve the Province from the difficulties experienced under the existing Law, will prove unavailable and fruitless, a result which the Council would most deeply lament. The amendments to the second, and consequently to the eleventh section of the Bill, are founded upon a different principle, namely, that property, while it remains altogether unimproved and unproductive, is not in any just or equitable view of the subject, a proper object of taxation. The Council, however, most sincerely desirous that the Bill should not be lost, are willing to submit to its operation in this regard, during the short period for which it is passed, being persuaded that upon a more deliberate view of the subject, and the Lessons that will be in the mean time suggested by experience, a similar provision will not on any future occasion be contended for---the Council therefore consent to withdraw the amendments to the second and eleventh sections of the Bill.

His HONOR the PRESIDENT having communicated to the Council a Message sent by His HONOR to the House of Assembly, during the late Session of the Legislature on the subject of the Oak-pack branch of the Melicete Tribe of Indians, as follows:

" NEW-BRUNSWICK, 4th February, 1814. " MESSAGE to the HOUSE of ASSEMBLY.

" THOMAS SAUMAREZ.

"The PRESIDENT informs the House of Assembly, that earnest application "has been made to him by the Oak-pack branch of the Melicete Tribe of Indi-"ans, stating their anxious desire to have an allotment of Land in the vicinity "of this Town, on which they might have a fixed residence, and be able, by em-"ployment as labourers in the neighbourhood, to obtain a subsistence, and pre-"vent in future, such want and distress as they have of late years frequently suf-"fered; and as there are no ungranted Lands in this neighbourhood, these poor "people have indulged a hope that some adequate allotment for their relief "might be obtained by purchase, to be defrayed by a grant from the Legisla-"ture. The PRESIDENT therefore recommends the case of the Petitioners as a "subject of importance to the serious consideration of the House. T. S."

In consequence, the sum of £300 was granted to His HONOR, to be vested in the hands of Commissioners to be appointed by His HONOR, for the purpose of assisting the Indians of the Melicete Tribe in making settlements on, and cultivating and improving any Land which may be granted to them or for their use; and the Indians of this branch of the Tribe having made carnest application to His HONOR, praying that a Tract of 300 acres of Land, lying about ten miles above Fredericton, (about nine acres of which they had formerly bought, and had erected thereon a Chapel and a House for the accommodation of their Priest) should be purchased for their use, and it also appearing that they had been encouraged to expect that Lands should be procured for them, whenever adequate means could be obtained; and the Land in question, being stated to be cultivated to an extent sufficient for their immediate wants. His HONOR therefore, submitted to the consideration of the Council, the expediency of appropriating the sum of #300 above mentioned, in making the purchase in question, more especially at this particular crisis, and as there are no ungranted Lands in any situation which, from the peculiar habits of these people, would be suitable for them, and as it appears that by their established rules and customs of their Tribe, this branch are excluded from any share in the Lands allotted by Government for the use of the Indians on the upper parts of the River. Whereupon on the question

question, whether the sum of £300 granted as above stated, shall be employed for the purpose of purchasing the Land in question; the Chief Justice dissents ---thereupon ordered, that a Warrant issue for the said sum of money £300; payable to Mr. Secretary Odell, Judge Saunders and Thomas Wetmore, Esquire, Commissioners named by His HONOR the PRESIDENT for the purpose, and that they be instructed to make the purchase as prayed for, for the use of this branch of the Melicete Tribe.

Extract from the Minutes.

WM. F. ODELL.

The Commissioners appointed to expend the sum of $\pounds 300$, granted by an Act of the General Assembly, passed the 7th March, 1814, in aid of the Indians of the Melicete Tribe; account as follows, viz.

They charge themselves with this sum, received by a Warrant from His Ho-NOR in Council on the Province Treasurer, dated the May, $1814.--\pounds 300$.

They take credit for this sum, paid by them to Jonathan Estey, for the purchase of a Tract of Land, (under the direction of an order of the PRESIDENT in Council) containing about 330 Acres, in the Parish of King's Clear, (about 10 miles from Fredericton) and adjoining to a Lot belonging to the Indians on which their Chapel stands. The Lot purchased, having a number of acres cleared and improved, fit for immediate cultivation. The Deed is taken in the King's name and duly registered. £300.

Resolved, that the Committee be instructed to state to the managers on the part of the House, that the Council have agreed to the great road Bill with amendments, and at the same time, to offer for the consideration of the House, the following Reasons, in support of the amendments:

Reasons to be offered to the Committee of conference, on the part of the Assembly, in support of the amendments proposed to the consideration of the House on the Bill for the regulation and improvement of the great roads, &c.

Amendments from C to E. inclusive.

The reasons for the deviation from the old road proposed by these amendments arc, that there is not any necessity for crossing the Little Magagaudavic, which is an object of great importance to Travellers, as at present they often find great difficulty, and sometimes an absolute impracticability of getting over that river---that the high rocky Hill between the two rivers, is also shunned by this means---that the Traveller by this route, would have to cross but one river, instead of two, and that at a place where there is a settler who can render any assistance, and afford any accommodation that may be wanted.

Amendments from F. to I. inclusive.

By following the route proposed by these amendments, the distance from Fredericton to the Bridge at Pennington's stream is shorter by at least five miles, than by Kelly's, and the ground from the Mactuquac to the Bridge is very good

and

and entirely free from Hills, and the distance is but little more than seven miles. of which rather more than five miles are at present unsettled, but as the road will be so well protected in the winter, both from the drifts of Snow and the cold winds, it cannot but be considered as a great advantage --- for when it is once well broken it will continue passable the whole winter, and will enable those living in the vicinity of the Bridge, and also all Travellers coming from above, particularly those with loaded sleds, to get to Fredericton several weeks sooner than they could by crossing at Kelley's, as the river near Cunningham's seldom freezes over so as to be travelled upon with safety till after Christmas---as this road is shorter and would be so well sheltered in the winter, there is great reason also to suppose that it would in a great measure supersede the travelling on the river from Pennington's by Cunningham's to the Mactuquae, as there are several rapids in that distance, which not only render the travelling on it insecure, but sometimes occasion such large bodies of ice to be thrown up in places as to make it impassable till late in the winter. There is also good reason for the opinion, that both from the nature of the ground and distance, a road could be made to the Bridge by this route for less than half what it would cost if carried by Kelley's.

By the route by Kelley's, the distance as stated above, is increased not less than five miles, and there are several high hills over which it will be impossible to make a road, where loaded waggons or sleds can travel with any tolerable ease, unless at a very great expence, and roads thus made in this Country on the sides of such high hills, besides the disad vantage of increasing the distance by winding up their sides, are always liable to gully by the heavy rains in the spring and fall, and in the winter to be often rendered dangerous, if not impassable, by the glare ice---after crossing from Kelley's, which will be attended with more difficulty, particularly when the river is high, than at the Mactuquac, the long high hill at Cunningham's must be ascended, after which there are several deep ravines between that hill and the Bridge at Pennington's. The roadhere is principally over, cleared land, and consequently becomes after one or two heavy drifts of snow, very nearly, if not altogether impassable, whereas the road to the Mactuquac being well protected, would remain good the whole winter.

By recrossing the river higher up than Wolverton's as mentioned above, there is good high ground to the place of crossing, and then slack water for the Ferryboat. The rapid water in crossing to Mr. Fraser's lower Farm would be thus avoided, as also the low grounds on that side of the river, but what is of far greater importance, the great inconvenience and difficulty of crossing the Meductionicick in the spring, and after heavy rains, when it becomes very rapid, would by the route proposed be entirely removed.

Amendments at K.

It would be highly advantageous, not only to the Public at large, but also to the settlers on the Nashwalk, that the road from Moncton should be carried so far from the creek that the hills and the side hill road to Weade's may be avoided, which would enable the Inhabitants to bring down their Hay and other heavy articles to Fredericton, with case and convenience. It wou't also be highly beneficial to leave the road above Weade's open to the discretion of the supervisor, to make such alterations as he might find to be advantageous, as the present road is not only highly inconvenient, but often absolutely dangerous from the glare ice occasioned by the water from the mountain.

And that they return the Bill so amended to the Assembly for concurrence. WM. F. ODELL, CLERK.

sary of such parts of the Bill now under consideration, as do not affect those provisions in it which can be constitutionally insisted upon by the Assembly as their exclusive privilege to make; that those parts of this Bill to which the amendments not agreed to by the Assembly have been offered by the Council are of that description, and ought therefore to have been the subject of a separate Bill; that the Council see no reason to alter their opinion respecting the utility of those amendments, as the facts upon which they are stated to be grounded are not controverted by the Assembly, nor the reasons adduced in support of them in any manner answered: but as, at this very protracted period of the Session, it might be attended with great and serious public inconvenience to risk the consequences which might ensue from a determined adherence to these amendments, for this reason, and for this reason only, the Council consent to withdraw the same, protesting at the same time against the drawing of this measure into a precedent upon any future occasion.

Which report was ordered to be received.

The Committee appointed this day to search the Journal of the Council as to their proceedings upon the Bill to continue and amend an Act for regulating, laying out and repairing Highways, &c. &c. report, that upon searching the Journal of the Council, they found the following entry, made on the 9th March, 1816:---

"Read, a Bill from the Assembly, to continue and amend an Act for regu-"lating, laying out and repairing Highways, &c. &c."

"On motion, resolved that the further consideration of this Bill be put off "for three months;" which report was ordered to be received.

Mr. Attorney General, by leave, brought in a Bill, further to continue an Act, entitled "An Act for regulating, laying out and repairing Highways and Roads, "and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways, within the "several Towns and Parishes in this Province;" which was read a first and second time, and ordered to be engrossed.

Read a second time, a Bill further to continue an Act, entitled "An Act to " provide for the more effectually repairing the Streets and Bridges in the City " of St. John," and ordered to be engrossed.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Botsford from the Committee, to whom was referred the Message of His HONOR the PRESIDENT, on the subject of the Sloop Brunswicker, reports that---

The Committee having carefully examined the Papers relating to that Vessel, it appears to them that the Sloop Brunswicker, formerly the American Revenue Cutter, the Commodore Barry, was captured by His MAJESTY's Ships the Maidstone and Spartan, and brought into the port of St. John, where she was sold in the month of August, in the year 1812, by Capts. Burdett and Brenton, to Messrs.

William

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William Pagan, Hugh Johnston and Nehemiah Merritt, of the City of St. John, for the sum of twelve hundred and fifty pounds currency, --- That the capture and sale of the said vessel, having taken place previous to any Declaration of War on the part of the United Kingdom against the United States -- no regular condemnation could then be had; but to secure the purchasers, an agreement was made by the captors, in the words following, viz .-- " These may certify, that we have " this day, sold to William Pagan, Hugh Johnston and Nehemiah Merritt, the Prize " Sloop Commodore Barry, captured by His MAJESTY's Ships Maidstone and " Spartan, under our respective commands, for the sum of one thousand two hun-" dred and fifty pounds currency, purchased by them for the service of the Pro-" vince, should it meet the approbation of His Excellency General SMYTH, and " as a regular condemnation cannot now be had for the said vessel, we do hereby " engage to procure a condemnation, with such other documents as may be ne-" cessary to entitle the said vessel to a British Register, as soon as the same can " be had in regular course, free of any expence to the purchasers. It is under-" stood, that in the purchase is included all the Guns, Ammunition, Stores, " Provisions, Boats, and every thing else belonging to the said Sloop when cap-" tured, as witness our hands at St. John, New-Brunswick, this 8th August, **"** 1812."

This agreement was not signed by Captain Burdett.--It appears that the above vessel was purchased by Messrs. Pagan, Johnston and Merritt, with the intention of offering her to His HONOR the PRESIDENT, for the use of the Province, being well adapted for the protection of the coasts of the Bay of Fundy, which were at that time much exposed to the depredations of the American Privateers; an offer of the said vessel was accordingly made to His HONOR the PRESIDENT by the purchasers, immediately after their purchase, which was at first declined; but afterwards accepted of, and the vessel was bought in for the use of the Province, for the same sum of one thousand two hundred and fifty pounds currency. This vessel was soon after fitted out, and employed in the service of the Province, in which she continued until the following winter of 1813; when in consequence of a resolution of the House of Assembly, recommending to His Ho-NOR the PRESIDENT, to discharge the said Sloop from the Public service; she was dismantled and laid up.

Your Committee think it necessary to insert here the copy of the Letter, written by the Attorney General of this Province, in pursuance of the direction of His HONOR the PRESIDENT, in consequence of the above alluded to resolution to the Hon. *Richard J. Uniack*, Esquire, the Attorney General of Nova-Scotia, and his reply, which are as follow:---

" ST. JOHN, 28th April, 1813.

"Dear Sir, "An American Cutter called the Commodore Barry, captured shortly after "the Declaration of War on the part of America, by the Spartan and Maid-"stone Frigates, and sent into this Port, and sold by Captains Burdett and Bren-"ton, to three Merchants here, who purchased her with an expectation that she "would be taken for the use of the Province; the captors agreed to procure a condemnation of the vessel, and all the necessary documents to enable the purchasers to obtain for her a British Register; the vessel was taken into the service, and now belongs to the Province. It is said that she has been condemned as a Droit of Admiralty, but I dont recollect of noticing her name in any lists which I have seen of vessels condemned, and it is uncertain yet, whether any steps have been taken by the captors to procure a condemnation, so as to perfect the title of the purchasers, which now operates to the prejudice of the Province; being directed by His HONOR the PRESIDENT to take pro-"per steps for securing the Province from loss of the purchase money, I am "under the necessity of requesting you to be so obliging as to inform me if any

" thing, and what has been done in the Court of Vice-Admiralty at Halifax, to " procure the condemnation, or whether it is probable any steps will soon, and "when be taken for that purpose.

"Whenever she is condemned, it must I take it, be to the King in right of " his Crown, and I suppose the sum for which she is bid off at the Marshall's " Sales, must be deposited, to abide the order of the Treasury. Possibly Mr. " Wright, the Agent for the captors at Halifax, may be instructed to purchase " the vessel in at the sale; if so, all difficulties would be removed --- may I ven-" ture, to beg the favor of you, to make the enquiry of him, and to inform him that " the purchasers hold a written obligation of Captain Brenton, to procure the " necessary documents to entitle the vessel to a British Register, as soon as the " same could be had in regular course, free of any expence to the purchasers."

" I have received both of your Letters of the 29th April. The captors have " never brought in any papers or documents, on which I could found any pro-" ceedings for the condemnation of the vessel you describe, called the Commo-" dore Barry; however, to forward the business, I have petitioned for a moni-" tion which has issued, and have to request that whatever papers or documents " can be had respecting her, may be brought in on oath before the Commissioner, " who is appointed for that purpose with you, so that they may get into the " Registry, and I will proceed to obtain a decree of condemnation, when that " takes place, I will speak with the Agent appointed to manage the Droits of " the Crown, respecting the sale. Mr. Wright, nor none of Capt. Brenton's " friends here will interfere, so that your Province will have to buy her in, and " I have no doubt, but upon a proper representation, Capt. Brenton will replace " the money."

It appears that the above Letter of the Attorney General of this Province, had been written in consequence of directions given by His HONOR the PRE-SIDENT, to ascertain what had been done in the Court of Vice-Admiralty by the captors, towards the condemnation of the vessel, and not for the purpose of having the vessel seized.

In a Letter from Mr. Uniack, dated Halifax, the 19th June, 1813, to the Attorney General of this Province, is the following passage :--- " I have to acknow-"ledge the receipt of your Letter of the 29th ult. I have at length obtained " the papers of the Commodore Barry, which were lodged with Mr. Wright, " and have obtained a final decree for her condemnation, as a Droit to the King; " she will be delivered to the Agents for the American Commissioners for sale, " and Mr. Wright assures me, that he has on behalf of Capt. Brenton, taken steps " to have her bought in, that the engagements may be fulfilled."--- No steps were taken by Mr. Wright, to buy the vessel in, and it appears by another Letter from Mr. Uniack, dated the 10th April, 1814, that he afterwards declined entering into any negotiation for the settlement of the business.

It appears that the vessel was sold as a Droit to the Crown, on the 4th July, Y

1815.

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1815, at Saint John, for the sum of seven hundred and thirty pounds, and was bought by a Mr. Neak Disbrow of that place, on his own account, and not on the behalf of the Province.

It appears that the House of Assembly at the last Session, presented an Address to His HONOR the PRESIDENT, requesting " that he would be pleased to " direct such steps to be taken, as might be deemed expedient to recover from " the captors of the vessel, formerly called the Commodore Barry, since the " Brunswicker, the original purchase money, and reasonable damages sustained " for the non-performance of the engagement entered into by Capt. Brenton, one " of the captors, and that the House would provide for any expence attending " the same."

That in consequence of this Address, the Agent of the Province was instructed to apply to Capt. Brenton, for the re-payment of the original purchase money, with a reasonable sum for damages sustained, which application was made, but evaded as appears by the Letter of Mr. H. Abbott, addressed to Mr. Clarke, the Solicitor of the Agent,--That your Committee cannot but express their astonishment, at the reasons assigned in Mr. Abbolt's Letter, for the refusal of Captains Brenton and Burdett, to reimburse the Province, and beg leave here to remark, that the application made in the first instance, by Messrs. Pagan, Johnston and Merritt, for the Commodore Barry, was in the ordinary way---a mere verbal request to become the purchasers, which was complied with on the part of the captors, for a valuable consideration; when your Committee take into consideration the time when, and the circumstances under which the vessel was sold to the original purchasers, they cannot but think, that Captains Breaton and Burdett were aware, that the vessel was to be immediately employed in the service of the Province, otherwise the very object, the protection of the Bay of Fundy, for which she had been purchased, would have been defeated.

As Capt. *Brenton* had undertaken by his agreement, "to procure a condem-"nation with such other documents as may be necessary to entitle the said ves-"sel to a British Register;" it was not necessary for the purchasers to notify the captors, that the vessel was without a Register, as it was a fact well known to them--nor was it so essential for the safety of the vessel, as she was in the Fablic service of the Province.

Mr. Abbott, in his Letter, acknowledges "that Capt. Brenton is aware that he "promised to procure a condemnation of the vessel; but the loss of all her pa-"pers, which was not to be foreseen, prevented the execution of that promise." ---If this circumstance could at any time have been urged as a justification for the captors not fulfilling their promise, it will cease to have any weight when it is known, that the papers necessary for the condemnation of the vessel were found in the possession of Mr. Wright, the Agent of Capt. Brenton, where they must have been left by the captors.

Your Committee from a careful examination of all the papers, are decidedly of the opinion, that there is not the slightest ground for the charge, that the purchasers procured the seizure of the vessel under the plea of her having no Register, unless the herein-before recited Letter of the Attorney General of this Province can be so construed.

That although your Committee are of the opinion, that the captors are liable to reimburse the original purchase money, and that Capt. Brenton in particular, by his agreement, is responsible for the damages sustained by reason of the nonperformance of the same---yet, when they take into consideration the great delay and expence that would necessarily attend the prosecution of a Law suit; they are of the opinion, that it will be most advisable to accept of the sum of seven hundred and thirty pounds currency, at which the vessel was sold to Mr. Disbrow, and not to Messrs. Pagan & Co. as is incorrectly stated in Mr. Abbott's Letter.

Your Committee cannot forbear here to remark in justice to Messrs. Pagan, Johnston and Merritt, that their conduct in the purchasing of the vessel was

the

the most disinterested, and proceeded from a wish to promote the interest and welfare of the Province---for this purpose they took upon themselves the risk of having the vessel left upon their hands; and when the same was accepted of by His HONOR the PRESIDENT, they did not benefit by the transaction, having sold her for the sum at which she was purchased by them from the captors.

Your Committee beg leave to recommend to the consideration of the House, the expence incurred by the Attorney General in the prosecution of this business thus far, and a remuneration for his service.

Ordered that Mr. Street and Mr. Johnston, do carry the Bill and amendment to the Council, and acquaint them that this House hath agreed to the amendment made by the Council.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

Mr. Speaker,

" The Council have agreed to the following Bills:"

" The Bill to continue the Revenue Laws.

" The Bill to encourage the Fisheries.

"The Bill to enable the Minister and Elders of the Church lately erected in "St. John, to hold the same, &c.

"The Bill for opening and repairing Roads, &c.

"The Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue; and

"The Bill to erect into a separate Parish, the Lands in the rear of Wickham" and Waterborough;" and then Mr. Robinson withdrew.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'Clock.

Message from His HONOR the PRESIDENT, by Xenophon Jouett, Esq. Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr. Speaker,

His HONOR the PRESIDENT commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Council Chamber; accordingly Mr. Speaker with the House, went up to attend His HONOR the PRESIDENT in the Council Chamber; where the Speaker addressed His HONOR the PRESIDENT to the effect following, to wit:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR,

The House of Assembly anxious that this their last Session should be distinguished by important services to the Province, have provided for all the objects recommended by your HONOR. They have passed a permanent Militia Bill; a Bill for the establishment of Schools in every Parish, and several other Bills for the encouragement of Literature. They have granted unusually large Supplies for the improvement of Roads, and have made such regulations for the expenditure thereoil, as they trust will render them effectual. Liberal Supplies have also been granted for other services, and the House have provided for punctual payments at the Treasury, by continuing all the Revenue Laws now in force.

The Bills for these purposes they now tender for your HONOR's acceptance, praying your assent thereto; and the House have the fullest confidence that your HONOR's judicious management will render these Grants beneficial to the Province.

Then Mr. Speaker delivered the following Bills as engrossed upon Parchment, to the Clerk of the Council, viz.

A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned.

A Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province, and improving the Navigation of the River St. John and its Branches.

A Bill to continue and amend the several Acts now in force, for raising a Revenue in this Province.

His HONOR the PRESIDENT was then pleased to give his assent to the several Public and private Bills following, viz.

An Act to encourage the establishment of Schools in this Province.

An Act further to continue an Act, entitled "An Act for regulating, laying "out and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners "and Surveyors of Highways within the several Towns and Parishes in this "Province."

An Act further to continue An Act, entitled "An Act to provide for the "more effectually repairing the Streets and Bridges in the City and County of "Saint John."

An Act to encourage the Fisheries of this Province.

An Act to erect into a separate Parish all the Lands in Queen's County, in the rear of the Parishes of Wickham and Waterborough.

An Act to enable the Minister and Elders for the time being of the Church in communion with the Kirk of Scotland, lately erected in the City of St. John, to hold the same to them and their successors forever, and for other purposes in the same mentioned.

After which His HONOR was pleased to make the following Speech to the Council and Assembly :---

Gentlemen of the Council, and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

Having given assent to the several Bills which have been passed by you this Session, it only remains for me to offer my best wishes, that the success of the measures provided for, may equal our most sanguine expectations.

Your laborious exertions through a long Session to enact salutary Laws, and your liberal grants for the encouragement of zeal and industry throughout all classes of the community, merit the warmest gratitude from the Public at large; and I cannot refrain from expressing the satisfaction I feel in having been so fortunate as to suggest measures for your deliberation, which have been thought worthy of occupying a large proportion of your attention.
