"From the bottom of the Bay of Fundy come some of the finest grind stones in the world, and the manner in which they are procured is simple and ingenious, the stonecutters making the exceptional tide perform the hardest part of the work. When the tide is out, which happens twice a day, the workmen quarry the stones from the solid rock and fasten them to a big flatboat. Then in comes the tide, a mighty flood rushing in as though the great ocean had suddenly changed its mind. Wonderful sight it is, rising often as high as a house. And now the men have nothing to do. The tide lifts the boat, and up comes the stone with it. Boat and stone are then brought close inshore where the stone is removed at leisure when the tide is out."

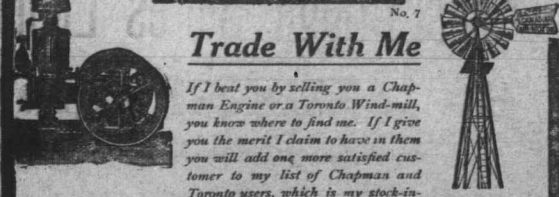

POLITICAL CLERGYMEN

We have little excuse to offer for calling attention to the rabid and bitter party work of the Reverend Editor of the Toronto Globe. It certainly is bad taste for the Western Chronicle to compare a man who has recently made such an unsavory record with the "other clergymen" who have become active politicians, which that paper thinks the ADVERTISER is sponsor for, in some way.

We have clergymen in King's County who have come from their pulpits to fight the Devil in its worst shapes and drive out bribery corruption and intemperance. They incurred the hatred of the politicians who revelled in those things and the newspapers which upheld those politicians in their devilish work.

That hatred of men who upheld clean politics still exists, as exhibited in recent editorials, but the Kings County Clergymen are endeared in the affections of their churches and congregations more than in other places. Had they followed "that good conscience" such as the Western Chronicle states it is just possible Mr J A MacDonald did, their usefulness as preachers would be nil. McDonald and The Globe has nearly driven Liberalism out of Ontario.

KENTVILLE TOWN IMPROVEMENT

Following is the report of the Committee on town improvement: PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRADE AND MEMBERS:

We our committee on town improvement have met together and discussed matters coming within the range of said committee. We have also in a general way in so far as time would permit, made an inspection of the town with the view of being better able to suggest what might be done in the way of general improvement. We beg to submit for your consideration the following report.

In order to make our report more comprehensive we have divided the work. We would suggest as advisable into two parts, 1st., immediate improvement work, 2nd., future planning improvement work.

IMMEDIATE IMPROVEMENT, under this head we would suggest that steps be taken by those in authority to have all persons owning property conform to a certain "law of finish" in so far as their place is concerned. That is, many places have a decidedly unfinished appearance, the side alleys, sides of buildings, in fact in some cases streets are used as a dumping ground for barrels, boxes, etc., old pieces of machinery, wagon, etc., in fact a decidedly unattractive condition prevails especially in certain sections. All of this could be remedied by a little outlay on the part of the thoughtless property holder, were it brought to his attention. To keep the ground and yard around each building in Kentville tidy will go further than any one thing to improve the town.

Many buildings could be improved by a slight outlay and be made attractive through an application of paint. Old unsightly shops should be removed or repaired. Buildings with glass broken should be repaired. In fact we would urge the town authorities to take such steps as may be necessary to give parts of the town a little more character in so far as buildings and their appearance are concerned especially in certain sections of the town. This we think is the second important step in town improvement. This improvement is largely a personal matter with the property holder. The town, however, should lead the way in promoting in better town planning and where necessary take steps to remedy existing condition. It is to the interest of all, that unsightly places should be done away with, and the town be given a more

finished appearance. The third phase of town improvement represents an outlay on the part of the town as a body as well as the individual personally, and that is in the improvement of streets, and that is necessary we think to at once take such steps as may be necessary to put down proper concrete sidewalks and curbing. This we think considering the condition of our streets in certain periods, is of the utmost importance, and will at once give an air of permanency to the town at a considerably slight cost. Such sidewalks could be washed down and kept clean for it cannot be said that the sidewalks at present are at all sanitary. This work which should first be confined to the area around the square; both sides of Aberdeen Street; from the station to Main Street and one side to Cornwallis Street; both sides of Webster Street; one side of Cornwallis Street; and both sides of Main Street in front of the square.

FUTURE IMPROVEMENT, we advise that steps be taken at an early date to put down Macadam streets doing first the area already mentioned for sidewalks. This work to spread out along Main Street both ways; and in other places as deemed advisable. Also that the sidewalks and streets in the residential districts we would suggest that a space for a strip of grass be left between the sidewalk and curbing and that where no trees at present are planted that such should be planted.

We suggest that the town take steps as finances warrant to develop a town square somewhere near the centre of the town. We also advise that a town planning scheme be developed as early as possible having this and other such features in view. We would further suggest that a plan of the school ground be formulated having in view future buildings so that necessary planting and beautifying of the ground may be proceeded with and thus make these grounds more attractive than they are at present.

Certain areas now within the range of the town which could be got at a slight cost such as corner areas on some of the side streets leading off from Main Street, south could by a moderate outlay be made to give a more attractive and finished appearance to the town.

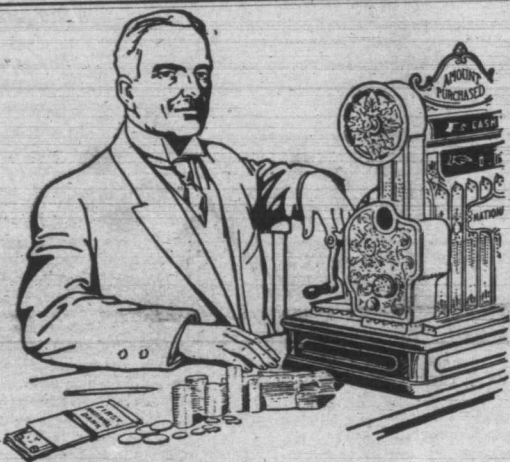

Future of Fruit Growing Never Brighter

A year ago the department of Agriculture at Ottawa, through the Branch of the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner, undertook an investigation of the fruit growing conditions throughout Canada. The inquiry was entrusted to Mr. Wm. H. Bunting, an extensive fruit-grower of St. Catharines, Ont., who secured as much information as possible on the following points:

1 The possibilities of an extension of the fruit growing industry of Canada in the different localities visited.

2 The tendencies in the matters of the planting and growing of different kinds of fruit, and with regard to apples, the varieties which are being most extensively planted in their different districts.

3 The difficulties which are likely to be encountered in the further development of the fruit growing industry.

4 Methods of production and orchard management which have been most successful in the different districts and the probabilities of over-production.

5 The conditions under which British Columbia, Ontario and Maritime Province fruit is marketed in the prairie provinces as well as the character and the effect of American competition.

The enquiry was concluded in due time and the report has been printed for general distribution. It contains a large amount of detailed information gathered in every province, making it an invaluable guide to persons who desire to take up fruit growing as an industry.

In his general conclusions Mr. Bunting points out that while the growing of fruit offers ample reward to the man of energy, patience and perseverance, there is perhaps no phase of agricultural endeavor which requires to be more closely studied and in which a wider range of information is more desirable and necessary. The future of the industry, he states, was never brighter than it is today, the prospects never more attractive nor the field of extensive effort in all fruit-growing provinces more inviting.

The report, which contains 84 printed pages and many illustrations, is available to all who apply for it to the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Ont.

Spray This Week

Fruit growers who have not already put the dormant spray on, (that is 4 gals. Lime-Sulphur to a 40 gals. bbls.) should not fail to do so within the present week.

In case some few people might fear the buds are too far advanced, we would like to cite the cases where last year quite a few people put on the dormant strength when the end of the leaves were away out like the top of half of a mouse's ear. In fact several orchardists made this spraying from the 10th, to 18th, of May and did not injure the tips of the leaves. A peculiar thing about it is that the younger the leaf the more it will resist burning, which is contrary to what would naturally be expected.

Only those who have previously made this dormant spray know of its great benefit in the cleaning up of the trees. Recent investigations have proven that it destroys a large quantity of eggs of the Aphis, which was so destructive a couple of years ago.

While there is an advantage in delaying putting on the dormant spray until the ends of the leaves are well out, so as to add 3 lbs. of Arsenate of Lead, in order to poison that most destructive bud moth, it now looks as if this spraying cannot be delayed beyond a week, or possibly 10 days if the weather turns cold again.

Do not hesitate to put on the full strength 1 to 10 and you will not be sorry for it.

If anyone has set out young trees within the last 5 years they should be careful and thoroughly spray them with even a stronger solution than 1 to 10, half Lime-Sulphur and half water will not injure the bark of the trees. Give them a good wetting and you will be sure to catch any San Jose Scale that might be lurking about.
