Recollections of the Exhibition.

The opening of the provincial exhibition at Halifax took place on Tuesday afternoon, the address being delivered by Messrs. Gov. Daly, Mayor Keeffe acting as chairman.

The attendance on both the first and second days was small, but on Thursday fully twenty thousand people paid the price of admission. The exhibit of fruit was excellent, especially the earlier varieties of apples.

In the educational department Acadia Seminary showed fine mechanical drawings. The Manual Training School also showed some fine specimens of the work of the students.

In the Natural History department some excellent specimens of gold quartz were shown, also a handsome bar of gold, worth over \$2,000.

The show of cattle was very poor, in comparison with previous exhibitions, owing somewhat to the dryness of the season, and the poor pastures consequent.

The show of sheep was fair, including Shropshires, Co. Swolds, Cheviots, and a pen of Merinos, which attracted considerable attention.

The show of horses was small, but some very good ones were shown; the first prize for standard bred horses was taken by "Israel," owned by A. C. Bell, of New Glasgow.

The free lunch counter, provided by the various wholesale merchants of Halifax, for the benefit of the visiting merchants, was too well patronized to obtain a lunch it was necessary to have a ticket from one of Halifax merchants.

Some very practical jokes, who having a weakness for the tempting display of Gravestones exhibited by the N. S. Fruit Growers' Association, procured a card, on which he labelled, "Please take one," and watching his chance placed it on top of the pile; nearly every one responded to the very kind invitation, and, as a result the pile was soon diminished.

On a whole the exhibition was much inferior to that of previous years, and was more of a huge advertising agency than an agricultural exhibition.

While thanking our many correspondents in various parts of the county for furnishing it with newsy letters, the ACADIAN would earnestly ask that others join in the work.

Unfermented Wine.

Mr E. Hulse not long since read a paper before the Victoria Vegetable Commission of Australia, regarding the use of unfermented grape juice, from which we make the following extract:

The grapes are picked when they are fully ripened and the juice extracted and bottled as soon as possible afterwards. The bottles are filled brimful and placed up to their necks in vats of hot water within ten degrees of the boiling point. When the must is as hot as the water, the cork is forced into the bottle, expelling a portion of the liquid. If the least portion of air is left between the cork and the liquid, the oxygen contained in the air will set a sulphurine matter in the wine in motion and fermentation will ensue.

When the cork is forced into the bottle, the liquid is in a state of expansion from the heat. As it cools it contracts, leaving a vacuum between the cork and the liquid; but the vacuum must not be an atmospheric chamber. The cork must, of course, be thoroughly tight. If fermentation does set in, it may be driven off by reheating the wine. The bottles are then laid on their sides in a cool place and the organic foreign substances must be allowed to settle, so that the liquid may become clear.

The settling may occupy whatever period the manufacturer chooses; sufficient time should, however, be given. The wine can lie six months or a year without damage. At the end of the settling period, it should again be filtered into bottles, the sediment being left behind. These bottles must be brimful, and should again be set in vats of hot water, heated up to the same degree and corked in precisely the same manner as at first, using sealing wax to exclude the air. The wine is then left to cool in the ordinary way, and must be put away where the temperature is even and cool. It is now ready for use, and will keep just as long as it is kept free from contact with the atmosphere. This makes a very delightful beverage, which is entirely free from alcohol.—Canadian Horticulturist.

The epidemic in some respects resembles cholera, but it is not thought to be anything so serious. The government is alarmed, however, and has despatched medical men to the settlement.
