THE GLOBE'S GREAT BLUFF

And How It Strikes the Quebec Wing

MONTREAL, Feb. 7.—Considerable interest was created early yesterday afternoon throughout the city by a despatch from Toronto to the Star setting forth that the Globe had discovered a new man's nest and indicating that the Globe's mission to Montreal had been much more successful from a party point of view than was the same individual's trip to Washington a year or two ago. Long-headed Grita, however, waited for the arrival of the Liberal organ before crowding for they had reason to believe that if any kind of a scandal had been unearthed the Globe's correspondent in the Queen City would have been only too ready to wire the details to his paper in Montreal. The arrival of the Globe's "startling story" has in every way confirmed the wisdom of the Liberals, who decided to await the context before going into hysterics over a badly written and stupid revelation of the Parro-McGreavy scandal.

SIR ADOLPHE CARON INTERVIEWED.

Luckily Sir A. P. Caron was in town this morning en route from Quebec to the capital, and the Postmaster-General, being interviewed by a reporter asked if he had read the "startling story" that Cartwright-Farrer organ had published yesterday. "I have read over very carefully, the alleged 'social correspondence' from Montreal to the Globe, as well as the fac-simile of certain orders given by me on Mr. McCreavy during the election contest of 1887."

"Do you object to giving any information that may be in your possession touching these charges?" asked the correspondent.

"Certainly not," replied the Minister. "There is nothing to hide. These orders were signed by me as I am on them in the Globe, and I take the full responsibility of the giving of the amounts to the gentlemen named in the correspondence in question. They were given under the following circumstances: Friends of mine and myself contributed towards the election fund to defray expenses of candidates running in the interests of the Conservative party. These funds I placed in the hands of Mr. Thom McCreavy, as I was away from Montreal attending and conducting the campaign throughout the Quebec district."

"Mr. McCreavy was the treasurer, was he not, in 1887?"

"Yes, and I have in my possession at Ottawa his receipts for sums larger than the total amount of the orders which I gave upon him."

"Then this disposes of the Globe lie that you were drawing upon the Larkin, Connolly & Co.'s funds?"

"Assuredly; these orders were not any money given to Mr. McCreavy from any other source, except through me."

"In reply to a further question, the Postmaster-General said: 'I had charge of the elections in the district of Quebec, and several of the candidates were young men who could not be expected to bear the legitimate and necessary expenses incidental to an election contest. I should likewise say that I did not know what other funds Mr. McCreavy had, nor the source from which they came. If an examination is made, I am confident that the amount of the orders I gave to pay money to the several candidates was only fair and reasonable. No amount was given unless previously agreed to by the committee which had charge of the campaign. So far as I know,' concluded Sir A. P. Caron, 'this is the plain unvarnished truth relating to this matter.'"

"While the minister and his friends are laughing at the Globe and its cook-and-bull story of Saturday relating to Sir Adolphe Caron, the Laurier party are furious with what they call 'Farrer's stupidity in showing up Tarte,' their new Quebec ally."

VIEW OF LIBERALS.

A French gentleman who is a personal friend of Hon. Mr. Laurier and a devoted Liberal, made the following observation to-day: "There will never be any fraternity between the Ontario and Quebec wings of the Laurier party while the Globe is run by Farrer and Cartwright. Here we have Tarte, who is doing most of the party's hard fighting both in Quebec and Ottawa politics, and with a view to establish Caron, the Globe ruins the Empire's view of him, viz.: That he was moved by no patriotic motives when making his charges of last session."

"The Globe," said a second Liberal, "had its managers possessed a grain of common sense, might have known that in putting Tarte in the soup they were paralyzing Laurier's present right arm in the province of Quebec, but as it is always the case with our Ontario friends, they never see further than the end of their noses."

"The general opinion, therefore, in Montreal, is that the Globe people have proved nothing against Sir A. P. Caron that renders the Postmaster-General unworthy of his place in Parliament; that after denouncing the Connolly brothers as thieves and plunderers, they have suddenly discovered them to be honest, hard-working contractors; that they admit Mr. Tarte, who is Laurier's end man in Quebec politics, to be a notorious hypocrite, and lastly that the mountain has labored and brought forth a mouse."
