

Provincial Finances, 1911.

We publish below the statement of the Provincial receipts and expenditures, for the fiscal year ended September 30th, 1911, as prepared under the late Administration. As will be seen, the total receipts were \$384,797.82, and the total expenditures \$416,778.36. This leaves a balance on the year's transactions of \$41,960.54. Adding this deficit, less \$11,595.00 charged to debenture sinking fund, to the balance of debt admitted by the late Government a year ago, the Provincial debt is now, according to their own admission, \$907,722.32. But what the real debt, liabilities and assets of the Province are, is not yet accurately known. Messrs. Dench and Rossborough, bankers, have been engaged to investigate the Provincial accounts. When they report, the public will be furnished with further information as to our actual standing. Meanwhile the figures herewith furnished, constitute ample matter for the meditation of electors during the election campaign. Following is the


