

The Housing Problem.

This question has suddenly assumed a new phase. Not until Dr. Brehm's report of the number of houses unfit for habitation have the public had the opportunity of realizing the gravity of the situation. It is true that Dr. Brehm has in the past pressed this question on the attention of the City Council, but to what extent we have at present no means of determining. That the matter in some cases was urgent was known from the revelations which were made as to the conditions under which some of the victims of the typhus outbreak were living. We have also a lively recollection of the disclosures made by the Hon. M. P. Gibbs, at the meeting at which the Association for the Prevention of Consumption was inaugurated at the British Hall during his mayoralty.

Little, however, was done. It is true some additional powers were obtained from the Legislature. The matter came up for discussion early in February. Mayor Ellis interviewed the Premier, and a conference was arranged between the City Council and the members for St. John's. A date was set. But the Premier, so three members of the City Council inform us, found the date inconvenient and the meeting has not since been held. In the meantime, the Mayor was stricken down with a serious illness, and when he recovered somewhat, he was advised by his medical attendant to take a trip abroad to recuperate. The Premier was also busy in the Legislature, and when the Legislature closed it became incumbent on him as leader of the P. P. party to take an extended trip through the electoral district of Burin, where a seat is now vacant through the lamented death of

The Legislature is now closed and therefore any legislation which the problem might call for is put off for another year.

In the past we have had public meetings on health problems, articles and correspondence in the newspapers on death-rate and dirt; outbreaks of typhus, typhoid and diphtheria, and now comes Dr. Brehm's report that 80 houses are unfit for habitation. If such calamities and conditions as these are insufficient to force the housing problem to the front, we know not what is able.

Well-known Ship Lost.

The well known s.s. Ulunda was recently lost in a gale on the Gulf of Patras, with several other steamers. She was bought last summer by a Grecian firm, when her name was changed to the Etil. The firm which purchased the Ulunda had a new steamer which had the same name as that given the Ulunda after she was purchased, and this ship the Furness Withy people, who owned the Ulunda, bought to replace her. The new boat, which was the Etila, was christened by Furness Withy the Westmoreland, the name which she bore when she was launched. Capt. Dew was the last master of the Ulunda before she was sold. She was in the Liverpool-St. John's service since 1892, and was commanded successively by Captains Fleming, Campbell (who died on the ship), Chambers and Barr. The ship was insured by her last owners for \$50,000. She was built in 1885.

Bishop's Falls Booming

WILL MANUFACTURE PULP NEXT WEEK.

Mr. Geo. Noseworthy, mason and bricklayer, who was at Bishop's Falls all the winter, arrived here by the express on Thursday evening, accompanied by his wife. Mr. Noseworthy with a staff of fellow mechanics was engaged laying down concrete floors, bricking in boilers and doing other work for the Albert Reed Co. Mr. Wm. Donnelly is still at work finishing up. There is a big rush of business at Bishop's Falls and fully 1,000 men are yet at work on the plant or in the forest logging. Weather conditions were more than favorable for the woodsmen the past winter and the cut of logs has been exceptionally large. This material will be used for pulp and building purposes, and more than 1,000,000 logs are now at the plant and ready for use. Everything is in readiness now for a start in the manufacturing line, and the first pulp, the product of the Albert Reed mills, will be turned out next week. When the fine weather of the late spring sets in one of the large buildings will be extended for the working of "wet" machinery, and for the first year only pulp will be manufactured and exported mostly to England. The plant will be added to after that upon an extensive scale, so much so indeed that it will take a big staff of builders and other mechanics from 18 months to 2 years to complete the new buildings which the company will erect. As soon as navigation opens, say about the 20th of this month, the first shipment of the company's pulp will be sent to England by one of the A. N. D. Co's. ships, which will load at Botwood, and this will continue afterwards in regular order. A year hence the company will manufacture paper. The Reed Co. are building houses of a superior class for the workmen and 15 are now in course of construction. They will be comfortable, commodious, well lit and ventilated. The company are now waiting for the ice in the Exploits River to break up to get the great number of logs cut in the forest down to the mills, and when that does occur, which will be soon, the place will be a hive of industry. When Mr. Noseworthy left there was about 2 feet of ice on the river, and as the weather was getting warmer as the days passed, it was melting quickly. There is now very little snow in the woods and no heavy floods are anticipated. During the summer and fall months there will be over 500 men engaged in the plant alone, and after the extension planned is finished, in about two years, fully twelve that number will, it is likely, be engaged in the mills and around the works. There is an inexhaustible supply of the best kind of pulpwood in the company's domain, which is considered by experts to be the finest in the island of Newfoundland, so that the very best quality of pulp and paper will be shipped from this industrial centre to the motherland in years to come.

At Grand Falls this year the A. N. D. Co. will extend greatly their paper mills, and the first shipment of machinery for these will arrive by the Tritonia, due at Botwood shortly, the rest to come forward by other conveyances. They will put in two more paper machines and two new digestors, with three new boilers. Quite a number of new houses are being erected there, the place being quite a fine inland town. It is lit by electricity and most of the houses there now have sewerage and water connections, and those who occupy them are well pleased with their lot.

Montrealer Who Was On S.S. Bruce Tells Graphic Story of the Wreck.

With men and women alternately praying and screaming in the dark hours of the early dawn, huge seas striking us and threatening to engulf the ship to pieces or else wash her off the reef upon which she had struck into deep water, I never want to go through such a nerve-racking experience as that which I did on Friday morning last, when the good ship Bruce, of Newfoundland, for Sydney, N.S., landed us on a Cape Breton point, declared Mr. A. J. Grubert, Manager of the Union Brewery, who was a passenger on the ill-fated vessel, in an interview with The Herald last night.

Landed on Shore.

"We landed on the Main-a-Dieu shoal—a bleak, bare spot inhabited only by a few 'lyvers,' natives who are engaged in the lobster industry. We did not see a sign of life and immediately look over the huts, which were there, for the shelter of the women, most of whom were not even clad. We built fires and tried to make the best of things, not knowing then where we were exactly, until one of the 'lyvers' from the nearest settlement, came down to the beach with a catamaran drawn by a bull. He told us in very old-fashioned French that we were on the Main a Dieu shoal, and

tearing sound, I leapt out of my berth, convinced that we had struck an iceberg, and rushed upon deck. The boat was rocking and swaying, though we did not of course know where we were then.

Rush For The Deck.

Almost immediately the passengers on the boat began to rush to the deck, some of them in semi-hysterics, others bearing in their arms what they could carry of their personal belongings. "I saw the Marconi operator running to his instrument, but a minute before he reached the wireless cabin I noticed a long flash emanate from the wireless mast and the same moment the ship was plunged into total darkness. The water had evidently flooded the electrical batteries and rendered them useless.

Played Band and Prayed.

"Then the panic started. Scores were down on their knees praying, each in their own fashion. A father, mother and their little boy knelt on the deck and a small band of the Salvation Army which was on board, played hymns with just the same spirit in the face of death as though they were on dry land.

First Boat Sank.

The first boat swung off the davits into the water was staved in and sank. The second boat, while being loosened up by five of the Newfoundlanders, caught the eye of them and hurried them into theinky water. Two were managed to gaff out with boat hooks, a third was washed back on the deck

of the Bruce by a huge wave, while the other two, Pike and Shea, were drowned.

"There was also a party of little Acadia girls on the boat and they were in hysterics all the time. One of them tried several times to throw herself into the water. It was about 8 o'clock in the morning when I left in the fifth and last boat to leave the damaged vessel's side. I asked the chief officer, who was a personal friend of mine, how long he thought the vessel would last and he said she might remain afloat on the reef for another hour, if the waves did not lift her bodily and drop her into deep water.


Shannahan on the New Policeman.

Mrs. Tucker Wants a Rise in Pay. "Before now," says Mrs. Tucker, "we'd have policemen in the force for years and years. They'd become as familiar to you as the twelve o'clock gun, and you could go to them in the hour of your sorrow and they'd sympathize with you. If you had a case on at the Court-house you could go and have a chat with one of the old fashioned policemen, and he'd be able to tell you if you'd win your case or not. They knew every man, woman and child in the town. They often acted the part of good Samaritan with the erring youth, and often by good fatherly advice, placed them on the right track."

"They were the right kind in a row," says Tucker, "they wouldn't be bothered arresting you, but dealt out your punishment on the spot and that settled it. They remained members of the 'force' till they died and when they 'went across,' people mourned them, and have a good word for them to this day. Now the scene is changed, you can't get to know a policeman at all, for they are resigning as fast if not faster than they join. They tell me that a policeman gets only thirty two dollars and fifty cents a month and two dollars o'clocks if they stop in the force for a year."

"I often wondered," said Delaney, "why all our policemen are so lanky and thin. In the old days we had good fat policemen, that would do you good to look at. Now they are as thin as a match, and no wonder they are thin, on thirty two and fifty a month. A city is judged by its policemen. Strangers form their opinions of us by taking in the surroundings, and in these surroundings are included our policemen. Then, for goodness sake, give them a rise in wages. Give them a chance to grow stout, or some day the whole jolly force will blow down town and not have sufficient strength to 'tack' back."

Coronation Music At the Famous Abbey.

The Choir Will Number 400 and the Orchestra 100—All Numbers of British Composers.

London, March 31.—The musical part of the Coronation service in Westminster Abbey has now been drawn up by Sir Frederick Bridge, under whose direction it will be performed. The choice of the music has not been easy, as each piece has had to be selected to correspond with some por-

tion of the elaborate ceremonial, but Sir F. Bridge has made a comprehensive scheme, the music being all by British composers (with the exception of Handel) from the sixteenth century to the present day.

New compositions have been written for the occasion by Sir F. Bridge, Sir Edward Elgar, Sir Hubert Parry, Sir Charles Stanford and D. Alcock (the organist of the Chapel Royal). The complete list, from the beginning to the end of the service, is as follows:

During the first anthem, "I was glad," which is sung whilst the Royal Procession passes up the nave, the Westminster boys, according to ancient custom, shout their "Vivats," these cries having been inserted by Sir Hubert Parry into the texture of his composition. Sir F. Bridge's homage anthem is sung whilst the Princess and Peers offer their homage to the King, and Sir Edward Elgar's offertorium is sung as the King and Queen make their oblations at the altar.

Handel's "Zadock the Priest" it may be noted, has been sung at every Coronation since that of George II. There will be several orchestral pieces played both before and after the actual service, and Sir Edward Elgar is writing a grand Recessional March, which will be heard as the King and Queen leave the Abbey in procession. Sir Alex. Mackenzie is also writing an orchestral piece to be played in the earlier part of the programme.

The performers are to number about 500, a choir (boys and men) of about 400, and an orchestra of 100.

The singers will be selected from the choirs of the Abbey, St. Paul's

Cathedral, the Chapels Royal in London and Windsor, the leading London churches and some of the provincial cathedrals. Elaborate arrangements are being made by Sir F. Bridge to secure the perfect working of the whole ceremony, and the organ loft is to be connected by telephone with the west door of the Abbey, in order to ensure perfect accuracy in the adjustment of the music.

The orchestra, one may note, is to be formed from the King's private band, augmented by a number of other professional players. Rehearsals will be held for some weeks beforehand, and at one of these the public will be admitted by payment, the proceeds going to Westminster charities.

"Wicked" Bibles.

Famous Errors Recalled at Tercentenary Exhibition.

There are two "Wicked" Bibles in the Bible Exhibition which was opened in the British Museum recently in celebration of the Tercentenary of the authorised version.

One "Wicked" Bible was printed in London, and in the Seventh Commandment missed out the vital word, so that it read, "Thou shalt" instead of "Thou shalt not."

Whether this was done by wicked will or merely a printer's error is not stated, but the printers were fined £500, and the whole of the impression was called in.

Another "Wicked" Bible missed out the same vital negative, and stated, "Know ye not that the unrighteous shall inherit the kingdom of God." Another Bible is christened "Basket-full of Errors," and nicknamed the "Vinegar Bible," because it announced the parable of the "vinegar" instead of the "vineyard."

Manuscripts are exhibited dating from the earliest times. A manuscript from the Gospel of St. Luke is shown dating from the sixth century. The manuscript formerly belonged to a Syrian convent in the Egyptian desert.

The First Great Bible, revised by Miles Coverdale, and printed in 1539, had an exciting history. Owing to political excitement in England, "four great dry fates" of printed sheets were sent over to Paris. Here, however, they fell into the hands of an official described as the French "Lieutenant Criminal," who sold them to a haberdasher to wrap caps in. They were recovered with difficulty.

Louis Hoffer, 16 years old, of Stoneham, hanged himself in a detention room at Concord reformatory.

Florence La Rochelle, aged 40, was found dead in a house where she was employed at Revere, with gas cocks wide open.

Miss Lulu MacAuley, aged 23, employed in watch factory at Waltham, took her own life by gas.

SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.
