

The salmon fishers should remember that the shop or office hold out little in the way of recompense for a life time of toil whereas the fisher man can look forward to a slinky pension as soon as he can prove satisaround this Island Home of ours. 

In order to draw attention from the Premier's change of front in regard to giving information about the Loans, the Tory organ has made another stupid blunder by raising another is-sue in the shape of a question.

The correspondent of the New York

Post foretold that the investing public would fight shy of the new loan, bebeing paid to the underwriters. forecast proved true, and we have been persistently inquiring into the cause. We have asked what rate of commission is being paid for underwriting the 1910 and the 1912 Loans Premier as persistently refuses to supply any answer, although ply information. Only one conclusion will be drawn by the public from the Premier's determined silence, and that is that the cause assigned by the N. Y. Post correspondent operated largely to bring about a result he fore

Chagrined at the results of the dis cussion, the Prime Minister commits another stupidity. He asks if it is the policy of the Liberal party to repudiate the contract for building the Branch Railways.

Jealous of the success of the fore cast of the N. Y. Posts financial correspondent, the Tory financier makes a forecast of the course we shall pur-sue. But unlike the Post man, he is ur-successful. He says: "No answer will be forthcoming." He is wrong. A square answer is forthcoming. We neither evade the question, as he does ours, nor do we equivocate as he i doing in extenuating his blunders i floating the loan. Our answer is i the negative. We say "No." If the Tory leader had not been "blinded with party passion" to use again the words of the Daily News, he would have refrained from putting such question and arousing memories he anxious to obliterate from the minds of the public. The Liberal party wil not follow the bad precedent establish ed in 1909 by his Government in re pudiating a contract, signed, sealed and delivered. How malapropos is the question. How untimely. How stupid. Who but the leader of the Tory party, traditionally the stupi party, would ask a question, which associated in the mind of the public with the sorry pectacle which the Tory administration presents after the great rebuff it received at the hands of the Lords of the Privy Council in the Commercial Cable appeal? Who so stupic as to recall the memory of Tory dishonour? Why, a Tory in a Tory paper.

But the stupidity is not confined to s unseasonableness, but extends to e unwitting revelation of what the oppounder has hitherto tried to hide The Government contended in 1910 nat the proceeds of the loan of that rear would cover the obligations of the Railway Extension Act. The question of repudiation could only arise in the mind of a Tory, convinced of the necessity of a third loan to pay for the branch lines already contracted for, and in a mind which s convinced that the Tory party will be defeated next Election. The quesion propounded carries the suggesion-you'd better stop criticizingyou'll be in the market yourselves shortly to find money to make up our shortage in paying for these same branch lines. Don't criticize us, for the criticism may hit you when you go nto the market, as go you must, after

you are returned to power, or will you epudiate the contract? The question about repudiation was an effort to burke criticism, but i 'ailed from stupidity. The suggestion was stupid because the contract, nade the Tories, is valid and the country must carry it out or pay damages. It was stupid because the criticism will not hurt the country but only the party of wilful extravagance
