It was morning, bright, beaming morning, but that time, and Mr. Murpoint had too many great matters on hand to allow of his retiring to rest.

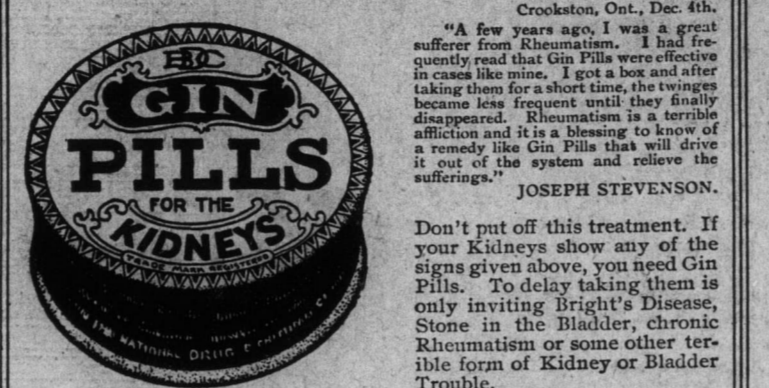

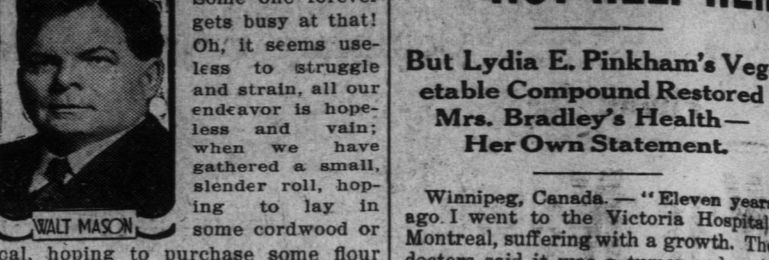

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL. LONDON, Feb. 12. The Governor, Newfoundland: The French Government reports violent fighting in the Argonne near Bagatelle. The German attack was broken by artillery and infantry fire, with heavy losses on both sides.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN. PARIS, via St. Pierre, Feb. 12. Between the sea and the Somme artillery contests. South of Boiselle the enemy exploded a mine at the extremity of one of our trenches, but we held on. Bombardment by the enemy of Tracy le Mont, and our artillery busy in Rheims and Soissons sections. In Woëvre rather sharp cannonading opposite Lambscourt and Hazelle Wood. We bombarded Thiancourt and Arville.

Fear Germans Got Lunenburg Vessel.

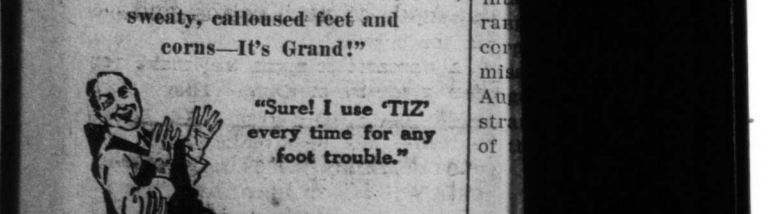
Lunenburg, Feb. 8.—The schooner W. Cortada, Captain Edwin Backman, left here on the 11th of January for Ponce, Porto Rico, with a cargo of dry and pickled fish from Zwicker and Co. The passage generally takes about fourteen days, and although the weather was fine and conditions were favorable, no word has been heard from the vessel since leaving the port and grave fears are ascertained by her safety.

"War is absolutely unthinkable to me," I heard a woman say the other day. "It seems inconceivable that a man should go out and kill each other." If I should tell this woman that she carries the germ of war about in her own heart she'd be horrified and indignant.

Yet it is true. What is the initial germ of war? It is just one thing, race prejudice, since different nations are not always of different races, perhaps I had better call it national prejudice.

**Hating War But Carrying Its Germ About.**

Now I happen to know that this woman has several race or national prejudices as firmly rooted in her heart as the oak outside my window is rooted in the soil. Indeed more so. For I suppose a hurricane might uproot an oak, but I cannot imagine any cataclysm that would uproot these prejudices from this woman's heart.

She is as sure that certain races and nations are inferior to her own as she is that a bomb will fall on her family; she could never take one as a friend on the same footing as her other friends.

Now think of the warring nations. Think of the hate between a Frenchman and a German, between an Englishman and a German, between a Serb and an Austrian. What is it but one of these race or national prejudices?

The king's business is not the snap which it once was, by any means. A hundred years ago a king could loiter around in a cloud of courtiers, and wives pro tem, drawing a shovel full of shekels out of the treasury every day, and slugging a tax on bread and milk whenever he wanted a new \$7,000,000 palace in which to spend the Fourth of July. He might be as big a nuisance in his kingdom as a mailpox and a war combined. Yet, no one objected, and the only evidence of discontent would be a pious longing for the opportunity to bury him with magnificent honors, and take a new chance with another.

However, with the general rise of modern fads, such as the ballot, the unbreakable constitution and the treasury time lock, there has been a marked change in kings. For the last half century kings have been working harder to hold their jobs than section hands. No enlightened country would think of harboring a king nowadays who did not obey the constitution and by-laws of his country and show every anxiety to please his employers.

The king of Italy is a fine example of the modern or improved variety of monarch. He is a young man of forty-five, Victor Emmanuel III, and was born in his business, his father having been King Humbert. When Victor Emmanuel was a boy he lived in a palace and was saluted with reverence by wise old men, but that was about all the fun he got out of it. In order to hold down his future job he had to take a university degree, serve in the army, acquire a large assortment of languages, learn how to run a battleship through the enemy in a scientific manner, become a connoisseur in art, and perfect himself in diplomacy, finance, statesmanship, city planning, botany, scientific agriculture, world geography, numismatics, hygiene, red cross work, philanthropy and the habits of volcanoes. He has been king since 1900, and is the hardest working man in Italy. Besides keeping half a dozen stenographers busy at his desk, he has to head a regular brigade every time Vesuvius or Aetna spout over, direct the army during war, preside at all national gatherings and keep his son busy learning kung-fu in good football weather. His only diversions are coin collecting and hunting for Spitzbergen and other remote corners of the earth, and he doesn't get one-tenth as many vacations as a union plumber.

King Victor Emmanuel is very popular, and has made so good that he could probably be elected to his job by a large majority if he had to run for it. But it is doubtful if he would make the race. It is far better to be a business man and to retire at the age of sixty with indigestion and a stable full of automobiles than to be a king who works wearily on in the late eighties waiting for death to come around and punch the time clock.

### Gloucester Firm SECURES PROPERTY AT NORTH ARM.

(Western Star.)

We learn that the property at North Arm owned by the late Capt. N. Butt has been acquired by Cunningham & Thompson, of Gloucester. It is their intention to erect fish curing sheds thereon, and also to construct a wharf so that vessels may berth thereby. Capt. Wallace Parsons came to Bay Islands a few days ago to make arrangements for the carrying out of some of this work. He informed us that it is the intention of the firm to engage in the packing of herring by the Scotch method, and also to carry on the winter and spring herring fishery there. Besides the erection of wharf, scalds and curing sheds, there will be bunk-houses and everything necessary for the comfort of the fishermen.

The property is adjacent to the fishing grounds, where, in season, both herring and codfish are fairly plentiful; and for the enterprising firm of Cunningham & Thompson we bespeak a larger share of Bay Islands fishing trade than they have hitherto enjoyed.

### City Waterman Victim of Theft.

Mr. John Flynn, who attends to the watering of shipping for the City Council, had a coil of hose stolen on his last evening by an unknown party while he was engaged giving the S.S. Adventure a supply of fresh water. The hose was left on Harvey's wharf, and some one saw a man take it from there and bring it on board the ship. The police were acquainted of the matter and Sergt. Noseworthy and Constable Power made a thorough search of the ship, but failed to find the missing property.

Are Canadians disloyal? is a question which in some parts of Canada may eventually be asked, unless there is a more general response to the call for recruits. The number of Canadian born soldiers who went over to England in the First Contingent was disappointingly small, and in some sections the response to the call for other contingents leaves something to be desired. There is no difficulty in obtaining the men required for the Second Contingent. That is a gratifying fact. If in some sections the recruiting has been slow, in others amendments to this is made, and the number required is assured. But the fact remains that there is a class of young men who are not responding as readily as they should, and as there will be need of further numbers from time to time, to follow the two contingents, it is well that the class to whom we refer should be aroused to a sense of their duty. It is stated that there have been disappointing returns from the rural parts of Canada. This is not to be wondered at. In the first place, there is an alarming scarcity of young men in rural Canada, especially in Ontario. The lure of the cities and the call of the West have stripped the farms of Ontario of the virile young men until to-day there are too few to man to properly till the soil. As Canada must take a large part in the feeding of the Empire during this time of stress, no greater or more patriotic work can be accomplished by our farmers than increasing the output of foodstuffs. A man cannot plant and harvest his crops and fight in the trenches at the same time.

The criticism is not against the young men of the country districts, but against thousands of young men in our cities who do not appear to realize what is their duty at a time

## Notes on the Patriotic Tour.

### Objects of the Tour -- Impressions of Norris Arm.

I. C. M.

The present war has created many new conditions throughout the Empire, and a wider vision has dawned upon the people. Locally we have had our share of this vision, and our people are more directly interested in the "Mother Empire" than ever before. Different causes have brought this about. At first it was the fact of our sons volunteering, thereby giving us a personal interest in the war, and later it has been by the public meetings which have been held, and the patriotic tours which have been made. These tours are conducted at different parts of the country, and their personnel consisted of our leading men and public speakers. They were all important and accomplished a very great work; but one of the principal tours was that which visited the West Coast, and for four weeks held meetings throughout the different districts of that large territory.

It was the writer's privilege to be one of the number which composed this particular party, and what may be hereafter written are his personal impressions of what he saw of men and things during his four weeks of travel. The party consisted of eight persons in all, whose names are as follows:—A. W. Piccott, Esq., Charles Emerson, Esq., and Mr. Devcreaux, besides a contingent of the Highlanders Band consisting of Pipers Thomas and Morris, and drummers Antle and Wheeler. This band was a great help to the success of the tour, and proved a great attraction at every place; and many an incident, and many a reference, will be dated from the time that the Highlanders visited such and such a place. The purpose of this tour was to hold public meetings, and to impress upon the people the serious situation of the Empire, as brought about by the war and to further encourage the public to do their duty in volunteering for active service.

It was Sunday, January 10th, that our party left the station by train and crossed the country to join the Fionn Channel. The data and impressions furnished by the railway alone are of themselves an interesting chapter; and every bend in the roadway, and every stream and lake, and every hill and mountain height presented each its own beauty, and told of its own majesty. It was Nature in all its sternness, and though wrapt in win-

ter mantle, it was still Nature in its glory. Nature should be man's greatest study and the more he penetrates her mysteries and comprehends its immensity the more will he discover that higher and Divine power, by which all things have been created.

Among the passing features which attracted our attention, those of "Norris's Arm" came first. What amount of trade is done in this particular place we do not really know, but judging from the land and water-front of the locality we certainly think that there should be very satisfactory agricultural returns to the enterprise and industry of any who would diligently apply themselves to the chances that offer. It sometimes seems that we have only half colonized Newfoundland, and that we neglected to utilize the opportunities which she offers. Certain it is that the slopes and acres of such places as "Norris's Arm," were meant for better cultivation, and, therefore, greater population than at present exists. In their places the boats and the fishermen and the fisherman's homesteads are all right, and will long continue the mainstay of the country; but this stay would be lengthened and its strands would be strengthened fifty per cent. if more systematic attention were paid to the tilling of the soil. It is true that fishermen cannot be real farmers, but it does seem that there is room for better results than we are having. We seem to have got into a rut and are depending upon the summer months of fishing for our entire support; and then wonder why things are not better; but how can they be better when we fail to make use of the other bounties which God and Nature has placed within our reach.

The North West does not offer more beautiful slopes than are to be seen along the railway line and vicinities of "Norris's Arm," and as for the Prairies they are not as good. The Prairies are arid, parched, and treeless; but in our country we have water in abundance, foliage in profusion, and land almost asking to be cultivated. These features of our country's advantages very often appeal strongly to us in our travels, and the more we look at them, and the more we consider them, the firmer are we in our conviction, that we the people of "Newfoundland" really do not know our own country.
