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

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

GRADECK, Serbia, Oct. 23. Via Paris, Oct. 25. A double attempt by the Bulgarians to cut the railway at Veles, and in the Velandovo sector has been com pletely defeated. Yesterday, Friday the attack on Veles was given up and the entire available Bulgarian strength was directed southward from Islip along the Gradeskar River spreading out over a five mile front and comprising the villages of Rabecovo, Velandovo, Pirude, Vesezel Halkova and Hodova, with its objective. AMSTERDAM, Oct. 25. German newspapers print the text of a note sent by Premier Radola-voff, of Bulgaria, to Bulgarian Ministers abroad, protesting against the bombardment of what he styles the open towns of Dedeaghatch and Porto Lagos, where he declares considerable damage was inflicted. Dedeghatch, says the Premier, was exposed on Oct. 21st to bombardment by eight large warships of the Allies, while Porto Lagos was bombarded by twelve ships. It is not necessary to point out, he adds, that the fire of the Allied fleet was not answered, since these open places possess no means of resistance.

The French success is considered important, because the capture of this fortified area clears the ground for another general offensive in Champagne. For the same reason the British are trying to force the Germans out of their redoubts and from the slag heaps south of La-Bassee. These are only preparatory operations, whilst the Italian great

offensive, which has already gained for them many valuable vantage points, according to Rome despatches, may any day place them in possession of the fortress of Gorizia. The Russians are fighting pitched battles in Riga and Dvinsk regions in an effort to retake the ground wor from them by Von Hindenburg las Russian attacks southeast of Riga have been repulsed, according to the Germans, as were those undertaken northwest of Dvinsk. Prohibition Meeting.

A large gathering of young voters attended last night's attended last night's prohibition meeting in the T. A. Armoury. Mr. W. White presided, and after ex-plaining the object of the meeting and referring to the progress made by the different committees. duced the first speaker Mr. R. G. MacDonald. Mr. McDonald dealt with alcohol as a drug, and while admitting that in exceptional cases it may prove beneficial, the decision as to when and how to use it should be left in the hands of members of the medical profession. The latter, said Mr. McDonald, are on the whole opposed to liquor as a stimulant, and have found many substitutes for it, which while providing the necessary energy leave no evil after effects. He loped that a big vote for prohibition would be polled on Nov. 4th next. Mr. H. V. Simms was the next speaker. In a clear and concise manner he expressed his attitude toward the drink traffic, and urged all present to use their utmost endeavors for the abolition of the saloon. Mr. W. J. Ellis followed and said that in the northern districts, from which he had just returned the sentiment was lowing pencilled words: was of the opinion that by the removal of liquor we shall be clearing the way for the raising of a strong and sturdy race. Owing to some of the speakers being delayed, the chairman related some facts gleaned by canvassers in their tour of the city. He srs. George Coughlan and George R. Johnston gave brief addresses, which were listened to with much interest. On the arrival of Dr. Mosdell, Mr. White vacated the chair. Dr. Mosdisease. He dealt also with the question of revenue and made a strong appeal for the abolition of the saloon. Rev. Mr. Legge, of Portugal Cove, gave a very earnest address and exhorted all to vote for prohibition. A vote of thanks proposed by Mr. J. M. Devine and seconded by Mr. Thomas R. Delaney, of Bay Roberts, was accorded the speakers by acclamation. The meeting closed with the singing

tion I would not vote for the enforcement of the present Prohibition Act. Before I wrote you, I had not seen a copy of the Act and only one or two quotations from it. I wrote for in-formation. I had a "hunch" that there would be some loop holes in a Tem-perance Act, and I find now, after reading a copy that was lent me, that I had underestimated their number. The Act is as full of holes as a sieve. It won't hold water, but it will keep n a power of whiskey!

Under the Act I may keep in my possession only such liquor as I may obtain before January 1st, 1917. When that stock is lost, wasted or consumed, I must fall ill before I can get any more, and then only enough for use during that illness. I cannot obtain any to keep by me for sudden illness. However sick I may be I must first see and pay a doctor, and then visit and pay a druggist. I may be on the Labrador, hundreds of miles from a doctor and druggist. I cannot

take it in my medicine chest.

But see what the law allows the rich man to do. He can purchase enough liquor before January 1st, 1917, to stock his house and load his yacht for years and years, for any purpose, medicinal, social or other The poor man's house, after a couple of years, will be empty of liquor and his schooner cannot carry it. He dare not import it then.

The rich man need not pay for it all at once. He must take delivery of and pay the duty before January 1st, 1917. He can settle with the liquor seller at his own and the latter's convenience. The seller can sue him for the amount or an instalment after January 1st, 1917. Who is going to give the poor man credit for enough liquor to last him for the rest of his

When I, at the request of the Rev. James Bell, drafted the section of the License Act forbidding credit in the sale of intoxicants, and punishing the giving of such credit with fine and imprisonment, I did not make one law for the poor and another for the rich. That was done when the Bill was before the House of Assembly. I did not then, nor do I now, believe in one law for the rich and another for the poor. I would have stopped credit in wholesale as well as retail, to wealthy employer and poverty-strick-

en labourer alike. I have shown, Mr. Editor, how the rich man may obey the law and yet obtain all the liquor he wants before January 1st, 1917; but the poor man will be unable to keep sufficient in his house as a medicine to save the lives of his wife and children in cases 11 00 of sudden illness, or on board of his 1 00 ship to save the lives of a ship-weight six hundredweight.

In my next lefter I shall show how easily and safely the rich man may openly and brazenly break the law after the Act comes in force. Of course the poor man won't be able to

do this! The Act seems to have a special dislike to schoolmasters and barbers, while policemen may become liable to a fine of five hundred dollars for trying to carry out the law!! I will explain how later.

The Revenue With Prohibition

Is the Liquor Traffic necessary to the Revenue, or will the Revenue really suffer any loss under Prohibition? The answer is NO! Certainly not. On the contrary, a decided gain to the Revenue is reasonable to expect when the Liquor Traffic is abolished.

The Revenue receives an annual income of \$360,000 from Liquor, and the people spend at least \$1,500,000 for the Liquor on which this amount is paid as duty. It is estimated that nearly a million dollars per annum is lost by the workers of this country through death, inefficiency and inability caused by drink. The expenditure of this amount would bring

\$200,000 more to the Revenue. Nor is this all, for the public purse will be saved some large expenditures over \$600,000 per year to support our Poor and Insane Asylums, Orphanages, Hospitals, Penitentiary, Jails, Magistrates, Police Force, Courts of Justice, and such like to take care of the results of disease, poverty and crime, and it is proven clearly by authentic investigation that a large proportion of this is directly caused by iquor. Indeed, we know this for a fact, as every man can see it for himself. Investigation, however, proves beyond a doubt that fully 50 per cent. of these things arise from the use of Liquor, which in our case would amount to more than \$300,000.

This simple view of the case, therefore, shows that the Revenue would actually benefit in a very large amount by the adoption of Prohibition. VOTE YES.




