





Ex-Kaiserin shared with her husband the glories of the German imperial throne, and then came downfall, suddefeat in the field brought about by a war for conquest and domination, the deposed Kaiser fled to Holland about the only place of refuge left him in Europe. He was soon joined by his wife whose loyalty to her ruined husband won for her an admiration that causes one almost to forget the unis tied.

The Ex-Kaiserin was a princess by birth, for her father was reigning Duke Frederick of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Augustenburg, who died several years ago. The Princess Victoria was, therefore, brought up in a ducal court. from which she went to preside over the imperial court at Berlin when she married the German Emperor, William II., on February 27, 1881 and became German Empress and Queen of Prussia.

The Ex-Kaiserin brought up children, and the greater part of her time at Berlin was devoted to her duties as a mother and head of a great household. Court functions, of course had to be attended, but she gave no more time to them than the duties of her position demanded. Although the all styles and colours, 25 p.c. off wife of the monarch possessing great powers, she does not appear to have taken or attempted to take any part in politics. She had no hand in wrecking the Hohenzollern family and bringing Germany down to the dust. That responsibility rests upon her husband and his war lords, who had inoculated the German people with the poison of world domination.





Thread was at first sold in hanks, as knitting wool is now, and ladies had to loosen the skeins and wind it into little balls. But a progressive thread manufacturer, James Clark, got a wool wood turner named Robert Paul to make a few wooden spools in the early eighteen hundreds, and then James Clark himself, to accommodate a fair customer, would sit down at a weaver's pirn in his own shop, while she waited, and wind the skein of thread on it for her. He charged her

Has Tumbled Off.

The top of Mont Blanc fell off recently and started an enormous avalanche, which rolled down into Italy along the gorge of the Brenva Glacier, destroying in its course the whole forest of Pourtoud.

The reason was found to be that part of the limestone pyramid which forms the summit of the greatest mountain mass in Europe had split and fallen. It looks as if several score feet had been taken from the height of the mountain which is given in books of

reference as 15,782 feet. The avalanche was one of the biggest and most destructive known for some time. The rock and ice tumbling from the summit dislodged immense snowfields, which in turn tore out rock, and the great mass went rumbling down the mountains for nearly ten miles. Lobster's Painless Death

A new method of killing and cooking lobster is advocated by Joseph Sinel, an English expert whose method is sponsored by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. He claims that the fish should be placed in cold water, which should be gradually raised to boiling point. His experiments showed that if a lobster is placed in water of 55 degrees Fahrenheit, it will be dead by the time the water is warmed to 80 degrees whereas if plunged into boiling water the lobster will struggle for more than a minute. 

Millionth of a Second.

A chronoscope is employed when experimenting with high power explosives used in guns, which registers the velocity of the projectile at sixteen successive points before it leaves the bore. It is possible with this apparatus to register time to the millionth of a second. In the older experiments, where the velocity did not exceed 1,500 or 1,000 per feet per second this projectile recorded its time by knocking down a series of steel triggers projecting into the bore. But with velocities of several thousstead of dropping, frequently plough ed a groove in the projectile, and this new device became necessary.

A Soldier for Parliament.

Major-General Sir Charles Townshend, who fought the Turks valiantly, but was surrounded and compelled by famine to surrender, has resigned from the British Army, and has entered public life. At the recent bye-election in Wrekin, England, brought about by the death of the member. Charles Palmer. Sir Charles Townshend presented himself as an independent candidate, and won, defeating the Labor date, and won, defeating the Labor candidate by a majority of four thou-

There are many and high precednts for Sir Charles, for many distinruished soldiers and sailors have sat n the British Parliament, and several are there now. A conspicuous case is that of the Duke of Wellington, but he did not have to face an election. His peerage gave him a seat in the House - tords. Four conspicuous leaders in the late war have seats in that House-Earl Haig, Earl Beatty, Viscount Jellicoe and Viscount French. In the Commons there is a group of military and naval men, and Sir Char les proposes joining it.

A few months ago he visited Canada. It was a holiday trip. He saw considerable of the country, and upon leaving he assured Canadians that his visit had been highly educational and most enjoyable.

Sir Charles has been a soldier from youth. He first saw active service in the Soudan in 1884-85, when he was an officer with the Guard's Camel Regiment, and took part in the actions of Abu Klea and Gubat.

He took part in the Dongola Expedition of 1898, and two years later went to South Africa where he served through the Boer War.

After defeating the Turks in two battles in Mesopotomia he advanced to untenable positions and then fell back on Kut-el-Amara. The mistake was not his but his superiors. It was only when his supplies were exhausted that he surrendered. That was the darkest hour of the war in the Middle East. In due time Allenby smashed the Turks and dispelled the gloom.
