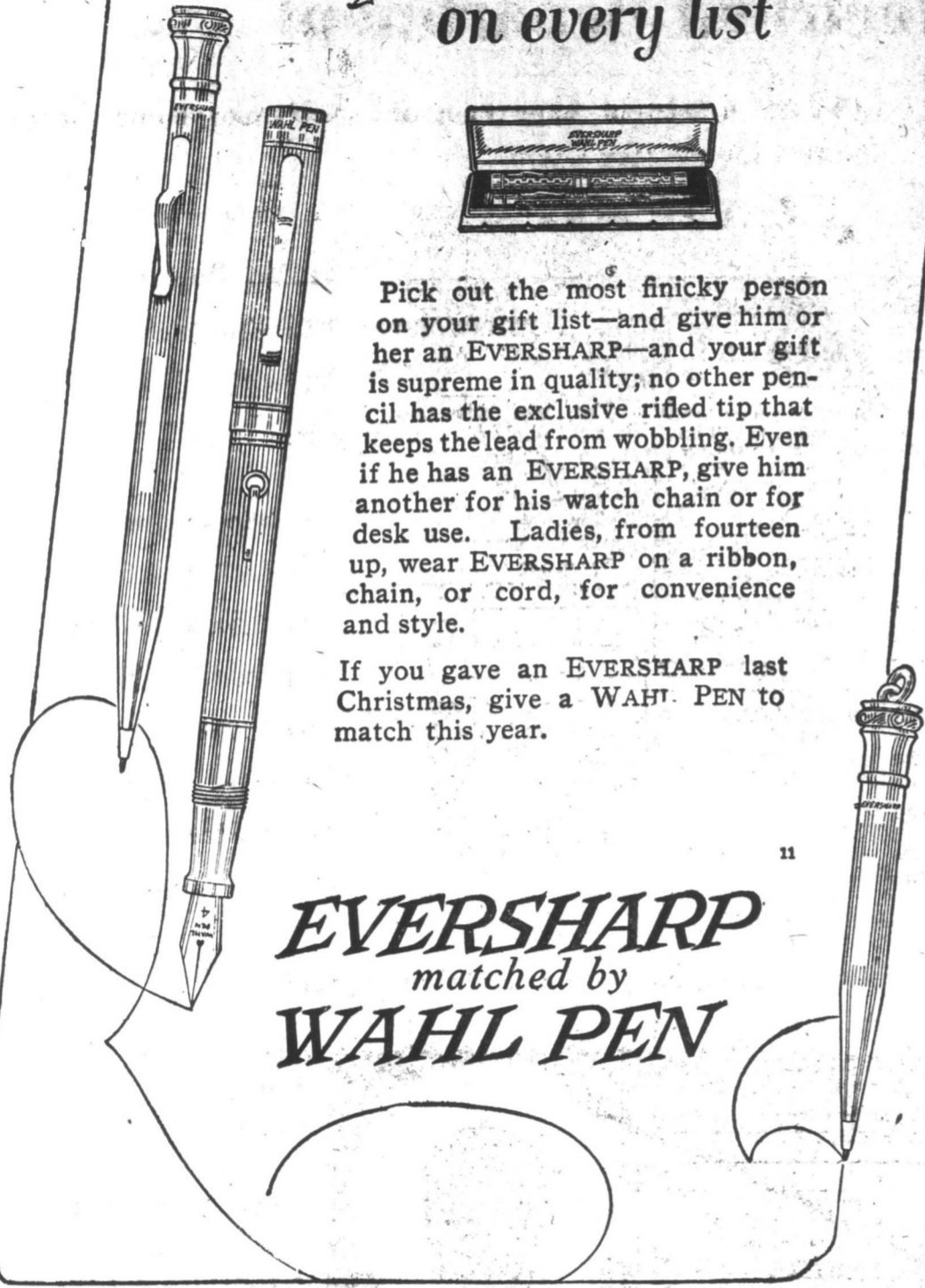

CLAIMS FOR A NEW PROCESS.

A discovery which may be of very great importance to the British coal industry—the conversion of soft coal into liquid oil—was the subject of a lecture delivered to the Mining Society of the University of Birmingham by Dr. F. Bergius, an eminent German research chemist.

The process is simple. To coal under a very high pressure the gas hydrogen is added, and the result is that 80 per cent of liquid oil is obtained. By various modifications of the process it is possible to produce petrol or other kinds of mineral oil.

A process which would enable a large part of the British coal reserves to be transmitted into liquid fuel would secure this country against any risk of a liquid fuel famine and enable it to make its own oil at home.

Hydrogen for such processes is generally obtained by decomposing water (a combination of hydrogen and oxygen) with electricity, and its price will depend on the cost of electric power.

Storms Wreak Havoc On Great Lakes.

Martial Law Proclaimed in Warsaw — Australian Elections May End in Coalition — Straight Talk to Germany by United States Bankers.

MARTIAL LAW IN WARSAW.

WARSAW, Dec. 18. Martial law became effective to-day by proclamation of the Polish Cabinet. Niewadomski, the artist, who assassinated President Narutowicz Saturday has been held for trial by court martial. At a preliminary examination he declared he had acted on his own initiative and had no accomplices. Many other persons are in custody pending a complete investigation of the assassination.

BATTLING WITH WIND AND ICE.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18. Battling foot by foot through towering seas and freezing spray, lake steamers are fighting an epochal battle across the icy wastes of Lake Superior to keep navigation open far beyond the usual time and bring down the last cargo of the year. Already the fight has claimed its toll of lives and before the last ship has been accounted for or lost, the toll may be greater. Navigation closes usually on December first, but this year it was decided to keep the water way open until the fifteenth, because coal and rail strikes had cut down coal shipments to the northwest and delayed

the eastern movement of grain. As a result nine big freighters and 28 million dollars worth of ships and cargo are struggling down Lake Superior towards the graveyard of gallant vessels in Whitefish Bay, trying to win through to Buffalo for winter storage. In Mud Lake, part of St. Mary's River, another big fleet is ice bound, waiting the arrival of nine which left Fort William three days ago, before trying with the assistance of ice breaking tugs to win past the detour to open waters.

23 RESCUED.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Dec. 18. A message by wireless from the tug Gray says that twenty-three of twenty-seven missing passengers and crew of the tug Reliance have been taken aboard the Gray from North Lizard or Rowe Island. Four are still missing.

AUSTRALIAN ELECTION RESULTS.

MELBOURNE, Dec. 18. The allotment of "preference" votes for members of the Federal House of Representatives in last Saturday's general elections shows the Nationalist Party of Premier Hughes, second

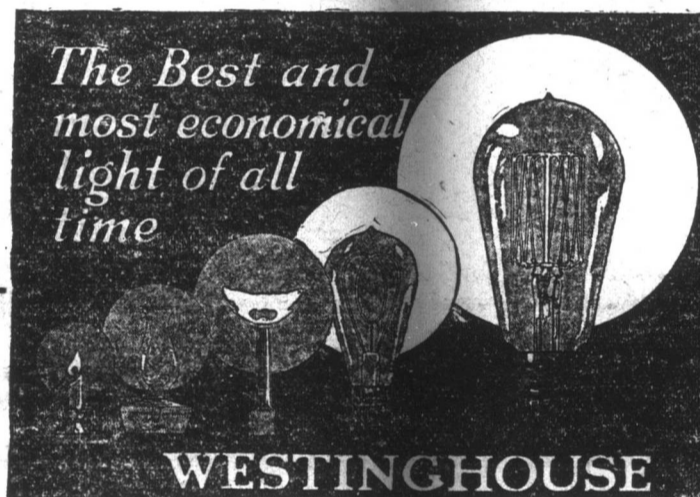

in standing; the Labor Party having won thirty seats, the Nationalists, Liberals seventeen. In the last House the Nationalists had thirty-eight, Labor twenty-four, Country Party and Liberals thirteen. The figures for the Senate are meagre but indicate an increase in the strength of Labor.

U.S. NAVAL APPROPRIATION BILL.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18. The naval appropriation bill, carrying a request of the President for negotiation with foreign powers relative to limiting the construction of war craft under ten thousand tons, passed to-day in the House of Representatives. The bill carried a total of three hundred and twenty-five million dollars, and provides for an enlisted naval force of eighty-six thousand men, the same as fixed last year.

WILL RACE IN 40 FOOT KETCHES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18. The Duke of Lismore arrived on the Baltic to-day to arrange with W. M. Nutting, the details of the trans-Atlantic race in forty-foot ketches or auxiliary sail boats planned for the summer. Discussing the contest the Duke said he would rather the ketches be sailed by one man, but he had acceded to Mr. Nutting's request for nine men in each boat. Mr. Nutting will be accompanied by F. W. Casey, Balwin, the Canadian yachtsman, who was one of his two companions when he crossed the Atlantic in the "Typhoon," a small sail boat, in 1920. The Duke will be accompanied by a servant.

NO LOAN FOR GERMANY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18. J. P. Morgan and Company to-night issued a statement declaring that they had notified the German Ambassador to this country that it was "impossible for us to discuss or consider a loan to Germany unless and until the Reparations questions were settled." The statement was issued, it was learned, to set at rest highly fantastical stories

which have been published regarding the possibility of the flotation of an International Loan to Germany estimated as high as one billion five hundred million dollars.

THE FIRST ACT.

DUBLIN, Dec. 11. The first act by an Irish Parliament for more than a century, which went formally through the Free State Senate to-day, was a highly technical measure

entitled "Adaptation of Enactments Bill."

DEVALERA CAPTURED.

PARIS, Dec. 19. The Herald this morning says reports are current in Paris that Eamonn De Valera has been captured by the Irish Free State authorities.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Dec. 19. Four persons lost their lives when

the tug Reliance was wrecked in a storm on Northern Lake Superior last Wednesday, it was learned tonight. They were swept from the tug's deck while helping to launch the lifeboats.

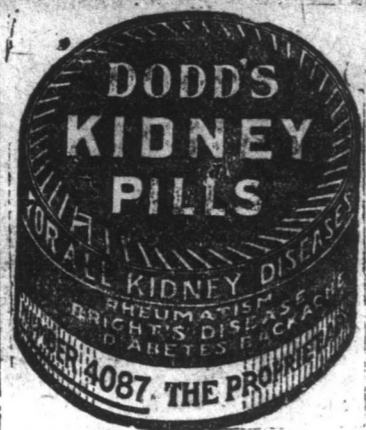

North Sea Herring Catch Declines.
OPINION OF FISHERY BOARD SCIENTIST.

LONDON. (Canadian Press)—The herring catch in the North Sea in 1921 was not up to the ordinary catch, though there was not an actual scarcity, but the herrings were of a very poor quality. An explanation for this is supposed to have been found in the change in the Atlantic currents, which change has been exercising the minds of scientists. This has not yet been established as a definite fact, but it is the belief of some eminent authorities. However, an international enquiry is now being held into the cause of the herring failure, the British Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries being particularly interested in the question. J. Nelson, Scientific Superintendent of the Fishery Board for Scotland,



states that as far as the tides are concerned in the summer of 1920, and again in 1921, there was an abnormal influx of Atlantic water into the North Sea, coming in by way of the Orkney-Shetland passage. "The water," says Mr. Nelson, "is more salt, has a higher temperature, and contains a distinct fauna. One of the

most easily recognized animals is a jelly-fish-like organism called a 'salp.' These are found abundantly in Atlantic water, but never in the true waters of the North Sea." Further Mr. Nelson says: "We know that the herring feeds on small crustacea, and the Atlantic water is found to be very deficient in these crustacea. Thus one can see at once a reason for the very poor quality of the herrings caught last year. Research this past summer as to the position of the Atlantic water showed that it was normal, and there were no signs of it penetrating into the North Sea. This may be correlated with the successful herring fishing of this summer. The herrings were in extremely good condition. It is impossible to say what actually was the cause of this until we have made further investigations. The previous influx of Atlantic water into the North Sea took place as long ago as 1905, so that it will be seen that the investigations are necessarily laborious and extend over a long period of time."

Stamp-Making Mysteries.
DEVICES TO RAFFLE FORGERS.
One of the most delicate and difficult branches of the printing-trade is postage-stamp making.
Many Governments have their own stamp-printing works, but in this country they are produced by private firms under the direction of the Postmaster-General.
The first step is to select the design. In some countries the designs are selected by means of an open competition, but in Britain the subjects are either commissioned from well-known artists or chosen from specimens sent in by the printers.
Three Months Used.
The next thing is to transfer the design to a steel die. This work is seldom carried out by one man, but is divided into three parts, the lettering by another, and the ornamental border by a third. This method is adopted as a precaution against forgery of engravers.
There are three methods of printing stamps—recess plate printing, direct-plate printing, and flat printing from prepared stones. The first process is the most costly, but gives the best results; the second is quick and cheap, and therefore most widely used. Flat printing is an inferior method, and is used only in an emergency, since by this method it is not possible to produce large numbers of stamps at the speed which is necessary.
In recess printing the design is engraved in recess upon a flat piece of steel, which is afterwards hardened. The design is then pressed on to a small roller of soft steel, hydraulic power being used. This roller in its turn is hardened, and used to transfer the design on to the steel plates from which the stamp is actually printed in sheets. This is done by rocking the roller to and fro on the steel plates until the surface is impressed with an exact copy of the design in recess—that is to say, with the design sunk into the plate.
Special Ink.
The plate is then cleaned and polished, and special ink is forced into the grooves by means of a soft pad. The surface is wiped clean so that the ink is left only in the sunken design. A sheet of thick paper which has been dampened is laid upon the plate, and an impression taken under pressure. After leaving the press the sheets of stamps are dried in a hot room, flattened out, and coated with gum. The sheets are then perforated, checked, and counted.
The direct-printing method is very similar, except that the design is engraved in relief instead of recess. The design is transferred to lead, wax, or gutta-percha, which are then coated with copper. When the coating has dried it is removed from the lead or wax, and mounted on an iron plate, from which the stamps are printed.

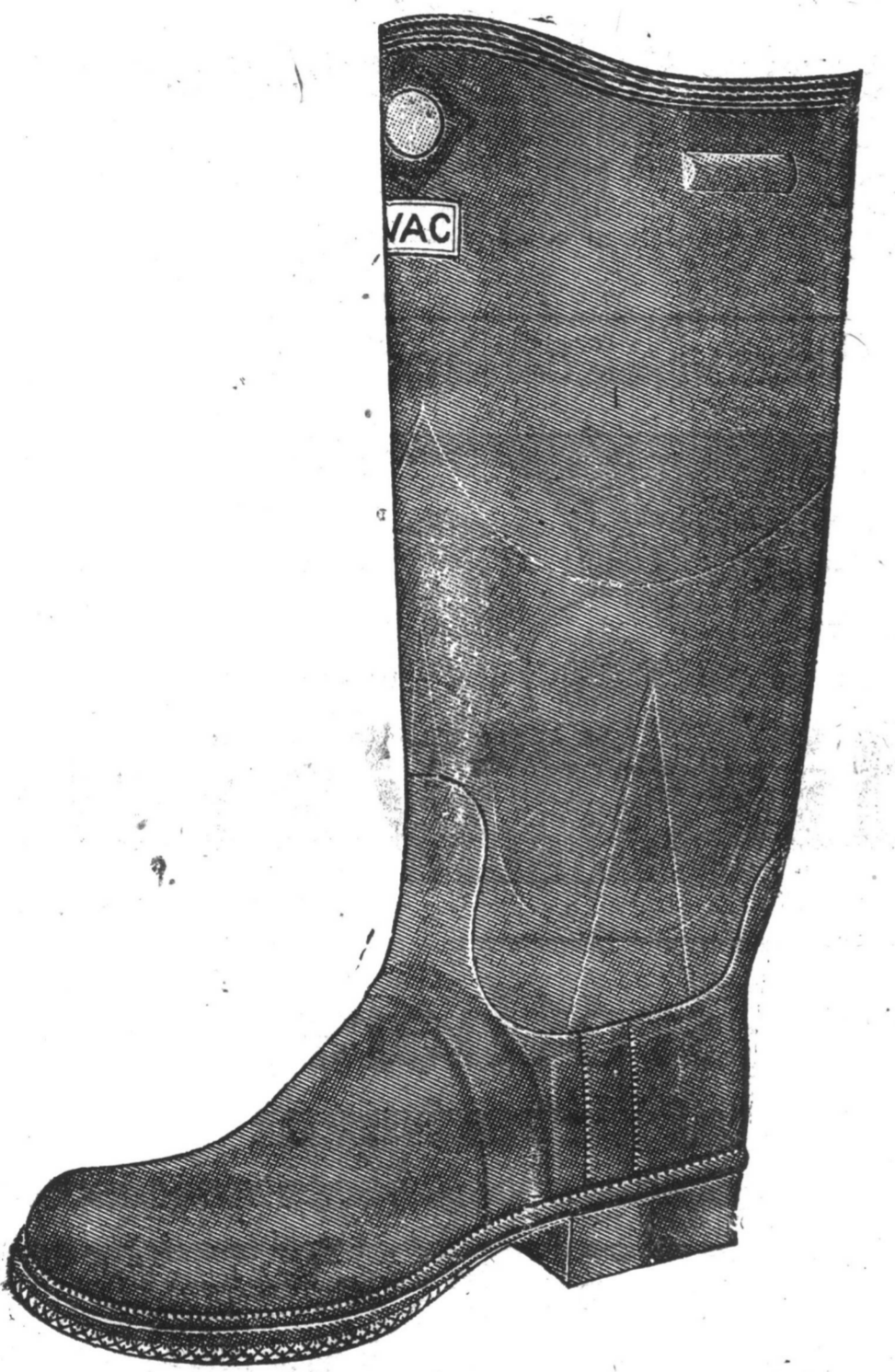

A Plate Cleaning Hint.
"I wish my spoons and forks looked like yours Granlet!" sighed a young relative, examining a shining specimen. "I suppose we do not spend enough time in cleaning them."
Hot Water Necessary.
"Probably you rub them too much," replied Granlet. "The mistake some people make is in trying to clean silver that is greasy. I first of all wash mine in hot soapuds; the water cannot be too hot. Then I dry it thoroughly. After that, I rub the plate powder on dry. This is most important. Some people have a smeary mess in a saucer which they rub on the silver. It will never look well if cleaned in that way. I rub the powder off again with a chamole leather and finish off with a hartshorn cloth."
Granlet held up a piece of white stockinette material.
"This is the top of an old cotton stocking. I boiled it for seven or eight minutes in a pint of milk to which one pound of powdered hartshorn had been added. These qualities were sufficient for several cloths. I dried them and use them for the final polishing of my silver."
The Best Way.
Some people apply liquid ammonia similarly, soaking the cloths in it, and when dry using them as polishers. But Granlet insists that her way is the best and certainly no silver that I know is as bright as hers.

Cave Treasures.

STOREHOUSES OF ANCIENT HISTORY.

The discoveries made in the newly-found caves at Koster, in the Transvaal, shed a fresh light upon a race which inhabited that part of the earth at a period so remote as to be almost beyond our conception. They offer one more instance of the immense value to modern man of caverns as storehouses of antiquity. It is very largely from the study of relics found in English caves that scientists have been able to build up the past history of the inhabitants of our own country. The most famous of these caves are Kent's Hole, just outside Torquay, and Brixham Hole. In the former a layer of stalagmite one to three feet thick has perfectly preserved a most amazing collection of relics of our long-vanished ancestors. Here are bone implements mingled with the remains of an extraordinary variety of animals, which include the cave bear, cave tiger, the mammoth, woolly rhinoceros, urus, bison, the giant Irish elk, and the reindeer.

Wookey Hole.

In the Cheddar caves, especially Wookey Hole, amazing quantities of the bones of similar animals are found, and with them all sorts of relics of men of the Stone Age. We learn, for instance, that these people of 10,000 years ago kept dogs. From flint scrapers we can tell that they were great hunters, and that they were acquainted with the use of fire. From human bones found we can even form a fair idea of their size, height, and general appearance.

In the caves of Italy bones of the cave bear have been found mixed with pieces of pottery, proving that man of that early age was a good deal more civilized than had previously been imagined.

At Chabou.

Still more startling discoveries were made in Belgian caves at Chabou, where axes of nephrite were discovered. Now nephrite is found only in Asia, and the only logical conclusion is that prehistoric man traded quite widely. In these caves were found also fragments of elephant ivory, shells from Champagne, and pieces of fluorine from Devonian limestone. The French caves of Gourdan, and caves near Schaffhausen, in Switzerland, have yielded numerous drawings cut on bone or horn, and some of these of really startling merit from an artistic point of view. There are sketches of the reindeer, the horse, the ox, the sheep, and even of the mammoth. Earrings, neck ornaments, head-dresses made of perforated shells, and scores of other objects in an almost perfect state of preservation have been found in these caves.

All over the world, wherever a limestone formation exists, are miles of subterranean caverns, waiting only for exploration to yield their treasures of antiquity, and to teach us how man lived and died in earth's earliest ages.

National United System.

OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir.—In a letter to the "Daily
News" a short time ago, "Parent" re-
ferred to an important decision taken
in England on the subject of denomi-
national schools, of which he had
read in the Educational Supplement
of the London Times. He has kindly
lent me, through the Editor of the
News, the supplement referred to,
and I find that the article in it con-
tains information which everyone, and
especially every member of the Church
of England, in this Colony ought to
have, and which therefore I propose
to pass on. The article is rather too
long to ask you, Sir, to print, so I
shall endeavor to condense it.

There are in England, it says, about
21,000 elementary schools. A great
many of these are public undenomina-
tional schools supported and run by
the Government; but about 10,000 are
provided and run by the Church of
England, with the assistance of gov-
ernment grants; in other words, they
are something like our Newfoundland
schools. People in England are now
beginning to feel, as many of us do
here, that this is a wasteful and in-
efficient system in these hard times,
and second, that public schools ought
not to be classified on religious lines.
The Rt. Hon. H. A. L. Fisher, late
Minister of Education in England, put
forward some proposals a year or
two ago; and, as a result, apparently,
of this, the National Assembly of the
Church of England appointed, in July
1921, an education committee to con-
sider the position. This Education
Committee presented their report in
February 1922. The substance of their
report, according to the Times' ar-
ticle, is as follows:

1. They consider the law should
provide that in every school religious
instruction according to the views of
the various denominations be given
regularly in school hours by the teach-
ers of those denominations trained
and qualified to give it; all denomina-
tions to be on equal footing; and the
teachers to receive training in giving
religious instruction. No one to be
compelled to receive religious instruc-
tion against his conscience; and provi-
sion to be made for pupils to receive
religious instruction outside the school
if necessary. Local and central re-
ligious committees to be appointed to
see that these arrangements are
properly carried out.

2. Subject to these conditions, the
Committee consider that a national
united system of elementary schools
might with advantage take the place
of the present system. (That is to
say, the Church schools.)

3. Any school to stand out of this
scheme if it likes, but if it does it will
no longer receive any support from
the Government. And now, mark this.
The Times says:—

"The National Assembly received
the report, and passed without op-
position a resolution that the Nation-
al Assembly of the Church of Eng-
land would support a settlement of
the problem of religious education
upon the terms outlined," and to-
wards the end of its article it says,
in the words already quoted by "Par-
ent" in the Daily News:—

"The Church of England has thus
officially proclaimed its readiness to
accept a settlement on the lines of
Mr. Fisher's proposals. Those pro-
posals are essentially proposals for
a real educational peace. They pre-
suppose that the scheme outlined
would be an agreed scheme on the
basis of true religious equality, and
that all concerned, Boards of Educa-
tion, authorities, teachers, voluntary
school supporters, and others interest-
ed in educational administration
would work together without ulterior
motives, and with no desire to over-
ride the one the other. If these aims
can be secured, then the State and all
the religious bodies, without petty jeal-
ousies, without mutual fears and sus-
picious, may work heartily side by
side in the great cause of National
Education."

It seems to me, Sir, that this should
go far towards clearing the way for
educational reform in Newfoundland.
The Methodist and Presbyterian churches
here are, it is understood, definitely
in favor of United Schools, and a
strong party of Church of Eng-
land people are of the same opinion.
In view of the clear official declara-
tion of policy in England, it does
not seem that opposition here can no
longer be justified. If the great Church
of England in England, has given its
decision, it is hard to see how a tiny
outpost of it in Newfoundland, can
be justified on theoretical grounds at
any rate, in taking an opposite course.

However, in order to get united
schools, all of us, of all denomina-
tions, must push hard, each in his
own locality. The poorness of our
educational system in this Colony is
a great handicap in life to our young
people. The only way to improve it
is to get together. Can we not do
this?

Cannot such powerful and influen-
tial bodies as the Fishermen's Union,
the Loyal Orange Association, the
Society of United Fishermen, take up
and discuss this question in their
Local and give public opinion upon the
subject of United Education a chance
to express itself? I believe if they did
they would be doing a great service
to Newfoundland. The better edu-
cated our people are, the better they
will be able to get along in the hard

Repairs to Canadian Seigneur.

BIG JOB FOR DOCK HANDS.

Quite a number of men are employ-
ed at the dry dock at present, ef-
fecting repairs to the steamer Cana-
dian Seigneur. The job, which is the
biggest that has been handled at the
dock this year will take another two
weeks before the work is completed.
The mechanics employed are at pre-
sent removing the old stern frame.
The propeller had been previously un-
shipped, and the main shaft pulled in-
to the tunnel. The new frame is being
adjusted preparatory to being placed
in position, and when this has been
done the new rudder will be shipped.
The repairs will cost many thousands
of dollars, and the expenditure of this
sum will no doubt be greatly welcom-

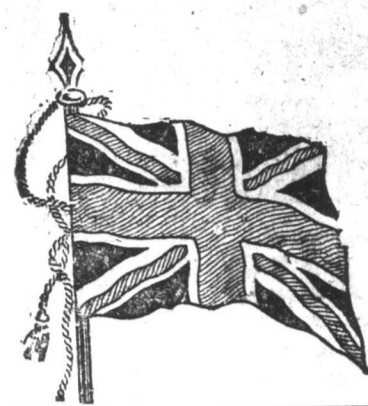

**Public Meeting
at Bonavista.**

**RECOMMENDS REMOVAL OF SUR
TAX, SUPER TAX, AND SALES
TAX.**

On last Thursday evening (Dec. 14) a public meeting of citizens of Bonavista was held in the Court House, to consider the subject of taxation. The meeting was called by Magistrate Rowell, and a large number attended. A communication from Hon. Dr. Mosdell, Member of the Tariff Commission, which was read, asked for suggestions and recommendations as to how the tariff should be rearranged so as to bear equally upon all. It was pointed out by one of the speakers that the Colony's debt had been piled up to a total close on \$56,000,000 and interest on this amount had to be found. It was also pointed out that many of the fishermen's commodities were on the free list. (7) The suggestion was made that the duties be removed from the necessities of life. The discussion eventually turned to the questions: Are the Powers that are exacting unjust taxes from the people? Is the revenue, that is necessary for the maintenance of our Civil Service more than is necessary for its legitimate purposes? If the Revenue suffers on the same ratio, what part of the taxpayers are to bear the extra burden?

The more the matter was sifted and discussed and investigated, the more intricate and difficult did the problem appear. Finally the meeting resolved to recommend the removal of the surtax, the super tax, and the sales tax, but made no suggestion as to how the 25% reduction was to be made up. The motion was carried and ordered to be forwarded to the Royal Commission.

SOME SUGGESTIONS.
During the discussions one person present requested that he might read a few suggestions. Permission being granted, he read as follows:—

"That whereas the Commission appointed by the Government to enquire into and if possible find out ways and means to alleviate the burden of taxation resting upon the people of this Colony, and whereas the income from the taxation of our necessities of life is the greater source from which the Colony derives its revenue, and whereas the Civil Service in all its ramifications from the Governor to the Civil Servant in the remotest hamlet, our educational system including colleges and boarding schools, and public institutions, Soldiers Penitents, the Poor Relief, Old Age Pensions, roads and bridges, lighthouses and other public works, have to be provided for from the said revenue, we the inhabitants of Bonavista, having been requested to help the Commission by an expression of opinion and having weighed the pros and cons of the serious problem to the best of our ability, humbly suggest:—

1. That the axe be laid to the root of the tree and wherein money can be saved by the blending of one or more Government offices, where the duties of such offices do not exceed the ability of such civil servants to perform them, and such changes be made after due notice.
2. That no civil servant be pensioned who is mentally or physically fit to perform the function of his office.
3. That for a period of five years at least, no gigantic schemes involving heavy financial outlay be undertaken, if such enterprises will entail increased taxation, except such enterprises as are already launched and well under way.
4. That for a period of at least five years every citizen of twenty-one years and upwards, be obliged to render two days' service annually upon the public roads or engage a substitute to do such work for him and so save the road grant except in the case of Government wharves and bridges.

Schr. Eisnor Overdue.

LEFT RED ISLAND TWO WEEKS AGO.

The arrival in port of the schr. A. G. Eisnor, owned by Crosbie & Co is anxiously looked forward to, as the vessel is now two weeks out from Red Island, Placentia Bay. The Eisnor had on board about 2,200 quintals of fish and left Red Island on Dec. 4, bound to this port. No report of the vessel has been received. The weather since has been very stormy, and there is a possibility the vessel has been driven to sea, although on the night after leaving the Placentia Bay port, the wind was in from the South East. The Eisnor is in charge of Capt. John Doody, and has a crew of six all told, all belonging to Carbonear.

Arson Enquiry.

WITNESSES EXAMINED.
The preliminary enquiry into the Basha arson case was resumed yesterday afternoon before Judge Morrin. The case for the crown is being conducted by Deputy Minister Summers. Mr. W. J. Higgins, K.C., is engaged for the accused. The case for the prosecution concluded after the evidence of Constable Walsh, Supt. O'Neill, A. McNamara, Capt. Kean, and Detective Lee had been taken.

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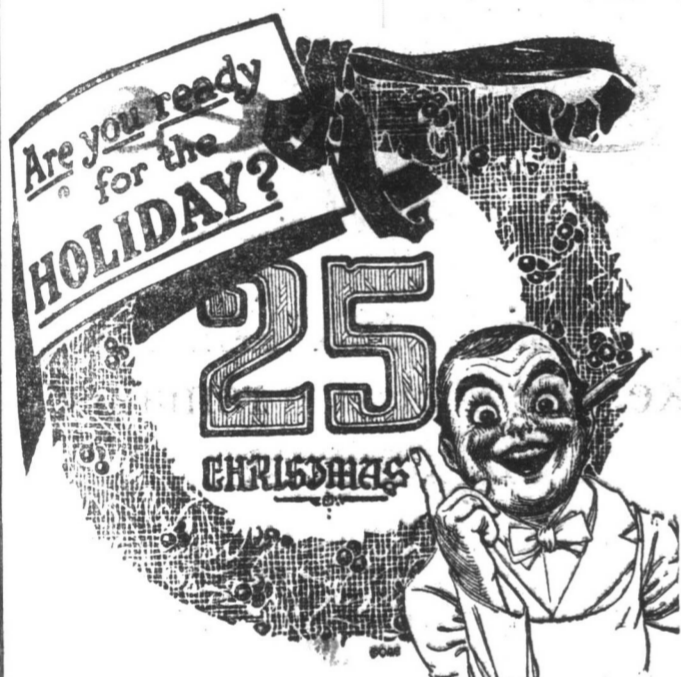

A "Dying" Star.

How many readers know the name of our next-door neighbour among the stars?

It is called Proxima Centauri, and it moves round another star, Alpha Centauri, which, up to a few years ago, was supposed to be the nearest star to us. Proxima takes over a million years to travel round Alpha Centauri, and it is about 94 billion miles from the earth.

For our nearest neighbour, Proxima is not a very grand object. If our sun were as far away it would give 10,000 times as much light as Proxima does. Probably the star is nearing the close of its long career, and this conjecture seems to be supported by the fact that it is a red star, for stars of that colour have long been suspected of being in their dying throes.

Proxima, it should be explained, belongs to the Southern Hemisphere, and cannot be seen in this country.

An interesting fact in connection with this "near" neighbour of ours is that, if it were possible for a fast aeroplane to pay it a neighbourly call—a real flying visit—the machine would arrive there only after a lapse of 24 million years.

Whether by that time Proxima would be there to be called upon by the enterprising aviator is, doubtful. Likely as not, its geocentric light would grow dimmer and dimmer with age as the adventurous airman winged his way through space, until it became so dim as to be difficult to find at all.

Stories From The Editor's Room.

It is seldom that the secrets of the editor's room are revealed to the public, and perhaps that is a wise dispensation of Providence for the mutual benefit of all concerned.

A writer in 'Cornhill' raised the curtain, and enabled the curious to have

a peep behind the scenes. Charles Cooper, a famous editor of the 'Scotsman,' tells, in his autobiography, a story of how a leader-writer (who, it has been suggested, was James Hannay), being pressed by the printer's devil for a leading article and having allowed the time to go by in which he could construct one of his own, too the scissors, cut out a "leader" from the day's 'Times,' pasted it

on a sheet of paper, and writing on it the headline, "What Does the 'Times' Mean by This?" sent the whole article as his contribution to the leading columns of his own journal!

It was printed as a "leader" exactly as he sent it in—simply an article from the 'Times' headed by the query, "What Does the 'Times' Mean by This?"

The late Dr. Robert Wallace, M.P.,

who edited the 'Scotsman' before Mr. Cooper, was asked early in his career by the editor of a local newspaper in the North of Scotland if he would kindly furnish an article on a light theological topic.

Wallace responded with one bearing the title, "The Relations Between the Presbyterian Churches and Modern Thought." When set up the article made forty columns, and it became a puzzle to editor and printer how to get rid of it.

Salmonier Notes.

At your pleasure, Mr. Editor, would you give space in the columns of your daily to a few items of interest from this little settlement, away back in St. Mary's Bay.

With every indication, grim winter has suddenly visited us fully equipped to remain awhile, but only an unwilling reception will he receive.

Many of our schooners have not arrived from St. John's, while others recently reached home after battling with hard winds and weather. Our fishery was practically a failure from many points of realization. Even those schooners and crews who were

favoured with a goodly share of the product, fully prove by the value received that fishing has become an insolent industry. It offers no encouragement, especially to our younger men, who are disgusted with their natural avocation, and many of them are leaving to seek a livelihood of independence elsewhere.

A number of providers of families have engaged in the cutting of pitprops, which is the only and most struggling means of keeping the wolf at bay. Not even a shadow of independence can fishermen ever hope for, until they receive higher value for the fruits of their toil, and prices of living go lower. But with the optimism and hopeful spirit natural to fisherfolk, a more normal standard is looked forward to.

Notwithstanding this depression, our parish and school work is steadily improving, under the guidance and supervision of our zealous pastor, Rev. J. Enright. Deeply interested and considerate of the needs of his people, he has opened a new school at the head of Salmonier. The building was completed a short while ago, through the cooperation and free labour of the people, and when it was formerly opened on Dec. 5th by Fr. Enright, giving a Xmas mission there, and naming the school St. Catherine's, they felt repaid for their bit of tree work and goodwill. Through the thoughtful suggestion of the Father, to distinguish this growing little village from the many "heads" so common around the Island, he, with the pleasure of the people, has named it "St. Catherine's." He then gave a

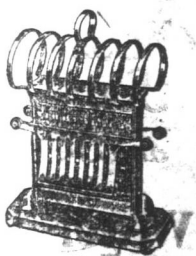

"Daily Mail" Egg-Laying Test.

1,000 EGGS IN YEAR FROM EIGHT HENS.

The first year of The Daily Mail Two Years' International Laying Test for fowls, in which 1,500 birds in pens of eight birds each are taking part on the Great Eastern Railway Company's farm at Bentley, near Ipswich, has closed. The winners of the £1,000 in prizes offered by this journal for the pens making the best performance in the year are as follows, eggs under the standard weight not being included in the test scores given.

Average 194 Eggs per Bird.

The main outstanding feature of the test is the high average of production over so large a number of birds. During the year 289,822 eggs were laid, an average of roughly 194 per bird, a figure arrived at after making allowance from time to time as became necessary owing to the death of birds. This is believed to be a test record for this country.

There were very high pen averages as well as high individual records. The most prolific pen was Messrs. A. Lathom and Son's 8 White Wyandottes, which laid 1,937 eggs, with an average of 242 per bird; but of these 120 eggs were under the standard. One bird in this pen died in the 12th month.

The leading individual bird records were one each of Messrs. Balnes and Ashton's and Mr. F. Harvey's White Wyandottes with 299 eggs, and a Rhode Island Red owned by Miss Kitchin with 298 eggs.

The first-prize pen of White Wyandottes had a very high average of first-grade eggs, only 24 being under weight. This breed has done remarkably well in showing in the test having done far to overcome the popular prejudice against it on account of the smallness of its eggs.

A Paper Book-Cover.

It is a good thing when a friend lends one a book to provide it with a paper cover which will prevent it from being soiled. The usual way of making a cover is to tuck roughly the paper under the "boards" of the book, with the result that it is constantly slipping off when the book is handled.

To make a cover successfully lay the book on a piece of thin brown paper, and open the front cover of the book. Cut the paper, allowing about 2in. on all edges for "turning in." This margin may be more or less, according to the size of the book. With the scissors remove a U-shaped piece from the centre of the top and bottom ends of the paper, carrying the scissors to within a quarter of an inch can be slit down at each side and the paper projecting above the edges can then be tucked into the hollow at the back of the book. It is worth doing so, as the top and bottom of the back of a book generally become shabby first.

Turn the top and bottom edges of the paper over the boards and then fold down the lengthwise edge of the paper. Crease a triangular piece of the paper across at the corners, and then, after opening this triangular piece, push each corner inside between the lengthwise edge of the paper cover and the outside of the book.

Two Dyes in One.

BRITISH CHEMISTS' DISCOVERY. Material made of a mixture either of silk and cotton or silk and linen can be dyed two colours in a single dye-bath. This was the statement made recently at a joint meeting at Manchester University of the Society of Dyers and Colourists and the Society of the Chemical Industry by Professor A. G. Green and Mr. Kenneth Saunders, the discoverers of a new class of dyestuffs known as ionamines.

By using a dye-bath containing a mixture of an ionamine with a direct cotton dye the various shades, silk and cotton, of the material would each select its appropriate dyestuff, and by this means two colour effects might be produced. A lecture was illustrated by experiments and an exhibition of jumpers and hosiery materials dyed in a variety of shades.

SIDE TALKS.

MOST IMPORTANT IN MARRIAGE.

If you had to name some single quality as most indispensable in man or woman as a foundation for a happy marriage, what one would you name?
It would not take me long to pick it out.

Of course unselfishness is a great help. And a sense of humor. And a sense of proportion. All these I have recommended in other days. And all are great helps in the art of how to be happy though married. But there is another quality even more necessary. If one has an indefinite supply of it, one may get along without the others. And if one has it not, the others are not enough.

A Mental Sense of Touch.
What is tact? The first definition in the dictionary is "a sense of touch." It comes from the Latin "tactus." The second definition is "sensitive mental touch."

A person who has tact has a sort of mental antennae with which he feels other people's states of mind. He or she (more generally she because he seldom cares so much about other people's feelings, and you have to care to be able to develop this quality in its higher degree) knows what other people like to talk about. She knows instantly when people

are bored. She is immediately conscious of any tension in the atmosphere if the wrong people have been brought together or some unwelcome subject has been introduced.

She knows when people are nervous and edgy and want to be left alone. She has a fine sense of the right time to approach difficult subjects and when to draw back.

She knows exactly what things people like best to be complimented upon. She understands human emotions and how to handle them to any given end.

Wish More People knew.

She knows when people are refusing another helping for politeness and when they really don't want one. Two other ways of expressing what tact means, are "sympathetic imagination" and the ability to put yourself in his place.

I said above that tact was more important for a happy marriage. (especially on the woman's part) than unselfishness or a sense of proportion or a sense of humor. I wonder if tact does not include those three qualities. For one must have a sense of humor and a sense of proportion to be able to enter into the hearts and minds of others. And to have true tact one must not only understand other people's feelings but must be tender to them, and what is that but unselfishness?

Boy Emperor and Bride to Make World Tour.

GROWN WEARY OF CONFINEMENT

PEKING—The picturesque and complicated wedding ceremonies over, Hsuan Tung, the 17 year old Emperor of China, and his bride, the Princess Kue Chia Si, two years his junior, are counting eagerly the days before they may set forth to see the world. Although an emperor only in name since the revolution which made China a republic and caused him to abdicate the Imperial throne, young Hsuan has been forced to observe the strictest ritual and to spend his life within the Forbidden City, outside Peking, a walled enclosure consisting of less than half a square mile. The young emperor has grown weary of his confinement. Only three times has he been allowed to leave the Forbidden City, on each occasion for the purpose of attending a funeral or memorial service. He is of the student type, and in spite of his disadvantages has learned many things of the outside world from his tutors, some of whom are English. Not long ago he had his queue removed, thus cutting away from the Manchurian tradition. Occasionally he wears European clothes and several times he has pleaded with his court to buy him an automobile. There are rumors that the young emperor sometimes evades his attendants and secretly ventures outside the Forbidden City and glimpses Peking from a closed car owned by a sympathetic friend. It is known that Hsuan is becoming "fed up" with his present routine and that he yearns to see something of the outside world, especially the British Isles, Canada and the United States, of which he has read much. The boy monarch apparently has no desire to return to power in China. He was only seven years old when, as the choice of the famous old dowager Empress Lung Yu, he was placed on the throne. He had no opportunity of tasting power. The revolution came a few years later and he was obliged to resign the government before he scarcely knew what the action meant. He retains the throne and title with the consent of the Republic Government. He still holds the respect of the Chinese people and the terms of the abdication are such that a fairly pleasant future is before him, if he is able to hold his own activities.

TRADITION RULES AT COURT.

The trouble is that the young emperor has so many retainers and courtiers that his attempts to break away from tradition are thwarted continually. Even his design to tour the world may be interfered with because there are influential courtiers with in the Forbidden City who realize that with the emperor journeying in foreign lands they must join the ranks of the unemployed. Hundreds of people earn a livelihood within the Forbidden City, hemmed in by the quiet old moat, and they are on the payroll merely because the emperor lives there. Naturally they do not favor progressive ideas for the emperor and from upon his departure would probably be forced to eliminate many of the luxuries

which his advisers consider it necessary to order to maintain the dignity of the imperial station. The young empress too is eager to travel. She has been instructed in the English language by a young Philadelphia woman and speaks English fluently. Now that the imperial household contains two ardent advocates of the plan to see something of the world, it is believed that the job holders of the Forbidden City will have more to worry about than ever.

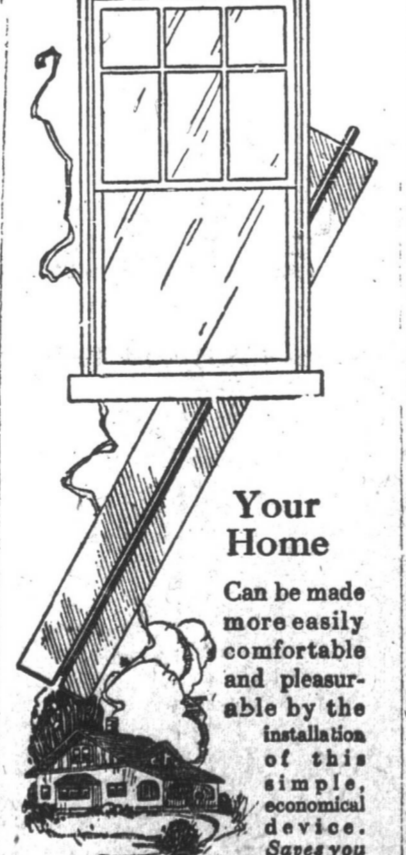

"Prophetic" Dreams.

THE TRUTH ABOUT THEM.
By A Physician.

Certain individuals seem to have, especially developed, the peculiar gift of dreaming a true account of future events more frequently than can be accounted for by coincidence, thus leading their associates to invest them with super-natural powers, and to declare that "there must be something in it".

This seemingly prophetic attribute of dreams led, in the past, to much superstition and conjecture, but the mental mechanism of the production stood and their prophetic nature can no longer be believed in.

The great majority of dreams are the mental safety-valve through which the mind gets rid of unpleasant ideas.

During the waking hours many unpleasant thoughts pass through the mind and are banished, after a longer or shorter stay, to the oblivion of the forgotten or, to use more psychological language, to "the unconscious."

It is a natural attribute of the healthy mind, so to rid itself of the distasteful, and a mind incapable of this would very quickly become insane through the constant presence of disquieting memories in the forefront of consciousness.

A very large proportion of our unpleasant feelings result from frustrated wishes, and so, if we could take stock of our unconscious minds, we would find there a large accumulation of "unsatisfied conations" or, in other words, desires which we find it impossible to gratify.

During sleep, when the mind is not fettered by the power of will or reason, these stored-away desires come to the surface, as it were, and appear as part of a dream.

Very strong desires, if brooded over and subsequently repressed, are so unpleasant that even during sleep the mind will not suffer them to appear unchanged, but distorts them so that when they arise in a dream form they are unrecognisable even to ourselves.

The dreams built up simply strike us as incomprehensible and silly, and seldom, if ever, stimulate prophecies. We seldom dream, for instance, that we have supplanted a rival in love, reached the height of our profession, or made a huge fortune in our business.

Should, however, the original wish have been hardly noticeable, as when a momentary desire to profit slashes through our minds as we accidentally catch sight of the name of a horse in the betting news, or of a country in the financial reports, then it is extremely likely that the name of the horse or the company will appear in a subsequent dream.

If that particular horse wins or the shares rise, then our dream will be remembered with reinforced vividness and be forever fixed in our memory as a prophecy; on the other hand, we are so accustomed to our dreams bearing no relation to the truth that a false forecast makes no corresponding impression.

Collier's "Clytemnestra" Banned.

The Hon. John Collier, the artist, is rather puzzled by the opposition in Blackpool, Lancashire, to the proposal to buy his picture "Clytemnestra" for Blackpool Art Gallery. The purchase is opposed on the ground that the canvas might have had moral effect on the community. Clytemnestra, the daughter of a Spartan king is seen in the painting emerging from the chamber in which she has murdered Agamemnon, her husband. She carries a blood-stained dagger. The proposal to buy the picture was referred to its General Purpose Committee by the Blackpool Town Council. The news came as a surprise to Mr. Collier told a Daily Mail reporter. "Blackpool Art Gallery Committee had recommended the purchase to the Town Council, and through an agent the price of £200 had been agreed.

"So far as I can gather the agitation began with a letter to the local Press in which the writer expressed the opinion that the topic was immoral. If such an argument were generally accepted it would rule out all tragedy portrayed in art. It is rather a novel doctrine if art is to depict only virtuous people."

Care of Gloves.

It is a good plan to keep a small piece of indiarubber in the glove-box, as slight marks can easily be removed with it, and the cleaner's bill reduced. Do not take off your gloves by pulling the fingers, but gently by the finger-tips, and withdraw the gloves from the wrist, over the hand. Blow into them, and then straighten out. Cotton gloves should be washed in the usual way with a few drops of ammonia added to the last water, and dried in the open air. They are much improved by being ironed over a clean handkerchief, after being pulled into shape, and laid quite flat.

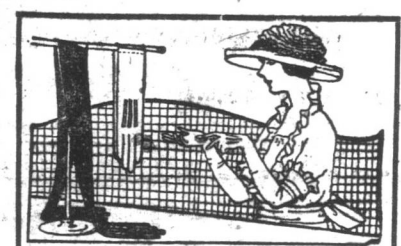
