Redistribution of the Public Debt.

MR. CARTWRIGHT'S SPECH.

The Finance Minister was followed by Mr. Cartwright, who, in a speech distinguished by mast careful proparation and would have deceived the devil."

MR. CARIWHORT'S SEECH.

The Finance Minister was followed by Mr. Cartwright, who, in a speech distinguished by nost centur proporation and great ability, hend the attention of the House uninterruptedly while he reviewed the whole financial position of the Dominton. He complained that matters of a so much gravity second be left to be discussed at the Ingent of the session, and warned the Finance Minister that he might find he had taken lar too sanguine a view of the stration. He believed the banking policy of the Government was hiely very greatly to complicate difficulties. He suggested that they should proceed to consider, first, whether the probable resources of the country had been fairly stated, and second, whether the special policy of the Government was not likely to complicate the possible mischief. He pointed out that adding to our present debt the sum it was already decided to raise during the next few years for great public works, our debt would soon be one hundred and sixty millions of dollars; and whereas in England they pay 3 per cent., the burden would be equal to a debt of five hundred millions of pounds sterling on the people of Great Bittain. We should soon, therefore, be little better off so far as the national debt was concerned than the mother country. At the best, so studien an increase of debt was a very risky policy. He next referred to the fitful periodical expansions of trade, and showed how, while in the five years ending 1854 the imports had increased three hundred and thirty per cent., from 1856 to 1864 they were about stationary, or had in fact slightly decreased. Again, they had been nearly stationary from 1867 to 1850, but had ingreased in the next two years from ninety-four millions to one hundred and eleven millions. This proved the truth of the recuperative power of the country, but it also showed that the sudden expansions of trade were a very unreliable rasis to rest a permanently increased expenditure upon. Again, it was unwise-to-rely on a

Again, it was unwise-to rely on any great accession to our resources from the new and smaller Provinces. For some time they could be expected to return but littie except a bill of expenses, and it would be most unwise to stunt their development by a parsimonious policy. The burdent must therefore in the main be borne by the four older Provinces. The revenue at present, omitting the receipts of the debts, which were little more than so many cross entires, he found made a total of about eighteen millions, from which, after deducting a loss on the post office and the cost of collection, remained about sixteen and a half millions, of dellars. A small income, indeed, against a debt that would soon reach one hundred and sixty millions of dollars.
