BERLIN, Feb. 13.-Adhesions of the Centre definitely. The anumber of districts where former deputies achieve to the Triennate the Catholic vote is becoming divided. Many candidates are trying to avoid pledging themselves definitely. The attitude of the party on the whole promises an ultimate submission to the instructions of the Vatican. There will probably be returned to the Reichstag as many Catholics as there were in the last House, but they will be divided, a large

The Progres iste are losing heart, and admit the triumph of the Government. It is now estimated that they will lose twenty seats to the Conservatives. The Socialists maintain an unbroken front and hold their own. The prospect is that there will be slight gains for the Government candidates in the six Berlin circles. It is reported that Prince Bismarck is not inclined to favor the Emperor's issuing an electoral manifesto, trusting that success is assured without the Emperor being pledged to assurances of peace or threatenings of war.

Boulanger assumed charge of the French War Office not a day has passed without measures being taken to augment the offensive strength of the French army The patriotic attitude of the French Chamber of Deputies and the French press toward the credits Boulanger considers necessary ought to cover with shame the Progress ist and Catholic parties in Germany which, when the glorious creator of German unity declares that the sacrifice he asks from the nation has no other aim than peace, refuse him the necessary means to defend the frontiers of the Fatherland.

In 1878 Mr. Paterson said that a high duty on eigars transferred a large number of workmen from Germany to Canada and the result was no addition to price of cigars. He said that the duty on woollens only touched the pockets of rich men who wore broadcloth, that whereas before 1879 the Americans flooded Canada with machines whole or in parts, we now made those machines wholly at home and made them cheaper and better. This he explained was the result of a division of labor, each manufacturer now taking a special line and so economizing. He dealt at length with the sugar question and proved that it was now cheaper and purer than under the old tariff, while tea and coffee now were free. He concluded by declaring that while Mr. Blake saw nothing in the Northwest but the blackness of darkness, the present Government had bound all that region to the Dopiniou by a railway which was developing the vast resources of our country and gave the promise of illimitable progress and prosperity.
