"and this is the best possible thingto do it." The effect of the strake on vacant land is equalised. There is no doubt that the throwing out of work of 2000 men will not be a good thing for realestate, says a member of a land company. TREATING THE COUNTRY'S CURSE

Mr. Juctice MacMahon and a jury were occupied yesterday in hearing the evidence in a somewhat interesting action brought by Caroline Emma Stagdill against James Dug-gan, both of whom reside near Lloydtown Caroline Emma Stagdill against James Duggan, both of whom reside near Lloydtown P.O., in King township, where the defendant keeps a hotel. The plaintiff, who is a widow, appeared in the court in deep mourning. According to her statement her son, Seymour Henry Seymour, came to his death through cold and exposure consequent upon excessive drinking in the defendant's establishment on the night of Feb. 22 last. The plaintiff as the legal representative of the deceased claimed \$1000. The counsel for the plaintiff, Mr. C. H. Ritchie, in his address to the jury took occasion to denounce the practice of tavern drinking and particularly of the treating system.

"The curse of the country," said Mr. Ritchie "is the treating system, and where is its home but in the tavern?"

In addressing the jury His Lordship read that portion of the act relating to the supplying of liquor by tavern-keepers to men who has drunk to excess of intoxicating liquor of any kind is sold to any person, who has drunk to excess of intoxication, the keeper of such tavern, etc., or any place where intoxication has come to his, death by suicide, drowning, perishing by cold or other accident caused by intoxication, the keeper of such tavern, etc., shall be liable, and the representative of the deceased may recover not less than \$100 or more than \$1000.

The Chairman announced that there was no use in recommending the changing of street names when there were no duplicate streets in any other part of the city, as the County Judge distinctly refuses to entertain such recommendations. It was determined to suggest that Reith and Cherry-streets be changed to Fernavenue, Clare-street, St. Alban's Ward to Mount Stephen-street, Exhibition-avenue to Seaforth-avenue. A strongly-signed petition from residents and property-owners on Bearstreet was produced begging that it be changed to Albion-street, the argument adduced being that the name Bear had not a very savory sound. It was decided that nothing could be done as there was no other thoroughfare of the same name in the city. The committee resolved to ask that Munn's Lane be turned into Mincing Lane, as a change liable to help that street live down several unpleasant reminiscences. nanimously re-elected chairman. There






