CONSPIRACY A MISTAKE.

MR. MILLER DENIES IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Liberals Engaged to Come Out Flat-footed for Free Trade—A Number of Bills Advanced a Stage—Progress with the Tariff Resolutions—Notes from the Cabinet.

OTTAWA, April 11.—In the House today Hon. J. A. Chaplin introduced a bill to amend the Franchise Act and reduce the cost of printing and other expenses.

General Lacombe made a personal explanation why he had drawn mileage for the distance between London, Eng., and Ottawa. He said that since last year he had removed his residence to London and when he had explained the circumstances to the clerk he was told that he could draw mileage upon signing the declaration he had drawn.

The Government bills to amend the Territories Real Property Act and to prevent the disclosure of official documents and information were read a second time.

The House then went into committee of ways and means, taking up the tariff resolutions. The greater part of the afternoon was taken up with a discussion as to whether or not Hon. G. E. Foster should be permitted to say in the other night that it was criminal for public men in this country to attempt to create the impression that the Government was animated by a malicious desire to retaliate upon the United States.

Mr. Mulock being the point that this language, being applied to the Opposition, was unparliamentary and almost a libel, and several other members backed him up in this contention.

Three items were passed during the afternoon, these relating to live animals, artificial flowers and furs.

After recess the bill relating to the extension of the Great Trunk Railway Company were adopted in committee. These private bills were: To incorporate the National Construction Company.

To amend the act incorporating the Imperial Insurance Corporation Limited. To incorporate the Erie County Bank.

To incorporate the Ontario and Quebec Railway Company. To amend the act incorporating the Dominion Mineral Company.

The House again went into committee of ways and means and these items of the bill were adopted: A bill to amend the act relating to the regulation of the practice of the medical profession.

AN IMPORTATION OF LIVE QUAIL.

Hamilton Sportsmen Providing for the Future—Members Active in the Courts' Instruction—School Statistics.

HAMILTON, April 11.—A number of sportsmen in this city, who are fond of a day's shooting and who deplore the scarcity of quail in this vicinity, have determined to stock several farms about Hamilton with these edible whistlers. Some time ago an order was placed in Chicago for 50 dozen brace of quail, and this morning the first consignment of 12 dozen brace arrived. They were liberated this afternoon on half a dozen farms near the city, and a ring had been made to protect these birds from the ravages of pothunters and to prevent their being shot on the property of others.

DEATH OF THE DEPUTY-MINISTER OF EDUCATION.

Mr. Alexander Marling's Brief Illness—Sketch of a Useful Career—A Gentleman of Literary Tastes, Wide Culture and Busy Business Faculty—Chief in Educational and Other Circles.

It was with deep regret that his many friends learned last night of the sudden death of Mr. Alexander Marling. Widely known as a gentleman of refined literary tastes and esteemed for his rare tact and Christian character, Mr. Marling's place could not easily be filled.

It was just two weeks ago yesterday when he came home from work on account of being unwell and inflammation of the lungs set in. The following Sunday he was in a critical state and grave fears were entertained that he would not survive. He rallied, however, and in a few days was considered as being only a matter of a short time, when at 6 o'clock last night Principal Kirkland called on the family residence, 110 Cartwright street, and was informed that Mr. Marling was getting along nicely. Shortly afterwards his condition suddenly changed for the worse and he died at 10 o'clock last night. 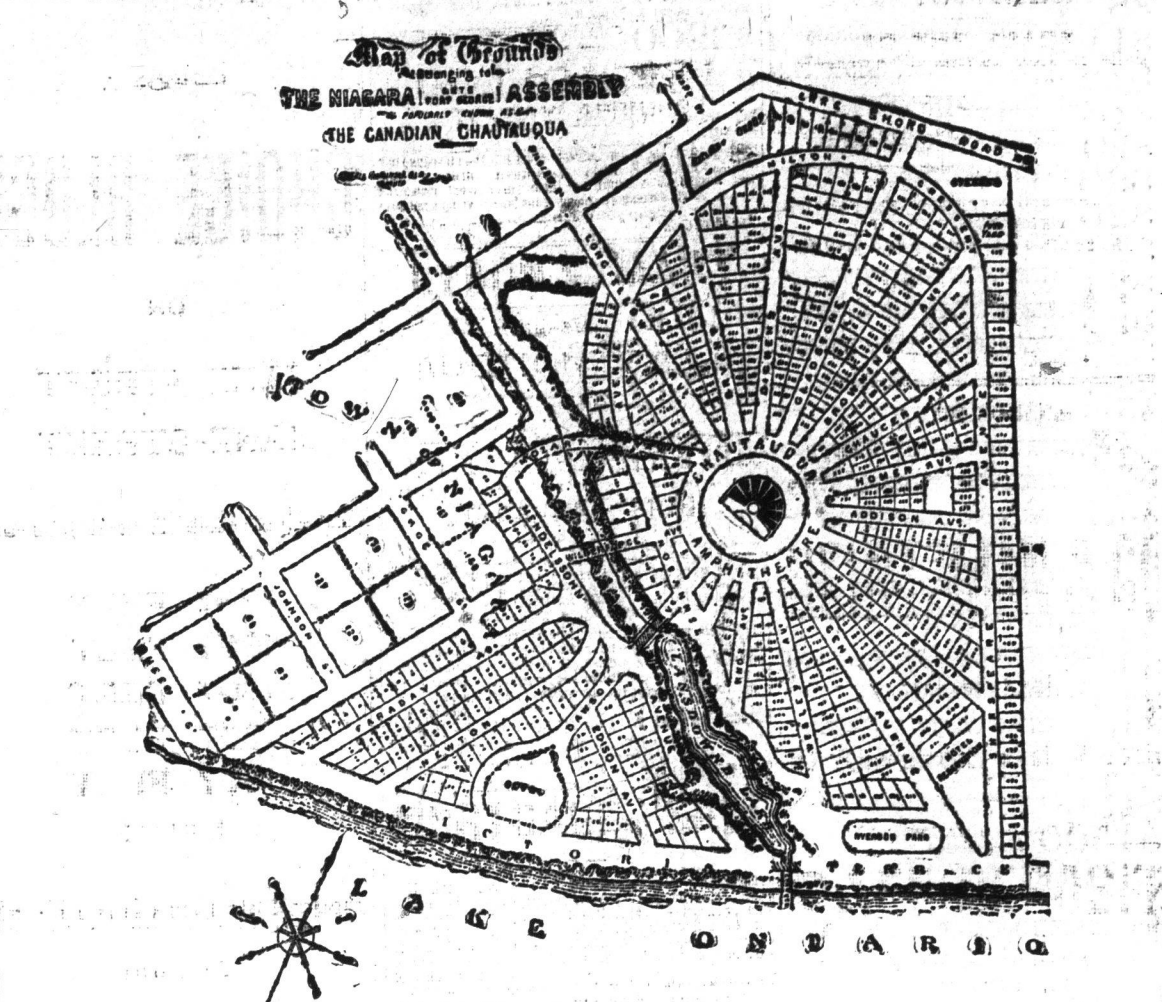

And the Taverns the Cause—So Says Mr. Ritchie in His Address in St. Paul's Church, Toronto, on Monday.

Mr. Justice MacMahon and a jury were occupied yesterday in hearing the evidence in a somewhat interesting action brought by Caroline Emma Staggill against James Duggan, both of whom reside near Lloydtown P.O., in King township, where the defendant keeps a hotel.

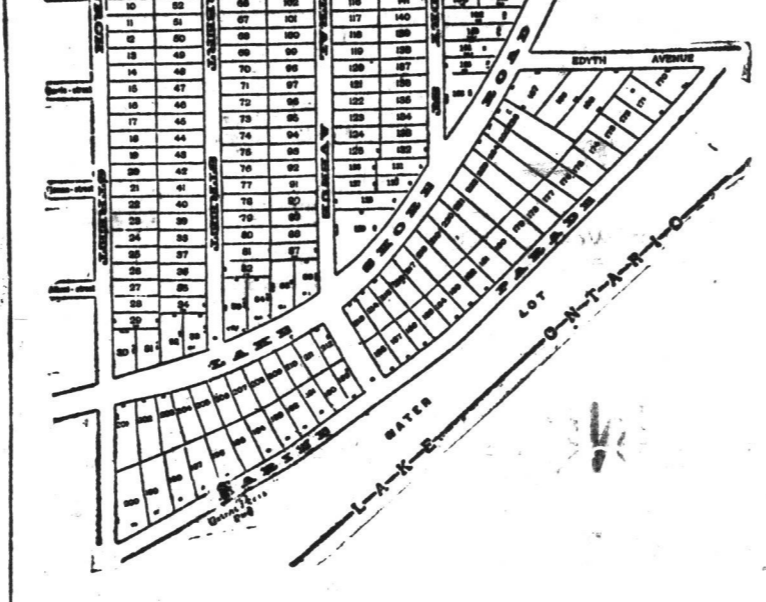

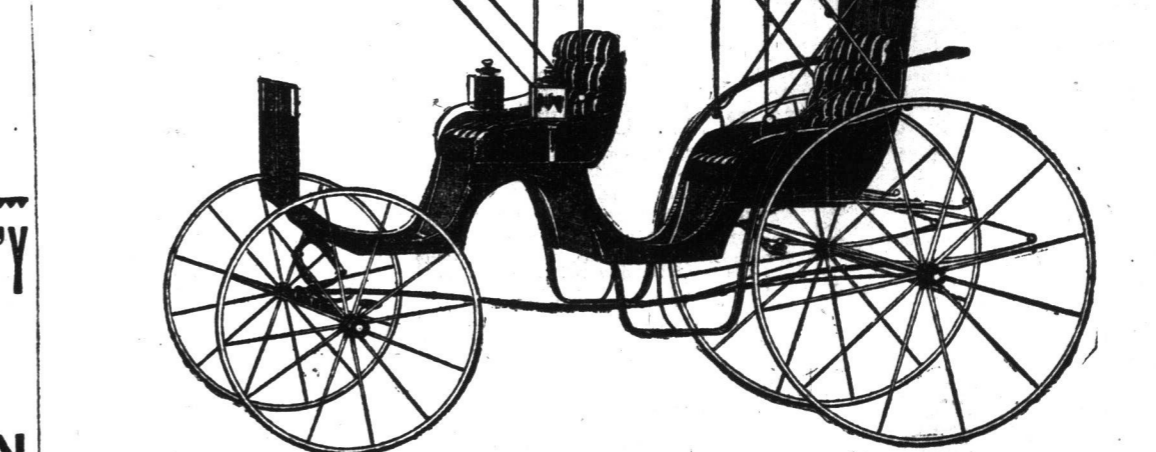
