The Honourable the Speaker informed the Senate that he had received a communication from the Governor General's Secretary, in the following words:—

OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL'S SECRETARY

OTTAWA, 12th January, 1925.

SIR,—I have the honour to inform you that His Excellency the Governor General will proceed to the Senate Chamber to open the Session of the Dominion Parliament on Thursday, the 5th February, at three o'clock.

The Senate was adjourned during pleasure.

After a while, His Excellency the Governor General having come, and being seated on the Throne.

The Honourable the Speaker commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to proceed to the House of Commons and acquaint that House that,—It is His Excellency the Governor General's pleasure that they attend him immediately in the Senate.

Who being come, with their Speaker,

His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to open the Session by a Gracious Speech to both Houses, as follows:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

I have pleasure in welcoming you to the fourth session of the fourteenth Parliament.

Since prorogation, the economic situation throughout the world has notably improved. For Canada, the year 1924 was a period of substantial progress. In trade alone, the excess value of exports over imports was more than \$260,000,000. The present year opens with prospects of sound and steady development. The financial and trade situation justifies the expectation of an early return to the gold basis.

The problem of the cost of living is the most important that my ministers have in mind at the present time, and every effort is being made to improve conditions with respect thereto. It is apparent that even the most rigid economy in public expenditures, will not suffice to solve this pressing problem and the problem of taxation incidental thereto. Their ultimate solution lies largely in increased production and the development of new and wider markets. It is to be borne continually in mind that the existing burden of taxation is due mainly to uncontrollable expenditure in the nature of payments and obligations arising out of the War, and to the encumbered position of the National Railways.

To aid in an increase of production, through the development of our vast natural resources, every effort is being made to attract the right class of immigrants to Canada, and to secure their settlement in the undeveloped areas served by our great transportation systems. In due course steps will be taken to further colonization and settlement in other fertile regions such as those of the Peace River.

The cost of production of raw materials and the necessaries of life has been lessened by the reductions in the tariff and the sales tax effected at the last session. It is becoming increasingly evident, however, that quite as important a factor as the customs tariff in their effect upon production and living costs are transportation costs and rates, by land and sea. It is the opinion of my advisers that the attention of Parliament at the present session should be directed more particularly to the desirability of effecting a freer movement of commodities through an equalization of railway freight rates as between provinces and localities, and through a lowering of carrying charges upon shipments by water of the products of the farm, the mine, the forest, the fisheries, and of our manufacturing industries.

Some measure of control of transportation by land and sea is obviously essential to the promotion of interimperial trade, the expansion of export trade generally, and the development of Canadian trade via Canadian ports.

The procedure it may be advisable to follow with respect to railway freight rates will in some measure necessarily depend upon the decision of the Supreme Court in the appeal respecting the Crow's Nest Pass Agreement. With regard to ocean freight rates, action is being taken to overcome the restraints on export trade due to the exactions of the powerful steamship combine known as the North Atlantic Steamship Conference. Your approval will be asked of a measure aimed at affording the Government of Canada a control of ocean rates.

It is the intention of the Government so to equip our important ports on the St. Lawrence route, and on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, as to enable them to meet all requirements of modern navigation.

To secure greater co-operation in the administration of the laws of the two countries respecting smuggling and the prosecution and extradition of persons violating the anti-narcotic laws of either country, treaties between the Dominion of Canada and the United States have been negotiated and signed. They will be submitted for your approval prior to their ratification.

You will be asked to sanction the calling of a conference between the federal and provincial governments to consider the advisability of amending the British North America Act with respect to the constitution and powers of the Senate, and in other important particulars.

Your attention will also be invited, during the course of the session, to certain trade agreements, to legislation respecting the handling and marketing of Canadian grain and to other important matters.

Members of the House of Commons:

The public accounts for the last fiscal year, and the estimates for the coming year, will be promptly submitted. In the preparation of the estimates, regard has been had to the need for continued economy with respect to the public services and public works.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIANS FOR 1924

To the Honourable the Speaker of the Senate.

The Joint Librarians have the honour to submit their Report for the year 1924.

The Supplementary Catalogue of books purchased during the past year, and the list of those books donated to the Library, are in the hands of the printers and will shortly be presented to Parliament.

Among the more valuable donations there may again be noted the volumes presented to the Library by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace consisting of works by recognized authorities dealing with the various complicated world problems resulting from the Great War, and those connected with the subsequent reconstruction period.

The Undersigned regret to report the death of Mr. Meiklejohn, who had been an employee of the Library for the last twenty-seven years, latterly as Shelving and Registration clerk. Mr. Meiklejohn was a trusted, diligent, and conscientious official of the Library. Application to the Civil Service Commission for the filling of this position has been made.

The Undersigned record with pleasure the completion of the new lighting system by the Chief Architect's Branch of the Public Works Department. The old central combination gas and electric fixture has been removed and powerful globe lights placed in the dome of the Library. All galleries and alcoves are now furnished with indirect lighting, and a thoroughly fire-proof system installed throughout the vaults, the general result being highly satisfactory.

The work of classifying and indexing the many thousands of Canadian pamphlets is being proceeded with.

KNOW you, that being well assured of your loyalty, fidelity and capacity, I, Julian Hedworth George, Baron Byng of Vimy, Governor General of the Dominion of Canada, under and by virtue of and in pursuance of the power

and authority vested in me by the Commission under the royal sign manual and signet of His Majesty the King, constituting and appointing me to be His Majesty's Governor General in and over the Dominion of Canada, and by The British North America Act, 1867, do hereby nominate, constitute and appoint you the said FRANCIS ALEXANDER ANGLIN, to be my Deputy within the Dominion of Canada; and in that capacity to exercise but subject to any limitations or directions from time to time expressed or given by His Majesty all the powers, authorities and functions vested in and of right exercisable by me as Governor General saving and excepting the power of dissolving the House of Commons of Canada: to have, hold, exercise and enjoy the said office of Deputy of me, the Governor General of Canada, as aforesaid, together with all and every the powers, rights, authority and privileges to the said office belonging or which ought to belong to the same unto you the said FRANCIS ALEXANDER ANGLIN, for and during my pleasure.

Given under my hand and seal at arms, at Ottawa, this sixteenth day of September, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-four, and in the fifteenth year of His Majesty's Reign.

While their salaries are at present \$3,240 per annum, going to a maximum of \$3,360, his remuneration is at the rate of \$2,000. Moreover, while they are on the permanent list, with the advantages of *The Superannuation Act*, his employment is sessional and temporary, carrying no legal right to a pension on retirement. I may add that he is invariably faithful and efficient in the performance of his work.

Under the circumstances, I recommend that, beginning with the present session, his remuneration be increased to \$3,000 per session, the payments in any one year not to exceed this amount.

Dear Mr. Speaker:—

I have taken cognizance of the debate which took place in the Senate yesterday on the question of the distribution of the printed minutes and proceedings of the Commons Committee now sitting on ocean rates. The honourable gentlemen who have spoken seem to be under the impression that some instructions or other had been given either by the Government, myself, the Clerk of the House, or some other officer for the distribution of these to the members of Commons only. I may point out, however, that the matter has been entirely dealt with by the Committee itself. The resolution which you quoted clearly states that these documents are to be printed for the use of the members of the Committee. No mention is made either of the Senators or members of the House of Commons. Upon investigation, however, I find this morning that five hundred copies in all have been printed and that each of our members was supplied with copies. This was not done upon any instructions from the Clerk of the House but the Chief Committee Clerk, acting upon the request of several members, deemed it advisable to make that distribution. I may add that he followed thereby an old custom which is also observed in your honourable body. You may remember that when the Senate held investigations over the Hudson Bay project and the fuel question it ordered its evidence to be printed but did not distribute the same to the members of the House of Commons. It has always been accepted as a principle here that until a Committee document has been laid on the table of the House it does not become a parliamentary paper in the sense that it must be distributed to the members of both Houses.

I infer from the debate which took place in your honourable body yesterday that your colleagues are desirous to receive these papers and I think it only fair that they should get them. The Special Committee will therefore be requested to extend the order which it passed a few weeks ago so that the members and Senators as well may receive from day to day the copies of the printed evidence and proceedings.



After debate, and—

On motion of the Honourable Mr. L'Espérance, it was—

The Honourable Mr. McCoig, from the Standing Committee on Agriculture and Forestry, to whom was referred the Bill (109), intituled: "An Act to amend The Dairy Industry Act, 1914," reported that they had gone through the said Bill, and had directed him to report the same to the Senate, without any amendment.

The said Bill was read the third time.

The question was put whether this Bill shall pass.

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the House of Commons and acquaint that House that the Senate have passed this Bill, without amendment.

The Honourable Mr. Foster (Alma), from the Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, to whom was referred the Bill (145), intituled: "An Act to amend the Customs Act," reported that they had gone through the said Bill, and had directed him to report the same to the Senate, with several amendments, which he was ready to submit whenever the Senate would be pleased to receive the same.

The said amendments were then read by the Clerk, as follows:—

Page 1, lines 17 and 18. Leave out "without power of remission".

Page 1, line 20. Leave out "without power of remission", and after "ascertained" insert ", such forfeiture to be without power of remission in cases of offences under paragraph (a) of this subsection."

The said amendments were concurred in, and—

The said Bill, as amended, was read the third time.

The question was put whether this Bill, as amended, shall pass.

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the House of Commons and acquaint that House that the Senate have passed this Bill with several amendments, to which they desire their concurrence.

The Honourable Mr. Belcourt, from the Special Committee on the administration of the Canteen Fund and the Disablement Fund, and the manufacture and sale of paper poppies by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*, presented their third Report.

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:—

THURSDAY, 18th June, 1925.

The Special Committee appointed to enquire into all matters relating to, or rising out of the following matters, viz:—The administration of the Canteen Fund and the Disablement Fund, and the uses to which advances from these funds have been put, the manufacture and sale of paper poppies by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* and the resale by various ex-soldier organizations, beg leave to make their third Report, as follows:—

(1) The Canteen Fund would appear to stand at from \$2,300,000 to \$2,350,000.

(2) Your Committee find that under Order in Council, P.C. 2378, July 5th, 1921, the sum of \$50,000 was paid to the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association in four payments, as follows:—

On the passing of the Order in Council.. . . .	\$20,000
1st August, 1921.. . . .	10,000
1st September, 1921.. . . .	10,000
1st October, 1921.. . . .	10,000

Under Order in Council, P.C. 3887, October 12th, 1921, the sum of \$120,000 was authorized to be paid to the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association and twenty-one other ex-service men's organizations. Of this amount, the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association received the following amounts:—

17th October, 1921..	\$10,000
1st November, 1921..	60,000
13th December, 1921..	10,000

(3) Under Order in Council, P.C. 2378, the money would appear to have been advanced to the Great War Veterans' Association from the Canteen Fund for the purpose of extending the scope and usefulness of that Association.

The Trustees were required to supervise the expenditure and require the production of vouchers and other evidence as they may consider necessary.

(4) Under P.C. 3887, 12th October, 1921, it is recited in the Order in Council, that there is danger of wide-spread unemployment which fact demands immediate attention, and that a grant from the Fund might properly be made for the purpose of dealing with such problems among ex-service men. The trustees were empowered to supervise all expenditure and require the production of vouchers.

(5) Evidence as to the manner in which other organizations had expended these sums of money was difficult to obtain in full. It appeared from such evidence as was put before the Committee, with respect to these other organizations, that a reasonable attempt was made to expend the money on unemployment relief. Such other organizations appear to have kept separate accounts and in some cases vouchers were submitted.

(6) In the case of moneys paid to the Great War Veterans' Association, amounting, as above mentioned, to the sum of \$130,000, it would appear that the whole of this sum was put into the general funds of the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association, and that the whole of the said amount was expended between the 1st of July, 1921, and the 31st of August, 1922. The said sum of money appears to have been used for the general purposes of the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association between these dates in the payment of such amounts and for such services, as follows:—

and other expenditures of a similar nature.

It would not appear that any portion of the said sum of \$130,000 had been spent on unemployment relief for ex-service men and their dependents.

(7) In addition to the sum of \$46,000 paid the "Veteran" as above set out under the caption of "Publicity and Propaganda"; the further sum of \$6,045.95 was paid the "Veteran" under the heading of "Salaries", "Rents" and so forth.

(8) In passing, it may be observed, that between a date in 1921 and January 31st, 1925, the various Departments of the Government paid to the "Veteran" for advertising and subscriptions the sum of \$10,451.81.

Findings

(1) That the moneys in the Canteen Fund belong to all ex-soldiers of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, and generally speaking, should only have been expended in whole or in part, in such a way as to confer a direct benefit upon all ex-service men.

(2) As a departure from the foregoing, there could not be great exception taken to an expenditure upon certain of the ex-members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force and their dependents, who were unemployed, or in needy circumstances, providing that such unemployment, or needy circumstances, were not properly the especial care of Government agencies maintained at the expense of the Government.

(3) Your Committee cannot believe that in making grants of money from this Fund to ex-soldier organizations the Government intended, or approved, of the expenditure of such moneys to be made solely upon the organizations themselves in the payment of salaries to their headquarter officers, propaganda, honoraria, and other headquarter expenses. If the Government did so intend, or approve, your Committee are of opinion that such grants were improperly made from this Fund.

Recommendation

(1) Your Committee recommend that the whole of this Fund be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of Bill No. 32, as amended by the report of the Special Committee of the Senate, to whom the said Bill was referred, subject only to the repayment to the Disablement Fund of the sum of \$15,000, more particularly referred to in the report of this Committee on the Disablement Fund.

The Honourable Mr. Belcourt, from the Special Committee on the administration of the Canteen Fund and the Disablement Fund, and the manufacture and sale of paper poppies by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*, presented their fourth Report.

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:—

THURSDAY, 18th June, 1925.

The Special Committee appointed to enquire into all matters relating to, or rising out of the following matters, viz:—The administration of the Canteen Fund and the Disablement Fund, and the uses to which advances from these funds have been put, the manufacture and sale of paper poppies by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* and the resale by various ex-soldier organizations, beg leave to make their fourth Report, as follows:—

(1) The Disablement Fund had its inception in a sum of money subscribed by the late James Carruthers of Montreal for the purchase of machine guns for the Canadian Forces. Subsequently, it was discovered that it was the duty of the Government to supply all machine guns and that the Government was supplying all the machine guns that could be obtained. It was decided to make the Fund, with the consent of Mr. Carruthers, available for other purposes and to augment the same by public subscriptions.

The Fund at the present time would appear to stand at something in the neighbourhood of \$116,945.22.

(2) Mr. E. H. Scammell, Assistant Deputy Minister of the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*, was appointed trustee and is at the present time the trustee of the said Fund.

(3) In a series of letters passing between various members and officials of the Government, contributors and other persons, and in a series of interviews given to the press, the objects of the Fund were set out and it is submitted that the objects as set out therein constitute the trust. These objects or purposes of the Fund may be summarized, as follows:—

(a) To supplement the pension or compensation granted by the Government in cases where this is insufficient for the support of dependents.

(b) To educate and train those who are unable to follow their previous vocation in other lines of industry and to supplement their earnings during the period of training.

(c) To assist those totally incapacitated, either by the erection or maintenance of soldiers' homes, or as may be hereafter determined.

(d) Generally, to take such steps as may be deemed necessary or desirable to carry out the duty of the Canadian people to the men who have suffered in the defence of our National liberties.

(e) To grant short loans to men on the strength of the Department (*Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*) for training or treatment, where such loans will tide over a temporary emergency.

(f) To make small grants to ex-members of the forces, who are in need of the same to tide over a difficult situation, or a temporary emergency.

(g) To make small loans or grants to dependents of men on the strength of the Department in cases of special need.

(h) To make small grants in cases of special need where pension is found to be inadequate.

(i) To make small loans and to purchase household necessities where urgently required through the intervention of Social Service Workers under the vocational or medical branches.

(j) To meet cost of transportation to enable the loanee to proceed to another point where he has been assured employment.

(k) To meet emergencies due to sickness in the family where it was required to make immediate purchases of medicine, and advances for such necessities have been made to both disability and dependent pensioners.

(l) To assist in payment of overdue taxes on real estate (dwellings) where the sum the applicant had, was less than the amount he was called upon to pay.

(m) To meet other domestic emergencies where a small outlay was urgently required to prevent hardships falling on the dependents of ex-service men.

(4) Under Order in Council, P.C. 1565, of the 14th of August, 1923, the sum of \$5,000 was advanced from this Fund to the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association as a loan.

(5) Under the Order in Council it would appear that this sum of money was advanced to this Association as assistance towards the expenses incurred by the Association in the presentation of cases requiring investigation to the Board of Pension Commissioners and the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*. This loan was repaid by vote No. 543 of the Estimates of 1923-24.

The Order in Council above mentioned went on to state—"The Association has been doing work which in future will be undertaken by the official soldier

advisors, who are to be appointed under the amendment passed at the last Session of Parliament to the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Act*."

(6) It is to be pointed out that the following payments were made by the Government in connection with the enquiry of the Royal (Ralston) Commission:—

(a) To Mr. C. G. MacNeil for travelling expenses December 19th, 1922, to May 5th, 1923, \$1,757.58.

(b) To the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association between the same dates and in connection with the same enquiry, \$5,411.15.

(c) To Mr. Bowler, barrister at Winnipeg, for legal and other charges in the same matter between August and November, 1922, \$4,575.04.

To which is to be added the value of transportation supplied by the Government, the payment of all witnesses who appeared before the Commission, and expenses of local veteran organizations in connection therewith.

(7) The Dominion Veterans' Alliance is a federation of the chartered ex-service men's organizations in Canada. The governing body is a committee consisting of two representatives from each of the said chartered associations. The President of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance is Major F. G. Taylor of Portage la Prairie and the Secretary thereof is Mr. C. G. MacNeil of Ottawa. Mr. MacNeil is Chairman of the legislative committee of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance and is also the Secretary-Treasurer of the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association.

(8) Under Order in Council P.C. 1596 of the 16th of September, 1924, a loan of \$15,000 was authorized to be made by the trustee of the said Fund to the Dominion Veterans' Alliance to enable that body to continue its activities. The said Disablement Fund to be reimbursed—quoting the words of the Order in Council—"Should any money be appropriated by Parliament for the benefit of the Alliance, or should the proposed allocation from the Canteen Funds be made."

(9) In connection with the distribution of the loan of \$15,000 covered by Order in Council 1596—\$5,000 of the same was paid out by Mr. Scammell, the trustee, to Mr. MacNeil, Secretary of the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association in the following manner:—

Two cheques for \$1,000 each

One cheque for \$3,000

said payments being made between the 10th and 20th days of June, 1924, both days inclusive, and prior to the date of Order in Council 1596 of the 16th of September, 1924.

(10) With respect to the remainder of the loan, namely, \$10,000—the same was disbursed in the following manner:—

A cheque on the said Fund signed by Mr. Scammell, the trustee, payable to the Dominion Veterans' Alliance for \$5,000 was enclosed in a letter to Mr. C. G. MacNeil, Chairman of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance, on the 2nd of October, 1924, and secondly a cheque signed by Mr. Scammell, the trustee, on the said Fund, payable to the Dominion Veterans' Alliance for \$5,000 was enclosed in a letter on the 7th of January, 1925, to Mr. C. G. MacNeil, Secretary of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance. Mr. Scammell asked for an itemized statement of the said expenditures.

(11) It is to be pointed out that with respect to the first \$5,000 paid out under Order in Council, P.C. 1596, of 16th September, 1924, the same was paid

out prior to the date of the Order in Council and cheques were made payable to the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association. Mr. Scammell in explanation states, that he was instructed to make the cheques so payable by the Minister of the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*. Mr. Scammell states further, that when he learned Mr. MacNeil had applied for a further sum of \$10,000 and that an Order in Council was to be issued to cover the whole loan, he advised his Minister that he had reason to believe that other ex-soldier organizations, having heard of the first two loans of \$5,000 each to the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association, were about to apply to the Minister for similar loans or grants of money. He suggested to his Minister, that the sum of \$10,000 should not be loaned to the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association, but to the Dominion Veterans' Alliance, which was an organization representing all ex-soldier organizations, and that by following such a course the Minister would be in a position to refuse a loan to any individual ex-soldier organization. The Minister concurred with this suggestion and the Order in Council was worded and issued accordingly.

(12) When Mr. MacNeil received the first cheque of \$5,000 (of the \$10,000 remaining under the Order in Council) made out in favour of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance, he called upon Mr. Scammell with the cheque in question and asked Mr. Scammell to alter the cheque to read—Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association. This Mr. Scammell refused to do and referred Mr. MacNeil to the wording of the Order in Council. Mr. MacNeil then endorsed the cheque on behalf of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance and placed the same to the credit of the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association. He did the same thing with the second cheque for \$5,000 (of the \$10,000 remaining under the Order in Council).

(13) The evidence of representatives of other ex-soldier organizations was clear on the point, that Mr. MacNeil's proper duty in the premises was to forward these cheques to the Treasurer of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance, Captain H. A. H. Jones of Winnipeg, or to advise the members of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance Executive Committee and to wait the decision of that body as to the disposal of the cheques in question.

(14) Mr. Scammell in his evidence stated that had Mr. MacNeil communicated with the officials of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance and secured their authority for his action in the matter, he, Mr. Scammell, would have considered the transaction quite regular. Mr. MacNeil in his evidence admitted, that he had not consulted any of the officials of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance as to his course of action, nor did he inform any of the officials of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance, and the transaction, as far as your Committee could learn, only came to the ears of the officials of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance when the matter was discussed in the House of Commons in the month of March last. Upon getting the facts in the case, the President of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance wrote a circular letter to the constituent bodies of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance dated April 17, 1925, informing them of the facts and stating his strong disapproval of the action taken by Mr. MacNeil, and calling upon the constituent bodies, because of these transactions, to withdraw their representation from the Dominion Veterans' Alliance and in effect, to dissolve the said Alliance.

Finding

(1) Your Committee are of opinion that the conversion of the cheques mentioned in paragraph (12) hereof, from the use of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance to the use of the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans'

Association by Mr. C. G. MacNeil had the effect of defeating the intentions of the Minister and the Deputy Minister of the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*, and was a violation of the terms of Order in Council 1596 of the 16th of September, 1924, and was a breach of trust on the part of Mr. C. G. MacNeil as an official of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance.

Recommendation

(1) That the sum of \$15,000 be repaid to the Disablement Fund from the Canteen Fund.

The Honourable Mr. Belcourt, from the Special Committee on the administration of the Canteen Fund and the Disablement Fund and the manufacture and sale of paper poppies by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*, presented their fifth Report.

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:—

THURSDAY, 18th June, 1925.

The Special Committee appointed to enquire into all matters relating to, or rising out of the following matters, viz:—The administration of the Canteen Fund and the Disablement Fund, and the uses to which advances from these funds have been put, the manufacture and sale of paper poppies by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* and the resale by various ex-soldier organizations, beg leave to make their fifth Report, as follows:—

1. In shops operated under the direction of the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*, poppies are manufactured by disabled ex-soldiers for sale and distribution on Armistice Day and such other days as may be selected in different localities by ex-soldier organizations, or committees having the matter in hand.

2. The *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* are prepared to sell these poppies at the same price and upon the same terms to any organization of ex-soldiers, or other persons as may apply to purchase the said poppies.

3. The impression has appeared to exist amongst ex-soldier organizations and others, that the Great War Veterans' Association had an arrangement with the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*, whereby the Great War Veterans' Association had the exclusive privilege to purchase from the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* and to resell poppies.

4. It would appear that the Great War Veterans' Association in 1923 sought to copyright, or to patent the poppy in their own name and for their own benefit. The following resolution explains itself:—

“Moved by Comrade Myers and seconded by Comrade Miller that ‘Whereas the Poppy of Flanders Fields is immortalized to the glorious dead and because of Colonel McRae’s inspiring poem, and whereas the Great War Veterans’ Association have resolved in Annual Convention to petition the Government for an absolute monopoly and control of the Poppy on behalf of their own organization, and Whereas we feel it is so sacred that it should not be commercialized or exploited for any purpose whatsoever, Therefore be it resolved that we, the Dominion Executive of the Amputations’ Association of the Great

War, representing the war amputation cases throughout the Dominion, do hereby strongly protest to the Federal Government against the issuing of a patent or copyright of the Poppy to any individual or to the Dominion Veterans' Alliance, and that copies of this Resolution be sent to the Women's Press Club, the I. O. D. E., the Red Cross, the Women's Patriotic Association, and to representative M. P.'s from each province.'"

Carried.

5. In a letter dated Ottawa, January 29th, 1924, exhibit "J", Mr. MacNeil, Secretary, Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association to J. L. Melville, Supervisor of Vet-Craft shops, *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment*, Ottawa, Mr. MacNeil laid down the following provisions to cover the sale of poppies for that year:—

(1) "No sale of poppies will be made by your Department to organizations or associations at a lower price than quoted to the Great War Veterans' Association, Dominion Command."

(2) "No sale of poppies will be made to any organization or to any unit or branch of the Great War Veterans' Association, except through the Dominion Command of the G. W. V. A., unless by mutual agreement."

(3) "It is understood that the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* will undertake to prevent institutions and hospitals, other than the Vet-Craft Branch under their jurisdiction, from making poppy supplies to be sold directly or indirectly by them during the Poppy Day Campaign, 1924."

An order of poppies was then agreed upon to be delivered by the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, as follows:—

250,000 small poppies at	\$15.00	per thousand
50,000 large " "	at \$77.00	" " "

In reply, Mr. Melville wrote under date of January 30th, 1924, in part as follows:—

"In connection with paragraph two of your letter, it is considered that the following proviso should be added:—Where the Great War Veterans' Association are unable to arrive at a satisfactory settlement regarding the sale of poppies to any organization the Department, through the Vet-Craft Branch shall have the opportunity to endeavour to secure the contract direct, subject to the following provisions:—

That the prices quoted shall not be less than that agreed on in the contract with the Great War Veterans' Association, and (b) before taking such action, the Vet-Craft Branch shall advise the Great War Veterans' Association of such intention."

6. The *modus operandi* of the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association was described by Mr. MacNeil, as follows:—

"After communicating with the provincial Commands of this organization, an estimate of the number of poppies required within provincial areas was secured and a common order was put into the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* by Mr. MacNeil and the poppies were thereupon dispatched by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* to the provincial Commands, aforesaid. Taking a concrete case of one class of poppies, the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association purchased from the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* these small poppies at \$15 per thousand and resold to their provincial Commands at \$20 per thousand. There were other qualities of poppies, wreaths and so forth with varying prices, but in all cases the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association made an increased charge on the goods ordered by and through them."

7. In some communities committees are formed with representatives from all ex-soldier organizations and other kindred and allied organizations for the purpose of disposing of poppies in large numbers by the aid of volunteer workers by means of the tagging system, such general committees in turn purchase the poppies required from the provincial Commands of the Great War Veterans' Association. It would appear that this system was in vogue in the years 1922, 1923 and 1924.

8. In a statement of receipts and expenditures submitted by the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association to your Committee, on the revenue side there appears an item "Poppy Day Campaigns (statement attached) \$25,148.15."

In the statement referred to as attached, the following synopsis of the operations in the matter of the sale of poppies is given:—

9. It transpired in the course of Mr. MacNeil's examination that the item—administration expenses—was an arbitrary amount for which he had no vouchers or no special expenditure to show, but was merely, in his opinion, the value of the services rendered by himself and his staff in connection with the transaction.

To give an example—In the city of Winnipeg a Poppy Day Committee was formed of representatives of all ex-service men's organizations, plus allied and kindred organizations. This Committee having made all necessary arrangements, applied to the provincial Command of the Great War Veterans' Association in Manitoba for a supply of poppies and the same were supplied by the provincial Command of the Great War Veterans' Association in Manitoba who fixed the prices to be paid by the Winnipeg Poppy Day Committee, which are set out hereunder and are taken from statutory declarations made by five members of the said Winnipeg Poppy Day Committee, and are further supported by copies of accounts rendered by the Manitoba Provincial Command, Great War Veterans' Association, to the Joint Veterans' Poppy Day Committee, Winnipeg, Manitoba, in 1923 and 1924. A specification of the prices charged by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* for poppies is also submitted hereunder.

An analysis of the foregoing shows small poppies were sold as above at \$40 per thousand, large poppies at \$150 per thousand.

10. In a circular letter written by Mr. MacNeil, Secretary, Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association, to provincial Commands, dated February 6th, this paragraph occurs:—

"In discussing arrangements for the 1924 campaign, it was decided by the Dominion President that no attempt be made to secure any profit by the Dominion Command. Although funds are sorely needed at Headquarters to maintain enterprises to benefit ex-service men, there has been a great deal of criticism to the effect, that the sale of poppies was commercialized by the Dominion Command. Actually the surplus following each campaign has provided for little beyond reimbursement for expenditure undertaken. Nevertheless, it was considered advisable to renounce all prospects of gain and to lend emphasis to the real purpose of the campaign."

In the minutes of a meeting of the Dominion Council of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance held at Ottawa, November 5th, 1923, this item appears—

"Poppy Day Campaign"

"It was reported to the Council by several delegates that complaints had been received with regard to the monopoly obtained by the Great War Veterans' Association in the distribution of Vet-Craft poppies on Armistice Day. The arrangements for the Poppy Day Campaign, as conducted by the Great War Veterans' Association, were fully explained by Comrade MacNeil. Statistics were tabled in proof of the assertions that no profit was derived therefrom by the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association, as the major portion of the funds raised in this manner were left in the community for relief purposes. Any surpluses transferred from the Campaign Fund to the credit of the Great War Veterans' Association would not exceed the amount required for reimbursement of administration expenses."

11. Witnesses before this Committee representing the Grand Army of United Veterans, the Army and Navy Veterans, Canadian Legion and the Amputation Association were of opinion that there should be no monopoly in the sale of poppies, but that the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* should furnish poppies to all applicants at the same price and upon the same terms. That there should be no profit to any intermediaries in the transaction.

If any profits or proceeds resulted from the sale and distribution of poppies, it should go to the relief of ex-service men and their dependents in the localities where such poppies were disposed of to the public.

Your Committee find, as follows:—

1. That a *quasi* exclusive privilege to sell poppies in Canada seems to have been secured by the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association and their subordinate branches, in which other ex-soldier organizations apparently acquiesced in the belief that there were no profits except such as accrued to the actual vendors in the communities where such poppies were sold to the public, and it was generally believed by ex-soldier organizations that the Great War Veterans' Association had an exclusive privilege.

2. That in 1922, 1923 and 1924, the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association profited by its transaction in the purchase and sale of poppies in the sum of \$25,148.15.

3. In 1923 and 1924 there was a substantial spread between the price charged by the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association to the Manitoba Provincial Command of the Great War Veterans' Association and the price charged by the Manitoba Provincial Command of the Great War Veterans' Association to the Winnipeg Poppy Day Committee, which resulted in an average profit to the Manitoba Provincial Command of the Great War Veterans' Association in these years of 28.17 per cent.

4. The wearing of a poppy on Armistice Day has become a custom based upon patriotic and sentimental considerations. This imitation flower is worn as a memorial of the dead and to mark the anniversary of a great occasion. A fine poem by a distinguished Canadian soldier has given this custom and this flower a special place in the hearts and minds of the Canadian people.

Your Committee regret to find that this custom and this flower has been commercialized by the transactions above set out.

Your Committee recommend that:—

1. No exclusive privilege for the sale of poppies manufactured under the auspices of the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* be permitted, but that all such poppies be made available at prices and upon terms equal to all.

2. Care must be taken in the disposal of these poppies to see that no middleman's profits accrue.

3. That the commercialization of the sale of these poppies be eliminated and to that end the provincial units of the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* be utilized for the distribution of poppies within the several provinces.

All which is respectfully submitted.

"A. Section thirteen of the said Act as enacted by chapter sixty of the statutes of 1924, is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—

13. A pension shall not be awarded unless an application therefor has been made:—

(a) within three years after the date of the death in respect of which pension is claimed; or—

(b) within three years after the date upon which the applicant has fallen into a dependent condition; or—

(c) within seven years after the date upon which the applicant was retired or discharged from the forces; or—

(d) within three years after the date of the completion of his treatment by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* when he was retired or discharged direct to such treatment or undertook such treatment within six months of his retirement or discharge; or—

(e) within three years after the declaration of peace:

Provided—

(i) That where there is an entry in the service or medical documents of the member of the forces by or in respect of whom pension is being claimed

showing the existence of an injury or disease which has contributed to the disability in respect of which pension is claimed, such entry shall be considered an application as of the date thereof for pension in respect of such disability:

- (ii) That the provision of subsection (e) of this section shall not apply to an applicant claiming dependent's pension who was not resident in Canada at the date of the death of the member of the forces and has not continuously resided therein".

Page 2, line 10. Leave out the whole of clause 3.

Page 3, line 1. Leave out "was attributable to or".

Page 3, line 2. After "service" insert "during the war".

Page 3, line 9. After "service" insert "during the war".

Page 3, line 18. After "provisions" insert "of paragraph (b)".

Page 4, line 12. Leave out "as from the date of the final payment".

Page 4, line 20. Leave out the whole of paragraph (c).

Page 4, line 32. For "subsection" substitute "subsections".

Page 4, line 41. Add the following as subsection (4):—

Page 6, lines 27 to 36, both inclusive. Leave out the whole of clause 9.

Page 6, line 37 to page 7, line 2. Leave out the whole of clause 10.

Page 8, line 16. Leave out "not attributable to or was".

Page 8, line 17. Leave out "or was the result of misconduct".

Page 8, lines 18, 19 and 26. As consequential amendments, leave out the words "three, eight, nine".

Page 8, line 42. After clause 17 insert the following as new clause "B":—

NEW CLAUSE "B"

"Section nine of the said Act is amended by adding thereto the following subsection:—

"(3) The Commission, represented by one or more Commissioners, may in its discretion hold sittings in any part of Canada for the purpose of hearing evidence or complaints in respect of pensions."

- (a) within three years after the date of the death in respect of which pension is claimed; or—
- (b) within three years after the date upon which the applicant has fallen into a dependent condition; or—
- (c) within seven years after the date upon which the applicant was retired or discharged from the forces; or—
- (d) within three years after the date of the completion of his treatment by the *Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment* when he was retired or discharged direct to such treatment or undertook such treatment within six months of his retirement or discharge; or—
- (e) within three years after the declaration of peace:

Provided—

- (i) That where there is an entry in the service or medical documents of the member of the forces by or in respect of whom pension is being claimed showing the existence of an injury or disease which has contributed to the disability in respect of which pension is claimed, such entry shall be considered an application as of the date thereof for pension in respect of such disability:
- (ii) That the provision of subsection (e) of this section shall not apply to an applicant claiming dependent's pension who was not resident in Canada at the date of the death of the member of the forces and has not continuously resided therein."

The said amendment was agreed to.

Section 3 was read and struck out of the Bill.

Section 4 was read, and amended, as follows:—

Page 3, line 1. Leave out "was attributable to or".

From and out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund there may be paid and applied an amount not exceeding three million dollars, for the purposes of paying, under the provisions of this Act, to the several persons who were creditors of the Home Bank of Canada, hereinafter called "the Bank," when the Bank suspended payment, for money on deposit or in current account, the amounts to which they are respectively entitled as hereinafter provided; but in no case shall any payment so made exceed thirty-five per centum of the claim of the creditor as settled and approved by the Court in the winding up proceedings."

The said clause, as amended, was agreed to.

Clause 3 was read, and amended, as follows:—

In the last line after "collected" insert "by the Bank".

The said clause, as amended, was agreed to.

Clause 4 was read, and amended, as follows:—

After paragraph (b) of clause 4, add the following:—

"(c) any person who is or has been a director of the Bank, or his estate, or any company in which he is or has been a shareholder, or any firm of which he is or has been a member; or—

"(d) the Government of any province, or to any city, town, county, municipality, parish, school board, educational institution, local improvement district, telephone district, or other similar corporation or institution; or

"(e) any corporation, association, society, partnership, club, friendly or mutual benefit society, religious or church corporation, labour association, or any such society, organization or association whatsoever; or

"(f) any Senator or Members of the House of Commons of Canada.

"Any question arising under this section shall be determined by the Commissioner and his decision shall be final."

The said clause as amended was agreed to.

After clause 4, add the following new clauses A and B:—

Clause A

"(1) The persons entitled to payment of aid under this Act shall be such of the creditors referred to in sections two and three of this Act as are found by the Commissioner hereinafter appointed to be in special need by reason of the suspension of the Bank.

"(2) The President of the Exchequer Court of Canada or the Puisne Judge of that court, acting personally and not as that court, and hereinafter called "the Commissioner", shall, upon application made to him by any person whose claim has been settled and approved by the court in the winding-up proceedings, determine whether or not that creditor is entitled to receive any, and if so what amount of, pecuniary aid under the provisions of this Act. The Commissioner's determination shall be final.

"(3) For the purposes of such determination the Commissioner may prescribe the delay for filing claims to receive such aid, the evidence, by affidavit or otherwise, to be adduced in support of such claims, the procedure necessary or requisite and all other matters requisite in the premises.

"(4) So soon as possible after the expiration of the said delay the Commissioner shall from time to time prepare and forward to the liquidators of the Bank a list showing the names of the persons who have been found by the Commissioner to be entitled to aid under this Act, and the amount of aid to which each such person is entitled."

Clause B

"In order to facilitate the speedy settlement of this matter and to save expense in connection with the administration of this Act,—

(a) Every creditor having an approved claim of not more than five hundred dollars in amount shall be entitled to be paid thirty-five per centum thereupon without investigation of such claim by the Commissioner.

(b) Any creditor failing to take advantage of this Act within twelve months from the date of its passing shall be absolutely barred from receiving any benefit therefrom."

The said amendment was agreed to.

Clauses 5, 6 and 7 were severally read and agreed to.

After clause 7, add the following as new clause C.

Clause C

"The Minister of Finance shall annually submit to Parliament, within fourteen days of the opening thereof, a detailed statement showing the names and addresses of all persons who have received aid under this Act, the amount of their respective claims, and the amount paid to each."

WEDNESDAY, 24th June, 1925.

Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate to acquaint their Honours that this House disagrees to the amendments, made by the Senate, to the Bill (182), intituled: "An Act for the relief of the Depositors of The Home Bank of Canada," for the following reasons:—

1. Because the said amendments, which consist in changing the title and adding a preamble as well as new clauses, are foreign to the Bill passed by the House of Commons on the 10th of June, 1925, the said preamble setting out that certain representations have been made to the Governor in Council and that the Government's moral responsibility to the Home Bank depositors is not admitted, and also defining the principle on which pecuniary aid may be afforded to a limited number of creditors—thereby giving expression to recitals on behalf of the Cabinet and the House of Commons which have not been authorized either by the Government or by the House of Commons.

2. Because clause 2 of the Bill, which had been passed by the House of Commons on the recommendation of the Crown, and which provided that the amount mentioned therein be voted for the purpose of paying the Home Bank depositors such proportionate parts of their deposits as they would respectively be found entitled to in the liquidation proceedings, has been struck out and new clauses have been substituted determining another mode of payment based upon a different principle and fixing the amount to be paid at a sum not to exceed \$3,000,000, besides changing the proportion for the distribution of these public moneys and establishing classes of persons who may be paid or denied payment, according to the provisions of the said new clauses.

3. Because clause "A" added to the Bill provides for the appointment of a Commissioner and the organization of a lengthy and costly procedure, thereby

entailing a large expenditure which the Senate has no right to make a charge upon the public revenues, and which could only be authorized if it had first been recommended by the Governor General and voted by the House of Commons under sections 53 and 54 of the *British North America Act*.

4. Because it is provided by clause 7 of the said Bill as passed by the House of Commons that "The Governor in Council may raise by way of loan, temporary or otherwise, upon such form of security and upon such terms and conditions as the Governor in Council may approve, such sum or sums of money as are required for the purpose of making the payment authorized by this Act, and any sum so raised shall form part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund" and the raising of any loan as a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund is the undoubted and sole privilege of the Commons,—the Senate having no right to alter the same, whether by increase or reduction.

5. Because the title, principle, policy and economy of the said Bill as passed by the House of Commons have been completely altered and a new Bill has been substituted by Their Honours, and the action of the Senate in the premises is contrary to the Constitution and against the accepted principles of British Parliamentary practice.

6. Because the House of Commons, adhering to the *British North America Act* and the fundamental principle embodied in Rule 78, cannot renounce its inalienable right to initiate and regulate the voting of all aids and supplies granted by Parliament and it has never acknowledged the right of the Senate to make amendments to money Bills.

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House do carry the said Message to the Senate.

In section 1, the words "was attributable to or" should not be deleted as it is claimed a disability may make its appearance long after discharge and the words "incurred during military service" if they are the only ones left may lead to narrower an interpretation.

And hath disagreed to their third and fourteenth amendments for the following reasons:—

Sections 3 and 9 should be reinstated: They provide for payment of pension to dependents upon the death of pensioners in classes 1 to 5 regardless of whether the death is a result of military service or not. It is represented that high disability pensioners are less than others in a position to provide in advance for their dependents.

And hath also disagreed to their sixteenth and seventeenth amendments for the following reasons:—

Section 16. The words "not attributable to or was" in the 16th line, and "or was the result of misconduct" in the 17th line, should not be deleted for the reason that a decision of the B.P.C. to the effect that the disease is the result of misconduct is equal to a decision that the disability is the result of an injury or disease "not attributable to military service" and in such a case there should lie an appeal to the Federal Appeal Board.

The Honourable Mr. Ross (Middleton), from the Special Committee appointed to enquire into and report upon the best means to relieve the country from its heavy railway expenditure, presented their second Report.

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:—

THURSDAY, 25th June, 1925.

The Special Committee appointed to enquire into and report upon the best means to relieve the country from its heavy railway expenditure beg leave to make their second and final report, as follows:—

1. At the commencement of its enquiry, the Committee passed the following resolution:—

"Resolved: That the enquiry of this Committee should be confined to ascertaining from business and railway experts the best means to relieve the country of its heavy annual railway deficits, without entering into intimate details or particulars of the administration of the railways operating in Canada."

2. In pursuance of this resolution the Committee heard the evidence of a number of prominent business men.

3. The Committee sat in *camera* without shorthand reporters, as the Committee were anxious to assure the witnesses the utmost freedom in expressing their views in the frankest possible manner, so making it unnecessary for the witnesses to make qualifications or distinctions which they might wish to do if their evidence was to be published, but which, so far as the inquiry was concerned, would be relatively unimportant.

4. It was made clear by the witnesses that the increasing of the obligations of the country on account of the Government railways is a matter causing much national concern.

5. The addition to the national obligations through the Canadian National Railways has, for the last six years, averaged about \$100,000,000 annually, amounting in the aggregate, according to the Government and railway reports, to the sum of \$710,943,247, or to the sum of \$595,943,247 in the last five years. There is no assurance that under the present system this expenditure will materially decrease in the near future.

6. Among the different schemes discussed by the witnesses the most important were:—

- (a) Co-operation between the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National Railway systems.
- (b) The acquisition by the Government of the Canadian Pacific Railway.
- (c) The sale or lease of the Canadian National Railways to the Canadian Pacific Railway.
- (d) The transfer of the Canadian National Railways to a private company, to be owned and operated by such company.
- (e) The merging of the two railway systems for purposes of administration and operation.

That both the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National Railway should be placed under the management of a Board of fifteen directors, five to be named by the Canadian Pacific Railway, five to be named by the Government, and these ten to choose five proven, capable business men to complete the Board; these last five directors to hold office for ten years and to be removed only for cause. That a recapitalization be made of the Canadian National Railways from the point of view of earning capacity.

That the Canadian Pacific Railway be guaranteed an agreed dividend on its stock.

In the event of the joint management producing a surplus, a dividend at the same rate as is paid to the Canadian Pacific Railway be paid to the Government on the capitalization placed on the Government Railways. After the payment of these dividends any surplus earnings available for distribution be divided between the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National Railways, in proportion to the valuation of the two systems.

7. Various witnesses emphasized the waste of effort and money on competitive immigration practice, urging consolidation of effort in this connection. Three agencies are at work to secure immigration into the Dominion, viz: the Dominion Government, the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Pacific. Each of them maintains independent organizations, and their competi-

tion entails heavy expense; an expense which could be materially reduced by a unified system which would, at lessened cost, secure better results.

8. It was also stated to the Committee that no inconsiderable part of the expenditure of the Canadian railways is attaining no other end than dividing existing traffic.

9. Your Committee is of opinion that unless energetic means be adopted to reduce our national debt and the income tax, as is rapidly being done in the United States, we will be unable to command the foreign capital absolutely necessary for the development of our natural resources.

10. For those reasons, the scheme mentioned in sub-paragraph (e) of paragraph 6 above is strongly recommended to the attention of the government.

11. The merging of the two railway systems for purposes of operation and administration as above will remove or dispense with duplication in railway tracks and rolling stock in passenger and freight services, in railway stations from the Atlantic to the Pacific, in telegraph, express, and other services, in offices, in accounting and book-keeping, in numerous other special offices and staffs, in administration boards, etc., etc., and thereby and otherwise save an enormous amount of money to the country.

12. On unification of the railways taking place, your Committee recommend that the powers of the Board of Railway Commissioners be increased, if necessary, to secure the safeguarding of the interests of the public.

13. Your Committee is of the opinion that the railway question is one of extreme importance and of the utmost urgency; that the constantly increasing public obligation on railway account is approximately two million dollars per week, and that until this problem is settled in some way which will reduce the present enormous expenditure there can be no relief from taxation which is bearing so heavily on all classes, nor can there be any move towards the reduction in rates and fares so essential to the prosperity of every inhabitant of Canada.

14. Your Committee recommend that 4,000 copies in English and 1,000 copies in French of this report be printed for public distribution, and that Rule 100 be suspended insofar as it relates to the said printing.

“In His Majesty’s name, the Right Honourable The Deputy Governor General doth Assent to these Bills.”

The Honourable the Speaker of the Commons then addressed the Right Honourable The Deputy Governor General, as follows:—

“May it Please Your Honour:

The Commons of Canada have voted supplies required to enable the Government to defray certain expenses of the Public Service.

In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Honour the following Bill:—

‘An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial years ending, respectively the 31st March, 1925, and the 31st March, 1926.’

To which Bill I humbly request Your Honour’s Assent.”

After the Clerk had read the title of this Bill,

To this Bill the Royal Assent was pronounced by the Clerk of the Senate, in the following words:—

“In His Majesty’s name, the Right Honourable the Deputy of the Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill.”

After which the Right Honourable The Deputy Governor General was pleased to close the fourth session of the fourteenth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, with the following Speech.

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

In bringing to a close the fourth session of the fourteenth Parliament of Canada, I desire to express to you my appreciation of the care and attention given the many important measures which have come before you for consideration.

It is gratifying to observe that the trade of our country is expanding as at no previous period of its history. The favourable balance for the fiscal year ended March 31st exceeded two hundred and eighty-four millions of dollars. This expansion will without doubt be further stimulated by the inter-Imperial agreement negotiated with our sister Dominion, Australia, to which approval has just been given, and by the legislation enacted for the purpose of establishing most favoured nation trade relations with Finland and the Netherlands, including the populous and wealthy Islands of the Dutch East Indies.

Delegates from the British West Indies are at present conferring with my Government concerning reciprocal development of trade and the improvement of communications throughout British America.

Canadian trade, *via* Canadian ports, has been greatly developed under the policy of allowing additional preference upon commodities when imported through Canadian ports from countries enjoying the British Preference. Practically the entire importations of British goods enjoying a preference now enter Canada through Canadian ports.

To provide more adequate facilities for our increasing ocean-borne traffic, provision has been made for improving the equipment of our national harbours.

A Special Committee of the House, appointed early in the session to consider a proposal to bring about the lowering of North Atlantic freight rates, has recently reported, confirming the existence of a combine and the necessity for the establishment of an effective control over Ocean Rates. This important subject will continue to engage the attention of my advisers.

The intricate problem of the regulation of railway freight rates throughout Canada has been dealt with in a manner which it is believed will enable the Board of Railway Commissioners to present a rate structure, based upon an equalization of rates as between provinces and localities, that will be fair and just to all parts of Canada, and which should serve further to stimulate both domestic and foreign trade.

A consolidation and revision of the *Canada Grain Act* has been made, which should prove of direct and substantial benefit to the great agricultural industry of the country.

Rigorous enactments have been passed to aid in the prevention of smuggling and the enforcement of our revenue laws. They have been supplemented by important treaties with the United States respecting the suppression of smuggling, and of traffic in narcotics.

Agreements have also been concluded with the United States for the final demarcation of the international boundary line and the regulation of the level of the Lake of the Woods.

Amendments to the *Industrial Disputes Investigation Act*, the *Soldier Settlement Act*, and the *Dominion Elections Act*, have been among other important enactments of the session.
