


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

NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying Missionaries to strug-

gling Congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid Congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.
4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm Clergy.

5. A Fund to provide higher education for the children of the Clergy.

6. To provide Bibles, Prayer Books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Churchwardens, and others elected by the Society, being members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the

Investment and Education Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund, (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the Clergy Reserves, and (c) the Endowment Funds of the several Missions and Congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the

Synod.

This Board pays all the Missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the Congregations served by the Missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust, (e) the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Church Society was held in the Cathedral Church Hall, on Wednesday, the 1st of February, at two P. M.

Present, the Lord Bishop of Quebec in the chair, the Very Rev. the Dean of Quebec, the Ven. Archdeacon Roe, the Revs. Canon Von Ifland, L. W. Williams, T. A. Williams, Messrs. R. Hamilton, R. H. Smith, C. Judge, H. J. Pratten, Edwin Pope, J. Dunbar, Q. C., Geo. Lampson, E. J. Hale, John Hamilton, G. R. White, W. H. A. Eckhardt, Mrs. John Hamilton, Mrs. Celin Sewell, Mrs. Sharples, Miss Montizambert, Miss Dunn, and the Rev. A. J. Balfour, acting Secretary.

After prayers, the minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The reports of the Central Board, Diocesan Board, and Clergy Trust Committee were read, adopted and ordered to be printed. The report from the St. Francis District Association was also read, received and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report of the Church Society.

Statements of the accounts of the Church Society, Diocesan Board, Clergy Trust Fund, Bishopric Endowment Fund, and Local Endowment Funds, were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

Nineteen new members were elected, the Lord Bishop of the Diocese and the Rev. T. L. Ball, as "Life Members."

The Vice-Presidents were re-elected.

The thanks of the Society were then given to the Honorary Counsel, the Hon. Geo. Irvine, Q.C., James Dunbar, Esq., Q.C., and Geo. Lampson, Esq., and also to the Auditors, for their respective services during the past year.

The following amendment to Article XIII of the By-Laws, agreed to for the first time at the last annual meeting, was finally adopted:

"That Article XIII be amended by adding after the word "Diocese," in line five of paragraph five, the following: "and the ministratious of the Church in the poorer districts."

The following alterations were then read for the first time and await confirmation:

That Article XIII of the By-Laws of the Church Society be amended by striking out the following words in Section C, beginning with first word of eleventh line of of said section: "all the members of the Board being also members of the Corporation of the Church Society, one half of whom in each order shall be elected by the Church

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ch ds of lso alf ch Society, and the other half by the Synod of the Diocese, the members of the Board to." and substituting the following therefor: "who shall be elected, one half of each order by the Church Society and the other half by the Synod of the Diocese. All the members of the Board shall be members of the Corporation of the Church Society; and the elected members shall."

That Article XIII of the By-Laws of the Church Society be amended by striking out the following words in Section B, lines eleven and twelve, page fifty-three: "to the extent of not more than two-thirds of the surplus revenue," and inserting the word "surplus" between the words 'the" and "revenue," in the tenth line.

That Article IV of the By-Laws of the Church Society be amended by striking out the word "two" in the first line, and substituting therefor the word "three."

A resolution, expressive of sincere regret at the enforced absence, through illiness, of the Revd. Canhon Richardson, Secretary of the Church Society; of the esteem in which, for his personal character, his talents, his valuable services, he is universally held; and of hope for his speedy restoration to health and active duty, was passed.*

The meeting was then closed with the Benediction.

45 VICT., CHAP. 89.

An Act to authorize the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, to consolidate certain Endowment Funds.

[Assented to 27th May, 1882.]

Preamble.

Whereas the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec has, by its petition, represented that it is in charge of certain endowment funds for the support of various Parishes and Missions within the Diocese of Quebec, and has prayed that the said Church Society should be authorized so to distribute any losses which may occur, through failure in investments, as to make them fall proportionately over the whole of such endowments held by the Society; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petitioners; Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:

Consolidation of endowment funds of society for certain purposes.

I. The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec is authorized, so far, to consolidate the said endowment funds, so placed and hereafter to be placed in the hands of the said society, under deeds of trust for investment, as to enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur through failure in investments proportionately over the whole.

Consolidation limited. 2. The said consolidation of the said intrusted endowment funds shall extend, only so far as to enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur, through failure in investments proportionately over the whole, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Note.—The following parishes or missions have agreed to the by-law on the consolidation of endowments, viz:—Barford and Hereford, Cape Cove and Percé, Cookshire, Dudswell, Gaspé Basin, Ireland and South Inverness, Levis, Malbaie, Inverness, Rivière-du-Loup, Bourg Louis, Kingsey, Magog and Georgeville, Stanstead, Durham, Leeds, Brompton and Windsor, Sandy Beach, Hatley, Coaticook, Melbourne and Richmond, Frampton East and West, Compton, St. Sylvester, Portneuf, Three Rivers.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1892.

(Presented to the Church Society, February 1st, 1893.)

Since presenting our last Annual Report to the Church Society, three events of great importance have occurred, which will ever make the year 1892 a memorable one in the annals of the Diocese of Quebec; we need hardly say that we refer, first, to the death of our beloved Bishop in the month of April last, then, secondly, to the choice of his successor, in the month of June, and, lastly, to the fact that on the 7th day of July last, our Church Society completed the fiftieth year of its existence.

By the death of our beloved Bishop the greatest possible loss has befallen this Diocese. Though not the originator of the Church Society, he devoted so much time, thought, and interest to its welfare, that it throve apace under his administration; as was happily the case with all our Church organizations.

Bishop Williams not only watched over the welfare of the Society, but inspired others with somewhat of his own energy and enthusiasm; Clergy and Laity alike under his example and guidance, strove to promote its well being, and thus are we enabled to shew a financial condition as remarkable in its present prosperity as it is encouraging for the future.

However, we could not be long left without a Chief Shepherd to watch over the spiritual affairs of the Diocese; and so in the month of June, at a meeting of the Synod, specially summoned for the purpose, we were called upon to elect his successor, when, by the blessing and guidance of the Holy Spirit, the Reverend Andrew Hunter Dunn, Vicar of All Saints, South Acton, England, was unanimously chosen for that very arduous and responsible position; and was consecrated in Christ Church Cathedral, Montreal, on Sunday, 18th September, 1892, during the session of the Provincial Synod.

Then, as we have already stated, on the 7th day of July in the same year, our Church Society, a society which has

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done so much in our Diocese, completed the 50th year of its existence; and when we bear in mind its comparative small beginning, in the year 1842; review the steady and solid work which, since then, it has been instrumental in accomplishing; and now see the great power and usefulness which it wields in the Master's cause, we have indeed reason to thank God and courageously press forward to yet wider and nobler ends.

On comparing the receipts of the year 1892, with the year 1891, we regret to have to record a slight decrease, as will be seen by the following statement:—

GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the support of Schools; in the promotion of Local Endowments; in the Education of the children of the Clergy; and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

During the past year, the following sums have been paid from this fund:

\$400.00 outfits for 4 clergymen.

\$100.00 towards a new Church at Malbaie.

\$100.00 towards a new Parsonage at Sandy Beach. \$100.00 towards a new Parsonage at Windsor Mills.

\$59.85 to the fund for the Education of the children of the Clergy.

And the following grants, which had already been made, but which had lapsed owing to their not having been claimed within 12 months, have been renewed, and are now waiting to be paid, viz:—

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\$100.00 towards a Parsonage House at Fitch Bay. \$100.00 towards a new Church at Hopetown, in the parish of New Carlisle.

MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries, in connection with the Annual Grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts: Assessments from the Rural Congregations: A grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, and the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund, administered by the Diocesan Board.)

This Fund, we are sorry to say, shews a decrease from the amount subscribed last year of \$162.44. This ought not to be. Such an important Fund as this should receive the warm support of every Church member in the Diocese, and should never be allowed to fall back.

The report of the Diocesan Board will furnish a full account of the Missionary labours of the Society.

PENSION FUND.

(For the support of aged and infirm Clergymen.)

Six Clergymen, after many years of faithful hard work in this Diocese, are now receiving their well earned pensions from this Fund, amounting in the aggregate to \$2,510.

This Fund, we may remark, owes its formation, under God, to the wisdom and foresight of our late beloved Bishop; and was established in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the Church Society, as a thank-offering to Almighty God for his abundant blessings upon this Society during the first 25 years of its existence. This one fact, if nothing else, should serve to perpetuate the memory of Bishop Williams in the Diocese of Quebec, so long as there remains a recipient of a pension from this Fund.

We are sorry to notice a decrease in the amount subscribed to this important Fund for this year of \$31.42, as compared with the previous year.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Annuities to the amount of \$2,981.25 have been paid during the past year to ten widows and eight children of Clergymen, who, at the time of their decease, were connected with this Diocese.

One, hitherto an annuitant to the extent of \$75 per annum, through coming of age, is no longer a claimant.

The widow of the Rev. R. G. Ward, who relinquished her pension in the month of October, 1890, has again been placed on the list of annuitants from this Fund.

We are glad to be able to state that the pensions paid to widows of the clergy of this Diocese have since January 1st, 1892, been raised from three to four hundred dollars per annum.

Your Board begs to acknowledge again with deep gratitude the annual grant of eighty pounds sterling for the cause of Education in this Diocese from that faithful handmaid of the Church, and the tried friend of this Diocese, the Colonial and Continental Church and School Society.

From the returns made by the Teachers, and by the several Clergymen in whose Missions these Schools are situated, we gather that the grants are much appreciated, and that a great good is being done by their means for the cause of the Church in the Diocese.

EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY.

The subscriptions shew an increase of \$115 over those of the previous year. This, we are bound to say, comes entirely from the City of Quebec, the amount received from the whole of the Country Missions, for this Fund, being only \$8.10. Surely there must be great fault somewhere to account for such a meagre result.

OBITUARY.

On the 20th day of April, 1892, the Right Reverend J. W. Williams, fourth Bishop of Quebec, after an Episcopate of

nearly twenty-nine years, entered into his rest. Of him it can be truly said that his works do follow him. He has left a mark upon the Diocese, which is never likely to be effaced.

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Though our population is sparse and our people not wealthy, the financial condition of the Diocese can compare favourably with that of larger and more wealthy Dioceses. The band of earnest laymen, who have devoted their attention to the various funds of the Church Society, have contributed, by their financial knowledge and business capacity, in no slight degree to this happy state of things. It was the late Bishop's good fortune to secure such valuable coadjutors; and all these, from their unbounded respect for his person and office, esteemed it a privilege to work with and under him

We have also to record with much regret the death of the Honourable Col. Wm. Rhodes, a Life Member, and a warm friend of the Church Society, who was called to his rest in the early part of the year.

THE ASSOCIATION OF CHURCH HELPERS.

Our best thanks are due to our friends of the Church Helpers' Association, for their successful exertions on behalf of the Church Society, by which is shown an increased contribution to its Funds of more than \$300 as compared with the previous year. No doubt, as this Association becomes better known, even greater results may be looked for in the future.

Their example should stir up the Country Districts to greater exertion; for, if even the same efforts had been made by them this year as in the past, instead of a deficiency of about twenty dollars, there would have been an increase of over three hundred dollars in the Society's income for the current year. Is it too much to hope that at the end of another year there will be a better state of things to report; for it must be remembered that if the revenue of the Society diminishes, it is not the City that will suffer, but the Church in the Country Districts.

BISHOP WILLIAMS' MEMORIAL MISSION FUND.

Immediately after the death of our late beloved Bishop, the question was mooted of raising a worthy memorial of one so respected throughout the Diocese.

The subject was considered at the meeting of the Synod, in June. In the month of October a public meeting was held in Quebec, presided over by our present Diocesan, to consider what would be the best form of memorial, one that would be of permanent use in the Diocese, and keep the Bishop's memory ever before us; when it was decided to raise a sum of money, twenty-five thousand dollars at the very least, the interest of which should go towards the maintenance and extension of the Church's missionary work which he had so much at heart. One thing perhaps more than another that suggested the memorial taking this form, was the fact that the late Bishop himself strongly felt the necessity for such a Fund; in order to meet the reduction and final withdrawal of the grant which we receive from the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, and also because he saw the necessity of employing more men in the Diocese, if our missionary work was to be maintained and extended.

We are glad to be able to report that the sum of nearly twenty thousand dollars has already been subscribed, and good hopes are now entertained that the Memorial Fund will reach thirty thousand dollars before it is finally closed. The Venerable Archdeacon Roe has offered to visit any Parish or Mission to which he may be invited and fully explain the object of the Fund. We would strongly advise Clergymen who have not done so, to avail themselves of the Archdeacon's offer, as there should be no Church family in any Parish or Mission to which the opportunity has not been given of contributing to so worthy an object.

NEW MEMBERS.

At our last annual meeting, one hundred and thirty-seven fresh names were added to the list of members of the Church Society.

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REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF MISSIONS

TO THE

Diocesan Church Society for the year 1892.

The following is the abstract of the revenue account of the Diocesan Board for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1892:—

A comparision of the above with the statement for the previous year shows an increase of over \$1,200 in the amount paid for stipends, and over \$300 for special missionary work, both items indicating a fuller occupancy of the field of labour; but, in order to meet this increased expenditure, your Board has been obliged to draw upon the surplus revenue of the Clergy Trust Fund for the full amount allowed by the By-law, and at the same time witness a reduction of over \$1,350 in the balance on hand at the close of 1891. In other words, this means that the Board's expenditure has exceeded its revenue from all sources by over \$1,350. At the present rate of expenditure, the balance, now standing at \$1,441.19, will have disappeared by the end of 1893, and the prospect of an actual deficit in 1894 will have to be faced.

And the outlook here presented acquires a darker hue in view of the withdrawal of the grant from the S. P. G., which cannot be continued to the Diocese for more than a few years on a rapidly diminishing scale. The Society did not reduce the grant for 1893 only in consequence of the death of the late Bishop, but has clearly intimated its intention of doing so in 1894.

In conveying to the Archdeacon the Society's decision, for the reason stated, not to reduce the grant for 1893, the Secretary at the same time expressed the desire of the S. P. G for some proposal on the part of the Diocese by which the "Society's grant could be relinquished at an early date."

Your Board, after long and careful consideration, recommends the following scheme of reduction to be submitted

by the Bishop:

- I. That the Society be requested to continue the grants of £150 and £50 for the Missionary on the Labrador Coast and for the Chaplain to the Hospital for services to sailors, respectively,—the latter to cease when the office next become vacant.
- II. That the balance of the grant, £900, be reduced as follows, viz:

That the grant be £700 for the years 1894 and 1895; £500 for the years 1896 and 1897, and £300 for the years 1898 and 1899, after which the grant is to cease.

Your Board cannot of course affirm that this proposal will be accepted by the S. P. G. The urgent claims pressing upon the Society for an extension of their work in the more purely missionary field among the heathen may demand a more speedy withdrawal of the aid so long contributed to old Colonial Dioceses; but the existence of a strong feeling in the minds of many churchmen in the Diocese in favour of an early relinquishment of all further assistance on the the one hand, and the pressure of our own obligations on the other, have indicated the necessity of some scheme of reduction that seemed to reconcile the interests of the work in the Diocese with the views of the Society.

Whether the Society accept this proposal or not, the situation is sufficiently grave, and your Board would earnestly draw the attention of members of the Church in the Diocese to the need of additional and special efforts from every quarter to prepare for the crisis at hand and endeavour to avert the danger of having to withdraw our hands from missionary work which has strong claims upon us.

Among the direct means by which help ought to be rendered, the following may be suggested:—

1. The speedy completion of the Bishop Williams Memorial Mission Fund, as originally contemplated, and its augmentation.—It now reaches over \$20,000, so that the minimum sum named—\$25,000—may be looked upon as assured; and to expect that the final returns will exceed that amount by several thousands is surely justified by the very gratifying results which have thus far followed the appeal on behalf of this Fund.

2. Additional subscriptions and larger offertories for the Mission Fund.—This is almost the only source of income capable of any degree of expansion, and the Fund of the Church Society which ministers to the most important needs of the Diocese. Contributions have shown no material increase for some years past. Its special importance and necessity to the missionary work of the Diocese at the present time, it is hoped, will be more fully recognized.

3. Assessments.—Whilst your Board cannot count upon any very large addition to its income from this source for some time to come, some increase may reasonably be expected, gradually rising as some of the newer Missions grow stronger. When it is considered that the aggregate assessment of eight among the more recently established Missions amounts to only \$1,535, or less than an average of \$200 each, the difference between this point and self-support surely suggests the expectation of improvement.

Your Board has observed on the other hand that in certain cases where numbers have been reduced by deaths or removals, congregations expect a proportionate reduction of assessments, and the plea, when justified, has been admitted. In future, it is plain, the financial difficulties to which reference has been made, will render it impossible to concede any reduction in the assessment. If, from any cause, the members in any congregation are diminished, greater efforts must be made to meet the assessment; and if that is found on trial to be impracticable, the Diocesan Board will then be compelled, however unwillingly, to put in force the recommendation made by the Synod in 1881, to meet an emergency similar to that now threatened, and unite two Missions into one.

The Diocesan Board was constituted only a few months previous to the death of Bishop Mountain. Its entire work therefore may be said to have been carried out under the guiding hand of our late revered and lamented Diocesan.

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His careful oversight, unflagging interest and ready participation in its important and anxious labours during his long episcopate are best known to those who were privileged to assist him in the solution of the many difficulties which from time to time engaged the consideration of the Board, and it is perhaps unnecessary on this occasion to say anything more in recognition of his wise and active agency in the conduct of the missionary work of the Diocese beyond transcribing the resolution adopted on the 18th May last, which reads as follows:

"The Diocesan Board take advantage of this first meeting, since the death of their late lamented President, to place on record their deep sense of the nobleness of his character as a Bishop in the Church of God, their profound confidence in the wisdom of his administration of the Diocese, and their affectionate attachment to his person, which has grown deeper and deeper as time went on.

The members of the Board are necessarily brought into the closest and most confidential relations with the Bishop of Quebec in the administration of the affairs of the Diocese; and their knowledge of the many admirable qualities of the late revered Bishop as a ruler of the Church is consequently larger than that of others. The members of the Board feel it their duty and privilege to bear their witness to the absolute impartiality, justice and fairness of the late Bishop as well as to the great ability which he ever displayed in all matters that came before the Board, and to record their persuasion that to him is largely due the distinguished success which, under God's blessing, has attended the labours of the Board in the extension of the work in this Diocese."

There are at present thirty Missions aided by the Diocesan Board, all of which enjoy the blessing of a resident Clergyman. Labrador, which completes the number on the full list, is, for the time being, served by a Catechist and School Master. There are besides four self-supporting Parishes which have retained their connection with the Board.

The work which is being done in these Missions and Parishes as well as in some outlying stations is set forth with many interesting particulars in the reports of the Clergy. A very valuable summary of the progress made in the St. Francis District will be found in the usual report transmitted to the Church Society; and the special work

carried on at Scotstown, Lake Megantic and Hereford, under the direction of the Archdeacon, is narrated in his report on those places. The impression to be gathered from all these sources of information is that the Missionaries of this Diocese are entitled to high praise for the unsparing way in which, amidst great difficulties, they devote themselves to the work of Christ and His Church.

The Archdeacon has discharged the duties of General Missionary Agent during the past year with his usual zeal and devotion in addition to the trying and important labours which devolved upon him on the death of the late Bishop. It is only right that your Board should take this opportunity of expressing its high appreciation of the manner in which all those various duties were fulfilled.

Report of the St. Francis District Association of the Church Society for the year 1892.

Although the total amount of money raised during the year for Church purposes is less by some \$2,000.00 than that of last year, the reports of the various Parishes and Missions of the District are on the whole very encouraging. They show abundantly that life and activity have characterized the Church throughout the year. The following facts will serve to illustrate this:

A total amount of \$25,809.38 has been raised in the District during the year for the general work of the Church; of which, the sum of \$3,102.02—some \$771.82 more than last year— has been devoted to extra parochial objects.

The Parish of Danville devotes one-seventh of its income for the year, and the Parish of Sherbrooke one-fifth of its

income, to outside objects.

While a few reports refer to fluctuations of population and to losses sustained through the removal of Parishioners -as many as thirty Church people having removed during the year from one Mission-it is evident that in most Parishes steady progress has been made. We find the usual increase and improvement of Church property recorded, many reports making mention of repairs and additions to their Churches, their Parsonages and their Burying-grounds. In Hereford the sum of \$100 and a site for a new Church have been offered as a free gift. Rector of Richmond reports the happy termination of the long pending suit and an award of \$2,000 towards the reconstruction of the Parish Church. He also reports the building of a new Parsonage which is already nearly free from debt. The Incumbent of Fitch Bay and Georgeville also reports his Parsonage nearly paid up. The Principal of Bishop's College reports the year one of restoration, the College Chapel having been so far rebuilt that a Service of Dedication was held in it in the month of October last. He adds that sufficient funds have been provided to warrant the undertaking of further work; and that the stalls alone remain to be provided for. A conditional subscription of \$700 will be available, he says, when \$2,500 more shall be in hand.

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But it is not to material progress alone that the reports bear witness. Solid educationial work continues to be done at Lennoxville and Compton. Both places deserve far more support than they receive. In Durham a Parochial Mission has been conducted, with excellent results, by one of our Diocesan Clergy, Rev. Edwin Weary. And the Revd. Canon Bullock, of Leeds, England, is to conduct a Mission in Sherbrooke in the coming Lent. An increase of celebrations of Holy Communion, speaking of a truer estimate of the value of that great Sacrament, together with a general brightening of the Services by more and heartier music, has been reported from more than one or two of our Parishes. The report from Magog tells of an organization, "The Associated Promoters of Worship," established to increase the heartiness of the Services of the Church. A District Choir Association has been organized under the efficient musical leadership of Mr. Arthur Dorey, of Sherbrooke, and must, in time, lead to a greatly improved taste in Church music. Under the auspices of this Association very successful Choir Festivals have been held in Sherbrooke, Cookshire and Hatley, the good effects of which are very evident. The Church is much indebted to Mr. Dorey for his self-denying labours. Bishop's College has continued to be a centre of Missionary life and effort. The Professors have, as usual, given cheerful aid to their brethren, the Parochial Clergy. And the members of the Bishop's College Brotherhood of Readers, under their Warden, the Revd. B. G. Wilkinson, Prof. of Pastoral Theology, have had, and have used to good effect, many opportunities of serving the Church and of gaining experience as Lay-Readers. Some twelve Missions and Parishes have had the benefit of their services. And one report, referring to their work, says:—and it is no small praise—" after a vacancy of nearly a year they handed the Mission over to the newly appointed Incumbent in a healthy condition."

In addition to such facts as the above, evidence of the advance made by the Church during the year is found in

the character and tone of the work done.

One of the most hopeful features of the past year's work is the quickened interest of clergy and people in the training of children. In proof of this it may be stated that most of the reports bear witness to the efforts being made to increase the efficiency of our Sunday Schools; while in the report from Hatley we are told of a most successful Sunday School Teachers' Conference held in that place, at which

were present teachers and elergymen from various Parishes and Missions far and near. Nor are the clergy any longer content to depend entirely upon the ministry of Sunday Schools. One Missionary—and he represents many—speaks of giving instruction to the children himself by public catechising and the use of charts. Another speaks of visiting the district schools and having many children thus brought under religious instruction. And a third says: "I find myself responsible for teaching Sacred History in a school of eighty pupils."

Quite akin to this awakened interest in the teaching of children is the evidently growing attention paid to the bringing of children to the Sacrament of Regeneration. The statistics this year show a marked increase in the number of children admitted through the appointed gateway of Baptism into Christ's Holy Church. The total number

reported is three hundred and eighty-six. The Mission of Waterville alone—one of the newly established Missions—reports thirty-three children and twelve adults baptized.

Another good feature in the outlook, is the awakening of conscience on the subject of, "how to raise money for Church purposes." While the benefit of social gatherings and of co-operative work is fully recognized, the blessedness of pure giving is emphasized. Two reports speak with undisguised thankfulness of the successful change from old methods of money making, in which in one form or another a return is obtained for money contributed, to direct and real giving. Under this head the words of a layman quoted in one of these reports are worthy of repetition: "When I endeavour to follow the rule of laying by period-"ically a certain amount for God, I never have any difficulty, if only my aim is to cancel God's debt first; and "what is more I have never been sorry for it.

Yet another encouraging sign of the times is the increasing appreciation of good literature as a means of extending

the influence and principles of the Church.

Several reports acknowledge with gratitude the liberality of the Ven. S. P. C. K. in granting additions to Sunday School Libraries. One refers to the valuable character of these books, treating as many of them do, of Church History and Church Doctrine, and all of them being sound and wholesome. In another report the Missionary expresses his conviction that a general distribution of Churchly tracts throughout his large country Mission would greatly strength-

en his hands. The only question appears to be how to obtain money to buy the necessary tracts. Yet another clergyman speaks with appreciation of the visit of the recently employed Colporteur and says: "he was well received, and I have had

many enquiries asking when he is coming again."

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But, of all the evidences of healthy life revealed by the reports of the year just closed, the chief place of importance must be given to the signs of a growing missionary spirit. No Church can be progressive, we might almost say no Church can live, except it be possessed by the spirit of Missionary zeal. It is distinctly hopeful therefore when our district reports tell us of \$1080.55 raised in the year for Foreign and Domestic Missions; of \$230.13 given to the suffering Church in Newfoundland; and of \$1082.25 contributed to our own Diocesan Church Society. But it is yet more hopeful when we read of the revival of Missionary Meetings; of laity taking a part at these meetings in advocating the cause of the Blessed Master; of women pressing to the front in Missionary work; and of the Woman's Auxiliary grown to be an essential part of our Parochial machinery, above all, when we read of Missionaries whose actions, speaking more powerfully than words could do, declare that their one concern is to extend their Master's Kingdom; one visiting, during the last two months, and largely on foot, some one hundred and sixty-four families scattered over an area ten miles square; another taking four services on a Sunday and driving eighteen miles to do it; yet another serving seven stations, and with apostolic ardour reaching out, not content with the bare limits of his duty, to minister to a remote settlement of people living over the border in the neighbouring State of Vermont.

It is a natural sequel to all this that there are, at least, two centres of Church work, Scotstown and Hereford, where the appointment of a resident missionary is imperative if the work is to go on as it should. While thanking God for the state of things which the reports of the year disclose it is plainly our duty to pray that, having opened the way in these places, He would also give us the means

and the men for the work.

ACTON

The Rev. Louis C. Wurtele reports :-

Two years ago the village of Actonvale was incorporated into the Town of Acton. Naturally, from the additional privileges, secured by such a step, it was expected the place would thrive and be more prosperous,—that factories would be built, and many other openings presented to the young for the application of their different talents. None of these expectations have as yet been realized. There still remained in the town one solitary boot factory, giving employment to about sixty hands, and one morning last Spring it was reduced to ashes. In about a fortnight afterwards the workmen all left this locality to find elsewhere means of support for their families.

In reality, the Town of Acton is a central place, just half way between Montreal and Sherbrocke, on the line of the Grand Trunk Railway. There is also here a large market building, at which every Saturday meats and vegetables of all kinds can be bought, at a far lower rate than at either Sherbrooke or Montreal, making it a very cheap place to live in; besides this, the town has good water-works, by which the houses are all supplied with water. These and many other advantages belong to the place, and yet the public outside do not appear to be aware of them; at least they do not come to avail themselves of them, and the inhabitants are meanwhile hoping and hoping on.

Thus it is evident that the temporal prospects of this Mission are not very assuring, nor cheering. However, it is with a thankful heart, that the Incumbent can report the attendance at the Church Services to be gradually increasing; the attendance also at the Holy Communion has shown a very good average. Although the members of the congregation are fewer in number, they are more regular in their attendance at Church than in past years.

During the year were held six Socials, affording a good opportunity for friendly intercourse among the parishioners as well as netting \$16.96 for defraying Church expenses

The request of his Lordship for the celebration of the Holy Communion on Thanksgiving day was joyfully complied with, as no better manifestation of our thankfulness for mercies received, could be given than by the participation in the Holy Eucharist. It is an act of gratitude every time we participate; how much more then it should be so on a day, specially appointed as a day of thanksgiving.

ASCOT CORNER AND WESTBURY.

The Rev. II. E. Wright reports:-

In making a report of work done in this Mission, I have nothing remarkable to relate, either in the way of success or of failure.

It has been a time of continued effort to place the Church upon a firmer basis than it has hitherto occupied. In some parts of this Mission former Missionaries, carried away by a too fervent zeal to add to the Church, have hurried people on and made them members of the Church before they fully understood the full import of their actions—they were not built up in the faith—and as soon as offences came immediately they fell away. I now find it much more difficult to deal with these people than with those who have not yet been brought under the influence of religious training.

On the whole, however, I am thankful to relate, there are signs of improvement, especially among the young.

Finding it difficult to approach the parents directly, I have tried to do so through the children, and have hopes of accomplishing much good in this way.

Owing to the demand that is made upon my time in conducting the regular Services of the Church, I have not been able to give as much attention in certain parts of the Mission to Sunday Schools as I thought necessary. To remedy this defect I applied for, and obtained permission to visit the District Schools in those parts weekly and teach the children as I would in our own Sunday Schools. I have in this way over forty children under regular Church instruction, besides those in my Sunday School at East Angus.

I am happy also to relate that, at a Vestry Meeting, called for the purpose at Westbury Church, it was proposed and carried unanimously that Services be discontinued there and that the two congregations of Westbury and East

Angus form but one, with Christ Church, East Angus, as their Parish Church. This, I think, is already productive of good, and will facilitate Church work very much.

Christ Church, East Angus.—During the past year, the Church at East Angus has been consecrated to the service of God, being the last Church consecrated, I believe, by our late beloved Bishop. The Church has also been improved by the addition of a good stone Font, matting, and Altar cloth. The Church grounds have also been cleared of stones and stumps, and surrounded by a substantial fence. The Parsonage has received two coats of paint: A carriage house has also been erected on the Parsonage property. The hearty thanks of the people are due to Mr. Finlay, the managing director of the Royal Pulp and Paper Company, through whose generous assistance we have been able to accomplish so much.

The Ladies' Guild has also carned the gratitude of all by their patient and persevering efforts to make the House of God more fit for the worship of the great Creator of all. They have made our Church what it is.

I have Sunday School here every Sunday, and now have Services both morning and evening every Sunday but one in the month, and they are well attended by all.

Ascot Corner. — Services have been held here regularly every Sunday during the past year, but they are not attended as they should be.

I held Services for eight consecutives evenings during last Lent; they were well attended and, I think, did some good. The financial position of this congregation is better than at any time since my work here began. It is in this part of my Mission that I teach in the District Schools.

Westbury.—Services were held here regularly till about one month ago, when the people decided to unite with the congregation of East Angus. I owe great thanks to Miss Katie Chester, who was the organist in this Church, and now kindly assists us in the same capacity at East Angus.

BARFORD AND HEREFORD.

The Rev. G. H. A. Murray reports:-

In taking both a retrospective and a prospective view of the Church's work in this Mission, in comparing the barriers that have already been surmonted with those that still beset the path of advance, there is much reason to thank God and take courage.

With the help of two students from Bishop's College, Lennoxville, regular Services have been maintained at the seven following stations, each of which I shall treat of sepa-

rately:

St. Cuthbert's Church, Dixville.—This being the head-quarters of the Mission, Morning and Evening Services are held every Sunday. Owing to demands elsewhere, the Evening Service was omitted a few times this year. The attendance at the 10.30 A.M. Service, compared with the total number of actual members of the congregation, has been very good.

I cannot speak so encouragingly of the Sunday evening and Wednesday evening Services, both of which are usually but thinly attended. At the latter I have just begun a course of addresses on the history of the Christian Church.

The Holy Week Services were fairly well attended; and those of Easter were bright and hearty, with a good number of communicants.

I am happy to say that there is a slight increase in the number of Sunday School scholars, and that the lessons are, for the most part, well prepared. I superintend the school and teach the senior class; Miss M. Damen, whose efficient services I have lately secured, teaches the juniors.

Our library has been increased by about lifty volumes of S. P. C. K. books.

The few members of the Guild meet regularly and are doing good work. We have to thank them for a pretty new superfrontal and dossal curtain, which improve the appearance of the Chancel very much; we have also to thank the St. Matthew's Guild, Quebec, for making the same gratis.

St. Lawrence Church, Barford.—Added to the regular fortnightly Services at 2.30 P. M., Rev. Dr Adams has been kind enough to give this congregation four Morning Services, with a celebration of the Holy Communion at each.

Miss Ward, an old and respected member of the Church here, entered into her rest last June.

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ssions, 10 ; St. The Special Offertories throughout the year, as well as the subscriptions to the Church Society, from this congregation, have been very liberal.

St. Paul's Church, Stanhope.—Our late revered Bishop, whose death was deeply felt all over the Mission, visited this Church on the 13th of last December. His Lordship confirmed eleven candidates, all from Averill, Vermont,—two of whom he also baptized. They all received the Holy Communion at the same Service. The Bishop's solemn and impressive address was listened to by a large and attentive congregation.

Services are held alternately at 10.30 A.M. and 7 P.M. one Sunday by a student; and at 4 P.M. the next by myself. This is the usual order, and it is seldom changed, except that I take the student's place when there is to be a celebration of the Holy Communion. The congregation is not as large as it ought to be; still, of late, the attendance has been better, and the singing and responding more hearty. Owing to press of work in other parts of the Mission, I was obliged to suspend the regular Friday Evening Services for a time; I have, however, begun them again under encouraging prospects.

Mrs. Hughes and Mrs. R. Marsh take efficient charge of the Sunday School, which, though still small, is larger than in the past; but the co-operation of the parents in this

branch of the Church's work is sadly lacking.

Last February, at the solicitation of a few members of the congregation, I called a meeting for the purpose of organizing a Ladies' Guild. A good number turned out; the Guild was organized, and the members of it deserve much credit for what they have accomplished thus far. The proceeds of the first sale amounted to \$70.90, which amount was applied towards a new bell for the Church; this, together with a sum my predecessor left me for the same purpose, and what I succeeded in collecting, making in all \$112.50, was sufficient to pay for a 400 lb. bell, whose sweet tones now call the congregation to worship.

Our thanks are certainly due to Mrs. A. M. Stetson, not only for the liberal way in which she encouraged the Guild but also for the improvements she made in the appearance of the Chancel by the addition of a new curtain, superfrontal, and hanging for the Lectern. Her aim is to beautify God's House.

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Church of the Advent, Perryboro'.— The new Church spoken of in my last report was consecrated December 12th, 1891, and, at the same Service, eleven persons received the Apostolic rite of Confirmation, all of whom received the Holy Communion.

Two beautiful, large banner lamps, an Altar cloth and hangings for the Prayer Desk and Lectern, are tangible proofs of the good work that is being done by the Guild.

We owe our best thanks to the Church Helpers' Association, Quebec, for a neat and serviceable Communion Set; also, to Miss Nish, for her gift of Fair Linen.

This congregation is steady, and the Service is always hearty. In most cases I have been obliged to have the celebration of the Holy Communion at 7.30 or 8 A.M.; and on each occasion the attendance has been very good. Last Christmas, at the 8 A.M. Service, out of a congregation of about thirty, there were twenty communicants, eight of whom were members of one family; and at 7.30 A.M. on Easter Day there was a congregation of forty, twenty-six of whom communicated.

I hope the day is not far distant when this deserving congregation shall have a weekly instead of a fortnightly Sunday Service. When the weather is such that the scholars can come to the Church, Mr. Nish and Mrs. Birch attend to the Sunday School work.

All Saint's Church, Hereford. — Morning Service has been held weekly during the Christmas and Mid-summer vacations, and fortnightly the remainder of the year. The attendance during the Summer months was fairly good. In warm weather nearly thirty children come to Sunday School. Through the kindness of Archdeacon Roe and the S. P. C. K., there is a Sunday School Library of lifty volumes.

It is vain to hope for satisfactory results here until a resident clergyman can be appointed. The people need some one to go in and out among them, who would be at the same time a pastor, teacher, counsellor, and friend. There are so many claims upon me nearer home that it is impossible to exercise such pastoral supervision as is necessary to the spiritual welfare of the people, who are hungering for more ministrations. The majority of the families who reside in this vicinity are in some way or other connected with the Church. A Missionary would find

plenty to do in the township of Hereford alone, which, apart from this congregation, includes those of Perryboro' and Hall's Stream.

On October 9th, I baptised two adults and five children; there are several others looking forward to Baptism at an early date.

Hall's Stream.—Instead of holding the Services at Beecher Falls, Vermont, as heretofore, they are now held in the school house here on the same Sundays as they are held at Hereford; and the same remarks with regard to the attendance, etc., which have already been made under that place, will apply here; the only difference is that the Adventists are now in the field.

Mr. Bean has kindly offered a site for a new Church and \$100 towards its erection. This would be the most convenient place for the head-quarters of the Mission of Hereford.

Averill, Vermont.—As I send a report to the Bishop of Vermont every quarter, I need say but little here. Being a fluctuating population, our congregation has suffered from removals. Sunday School work is carried on under the competent supervision of Miss Ames assisted by other painstaking teachers.

Though I have been blessed with the best of health since I come to the Mission, yet I thought it desirable to have a change last Summer; accordingly, having obtained leave of absence, I spent a month at Portneuf, during which time I relieved Rev. C. B. Washer. Mr. Dowdell, a student of Bishop's College, who has been working in the Mission since last April, and has given general satisfaction, carried on the work here.

Mr. C. E. Bishop, another student, has done good work at Hereford and Averill.

I have to thank Rev. Dr. Adams for coming to my assistance so often; I have also to thank Ven. Archdeacon Roe, and Revds. Canon Foster, A. Stevens, I. M. Thompson, W. T. Forsythe, and N. P. Yates, for special sermons.

On the whole, the financial affairs of the Mission are on a sound basis; and though the spiritual condition of the congregations is far from being up to one's ideal, nevertheless the leavening influence of God's Holy Spirit may already be working secretly in hearts that one least suspects. Let us

but have faith in the promise given by the great Head of the Church, and let that faith be the incentive to persevere in the glorious work that He has placed us here to do.

BARNSTON.

The Rev. C. H. Brooks reports:-

Rev. Joseph Eames left in December 1891 to settle in Lancaster, N. H. From that time to the end of August 1892, the Tervices were conducted by the Students, Wilson and Kerr.

I began my duties as Lay Reader, September 1, 1892, and was ordained in the Church at Way's Mills, October 2nd, by Bishop Dunn, about two hundred persons being present, and much interest awakened; are not local Ordinations more generally advisable?

Special Confirmation held at Barnston Corner, September

29th, by Bishop Dunn, for Rev. C. Brooks and wife.

Since September 1st, excluding Ordination day, the morning congregation at Way's Mills has averaged fifty-one, and the fortnightly Sunday evening Service twenty-two.

The regular Services are: Sunday morning, 10.30, Way's Mills; Sunday afternoon, 230, Barnston Corner; Sunday evening, 7, alternately Way's Mills and Barnston.

Thanksgiving Services were held: Way's Mills, morning,

and Barnston Corner, evening.

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A furnace has just been placed in the Way's Mills Church, and works very satisfactorily, and a horse-shed of eight stalls just completed at Barnston Corner, where granite underpinning for the Church is also provided; the Ladies' Guild in each place meets fortnightly, and raises money for such objects as the above. We need a bell at Way's Mills.

In about two months time I have visited one hundred and sixty-four families, mostly scattered farm-houses.

At Barnston Corner the evening attendance is the largest, but neither averages over twenty; a few strangers are beginning to come in, and things look slightly more hopeful than at first; the ground however is unoccupied, and the Church idea seems scarcely to exist; Way's Mills district promises much larger things, and was wisely, I believe, selected as the centre of the Mission.

I am appointing two lady communicants in each case, as district visitors for each of the six out-stations with which our parish divides itself; have also collectors appointed to canvass each neighborhood in behalf of the Church Society, &c. The whole township needs to be saturated with first-class tracts, largely on Church topics.

The tone of things is hopeful; the assessments will be increased the coming year, and fruits of godliness will appear, we believe, to God's glory.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. Thos. Adams Reports:—

At the end of another Christian year, we have cause to look back with gratitude and to look forward with hopefulness.

This year has proved to be one of restoration, though somewhat incomplete. During this year we have not been able to exercise the use of our Chapel. The Sunday Services and the celebrations of the Holy Communion have been

held in St. George's Church, the College staff having been responsible for one of the sermons on Sundays. Morning and Evening Prayer have been regularly held in the College Library, which, however, has been much crowded. We owe a debt of gratitude to our Rector at 1 colleague, the Rev. Professor Scarth, for welcoming us into the Parish Church and allowing us its frequent use. progress of the restoration has been as follows: A contract was awarded to Messrs. Lemaire & Son, of Sherbrooke, for \$8,000 in round figures: this sum exceeded the funds available, but three members of the committee made themselves responsible for the excess. This contract provided for the rebuilding of the walls, glazing, most of the roof and heating. but omitted plastering and the inner sheating of the roof as well as the stalls and seating. In the Chapel, partially restored, a choral celebration was held on the occasion of the first visit of the Bishop (October 4th). The Bishop himself celebrated and was the preacher. It was then felt that the Winter could not be faced in the Chapel in its unplastered state, and some additional subscriptions coming in at this time, it was resolved to plaster the Chapel at once and to complete the roof. This has now been done, and the stalls and seating remain to be done. We have gone on the principle of doing everything solidly, and also of doing the more essential parts first; but it may be remarked that the part which remains to be done is that which is most distinctive of a College Chapel. question of an organ is now before the committee; fortunately we have at least \$1,600 available for this object. As regards the funds required for the completion of the Chapel, we have a conditional promise of \$700 from R. Hamilton, Esq., available when \$4,000 shall have been subscribed otherwise; to earn this gift of \$700, about \$2,500 or more is still required. It is very important that the College Chapel should be fully and adequately restored, as an object lesson daily placed before those who are to be in a few years our clergy and laity. We shall be able to hold our Services in the Chapel in the approaching Lent Term; but we shall also hope to complete the internal wood-work at no distant date.

The Divinity House was entered upon for its own proper use in January, 1892; its rooms had been, during 1891, occupied as class rooms by the School. In October, 1892,

ten additional rooms were completed, thus giving increased

accommodation.

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Special Services of dedication—were held in the Divinity House and in the School, on St. Matthias' Day, on which occasion our revered Bishop Williams was with us for the last time. He had never preached or spoken to us with greater effect or vigour than on than well remembered occasion.

The Warden of the Brotherhood of Lay Readers will give a detailed report of the work done by that association.

Some of our old students have entered on the work of

the ministry:

As deacons, the Rev. H. A. Brooke, B.A. (Peninsula); and a former pupil of the school, Rev. Charles Brooks,

M.A. (Barnston).

As priests, the Rev. B. G. Wilkinson, B. A., Professor of Pastoral Theology; the Rev. H. E. Wright, B.A. (Angus); the Rev. H. A. Dickson, M.A. (Randboro); Mr. W. T. Lipton, B.A., has been accepted as a candidate for Holy Orders by the Lord Bishop of Ontario.

Mr. J. N. Kerr, B.A., has gone to work in Labrador as a

Lay Reader.

Owing to the vacancy of the See no confirmation was held this year, a class is now being prepared for confirmation. Besides this the Principal, as Chaplain of the school, has two other classes every Sunday — a communicants' class and junior class. Every Sunday evening a Service is held by the Principal for the boys, in the Williams Hall. An interesting address was given on September 25th by

an old boy, Rural Dean Forneret, of Hamilton.

The College Missionary Union has held each Term its Special Services. Celebration at 7.15 A.M. Evensong with special sermon at 5 P.M. Meeting at 7.30 P.M. The preachers have been Rev. Alfred Wheeler, of Island Pond, Vt.; the Rev. G. H. A. Murray, M.A., of Dixville; the Rev. F. G. Scott, M.A., of Drummondville. The special speakers have been: the Rev. Principal, on "Madagascar"; the Rev. N. P. Yates, B.A., on "Work amongst the Esquimaux"; the Rev. Charles Brooks, M.A., on "Work in Constantinople".

Students' papers have been read by Messrs. T. N. Kerr, B.A., on "Bishop Steere"; E. R. Wilson, B.A., on "St.

Patrick"; N. M. Bayne, B.A., on "St. Columba."

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The year has seen an addition to the present College Staff by the appointment of the Rev. B. G. Wilkinson, B.A., to the chair of Pastoral Theology. It is gratifying to find one of our own graduates so well able to take up this important work. The new professor has given good auguries of success.

The Special Lenten additional Service at 7.45 A.M., lasting till 8, was held daily. Helpful readings were given

from Dean Paget's "Spirit of Discipline."

The Principal has recently undertaken to have the Sandhill Church supplied once a fortnight, thus giving that Church a Service every Sunday afternoon.

During the year, the Principal has preached at Milby, Sandhill, Sherbrooke, Georgeville, Dixville (5 missions),

North Hatley, Eustis, Montreal (St. James).

BROTHERHOOD OF READERS, B. C. L.

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The Warden of the College Brotherhood of Readers begs to hand in the following report of work done during the past year:

Mr. J. N. Kerr, B.A., conducted Sunday Services at Scotstown regularly up to 1st July last. During the Christmas vacation he stayed there. During July and August last Mr. Kerr had charge of Barnston.

Mr. W. T. Lipton, B.A., took Services at Hereford for

three Sundays during April.

Mr. H. A. Brooke, B.A., assisted the Rev. W. T. Forsythe up to 1st September; being left in charge of the Parish for

six weeks during July and August.

Mr. E. K. Wilson, B.A., had charge of Barnston during the Christmas vacation and conducted Sunday Services regularly there from 1st December to 1st July. He took charge of New Carlisle on 17th July and remained there till 78th September. Since October 2nd he has taken Services on alternate Sundays at Scotstown.

Mr. N. M. Bayne, B.A., has conducted Services regularly on Sundays throughout the year at Lake Megantic, and stayed there to take charge of the Mission during the Christmas and Summer vacations.

Mr. C. E. Bishop took duty under the Rev. G. Murray from 1st December to April. He had charge of Hereford during the Mid-summer vacation, and has, since the beginning of the academical year, taken the Sunday Services at

Milby.

Mr. A. H. Moore, during the Christmas holidays, had charge of St. Sylvestre, and during the Summer vacation had charge of Acton for six weeks; and took Services on six Sundays at Windsor. Since the re-opening of the College, he has taken Services at Scotstown on alternate Sundays.

Mr. W. Barton took Services on two Sundays at Hereford in November, 1891. And during the illness of the Rev. I. Thompson took his duty on six Sundays about Easter last. Has taken occasional Sunday Services since the re-open-

ing of the College.

Mr. E. C. Avery assisted the Rev. J. Hepburn, at Richmond, from 5th June to 2nd October. Since October 9th, has been assisting the Rev. W. T. Forsythe at Stanstead.

In addition to the above, Messrs. Almond and Dowdell, associate members of the Brotherhood of Readers, have, under the sanction of the Lord Bishop, given help to Clergymen as follows:

Mr. J. Almond—Services on alternate Sundays since

On the eighth, tenth and twelfth Sundays after Trinity, the Warden took Services at Scotstown and Canterbury (and Sunday School), twice with a celebration of the Holy Communion. On the ninth Sunday after Trinity, he took the Services at Cookshire and Johnville. He has also taken Services and celebrated the Holy Communion at Milby, on the 2nd October and 6th November.

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BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports:

The year just ending is one that will be long remembered here for the great amount of sickness and many deaths by which its first months were marked. Most of my time last Winter was taken up in visiting the sick and dying.

I am thankful to say that there has been much to encourage me in my work. In the first place I may mention the great improvement in the appearance of the place, caused by the building of a new board fence, nicely whitewashed, three acres long by the road in front of the Parsonage. This was paid for out of the proceeds of the second concert spoken of in my last Report. The road itself was also nicely built and rounded up. Then a sidewalk was made from the road to the Parsonage. All this made a very great difference in the appearance of the place.

Our Services have been well attended, and the singing and responding have improved. I have two Services in the Church every Sunday. I have also three outposts, to one of which I go every second Sunday, and to each of the other two every fourth Sunday. I have also Services on

week-days.

There is one thing in regard to which a great change of feeling for the better has taken place: this is in reference to the Women's Auxiliary of Domestie and Foreign Missions. This is now, I trust, an established institution in Bourg Louis. It has now fifty members, and it is hoped that ten more will be added soon.

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Thanks to the grants from the Church Society, we have now three schools in operation. No. 3 has been re-opened, under one of its former teachers, after having been closed

two years.

Last year I could chronicle several visits made to us. This year we have had only one. This was from the Rev. A. J. Balfour, who kindly came and helped us to realize the antiquity and history of our Church by the aid of his Lantern.

We are expecting a visit from our new Bishop. I have no candidates for Confirmation ready. Our lamented late Bishop confirmed twenty-five here last year; but our present Bishop has kindly promised to come without waiting for me to have candidates ready.

Our people have taken great pains in decorating our Church for Christmas, and it looks well. It is a beautiful little Church inside; the roof, however, greatly needs recovering. I am hoping to raise funds to do this next Spring. The ladies of the Church Helpers' Association have expressed a readiness to help us, if our people will do their part, as I trust they will.

I have been collecting towards the Bishop Williams Memorial Fund. Fifty-two dollars and seventy-five cents have already been paid, and some eight dollars more promised. This will make our contribution over sixty dollars.

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

The Rev. J. C. Cox reports:—

With the assistance of our Lay Reader, the usual Services have been kept up at the three Churches belonging to this Mission, viz: At St. George's, Windsor Mills, twice each Sunday; at Christ Church, Brompton, once, and at Grace Church, Hardwood Hill, once on each alternate Sunday; but in Winter, while the roads were bad, only once a month. The distance I have to drive on the Sunday that I hold Service at the Hill, is twenty miles; and when the roads are very bad I am unable, after a Service, and a celebration of the Holy Communion at Brompton, to reach this Church in time for an afternoon Service. As we have very few people now left at the Hill, the congregation here, especially in Winter, is small and is composed chiefly of young boys and girls, some of them English boys from the Home in Sherbrooke, placed here with farmers, who come to be catechised, and remain for a short Service. In Summer, however, we usually have a larger attendance; but consisting chiefly of dissenters, unfamiliar with our Prayer Book. Some benefit is derived here from the use of the paged Prayer Book, as, by its means, they are better able to follow in the Service.

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Last Winter there was more than the usual amount of sickness among my people at Windsor Mills; one family, especially, that of my senior Warden, was greatly afflicted; every member of his family (as well as that of his son's near by,) being very ill with La Grippe, at about the same time. This sickness resulted in the death of one of the sons, a very steady, promising young man and a general favorite with the entire community, here, as well as in Durham, his former place of residence. This young man,—whose death was a loss to the Mission,—was a brother of the esteemed clergyman at Hatley.

During Advent and Lent, special week-night Services were held at Windsor and Brompton, and were fairly well attended. We have, during the past year, suffered greatly by removals; no fewer than thirty persons, whom we regarded as belonging to us, having left the Mission, in addition to those lost by death. In consequence of this, the number of our communicants, particularly at Windsor Mills, has diminished rather than increased, and the number of scholars at St. George's Sunday School is small.

During the year, several socials have been held at the Parsonage and elsewhere. By means of these, a two-fold object is attained: first, to raise funds for Church purposes; secondly, to cultivate a friendly spirit between members of our Church, and all others who may attend them.

The usual entertainment, on these occasions, consists of music and readings. Our Roman Catholic friends often render us good assistance.

The chief difficulty with which this Mission has to contend, is the financial one. The effort to make up the assessment each quarter, seems to be a continual source of anxiety to the Church-Wardens, both here and at Brompton. This difficulty, particularly at Windsor Mills, may in part be due, the past year, to the fact that we have been called upon to do our utmost to pay off the debt on the new Parsonage; the great incentive for doing this at once, being that we might be able to claim the conditional grant of \$100 made to us by the Church Society; likewise, the promise from Mr. Robert Hamilton, of \$25.00 (besides the \$50.00 previously donated), on like condition, viz.: that by the payment of these two sums our Parsonnage property here should be absolutely free from all debt.

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o conne asrce of frompnay in e been e new being ant of e, the es the nat by operty Last Spring, the Archdeacon, after urging upon our people the necessity of trying to raise the amount required, in order to claim the above grants, kindly offered, as an additional stimulus, to contribute the sum of one dollar for every ten dollars raised before the first of December.

Having raised \$160.00, I have received the Archdeacon's cheque for \$16.00; and am now able to claim the Society's grant, and also that promised by Mr. Hamilton. The prospect, therefore, of being entirely free from debt, has at length dawned upon this struggling Mission; and, best of all, we have a fine respectable Parsonage, near the Church.

At Brompton, fortnightly meetings from house to house have been hald, and thereby money raised for Parish purposes. And Church sheds have been re-shingled, the men giving their labor gratis; also, curtains for the windows provided. We have money in hand for a Chancel-chair. We are much indebted to Miss Riches, organist, as also to Mrs. Knapp and Mrs. G. Ward our Sunday School Teachers. The Senior class I usually take myself.

I should not omit to give a word of praise to the few members of the Women's Association at Windsor Mills. Though few in number, they hold themselves responsible for the clothing of an Indian girl belonging to the Regina Indian Reserve in the North-West.

BURY.

The Rev. H. S. Fuller reports:-

Work in this Parish has gone quietly forward during the past year, leaving perhaps little worthy of record, beyond the recognition, on my part of the kindly spirit of helpfulness and sympathy which has characterized the conduct of so many of our Church members during my term of office in this Parish, and which has contributed so greatly to the

comfort of life in Bury.

In material things we may report progress, both in the case of St. Paul's—Robinson Village—and in that of St. John's congregation, while indications have not been lacking of a strong progress in spiritual affairs, and notably in an increasing spirit of good fellowship betwixt our Church members. Naturally enough, circumstances have from time to time arisen of an irritating and even depressing nature, still the past years have carried with them ample compensations in facts of another kind, facts which in themselves have been encouraging as indications of the existence and growth of a healthier tone of feeling and a more complete recognition of the laws which should govern the Christian life.

Financially, we have never been in as good a position as one could wish; for while our resources have been small, the demands upon them have been proportionately great, and while not questioning the wise intention which prompted the act of cutting Bury adrift from the Board, one may be pardoned for feeling that the act was in itself premature, and that it would have been better for the Parish had the severance been less hastily brought about.

Of St. John's congregation one may report that the stipend has always been paid with a fair degree of punctuality, for which we have to thank our good Church-warden, Mr. Jas. Wyatt, and also the members who so readily responded

to the calls made upon them.

From the position occupied by this Church the attendance must always be a somewhat slender one, unless land now lying idle in the vicinity shall be taken up, in which event matters might materially alter. At present the attendance varies from some fifteen or twenty to an occasional forty, with an attendance at the Hely Table of some ten or a dozen persons.

The members of this Congregation have, during the past two years, placed a very neat and substantial fence around two sides of the grave-yard, purchasing the materials by subscriptions taken up among such persons as were interested in the grave-yard, and themselves furnishing the

labour necessary to its erection.

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Mr. Martin, under Bishop Mountain, Lay Reader in this Parish, and for many years of his life one of the most active members of this congregation, has laid both Clergyman and his fellow worshippers under great obligation by his ready zeal, and his earnest efforts to promote the comfort of those attending at St. John's, shovelling paths, lighting fires and performing all such good offices as lay within his power, and this apart from all renumeration or expectation of it. From love, and high sense of duty and privilege. "A

Door-keeper in the House of the Lord."

At Lingwick (St. Peter's), our congregation is, and always has been, an exceedingly small one, and, so far as we can now see, is one with no prospect of any marked increase of membership in the future, being composed as it is of some half dozen families (and these not many members of the Church) surrounded by a Scotch Presbyterian population. In this district there has always been a very marked display of affection on the part of members towards the Church, and this has led them to cling closely to her through all discouragement and difficulty. One can only hope that the scheme, now under consideration, of creating a new Mission, to be composed of Scotstown, Canterbury and Lingwick, with parts adjacent, will be carried out, and that the early continued faithfulness of these people to their Church will be rewarded by more frequent opportunities in the future of attending the Services so highly valued by them.

In Canterbury it has, for years, been desirable that more frequent Services should be held, as it was possible to visit this parish for Service only once each month. During several months past additional Services have been supplied from Lennoxville, but if we are to retain our hold at this point, it is necessary that it shall be under active and direct clerical supervision; with the present prospect, that if this be done at once, a fairly strong Church formation will result

within the next two years.

Bain's School-House.—At this point a monthly Service has been held—the Service alternating with that held at

Canterbury—but at the withdrawal of Canterbury it will be possible to make this more frequent, unless it shall seem more desirable to employ the time at some other point. This congregation, at present small—and with no more probability of any increase in numbers—at one time possessed a Church; but, having determined upon building a new edifice, at a point which would accommodate themselves and the people of Canterbury, tore down the old building, and having the misfortune to lose the new structure by a heavy wind storm were left without any Church building, and their discouragement being yet deepened by serious trouble which at the time arose within the Mission, work was never again resumed.

St. Paul's Church, Robinson.—I have the pleasure of reporting Services continued throughout the year without break. Services each Sunday in the morning, and Evening Prayer twice each month. Holy Communion (as at St. John's and St. Peter's) once a month and at the time of the Greater Feasts. The congregation is, as at other points, exceedingly well conducted, but variable in numbers. Many coming from distant points, sometimes the numbers reaching 140 to 150, and sometimes sinking down to a possible 30 or 40. Holy Communion well attended.

Highest number 47.

The Sunday School seems to be doing a good work, and is continued throughout the year, some of the children

coming distances of two and three miles.

Some forms of the activity possible in more clearly settled districts prove very little successful here, but a good lady of the congregation has on foot a small Society of Church-Workers among the children from which much may be noped. Already it has supplied some \$22.00 toward the needs of the Church fabric, and we will hope for other and

different results through its instrumentality.

The property has been much improved by the addition of a new horse-shed completed and paid for, also a new fence along the front of our property, strong and put up in an excellent and workmanlike manner. Both were erected by Bees formed by our people, the latter being completed together with much other work by a Bee formed of some forty Churchmen and supervised by Mr. Anthony Allison, the funds for material having been in part paid from rent of Glebe land for Agricultural Show. These moneys having also been got together by the good offices of Mr. A. Allison

It has been somewhat slow work getting things into shape, but much had to be done, and however willing our people might be, the means to the end were small.

The Church-Wardens report:-

The clergy nominated by the late Lord Bishop to do duty at Cacouna during the season of 1892 were the Rev. Canon Thorneloe, for the month of July, and the Rev. A.

J. Balfour, for August.

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The Church of St. James the Apostle was opened on Sunday, the 3rd July, the Rev. A. T. Williams doing duty that day—and the last Services were on Sunday, the 4th September, when the Rev. R. H. Cole did the duty; the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Niagara preaching in the morning, and the Rev. Canon Mills in the evening.

There were more than the usual number of clergy visiting Cacouna this season in consequence of the opening of

the Clergy House of Rest on the 1st July, 1892.

The following were the collections: For Mission Fund, \$567.15; For Pension Fund, \$41.60; For Bishop of Newfoundland Fund in aid of toss by Fire, \$483.46; Ordinary Collections, \$210.47. Total, \$1,302.68.

CAPE COVE, GASPE.

Rev. W. G. Lysler reports:-

The Services of the Church have been performed as usual during the past year; as to these there is nothing new to report; nor can I say anything new about our Sunday School, which has been as well attended as usual.

The four daily schools have been in operation during

part of the year.

Miss Dumaresq, who had taught faithfully for five years in School No. 1, having resigned, some difficulty was experienced in finding a qualified successor.

We, at last, secured a very competent and energetic teacher, Miss Emerson, who has, so far, given much satis-

faction.

Miss Le Gallais, also a qualified teacher, has taken charge of a small School No. 2, in which the children of the few families in the district have commenced their education.

Without the grants of the Church Society, we could not

keep both these schools open at the same time.

During Summer, the foundations of the Parsonage were examined, and having been found very defective, were in part renewed.

The roof also, which was in a bad condition, was properly shingled and painted; and the roof of the barn received

a much needed coat of paint.

On the 20th of December, a Christmas-tree entertainment was given, which proved quite a success. The admission fees were devoted to the payment of a debt for new school furniture of an improved description, which our active chairman of trustees, Mr. Jas. Baker, had procured for No. 1.

Our organist, Miss Cass, who for four years had conducted the musical part of the Services in St. James' Church with great kindness and self-denial, resigned her position on the occasion of her marriage in September, when a few members of the congregation presented her with a suitable gift, as a slight token of their esteem and gratitude.

The remark made in my last report as to the valued services of the Lay Readers and Sunday School teachers, are equally applicable this year; it is therefore unnecessary to

repeat them.

It will be seen that the contributions of the Mission exceed those of last year, and average about fifteen dollars per family.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. Canon Foster reports: -

The Church's work in this Parish has not been marked

by any unusual incidents during the current year.

The usual Services at St. Stephen's (the Parish Church), and at Christ Church, North Coaticook, have been kept up with unfailing regularity.

The attendance at St. Stephen's is about the same as that of last year; that at Christ Church shows a marked increase.

The Sunday Schools at both Churches are kept up all the

vear round.

Mr. J. J. Fiske, Advocate, and Manager of the Coaticook Knitting Mill, has kindly taken my place, as superintendent of St. Stephen's Church Sunday School. I have a children's Service and catechising on the second Sunday in every month.

The Ladies' Guild of St. Stephen's Church kindly provided funds for much needed repairs on the Sexton's house. They are now hard at work raising funds for the decoration of the Church, and the building of a Church Hall, in which we can hold week-day Services and Sunday School.

The Ladies' Guild at North Coaticook have just purchased three handsome lamps for use in Christ Church, and they hope, during the Winter, to raise sufficient funds to pay for several much needed improvements in the interior of the Church. On Sunday, the second of October, his Lordship, the Bishop of Quebec, paid a visit to the Parish, and preached at St. Stephen's, in the evening, to a large and appreciative congregation.

I have to thank the Wardens of both Churches for their unvarying kindness and co-operation in all Church work

during the current year.

The Rev. G. H. Parker reports:---

The work of the Parish has gone on much as usual dur-

ing the past year.

In December last the Bishop consecrated the Cemetery which belongs to the town, and is used by the inhabitants generally.

The members of the Women's Auxiliary have been quietly working; and in the Autumn a barrel of clothing was sent

off to the North-West, valued at \$75.

The Ladies' College continues its usefulness, doing good and solid educational work. It were much to be wished that a warmer and more general interest were taken in the Institution. Thus far only seven Parishes and Missions have forwarded offertories, viz: Sandy Beach, \$5.30; Quebec Cathedral, \$6.16; Kingsey, \$2.24; Compton, \$14.00; St. Peter's, Quebec, \$4.00; Montmorenci, \$1.25; Sherbrooke, \$21.78. It seems to be forgotten that the Committee of Management are very much worried from time to time to meet necessary outlays, and that the work they are doing is the work of the Church in the Diocese, and they ought to be relieved of unnecessary anxiety. The numbers during the term just ended were:—Boarders, 28—Day scholars, 11.

DANVILLE.

The Rev. Thomas Blaylock reports:—

Just after the close of our last anniversary meeting, our late revered Bishop visited this Parish and confirmed candidates in Danville and Lorne. This was his last confirmation, I believe, in the Eastern Townships, and it is hard to realize that we "shall see his face no more". We may well believe, however, that his work was accomplished, and that he is at rest in the Paradise of God.

Last March the Venerable Archdeacon of Quebec held an Archediaconal meeting in the Village of Danville, which was attended by the clergy of the surrounding Parishes. Papers were read by them as well as by the Hon. Hy. Aylmer and Judge Hemming. The Archdeacon's address was one of singular interest and dealt with Church progress during the past half century in this Diocese. The weather prevented many from the outside Churches attending, but notwithstanding a profitable day was spent, which ended with a rousing missionary meeting, and a good collection, for Domestic Missions. Several Church families having moved into Kingsey Falls, I have, with the help of a student, opened the Church there again and now hold fortnightly Services. The people pay four dollars towards the expenses

of each Service, and so far, the Church has been well filled with attentive congregations. I hope soon to start a Sunday Service at Asbestos. At Lorne, owing to the people nearly all having left to work in the States, our congregation has fallen off considerably. We have also to regret the removal of Mr. Geo. McKeage, jr., a good churchman and warden, and a ready worker for the good of this congregation. The Sunday School greatly misses him. A good fence has been placed around the Church property here.

In Troutbrooke the congregations continue good, though here, also, we have to deplore losses by removals, which have weakened the Church financially and otherwise.

The Sunday School under Mr. Jas. Wilson is doing good

work and is by far the best attended in the Parish.

In Danville we have at any rate held our own in numbers, perhaps made some progress; certainly in unselfishness; the amounts for Foreign and Domestic Missions, Church Society and other extra parochial objects are much the largest ever raised in the Parish, reaching the sum of \$193.66, over one seventh of our total incomings.

We have secured, at a cost of \$60.00 and by means of a generous grant from the S. P. C. K., a handsome addition to our Parish Library—It contains many books in Church History and doctrine which are read and appreciated. It will, I hope, do much to promote intelligent church manship amongst us.

DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. F. G. Scott reports:—

There is nothing to record in the history of this Parish during the past year. The Services in the Church have been held regularly, and a fortnightly Service is now held at Mitchell, a small settlement thirteen miles distant, where

there are several communicants. I must take this opportunity of publicly thanking the church-wardens for many acts of kindness, and especially Dr. Hemming, who acted as lay reader for several Sundays during my illness in the Winter.

DUDSWELL.

The Rev. R. Walter Colston reports:-

In handing in my annual report, I think that it ought to be prefaced by a brief account of the work of Dudswell's first incumbent, the Rev. T. S. Chapman, a work unique in our Diocese.

Mr. Chapman's work in Dudswell began on January 1st, 1849, when, as travelling Missionary, with a loving commission over the whole of the Eastern Townships, he first visited this Mission. On the occasion of this visit, many inquired what had brought an "Episcopal" to Dudswell, as there were none of his "persuasion" in the vicinity. This was not quite true. There were a few. A mere handful of Church people. So strong was the impression made by Mr. Chapman on the people, that early in 1850, a very urgent petition, signed by a large number of the inhabitants, was sent to the Bishop of Quebec, asking for Mr. Chapman's appointment as incumbent of the Mission. In March, 1850, he took up his residence in Dudswell and began what proved to be his life's work.

For over a quarter of a century Mr. Chapman's ministrations extended over the whole of the County of Wolfe and the adjacent portions of the Counties of Richmond, Beauce, Compton and Sherbrooke. In this extended field he had ten permanent stations.

Few men are permitted, in their lifetime, to see such full results of their labours as he.

In 1850, along the shores of the St. Francis from Sherbrooke to the wilderness, there was not one single Church. Now there are five. Three of which were built by Mr. Chapman, almost wholly by his own hands and largely with his own money.

In 1850, whereas there were but a mere handful of Church people in this district, now there are two resident Clergymen, and in the mission of Dudswell, about one hundred families looking to the Church for all religious ministrations; and this, not by immigration, but by the drawing in of stray and wandering sheep. There are few, if any missions, in the Eastern Townships, in which the Church stands more firmly in the estimation and love of the people, or as regards numbers and influence. Such is the position of Dudswell to-day.

In 1850, the Church had to depend upon the wreighed District School Houses in which to hold services, and the still more wretched and forsaken little burial places in which to lay by her departed children. To-day in Dudswell there are two fine and commodious Churches and two grave-yards, neatly laid out and well cared for, and, in addition to these a first-class Parsonage and a Church Hall.

It would make this report too long to recount all the acts of self-denying love and burning zeal displayed by this aged Missionary. I cannot forbear giving one or two.

When St. Paul's Church was being built, the supply of material failed. Winter was close at hand. It was imperatively necessary that the work should be pushed forward without delay. Mr. Chapman came to the rescue and gave all the material he had prepared to build himself a house. It was fifteen years before he succeeded in replacing it. This was in addition to a large money subscription and many days and weeks of hard manual labour. For, in those days, it must be remembered, there were no mills where wrought work could be done quickly and cheaply as now, all had to be done labouriously by hand.

Some twenty odd years ago, being anxious that his flock should have all the possible educational advantages, Mr. Chapman built, what has ever since been known as "The Model School," with his own hands and furnished it in a most complete manner, and this without one cent's assistance from any source. A few years ago, when this building ceased to be used for scholastic purposes, he gave it and its contents, as a free gift to the Parish, to be used as a Parish Hall.

I could tell similar stories of Mr. Chapman's selfdenying zeal for God and His Holy Church, in the building of St. Thomas' Church, Westbury, the Church of the Good Shep-

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ereh. Ar. herd, Dudswell Centre, and the Parsonage, Marbleton; but space will not allow of it. In years to come, when the place on earth of "the best friend Dudswell ever had," knows him no more, the story of his love and zeal—his exceeding generosity—his indomitable courage, will be told, by the people for whom he was content to spend and be spent. Truly others have laboured and we have entered into their labours.

During the past year, 288 Services and devotional Meetings have been held in four centres, in this Mission. To accomplish this, your missionary travelled 1979 miles. This is exclusive of the distance travelled for other parochial work. There were forty-four celebrations of the Holy Eucharist. There has been only one Sunday School in operation in the Mission, viz, at St. Paul's, Marbleton. At the other Sunday stations instruction to the children is given, by your missionary, and by a set of the "outward and visible sign charts," which has become a necessary portion of his missionary kit. These instructions are given during the Service.

Since St. Thomas' Church, Westbury, has been closed, I have given a Sunday service to the people in the south end of the township. This entails four services every Sunday,

with eighteen miles drive.

As soon as the roads settle two more stations will be opened. With these the ground will be fairly well covered.

During the past year a branch of the C. E. T. S. was established in Marbleton. I look for good work from it. Certainly there is a great deal of hard work to be done, with four licensed houses in the township.

According to my usual custom, last Lent, a series of ten consecutive Services were held in four centres. In two of these, they were well attended and, I trust, with good results. In the other two a serious outbreak of scarlet fever caused complete demoralization.

The Ladies' Guilds in Marbleton and Dudswell Centre have done good work, in the past year, in assisting to pay off a portion of the debt on the Parsonage. Our thanks

are due to the members for their labours of love.

The Rev. T. S. Chapman has spent the past month in repairing and renovating the interior and exterior of St. Paul's and the Church Hall. Thus adding to the already great debt of gratitude owed him by our Church people.

I had hoped this year would see our finances placed on a more solid foundation than formerly. In this I have been disappointed But look for better things in the future. Your Society must bear in mind that our financial position, to-day, is in a very large measure due to the action of the Diocesan Board some years ago, in withdrawing the grant from the Mission.

During the past year, collections for the various funds of the Church have been made. Unfortunately the Church-Wardens have used the money for other purposes. I mention this in self-defence. I do not wish it be thought that I am indifferent or careless about these matters.

DURHAM.

The Rev. D. Horner reports:--

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As I look back over the events of the past year, I have many reasons to thank God and take courage. The discouraging elements which I hesitated to explain fully in last year's report, because they mostly affected ourselves only, are gradually clearing away, and I earnestly hope that the promise of May will bring forth fruit unto holiness.

The Mission held at South Durham last Lent by the Rev. Edwin Weary was attended with marked results; a crowded Church night after night, welcomes everywhere, willing help from all sorts and conditions of men, and although to many the Mission is now but a nine days wonder; I am pleased to note that the attitude of our own people towards the Church and her Services is somewhat improved, and the others have lost much of the prejudice heretofore displayed. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese confirmed eighteen candidates who had given their names at the time of the Mission, and His Lordship's previous and subsequent individual interviews with the members of that place have strengthened my hands. But I must not be thought to imply that all the interest mentioned above is of those whose praise is in the Gospel.

Some were visibly impressed at the time of the Mission, but they happen just now to be inseparably connected with principles and practices which that Gospel condemned, so they possibly await the more convenient season when the Gospel may be made easy, when it may not be "too high" or "too low" or "too broad"; when for instance they need not be expected to do anything or pay anything for their religion; when they need not stand the ridicule of friends or follow a fixed manly resolution, or when that Gospel shall not be "too broad' for their narrow-minded jealousies.

The fact is that we are much troubled with spiritual dyspepsia. The diet question seems to be at the root of all our diseases, and I am now strongly of the opinion that if our digestive organs are allowed to rest awhile, we may be

cured.

I used to think that no Church could be effected in this vicinity without an unlimited supply of pastry and subsequent head-aches; but Archdeacon Roe has lately given

me a practical denial of the supposition.

It happened in this way, our old Church at L'Avenir was so saddly dilapidated, that a new one must soon be erected in its place; and the prospects to my mind shewed nothing but the forlorn hope born of the "flour barrel": so I proceeded to induce the women of the Congregation to gird on their aprons, and the younger members to prepare entertainments for our dyspeptic Christian; but a providential thought brought Dr. Roe amongst us, and he prescribed a medicine which has already produced a raost wholesome effect; and his prescription was this:—"Mr. Horner and Dr. Roe will hold themselves responsible for \$400, if the people will raise \$600, by honest free-will offerings." I told the meeting held there a week later of the Archdeacon's offer, laying stress upon the fact that there must be no socials or entertainments to raise that amount, and the immediate result was that before the day was out, five hundred and ten dollars was signed on the paper drawn up by Mr. George Atkinson, and I have heard since that some ninety dollars has been added to the list.

So you see that I might have ruined their health, bodily and spiritually, had I been allowed to have my way. This is only one of a number of instances whereby we have to thank the Archdeacon for his kind attention to our welfare.

The Church at Kirkdale is now in course of repair; we have been forced to order this work to be done on account of the dangerous state of the roof from which large pieces of

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plaster have already fallen, and other portions hang threateningly. We do not know the exact cost of the improvements contemplated because the Church is being ceiled with basswood, and varnished, and the walls must be recoloured and the seats repaired. The amount of seventyfour dollars has been promised by members of the congregation, who are, I have been given to understand, more prosperous on the whole than those in other parts of the Mission, and there are gleams of hope that we shall not be allowed to saddle the disgrace of debt, if the determination shewn by Mr. Wilson Lyster, of this place, is only followed by others.

He told us at our last Easter meeting that he intended giving twenty dollars a year over and above his usual subscription for Church or Parsonage improvements, on condition that he was not expected to provide for Tea Meetings to supply Church Funds, because he objected to the principle of them, and he hoped we would always be above such meannesses. What a relief if there were more of us who would answer to every call of religious duty, not grudgingly or of necessity, but with a cheerful and ready mind.

Mr. Wm. Henry Lyster was occupied lately in planting posts preparatory to fencing off a new grave-yard between the School and the Church, which is being prepared for consecration as soon as the Lord Bishop can come among us again,

We have over eighty dollars in hand at South Durham, to be expended on the repairs of the Church of that place, money raised by the Women's Aid Society, formed last year. We intend using some of it to pay for two lamps which I have ordered from Sherbrooke, and also for the purpose of closing up the holes and crevices against the coming Winter. The rest will be put in the bank until next year, when we hope to be able to strengthen the walls of the Church at present showing weakness.

The Archdeacon, who was at South Durham with me a few Sundays ago, expressed the grief he felt at the smallness of the number of those who were prepared to receive the Holy Communion celebrated on that day; not one half, I regret to say, of those who had been confirmed a short time previously were present to receive the Spiritual Food of the Body and Blood of our Lord: and he mentioned that he hoped to come again soon and work up a renewed

interest among the younger members of the congregation.

We are looking forward to his visit.

Before concluding, I would remark that Divine Service has been conducted on Sundays and the greater Festivals, except on two occasions, when I was prevented by impassable snowdrifts. The congregations are, on the whole, I think, slightly on the increase when compared with those of last year. On the other hand, I have heard with great regret, that one of our prosperous members, Mr. Albert Lyster, has left us lately for the Western States on account of ill-health, and does not intend to return.

The only Sunday School in the Mission is held at Kirk-dale and conducted by Mrs. Horner. We sadly need an efficient band of teachers in this and other parts of the Mission, and I am sure that our Bishop was not asking a hard thing when he expressed our needs to the candidates at South Durham.

Among the encouragements I have had during the year. I may be pardoned for recording the following testimony uttered by one of the most influential members of the Church in the Mission of Durham.

One of the men who was appending his name to the list of subscribers, for the proposed new Church at L'Avenir, expressed in so doing, some doubt as to whether he would be able to fulfil the terms of the obligation imposed upon himself. "Well," said Mr. George Atkinson, "have no fear about that, for my experience is, when I endeavour to follow the rule of laying by, periodically, a certain amount for God, I have never had any difficulty, if only my first thought, always was, to cancel God's debt first: and what is more I am happy to say to-day that I have never been sorry for it."

Before concluding, I must express my heartfelt gratitude to Mr. William Beard, of L'Avenir, for suggesting and earnestly striving for what has now blossomed into life. It is mainly due to him that the people of L'Avenir have come to realize their need of a new Church and ability to build it.

EATON. *

The Rev. Alex. H. Robertson reports:—

I have to report a year of quiet regular work.

St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.—In this Church we have

two Services on Sunday, morning and evening.

In addition to the usual celebration of the Holy Communion on the first Sunday of every month, we have also had sin a Easter last, an early celebration at 8 A.M. on the third Sunday of every month;—at 9 A.M. on Saints' days and Holy days.

We have also Choral Service on the first Sunday evening of every month. I must thank the Organist and Choir of

St. Peter's for their faithful and efficient services.

Our interest in Church music was stimulated by a visit from Mr. Dorey and members of the Choir at Sherbrooke and Lennoxville, who visited us on the 16th June, and gave us a Musical Service, a repetition of the Service held in St. Peter's Church, Sherbrooke, by the St. Francis Choir Association.

The Clergy and members of Choirs from the neighboring parishes of Angus, Bury and Newport were present, and all enjoyed the Service, and shall be glad if Mr. Dorey will favour us again.

On September 30th the Lord Bishop of the Diocese

visited this Parish for the first time,

A class of fifteen candidates, mostly adults, was presented for confirmation. The Church was beautifully decorated

for Harvest Thanksgiving. The Archdeacon and neighboring clergy were present, and the combined Service of Confirmation and Thanksgiving was perhaps the most beautiful we have ever had in this Parish.

The Sunday School is well kept up with six teachers and

an average of forty scholars.

Two earnest teachers and Church workers, Mrs. Sutton and Miss Mowle, have entered into rest in the Paradise of God during the past year.

A beautiful Memorial Window, in memory of Mrs. Sutton,

has been put into the Church.

We have improved the heating apparatus; and put in

the electric light, a great improvement on the lamps.

At the last Easter meeting, the Church-Wardens eported all accounts paid up and a credit balance on hand, for which we thank our wardens.

The Ladies' Guild and Missionary Auxiliary meet regu-

larly as usual, and do good work.

St. Lu're's Church, Sandhill.—The Services, at this Church, have been held fortnightly. I have long felt that this was a very unsatisfactory state of things. I am glad to say that, through the kindness of Rev. Dr. Adams and other members of the College Staff, there is now a weekly Sunday Service, and I am sure that great good to the Church, in Sandhill, will result therefrom. I have also commenced a fortnightly Bible Class.

Johnville.— Service here is held fortnightly in the Hall, but a weekly Sunday School is kept up, through the devoted labours of Mr. Oakes and his family, which in some degree makes up for the lack of a weekly Sunday

Service.

A small sum was raised by the Johnville Sunday School for the purchase of a Sunday School Library. The S. P. C. K. added thereto a most generous grant, and the result is a small, well selected library of over eighty volumes of good sound Church Literature, which is eagerly read by young and old and is doing excellent Missionary work.

This Parish was visited, during the past Summer, by the Church Colporteur, M. Jones. He was well received, and I have had many enquiries asking when he is coming again. The publications of the S. P. C. K. meet with a ready sale, and only need to be presented to the people.

FITCH BAY.

The Rev. W A. Adcock reports:

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The work of the past year has been of a varied character, having had many difficulties to overcome, which cannot well be mentioned here. I have endeavoured to perform the ministerial functions incumbent upon me. The round of parochial visiting, caring for the sick with many experiences of joy and sorrow, carrying on the Church's Services in different parts of the Mission and keeping the Parochial machinery in working order.

At Georgeville, the oldest part of the Mission, I have to record a number of removals of Church people who have left the quiet country life for busy centres, where they can find employment.

This means to us smaller congregations, and greater difficulty in meeting the assessment. The Services of the Church have always been bright and hearty, the singing good and the congregation well responding.

The special work of the year has been the renovation of the interior of the Church. The designer of the work done was the Rev. R. C. Tambs, the contractor being Mr. N. A. Beech, a resident of the place.

The work has been beautifully carried out. During the time this was in progress, for nearly two months, the Services were hold in the School-House.

From kind friends in Montreal we have received generous support in this undertaking. I must here mention Mr. E. G. Penny's subscription of \$50, and Mr. N. A. Beech, who undertook to raise and pay \$100 towards the work.

There is much work to be done on the exterior of the Church, which, I hope, with the assistance of kind friends, to have completed next year.

During the Summer months, two Services were held every Sunday, being assisted by a zealous staff of helpers, to whom I accord my hearty thanks, viz: Rev. Dr. Adams, Hon. Justice Tait, H. R. Mudge, and Dr. Codd. Mention must also be made here of the Services of our faithful organist and choir, who always do their best and never fail

to render their services in all kinds of weather. The Rev. Canon Thorneloe made a visit to the Mission in the early part of the year, being sent by the late Lord Bishop in the interests of peace.

The Revd. Canon was cordially welcomed by the congregation and listened to with rapt attention in his explanation concerning the future welfare of the Mission and the proper location of the Parsonage.

The result being, in many respects, satisfactory. The Ladies' Aid has been of great service this year in meeting the wants of the Church, working with a will and purpose.

Fitch Bay.—The work of the Church here is steadily progressing. The few Church people we have, are workers, and seldom absent themselves from Church and the Lord's Table.

The future appears hopeful. A few, each year, becoming candidates for Confirmation. The Sunday School has been well attended and special efforts are put forth to train the young people for the Church.

The Parsonage, which was purchased a year ago, is not altogether free of debt. I have to raise and pay the sum of one hundred and sixty dollars before the grant from the Church Society and Mr. Robert Hamilton's subscription can be attained. This sum I hope to raise without delay.

The ladies of the Lay Helpers' Association in Quebec have presented the Church at Fitch Bay with a Communion Service, which was very thankfully received and much appreciated. The water has been laid on at the Parsonage, at a considerable cost, with many thanks to the people of the neighbourhood.

The Church grounds have been much improved and considerable interest has been manifested.

We are in great need of a Church bell, to call the people together to worship, and the creation of an endowment fund for the Church's future.

The Outstations of the Mission are doing well.

FRAMPTON.

The Rev. Felix Boyle reports:

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If ever I have had reason, and I often have had reasons, to take up the words of the Psalmist and say "Bless the Lord, O my soul," I have, on reviewing the work in my Mission for the year now closing, more occasion than ever to use that exclamation:

(1) I have been blessed with health and strength to meet all my Church appointments, with scarcely one exception.

(2) My people, too, are, as a general rule, manifesting more interest in all kinds of Church work, and, as a proof of this, there never was as much collected in any previous year, in money or otherwise, as there has been in 1892, as will be shown at the end of this report.

It may be said that the above statements are no proof of spiritual growth, or life. To a certain extent that may be true, for "there is only One Who can search the hearts," yet I must say my convictions go with St. James, viz:—that a man can show his faith by his works; but I am not left to outward works alone as a proof of my people's spiritual state.

If I consider, what I cannot help seeing, their punctilious attendance at the Services of the Church on the Lord's Day, the increased reverence manifested when there, a slight addition to the number of communicants over last year, and I may further add, respect and liberality to myself as their elergyman. These are marks, and many more I might mention, which give me fond assurance that the spiritual life among my flock is in a healthy state.

I am pleased to state that there is a Women's Auxiliary in active operation, established at West Frampton with a membership of twenty, under the presidency of Mrs. H. L. Hodgson, who are doing good work. This association sent out of the Mission last year \$12.60 to outside charitable objects.

I have two schools in my Mission doing excellent work, one at Springbrook and the other at Tenth Range, E. F., under the careful supervision of the Misses Hughes and Wood, and I cannot refrain from thanking the Church Society for their liberal grants to both of our schools, without which I do not think we could keep them in operation.

So much for the bright side of my report. But we have had our gloomy days too. 1st, one family left West Framp-

ton last Autumn, and another of my leading families will leave in the Spring. This leaves quite a gap in a small

congregation.

I have had an unusual amount of sickness, and number of deaths lately. We have had four burials at Hemison within a little over one month. The first of the four was Mrs. Henderson, widow of our late esteemed Landlord, William Henderson, Esq.; her end was peace. The last was Mr. George Crawford, of Standon, who has filled the office of Clergyman's Church-Warden, I believe, ever since I came here. He is a loss to me, a loss to the Church, but our loss is small compared to that of his wife and his small children, which latter number eight. May God comfort them in their sore bereavement. I may say, and truly say, of my faithful friend, that he was a loyal Churchman, a kind husband and an affectionate father.

HATLEY.

The Rev. A. Stevens reports:—

Nothing apart from the quiet routine of work incident to the lot of a country parish priest presents itself as worthy of special mention. The usual round of Services on Sundays and week-days has been kept up in the three stations of Hatley, Massawippi and Ayer's Flat with no marked differ-

ence in the size of the congregations.

At Hatley a very interesting Sunday School Conference was held on the 27th of September, which was presided over by the Venerable Archdeacon Roe. Nine of the neighbouring clergy and about twenty Sunday School teachers were present, as well as many of the parents and friends of the pupils of the School here. Our people were deeply interested in all that took place, and no doubt we shall see good fruit from it in our Sunday School next year. A branch of the Women's Auxiliary was organized here in August last and now numbers sixteen members. Great interest and enthusiasm have been manifested by the ladies and they have undertaken to cloth an Indian girl.

Through the kindness and zeal of Mr. Arthur Dorey, or-

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ganist of St. Peter's Church, Sherbrooke, a very successful Choir Festival was held here on the eve of All Saints' Day. Mr. Dorey gave the whole day to drilling the choir of about thirty voices, made up from the choirs of Hatley, Barnston and Stanstead. The Service in the evening was greatly appreciated, and will help to create a taste for better music in our Services.

At Massawippi, the work has gone on as usual. On Thanksgiving Day I had Service here in the morning, with a celebration of the Holy Communion for the first time in the history of our work here. The communicants numbered sixteen. I have to thank Mr. Murray, who drove over from Dixville, and preached a very appropriate sermon. The Union Church in which our Services are held, is not convienent for a celebration, and I hope the time is coming when we shall have a well appointed Church of our own.

At Ayer's Flat there is no change to report except that the congregations have been somewhat larger than last year, owing chiefly to the coming into the place of a new Church family, that of Mr. Samuel Hethrington. Here also we feel the need of a small Church of our own in which our Services can be more appropriately conducted.

INVERNESS.

The Rev. Peter Roe reports:-

The Services of the Church have been regularly held during the past year, at St. Stephen's Church, the Church of the Ascension, and occasionally, when the roads and the weather permitted, at St. Julie Station. Holy Communion administered once a month in both Churches. We also held Services in the Churches on Ascension Day and other days appointed by the Church On the 17th January, we had our last visit from our late lamented Bishop, when he confirmed ten young persons at Camp'bell's Corners, Church of Ascension, and delivered an impressive and interesting address on Missionary work throughout the world, from the time of the Apostles to the present period. In the evening he preached in St. Stephen's Church, from the

words of the Lord: "What think ye of Christ?" a solemn and most heart searching address; his last parting words to us here! I drove his Lordship to the station on Monday, and parted with him there for the last time upon earth! His work in this Mission will never be forgotten by those who heard him. Our Sunday Schools have been well attended during the Summer months. Mrs. Roe and daughters, assisted by Mrs. Thomas Henry Wilton, managed the school at St. Stephen's. Mrs. Dr. Reed, assisted by Mrs. King, Miss Elridge, Miss Hattie Watts and Miss McVitty, taught the school at Church of the Ascension. Mrs. Roe has a large Bible Class of girls on Sundays in the Parsonage during the Winter. The two branches of the Women's Auxiliary have held their regular monthly meetings, and have been able to forward in cash and clothing, etc., \$71.95 to the N. W. Territory. For a small Mission, where the women are few, this is a good record of their faith and good works. We had our usual school pic-nic in September, very well attended. The repairs in the Church of the Ascension were completed in January last, and the interior of the Church is now much more comfortable than formerly. The Association of Church Helpers in Quebec gave me \$30 towards this work, and I collected altogether \$40 there. There has been nearly \$100 paid on account, but a balance is still due. As there has been a large exodus from this Mission during the past few years, it is a difficult matter for the Church-Wardens to make up the assessment for the Diocesan Board. member of the Church in the Mission, who does not wish his name to be published, gave the Wardens \$80 last January to make up the deficiency, and an old member of our Mission, now in the United States, sent me \$20 for the same purpose. It seems almost that the Mission is supported by the generous gifts of a few. At the request of our Bishop, I sent him a memorandum showing the past and present state of this Mission during the fifteen years I have been in charge. I forgot to mention that the young people of the Churches and their friends held an entertainment in the Court House, Inverness, which was well attended, and netted over \$50, which the Wardens paid out for painting the outside and repairing the inside of the Church of the We had a visit from the Archdeacon on the 4th Ascension. September, when he preached for us in both Churches. My friend and neighbour. Rev. John Kemp, preached occasionally when he came over to pay us a visit.

TRELAND AND SOUTH INVERNESS.

The Rev. W. J. Faulconer reports:-

Holy Trinity, Upper Ireland.—Another year has run swiftly by, with all its varying duties. As in most settled pastoral work much sameness is experienced from day to day, which involves the need of deeper spiritual sustenance.

To begin with Holy Trinity Church, Upper Ireland: on the whole I may report steady progress, but not so much as I could wish. The number of communicants has not increased this year. I am looking forward, however, with hope to an increase after our Confirmation early in June next.

Our Sunday Schools in the Scaly and Bennett settlements have done good work under the superintendence of Mr. W. Stewart, who as usual is laborious in his efforts to advance this branch of work in connection with our beloved Church.

The Women's Guild, Mrs. F. Wood, President, and Mrs. W. Stewart, Secretary, has done good work and rendered material aid to the Church. The Girls' Friendly Society, under Mrs. Faulconer, President, and Miss Bella Wood, Secretary, has accomplished much good.

The Sunday Services have been held regularly and have been well attended considering the long distance some have

to come.

The Diocesan Board Assessment has been more difficult to raise this year than usual, owing to slackness in the

markets and business transactions generally.

Our Offertory collections are not up to their average amounts this year for the same cause. Two or three of our families have removed to the States, and none, I am sorry to say have arrived to fill up the gaps. Death also has carried off some of our oldest and staunchest members, and some of our young people too, which, together makes our financial position, from year to year, the more difficult, but I trust the above trials will make those that remain more devoted.

My Church Wardens and Sides men are making several improvements about the Church and Cemeterv and are pre-

paring to build new stables early in the Spring, improvments and additions, much needed.

Mr. F. Wood, as usual, has assisted me in the Church Ser-

vices.

The Bible Class at Mrs. John Annesley's has been well attended. The young people are much interested.

I have to thank Miss Maggie Cross for acting so faithfully

as organist.

I have also to thank the Cathedral M. C. L. in Quebec, for so kindly and nobly taking up the case of a sick girl in the Sealey settlement, and other friends also who so kindly interested themselves in her.

Christ Church, Lower Ireland.—The Services here have

been held regularly with a very good attendance.

The monthly Celebration is not so well attended as I

would like it to be.

The Sunday School under the loving care of Mrs. Wm. Johnson, is making good progress, and Church teaching upheld.

My two wardens have again done faithful work. I have also to thank Miss May Marshall for acting as organist.

The Women's Auxiliary still works on.

St. Luke's, Adderly—Has been reshingled and repaired inside, through the efforts of Mr. Tom Walsh, the Church-Warden, and by the kindly aid of Quebec friends; and I am hoping to give the few Church families there a Service once in three weeks early in the New Year.

St. Peters' Black Lake.—Regular fortnightly Services have been held here during the year with a Celebration oc-

casionally.

The congregation one and all have shewn deep interest in their Church, which has been furnished throughout

The beautiful chancel carpet was the gift of the Scottish Canadian Asbestos Company, through their manager, Mr. M. Penhale. The Communion Linen was given by Mrs. Guilich, of Upper Canada.

The material for the Altar Cloth was given by Mrs. Penhale; and beautifully worked by Miss Malthy, of New

Jersev.

The silver plated Alms dish was presented by Miss Lily Penhale, v ho acted as organist until her marriage, when Mr. D. Wilson filled the vacancy and has ably presided at the organ ever since.

We hope, through the untiring efforts of Mr. A. M.

Evans, that the Church at Black Lake will be free of debt early in the New Year when it will be ready for consecration. The Women's Guild have done faithful work in furnishing the Church with pews, putting down matting in the aisle, and also paying for the new organ. A successful sale of work was held by them in September.

Great praise is due to Mrs. Crabtree, the President, Mrs. M. Penhale and Miss Ellen Prideaux, Secretaries, and all the members who have worked so untiringly for their

Church.

Our sympathy as a congregation has been enlisted in behalf of Mr and Mrs. Harvey Bennet, who, during the year, have laid two of their young daughters in the grave.

The S. P. C. K. made a grant of £30 towards the building of this Church, through the kindness of our late beloved Bishop, for which the congregation desire to acknowledge their sincere gratitude.

St. John's, Thetford,—A regular fortnightly Service has been held since May, which has been valued by the few

families who live there.

There is still a debt on the Church, which I hope will be cleared off by June next, when our Bishop will, we hope, pay us a visit.

My two Church Wardens shew great interest in their

Church and are trying to further the work.

Considering that there were no Services there until February, 1891, when I held a monthly Service at the house of Mr. Andrew Johnson, the work has progressed.

GASPÉ.

The Rev. John P. Richmond reports:—

Since my last report there has not been any great change in this Mission.

The Services have been regularly held in both Churches in the Mission with the exception of one Sunday.

In the Spring the annual sale of goods made by the ladies of St. Paul's Guild realized seventy dollars. The

Church has been provided with new lamps and the pews have been cushioned. Both these improvements were

provided for by the Guild.

The new Church at Gaspé South, to replace the old St. James' Church, has been completed, and I hope will be used for Divine Service for the first time to morrow. A new Church bell of 400 lbs. weight, from the Meneely Bell Co, Troy, N. Y., was presented to this Church by T. Murdoch, Esq., of Chicago, and through the kindness of the Quebec S. S. Co. it was delivered at Gaspé without charge for freight. A new organ has been purchased by this congregation.

A small debt remains on the new Church, but it will be paid before the Summer, when the people hope to present the Church to the Bishop for Consecration. Seventy-three dollars were raised towards the furnishing of the Church during the Summer by the people, and one visitor gave ten

dollars towards providing suitable Alms Plate.

The site chosen for a Church and church-yard, in the township of York, was found unsuitable, and with the consent of the Bishop a new site has been acquired by gift from Mr. C. Grant, who was for many years Church-Warden at St. James' Church, and who is said to have been the first child baptized in the settlement of Gaspé Bay by a clergyman, about A. D. 1823.

Mrs. Richmond has been presented with a handsome

purse from each congregation.

Among the deaths which have taken place during the year, that of Benjamin Bechervaise, several times Church-Warden of St. James' Church, and an active member of the building committee, is much regretted.

KINGSEY.

The Rev. J. S. Sykes reports:—

In looking back upon the year just ended, we have much to be thankful for. It has been a year of good works

Holy Trinity, Denison's Mills, having undergone necessarv and extensive repairs and improvements, at a cost of \$112, exclusive of the shingling, which was done as a labour of love by members of the congregation, this pretty little Church has been thoroughly re-novated; re-shingled, repainted, and the plaster repaired, and the whole interior papered, in order to strengthen the plaster. It will, I think, as it is now, compare very favourably with any country Church in the Diocese. Pleasing as the building is to the eye, it has an added beauty on Sundays, when fairly well filled with a devout and attentive congregation. the past year the attendance has considerably increased, owing in a large measure to the re-opening of the Sunday School, which acts as a feeder to the Church. By the removal of Mr. Harmon Wentworth to the French Village, the Sunday School has lost its first superintendent, and also the services of Mrs. Wentworth as one of the teachers They will be missed, as they were always most ready to help in all branches of Church work. The Bible-Class in connection with the Sunday School is successfully carried on by Mr. Wm. Denison, and the other teachers still continue at their posts.

Christ Church, Spooner Pond, has also been in the hands of the painters, and is much improved. The money required for this object being raised by a select social garden party, Mr. John Evans kindly giving the use of his grounds for that purpose. The Sunday School has been carried on by Mr. Lonsdell and well attended. The organ has been successfully manipulated by Miss Edith Hal, her predecessor having gone the way of all organists, the way of matri-

mony.

At St. Paul's, Sydenham, the attendance has hear very encouraging indeed, and the number of children attending the Sunday School larger than usual. In the instruction of the children I have been well assisted by Mrs. Sykes and the Misses Lodge.

The Sunday School Pic-nic, held as usual in the grounds adjoining the Parsonage, was a grand success, every one coming heavily laden, and departing relieved of their bur-

den and perfectly happy.

Early in the year I received from the Church Helpers a Surplice and Stole, for which I heartily thank them.

From Messrs. Hy. McMannis, Hy. Wadleigh, John Wad-

leigh and Joseph Lodge I have received a load of hay. These four gentlemen have, for ten consecutive years, regardless of bad seasons, each given me a load of Hay. Had I to buy all the Hay I require, it would be hard to make both ends meet. I should like them to know how much their kindness is appreciated. A well stocked Library has been added to the Sunday School at Denison's Mills, for which we thank the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, through whose influence it was secured from the S. P. C. K.

LEEDS.

The Rev. J. Rothers reports:-

During the past year the work has been carried on as in former years, with little variation and I trust it, has not been in vain. I have three Services every Sunday, which involve a drive of about twenty three miles. The greater Festivals of the Church are observed.

St. James' Church.—Divine Service has been held here every Sunday, and on alternate Sundays two Services, the Rev. J. Kemp taking a Service once a fortnight when at home; the attendance has been good, the lowest number present being seventeen, and the highest one hundred and forty. The Holy Communion has been administered once a month, the average attendance for the year being On January 14th, we had the pleasure of a visit from our late lamented and esteemed, Bishop, who gave us an address at the Missionary meeting on Missionary work and our duty with regard to it. On the 15th, his Lordship held a Confirmation when twelve were confirmed. The earnest words, he spoke to them, will not soon be forgotton. He said: "You are just as it were begining life, I am at the close of it—and warned them of making shipwreck of it."

On September 17th, we took leave of our respected Organist, who left us with her sister, Mrs White, for Manitoba. Miss Marshall had presided at the organ and led the choir for many years both willingly and well, and was always ready to assist in any Church work. I am pleased the Congregation showed their appreciation of her services by presenting her with a purse of \$50. The Ladies' Aid met fortnightly during the year. On December 27th, they had their sale of work at Leeds Village; but, owing to the severe weather, very few were present: It was therefore

not so successful a it might have been.

The Sunday School has been carried on successfully, Mr. S. Bayne acting as superintendent, assisted by five teachers. The attendance has been good.

The Sunday School had its pic-nic on 24th August, at the Parsonnage. After tea, the young people enjoyed

themselves in games.

I held a meeting once a week for prayer and the study of the Sunday School lesson, but I regret to say it was not very well attended. Week-day Services have been held at Nelson's Road, and Wilson's Mills School houses once a month, both of them are about three miles from St. James' Church The attendance has been very good-

St. Marks, Kinnear's Mills.—Divine Service has been held here on every Sunday, alternately morning and afternoon.

Formerly there was Service here but once every six weeks. I commenced this year by going to Broughton on a week-day, in order that they may have the Services regularly.

The Holy Communion has been administered once a

month. The average attendance has been ten.

The Bible Class, which was held once a week, was well attended up to the Fall, then it was given up for a time.

Beattie's Settlement.—I am thankful to say the new Church is composed as far as regards the exterior; but many things are required for the interior. The Church Society has promised as \$50, for which we are very grateful. When all that is promised as received, there will still be a deficit of \$60.

The St. Matthew's Guild has kindly promised to make us

an Altar cloth for less than half the cost.

On July the sixth we had a successful tea meeting and entertainment. After paying all expenses, \$34 were handed

over to the Building Fund.

I have a Service every Sunday, alternately afternoon and evening, instead of once a forthnight as formerly. The attendance has been good. I have a singing class once a week, which has been well attended, and I hope will be a help to the Service in the future.

Harvey Hill Mines.—The Mines have been closed since last Fall, and consequently all the Miners have left the place; they will probably open again in the Spring. I commenced a Sunday School here in the new School House, and was very fortunate in securing such an efficient teacher as Miss Beattie. I held a few Services at the same place.

Broughton.-I go here once in six weeks. There are only

six Protestant families left, one being Presbyterian.

Since the Sunday Schools were closed in the Fall, I have been giving object lessons on the Bible and Catechism at the three Churches. Ten minutes are given to each subject. I trust by this method our children and those present will get a knowledge of the Bible and Catechism, and I hope a desire to know more about the things eternal.

In conclusion I wish to thank alt who have assisted me, particularly the Rev. J. Kemp, J. Prout, the wardens, and members of the Choir, and especially Miss Dora Marshall,

who now fills the place of her sister as organist.

LEVIS.

The Rev. Thomas W. Fyles reports:

At the wish of the Right Reverend Bishop Williams and of the Church-Wardens of Levis I undertook the Services in Holy Trinity Church for a short time. This short time—the death of the Bishop having stopt negotiations for a clergyman—was prolonged till the opening of navigation. Since then the Rev. L. V. Larivière has performed the Sunday duties. I have however been able to render occasional services in visiting the sick, &c. The congregation has been happily thus held together in its entirety. We all rejoice in the near prospect of the coming amongst us of the Rev. I. Thompson as Rector.

The different parochial aids are in good working order. The Sunday School - prospering under the faithful superintendence of Mr. George Addie, who is assisted in his good work by an able staff of teachers.

The Choir, under the leadership of Miss N. Piton, has been well conducted. The Ladies, Guild (originated by

the Rev. George Thompson) has held its weekly meetings regularly, and has raised in the course of the year \$120 for Church purposes. It has just presented a new stove and oil-cloth for the hall of the Parsonage at a cost of \$55. The Women's Auxiliary is flourishing. It has already sent \$32.90 for Missionary purposes, and has just voted \$20 more. It has also sent away donations for the Indians of Saskatchewan, and to our poorer brethren on the coast of Labrador. Two Missionary meetings have been held this year under its auspices.

Important repairs have been made in the Parsonage house: a new floor has been laid in the kitchen, all the lower rooms have been re-papered and re-painted, etc, the whole at a cost of \$115, to meet which, a special collection has been made by one who is always ready to do his full share of Church work, Mr. Tofield. The parsonage is now

a desirable residence.

LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. A. C. Searth reports:-

The various amounts given to me last year, and mentioned in my report, for the improvement of the east end of the Church, together with a small legacy of \$30, have been expended in the following manner: Λ very handsome chancel Screen has been erected, and the choir has been reseated and the floor raised.

The members of the Guild have presented to the Church a beautiful brass eagle Lectern, and fair linen for the Altar. Mrs. Phillip's donation has procured for us an exquisite Altar frontal, the work of St. Matthew's Guild, Quebec.

I have nothing special to record during the past year. The usual Sunday Services have been held and Festivals duly observed, large congregations attending. The Holy Communion has been celebrated on the first and third Sundays of every month and on all great Holy days. There have been altogether thirty-one celebrations with an average attendance of seventy-six. This does not include the early celebrations in connection with the College Services which have been held every other Sunday and on Saints'

days. The Woman's Auxiliary continues to meet regularly, and does much good in keeping up a warm interest in all Missionary work. The Children's Branch also meets regularly once a week and is largely attended. The Guild, too, I am glad to say, continues its useful labours in the parish.

I have held sixty-eight Services at Grindstone, twenty at Grosse Isle, (thirty miles distant), paid occasional visits to Byron Island and Old Harry Head, and held Sunday and week-day Services on Entry Island. Was absent three weeks in June, attending Synod, the first holiday in three

In financial matters, the sum of \$223.90 has been raised, of which \$111.66 have been devoted to Diocesan calls, and the balance applied to Church and Parsonage improvements. Grindstone Church has been painted, at a cost of \$55.80, and the Parsonage is about half finished at the same cost. Labour and materials on the Magdalen Islands are very costly. Grosse Isle Church-yard has had a new wire fence placed around it, as the wooden paling was being continually blown down by the strong high winds which have prevailed this Summer and Fall. We hope to shingle the south side of the roof, and paint the building next Spring.

MAGOG.

The Rev. R. C. Tambs reports:—

The usual Services have been held during the past year, namely: morning and evening at the Church on Sundays with Sunday School in the afternoon, and fortnightly (with

some little irregularity on account of bad travelling) on week evenings for worship or in connection with the Ministering Children's League, at the Currier, McDermott and Cherry River neighbourhoods. The fortnightly M. C. L. meetings in the town have been well sustained. We regret the removal to other parts of two of our most devoted League secretaries, Miss Lydia Brownsword and Miss Clara Currier. The former was also a most valuable member of the

Choir and a Sunday School teacher.

Thanks to our devoted staff of teachers, our Sunday School is doing very well indeed, the attendance numbering at times upwards of sixty. The scholars bring their prayer books, and are taught to respond properly. Their ability to take an active part in worship does much to quicken their interest in the Services of the Church. Reverence is the first thing insisted upon. Better through strictness to lose the attendance of a few boys than that the School should fail to command respect, and parents will be less likely to let their children have their own way when they come to

lize that membership in the Anglican Sunday School is rivilege not to be thought lightly of. The Christmas athering and Summer outing in the name of the Sunday School were eminently successful. The former was graced with the fairy scenes of "The Rainbow Festival," which reflected enduring credit upon the taste and skill of Miss Fanny Hall; the latter took the form of a round trip of the Memphremagog on the "Lady of the Lake". The invitations embracing all the English of the District, and the Fitch Bay and Georgeville Sunday Schools happening to have their pic-nic on the same day and in the same way, there were between seven and eight hundred of a company, the largest excursion on the Lake for years. We were happy in having with us on board Dr. Niles, the Bishop of New Hampshire.

With a view to augmenting the Church choir we have started a weekly juvenile sol-fa class, in which work I am

kindly assisted by Miss Sweeney.

Following the example of the Rev. H. A. Dic'son, of Ranborough, in his last year's report, I gave constant assistance in the Model School last winter. That my efforts were appreciated may be inferred from the fact that I have been requested by the authorities to kindly continue the work again this year, consequently I now find myself

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eighty scholars.

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ie lf During last Winter I gave a course of illustrated Bible lectures for adults. About twenty attended regularly, and the same are looking forward with interest to a minuance of these evenings of Biblical instruction during the coming winter.

The constant change and fluctuation of our English community render the work in this town, so far as the local building up of the Church is concerned, very unsatisfactory. We have good congregations however, and such available space as we have in the Church is to be supplied with additional pews. On Easter Day we had fifty-live communicants, the largest number that has ever received here at one time.

The movement recently inaugurated under the name of "Associated Promoters of Worship" is quietly doing its good work. The A. P. W. embrace the communicants of the parish who, as volunteers, associate themselves with their clergyman to aid, under his suggestions, in making the Services of the Church more and more what they ought to be and to enlist the interest of others in a participation of the same.


Thanks mainly to the Ladies' Guild, the interior of the Church has been sheathed and looks very well indeed. This work was happily hastened on by the Summer visitors kindly getting up an entertainment amongst themselves and giving the proceeds for the purpose.

The aisle is to be recarpeted, for which funds have been raised by the young Ladies' Band of "Willing Workers."

The work at Cherry River continues as interesting as ever. I had hoped to be able to report a Church built there, but my energies have not been equal to the undertaking. In a week or two I purpose commencing Sunday afternoon Services out there, and hope by Spring to be in a position to build.

In addition to school-house Services I have spent many an hour, first in one house and then in another, in devotional conversation. This work is always warmly appreciated, and, I have reason to believe, is productive of the very best results.

With the rest of the Diocese our congregation, especially the older members thereof, felt very deeply the death of our late beloved Bishop, and words to that effect, together








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with expressions of sympathy with his bereaved family,

MALBAIE.

The Rev. George Radley Walters reports:-

The year past has been quite an eventful one in the history of this Mission, as it marks the openings for worship of our two new Churches: St. Peter's, Malbaie; and St. Luke's, at Corner of the Beach.

At Barachois, we have been enabled to erect the frame for a Church, to be named St. Paul's. The two former Churches, I am able to report, were quite completed and furnished, and free from every cent of debt before we opened them.

We were awaiting a visit from our beloved late Bishop, when he was to consecrate them, instead there came the

sad news of his illness and death.

In the month of June, we held our first Service in each Much interest was taken in these Services, and the congregations were large, and the Services, bright and hearty. We now await a visit, this coming Summer, from our new Bishop, when he will consecrate these Churches, and also a piece of land for a grave-yard at the Corner of the Beach, kindly given for the purpose by Mr. Daniel, and Mr. Henry Mabe, I am sure his Lordship will find these country Churches equal, both in workmanship, design and internal arrangement, to any in his Diocese. Mr. Touzel, sur., contractor, has really done an honest and good work on them. I must thank Mr. Collas and Mr. LeMarquand for the kind interest they took in giving their time, and sending men to cart and unpack the seats, which came to us from the firm of James Perry & Co., Quebec, and also for erecting and varnishing the same,

Especially would I mention the kind interest taken in furnishing St. Luke's Church, at Corner of the Beach, by the twelve families forming the congregation there. Geo. Vibert presented a remarkably handsome six-light chandelier, costing sixteen dollars, from the firm of Cole, Montreal; Mr. Henry Mabe, a very nice chancel carpet, purchased in town, of very Church-like design, which adds to the beauty and comfort of the building; Mr. Edward Mabe, a gothic chair in light oiled ash, for the chancel, made by the firm of James Perry & Co, who also made the pulpit, prayer desk and lectern for this little Church; Mr Peter Mabe, gave cocoa matting for the aisle of the Church Mr. Christopher Mabe, four lamps and shades, which well lights up the building for Evening Service, when so held; Mr. James Vibert and Mr. Philip Vibert, four very nice bracket lamps for the chancel. A very nice kneeling cushion for front of the Communion rail, of dark ruby velvet, has been subscribed for and made, I believe, by Mrs. Geo. Vibert, Mrs. Henry Mabe and others. All this has cost an effort, but all has been freely and lovingly given to the little Church which these people have taken so much interest in building.

I must not forget to mention that we have purchased a very excellent bell from the firm of Van-duzen and Tift, of Cincinnati, of four hundred pounds weight, note C. sharp, which is erected in the spire of this little Church, and bears my name east on it, also the name of the Church and place and date of year; its sweet tone can be heard a long distance, calling the dwellers in this little settlement to assemble for the worship of God. Our building in which we used to worship has, by an effort of some of the men of the congregation, been converted into a very pleasant and comfortable school-room in which day school is held. For all these outward signs of good feeling and fellowship, I gratefully lift my heart heavenward and echo the words cast in large letters on our sweet toned bell and say: "Laus Deo."

I wish I could write as cheerfully and hopefully of my congregations on this side of the river, that is, in this half of my Mission, but here a marked difference is at once noticeable. We have a different class of people here, ninetenths are, as I have repeatedly stated, of the poorest class, and the precariousness of the Summer's fishing, upon which they depend for a livelihood, seemingly keeps them very poor; this, coupled with the fact that many have large

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families, makes life a hard struggle; however these do what they can. At the Barachois, I am pleased to reiterate that our little congregation has erected a very strong frame consisting of chancel, nave and porch, with bell turret, set upon exceptionally heavy cedar foundation, and seem to do what they can to push the work on. Mr. John McCallum and Mr. Robertson have promised to give all the boards for boarding in the building, the other members promising sufficient clapboards and flooring; so that, God willing, we hope, this Spring, to board in, shingle, and clapboard this much needed Church. I may say it stands on land deeded to the Bishop, and the site has been fully approved by our venerable Archdeacon.

All our Services have been well attended during the past year, especially has this been noticed during the Summer months, in Malbaie; of course, during the rough inclement Winter, many persons are unable to come regularly, from the fact that they live far removed from the

Church and have no horses.

I notice especially, and feel very much encouraged from the fact that a larger number of men stay more frequently to Holy Communion, both here and at Corner of the Beach, than when I first came to this Mission. I find, on looking over my journal, only one or two men used regularly to communicate then. I recently counted as many as seventeen men coming forward to partake of that Holy Sacrament in Malbaie Church.

Our Sunday School, during the past Summer, has been regularly conducted. My thanks are due to Miss LeGros and Miss LeGresley, for assisting me as teachers, each taking a class, which enabled me to hold a class in the vestry of our new Church for those who were older and preparing for Confirmation. They also held Sunday School on those Sundays when I would be conducting Services at

other parts of the Mission.

I am extremely sorry to state that the past year has been a sad one in several homes here, and has also seen a loss to us of several Church members. In the Buckley family, once large, and strongly attached to our Church, two sons, both grown to man's estate, were unfortunately drowned at sea, and in the vessel with them another Churchman of this place and father of a family. Within the short space of a few years, I have buried the mother, four daughters, and a married son of this afflicted family. The

aged and infirm father is now left entirely alone, blind and helpless. He has the sincere sympathy of all here in his hour of sorrow.

Another, one of the olderst inhabitants and Churchmen in this Mission, Mr. John LeGresley, died during the past summer. He was present at the first Service held in our new Church in June and remained to partake of Holy Communion. Ere the next Sabbath came, he was called to his rest, and Mrs. Touzel, his daughter, mother of a family, she too has gone from us passing out of life, full of hope, and trusting in the merits of her Redeemer. family (Mr. Bowers), a tormer Church Warden, has, left us to reside in Montreal. I am just now returned home from the bed-side of one, Alexander Duncan, whose spirit we have in prayer commended into the hands of God, taken from us in the prime of manhood. The loss we have sustained by Mr. Duncan's death will be severely felt by us as a congregation. I always found in him, a man ready to sympathize and to help me in Church work as far as he was able, a generous giver he has been to our new Church. His family have, I am sure, the heartfelt sympathy of all in this neighbourhood with them in their affliction and loss.

Two others, both married women, are lying upon beds, from off which they will only be taken, when death, which is considered very near, has done its work. All these are missed in our small community, and especially so, when our assessment, is being made up. Those remaining finding

in hard to make the full quota to the Board.

I beg to say, I have preached and begged, in this Mission for the various funds, for our Church Society, and outside objects, as requested during the past year, some of which show a trifle in excess of last year, and others less. However I am unable to do more, among those whose disposition is not to give. I do, I confess, feel much ashamed, when I compare the amounts collected here with those of other Missions, whose Ministers are not more zealous for the good work than myself, and who have less trouble and anxiety, in raising large amounts, than I have here in raising small amounts. True we have been building new Churches, and are still doing so, and much yet remains to be done. Our Parsonage is old and uninhabitable, yet I do think, that in spite of much poverty among many, that a few could do a little more for the Church of God in thier midst.

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This is a large Mission with people living much scattered, which involves much driving. "The labourer is worthy of his hire," though amid a people, who know of little else other than hard laborious work, the injunction seemingly does not hold good, for in not a few instances here, a small salary is looked upon as a magnificent competence, and, some feeling their poverty, when called upon for contributions to Church work, exclaim: "The Minister should give to our

support, not we give to him."

An effort has twice been made, by a few members of St. Peter's Church, to remove our old Church building from the grave-yard, to a place on the Parsonage Glebe. I have suggested to convert it into a Hall, the need of which, all readily admit, but seemingly refrain from putting their shoulder to the wheel. However, the snow has come now, and nothing can be done till the Spring, when I trust the old unsightly structure will be removed from its present position. We succeeded in taking the tower and spire down, and I would thank those who did so. I must acknowledge the efforts of my Church-Wardens, Mr. John LeGros and Mr. Chas. LeMarquand, who succeeded in collecting and remitting our assessment, and were interested in other works.

This Mission Church has been served throughout the year by the Principal, Professors and Students of Bishop's College. Mr. Elkins, of Sherbrooke, kindly took the Service on one occasion, and Mr. A. D. Nicolls has taken it on several Sundays. Owing to the continued illness and absence of Mr. Tambs, whose work was so valuable, the Sunday School work was intermitted. Lately, Mr. Bishop has revived the Sunday School, and this work seems quite promising.

The state of things at Milby seems to me to be encouraging.

An effort is being made to provide a furnace for the

NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. E. B. Husband reports :-

Since November, 1891, when I was appointed to this Parish, I have endeavoured, as far as possible, to continue the Services carried on by my predecessor.

Last Winter, in accordance with the request of our late beloved Bishop, I also held the charge of the Mission of Shigawake.

New Carlisle.—The new Church, I am sorry to say, does not make the progress I could wish. However, much has been done, and I trust next Spring the congregation will make an effort to finish the outside, so that Services can be held in it, and the old Church pulled down.

In July, a Bazaar was held on behalf of the Building Fund, realizing \$325; added to this, Miss E. Murison has collected \$227.

The Sunday School has been faithfully carried on by eight teachers; the conduct of the scholars being all that could be desired.

I regret to say many are very indifferent as to the welfare of the Church; in consequence, the assessment is collected with difficulty.

To try and remedy this, I have opened a Sunday School three miles from the Church, under the superintendence of Mr. John Ray, and have met with much success. Thirty scholars have joined it, and more are coming. I also hold a Service there every alternate Thursday evening. The attendance has been very good.

Paspebiac.—The Services on Sunday have been well attended, also on Friday evening, when a short Service and practice are held.

Our Sunday School is carried on by four teachers, and I trust is doing much good.

The Church Hall has been completed, on which a small debt remains, but which will I hope be paid off during the coming year.

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D, the ork ted. In March a successful and enjoyable concert was held in the Church Hall, which realized \$40, and was kindly repeated for the benefit of the new Church at Hopetown, \$20 being collected.

In June, an enjoyable pic-nic was held, by the kind permission of Messrs. C. Robin & Co., in their beautiful

grounds.

I am glad to say a branch of the Women's Auxiliary has been formed; twelve members have joined, and I hope more will follow their good example; also, a Guild of Workers, to pay off the debt on the Church Hall.

Miss Viel, our organist, left us in May for Jersey, and was presented by the congregation with a gold bracelet.

Hopetown.—I am glad to say the outside of the new Church is completed, all but the bell turret; a floor and stove have been placed inside, and we hope to hold Service in it shortly.

Unfortunately the congregation here has become much scattered; but, when they see their Church finished, I trust

they will return.

I hold Service there every alternate Sunday.

I look forward to the coming year with hope, not only as to the various outward needs of this parish, but also to a deeper spiritual union with the Divine head of the Church.

NEWPORT.

The Rev. H. A. Dickson reports:-

In looking back over the work of the past year in this Mission, I feel that my report must contain a record of small accomplishments compared with the work yet to be done in this wide field. I am sorry to say there are many who, during the time covered by my report, have

not attended a Service of any description, unless, perhaps, a funeral, when to shew a respect for the creature which they deny the Creator. But, although the success which we hoped for a year ago, has not attended our labours, still we have reason to be encouraged, from the steady progress that has been made.

At Randboro', where I have resided since I came to the Mission, as being more central than Island Brook, this has been an uneventful year, the regular work having gone steadily on with no noteworthy change. During Lent, in connection with our weekly devotional Services, I gave a series of addresses on the Creed and Ministry, as well as readings from Dr. Randall's Pitt's street chapel Lecture: "Why I am a Churchman", which were frequently followed by a few minutes catechising in connection with the subjects considered.

Both the Church and Parsonage lots have undergone improvements at the hands of members of the congregation, and an expenditure of \$23, provided by the Women's Guild. The Guild continues its work, and in addition to having had a year of prosperity in its ordinary undertakings, has been instrumental in raising, by means of an entertainment,

\$35 towards the Parsonage Fund.

At Island Brook, we have had our discouragements, but can again look hopefully forward. We have lost by removal several of our faithful few including our organist, two Sunday School teachers and Choir leader. rejoice with those whose ranks of Church-workers were swelled, we could not but keenly feel the loss which to us seemed almost a mortal wound; however, in our weakness, those who had hitherto been almost silent from beginning to end of the Service, learned to take their part, and instead of the congregation depending upon the few to respond we have now the heartiest Congregational Service we have had since I came to the Mission, as well as having the offices held by those who left, filled by those who are both efficient and willing, and signs of new interest shown by several individuals, lead me to hope that Island Brook may yet shake off that cold indifference which has been so discouraging in the past. We have for the last few weeks been holding cottage meetings, which are encouraging from the interest shown not only by the attendance, but by the signs of preparatory labour spent in studying out the Scriptural foundations upon which the Church's doctrines

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of these meetings.

Since one of the characteristics of the Church of England is that her strength, both in numbers and in loyalty, lies where she is studied in the light of Holy Scripture and is known just as she is, I have endeavoured to put before the people, in as plain a way as I could, the reasons for the Church's ritual and doctrine, and especially those parts with which so many in new Missions are unacquainted, that they may love and trust her for holding and teaching those things which they before regarded with suspicion and distrust.

The Women's Guild here is flourishing, and during the past year has been busy preparing to meet the expenses of much needed Church improvements, towards which it

already has over \$60 raised.

At Clifton our Services suffered for some time from a serious interruption, caused by diphtheria. The school-house we occupy being closed for all purposes during February and March, it was some time after all danger was apparently over before many of those who had hitherto been regular attendants could rid themselves of their newly acquired habit of staying at home; but all is now bright and we again have our school-house well filled, but I frequently have reason to wish for heartier responses.

At Learned Plain we have had a regular and steadily increasing attendance, and for the last ten months the heartiest Services of the Mission have been held here, which is chiefly due to the untiring exertions of a few who have for some time shown their interest in a practical way which is being followed by good results. The influence of Mr. Frederick Bowen has been in several ways helpful, but especially by his care in training the Choir, which he leads, not only in the musical part of the Service, but also in the responses, in such a deliberate and reverential manner that others readily join in. And while thanking Mr. Bowen on behalf of myself and others enjoying the fruit of his labours, I cannot but express the wish that we could have in our country Parishes and Missions more of such old boys of Bishop's College School.

The Sunday School here, which is the largest in the Mission, like that of Island Brook, has been continued without interruption during both Winter and Summer; this, I am sorry to say, we have not been able to do at Randboro', on

account of the children living at such a distance from the Church.

PENINSULA.

The Rev. H. A. Brooke reports:—

I was appointed as assistant to the Revd. G. T. Harding, of Sandy Beach, in October last, to take charge of the Mission of Peninsula and Little Gaspé, which is separated from Sandy Beach by the Gaspé Bay.

In this part of the Mission there are two Churches, one at Peninsula, and the other at Little Gaspé, about ten miles from Peninsula. Since my arrival Services have been held

regularly in both Churches every Sunday.

Formerly at Little Gaspé Service was held once a month, and in some seasons of the year it was impossible for Mr. Harding to get there even once a month, and so they would only have one Service in two months.

But now, with a regular Sunday Service, the congregation is increasing, and I believe that there is a very good prospect for the growth of the Church in this part of the Mission.

Besides the regular Sunday Services at Peninsula, I also have a Service every Wednesday evening, followed by a choir practice, and at this Service I am giving a course of addresses explanatory of the Prayer Book, showing the connection between the different parts of Divine Service, and also the ancient origin of the Pravers. The people seem to be very much interested in these Services, and I am in hopes they will be the means of strengthening their faith in the Mother Church.

The Church at Peninsula has been greatly beautified this year by the addition of a new chancel, built at the cost of

about eighty dollars.

The Sunday Schools have been kept up in the Mission with very good attendance, considering the condition of the roads. I must thank Mr. William Miller, superintendent at Peninsula, for the kind and unceasing interest which he takes in the Sunday School.

And I wish also to take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Charles Bartlett, my Sunday School Superintendent at Little Gaspé, for the able and zealous manner in which he

has conducted the Sunday School at Little Gaspé.

Besides the Services above mentioned, I have arranged to hold a monthly Service at Ship Head, a place about fifteen miles from Peninsula, where are still remaining a few families faithful to the Church: Mr. Samuel Roberts having kindly offered us the use of his house for Service, which offer I gladly accepted.

Before concluding my report I must thank my Church-Wardens for their kindness and prompt attention to every

duty which that office involves.

It seems that our financial statement should be accompanied by a few words regarding the work of the year. The work has gone on in the usual way. The Services at Portneuf and Halesboro' have been carried on with scarcely any interruption. The congregations have been good at Portneuf, and they have been better at Halesboro' than heretofore. There has been at both places a decided improvement in the attendance at Holy Communion, both in numbers and frequency. The two Sunday Schools are

attended by all the children of the Church of suitable age. Portneuf Church has been enriched by the introduction of some beautiful stained glass work into the west window, by Mr. Walter Greenough, of New York, son of Mr. W. P. Greenough, of this Parish.

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During my absence, of two months' duration, the Services were taken by Rev. G. H. A. Murray, Mr. T. Dowdell and Mr. W. C. Scott.

Financially we are somewhat in advance of last year. Altogether, we have much to be thankful for. Our people, though weak as to population, I trust are strong in faith, and daily growing in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. James Hepburn reports:—

Once again I am led to speak of the Church suit; but now under very different conditions. We are at last out of the embrace of the law, and breathe more freely. The damages awarded us will be something beyond \$2,000.00, not as much as we expected, or thought we would require to put the building in good repair. However it will be a very real help; and will also give courage to the congregation to do their best. The award is given to us by instalments of \$400 bi-monthly. Next Spring we intend to be in readiness for action.

As soon as ever the judgment was made known to us last July we had a hearty Service of thanksgiving into which a large congregation entered most thoroughly. It was a happy coincidence that seven children were baptized the same day.

It would be unfair in me were I to withhold from the Honorable Col. Aylmer the tribute of praise due to him for his faithful services in this matter. The failing hopes of many have been sustained by him; and personally I feel I owe him much. I see nothing now to keep the Church back from peace, prosperity and happiness. May this hope be realized.

The Ladies' Guild is to be congratulated upon an excellent year's work, so that they have been able to pay the interest on the debt, \$192,00, and reduce the principal by \$150.00. They also manifested good, kindly feling in helping me to a most enjoyable and beneficial holiday at Cacouna. Their efforts to give monthly entertainments were very successful. And the best result of them appears to me to be the developing of the powers of the younger members, and the strengthening of the bonds of membership. One change in their conduct of affairs, for a time, I welcomed, viz., the suspension of sewing operations, and collecting instead from house to house for the payment of the debt on the Church. They gained more than was required for this purpose.

And now, I must speak with peculiar pleasure of the erection of a Rectory. It was much needed. The house is simple in design and unpretentious; but it is well suited to the wants of an ordinary Clergyman's family, and is more than comfortable, and I greatly enjoy it as a home. To ease the burden on the building committee I took the responsibility of a few extras, which friends have helped me to meet.

When a few more subscriptions are paid the house will be free from all liabilities. If this had been the only work of the year, it is quite enough to make all glad and thankful. I owe many thanks to the building committee for their ready assistance whenever I called for their services.

The sixth of October was a day of joy to be remembered by the people. The Women's Auxiliary of the Diocese held their quarterly business meeting here, and representatives readily gathered from the parishes around, as well as from the city of Quebec. The two Women's meetings were very bright and profitable. No offence will be given to any, if the name of Miss Montizambert be specially mentioned. The Parish highly prized the privilege of extending hospitality to those who took the trouble to appear.

In the evening we had a splendid Missionary Meeting in the Town Hall, a large audience having drawn together to see and hear the new Bishop. Canon Foster opened with a good, instructive address on work in Britain and the early customs of Christianity, relieved throughout with flashes of wit and humour; and the subsequent speakers never let the interest flag; they were Rev. A. H. Wheeler, of Island Pond, U. S., Canon Brigstock, of St. John, N. B., Dr. Heneker, of Sherbrooke, and the Bishop. It was more than kind of Dr. Heneker to make the effort necessary to come; and his words sank into every heart. It is a mighty help to the Church's work to have laymen stand and speak so honestly as he did. It is idle now to say that the Bishop made a very favorable impression upon all. Not that his presence made us forget the dear, kindly father taken away from us so suddenly. No! that could not be. But every one rejoiced that the standard-bearer appointed to follow him should give such promise.

Death has been very busy among us

Removals also are many, and particularly of late. Lloyd, the head of the Auxiliary and foremost in every Church work will be sadly missed, as also such good and helpful families as Vicat (Clarke) Peterson, Young and Jones. The two sisters of this last family, members of the Choir, had a pleasing memorial from the Choir on their departure. I was glad to have the congregations remember the organists as they did last Christmas.

RIVIERE-DU-LOUP.

The Rev. E. W. Weary reports:—

It is with much pleasure and satisfaction that I present the reports of work accomplished in this portion of the

Lord's vineyard during the part year.

Village Church.—Sunday morning Services have been regularly held, with a celebration of the Holy Communion once a month during the Winter season, and fortnightly during the Summer months. Our average attendance is about thirty. Last Spring the interior of the Church was greatly improved; the old fashioned box-pews were replaced by modern open seats, thus giving accommodation for fifty extra sittings. The amount for pews, reading Desh and Altar

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hosg in er to ith a Rails amounted to two hundred dollars. The visitors kindly paid the cost of the alteration, and were all well pleased and satisfied with the improvement made by the change. The building has now accommodation for two hundred and twenty-five persons, and on Sundays during the months of July and August, all the seats were occupied.

Our Harvest Thanksgiving Service was held this year in the Village Church, which was handsomely decorated with grain, fruits and flowers. At this Service we had the great honor and pleasure of our new Bishop's presence. As this was his Lordship's first visit, great preparations had been made for his advent, a magnificent arch had been erected over the gate-way with the words "Welcome" in the centre. As the Bishop arrived after dark, the arch was

beautifully illuminated with colored lights.

The weather turned out most disagreable, still a very fair congregation attended the Service. Full Choral Evensong was attempted by the Choir for the first time and was highly appreciated by those present, all listened with rapt attention to the earnest words of the Bishop. After the Service, the members of the Ladies' Guild gave a Social in the Parsonage, for the purpose of giving the congregation an opportunity of shaking hands with their Bishop. A suitable address from the congregation was presented to his Lordship and was read by J. B. Ferguson, Esq., Church Warden, to which the Bishop made a suitable reply in his ususual genial manner. After refreshment had been served, the guests departed to their respective homes, with feelings of great joy at the knowledge of having as their head such a good and kind Bishop. His Lordship left the following morning for Quebec, taking with him the best wishes of his people here and their prayers for a long and successful episcopate in this Diocese.

On Christmas morning, Matins, with Sermon and a celebration of the Holy Communion was held at 11 A.M. The Church was nicely decorated, the Service was choral, and the choir sang the Anthem, "Thine O Lord is the greatness." A good congregation was present, and the Service through-

out was most hearty and earnest.

Station Church.—Divine Service is held in this Church every Sunday evening and once a week during the seasons of Advent and Lent. Our average Sunday attendance is thirty-five and week-day eighteen. The sum of one hundred and sixty dollars was contributed towards the building comple-

tion fund by the Summer visitors. There still remains a debt of three hundred and fifty dollars to be paid before the Church can be consecrated. We hope to accomplish this next Summer. On the Monday in Advent week a very interesting Missionary Meeting was held in the Church; appropriate addresses on Home and Foreign Missionary work were delivered by the Incumbent and Messes. R. A. Day and I. Hill, suitable hymns and anthems were well sung by the Choir. On Christmas Day an early celebration of the Holy Communion was held at 8 A.M., fourteen persons communicated. Full Choral Evensong was held at 7 P.M. A large congregation was present, the Service was beautifully rendered by the Choir, a number of Christmas Carols were sung at the close of the Service.

The Annual Sunday School Christmas Tree was held in the building on Tuesday, Dec. 29th. There was a very large gathering of children; parents and friends of the children had been invited, so the room was filled to its utmost capacity, about one hundred and thirty in all. The large Christmas tree looked very beautiful and was bountifully laden with gifts, oranges, apples, candies, etc. The children sang several lively carols and recited humorous pieces. When the tree had been stripped of all the good things it carried and refreshments had been handed round the evening's entertainment closed with the singing of "God save the Queen". All had a good time and retired much pleased

with their Christmas fête.

It is with much regret that I report the death of the wife of my warden, J. B. Ferguson, Esq., who died in August; this is the first adult member of the resident congregation that has passed away since my advent here three years ago. We all miss her sadly, for she was a most faithful Church worker and devoted member of the "Women's Auxiliary." It can be said of her, as of Dorcas of old: She was full of good works and alms deeds."

A large number of visitors spent their Summer vacation here, and at Portage, St. Patrick's and Pelletier's Point.

At the Portage Services were held on Sunday afternoons in the Mission Room, which were well attended; the sing-

ing was most hearty and the responding good.

At Pelletier's Point, an evening Service was held in the large drawing room in Bellevue Hotel every Sunday during the months of July and August, for the convenience of the many visitors residing there. The average attendance at

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aurch ons of hirtyd and mplethese Services was seventy-five; some of the ladies and gentlemen formed themselves into a choir, and Miss Smith presided at the piano. The singing was very hearty and the responding good. I must here thank the Revds. Petry, Balfour, Hepburn and Dixon for assisting me in this good work, the day is not far distant when a Mission Chapel will be erected there, as a piece of ground has been kindly offered by the proprietor of the Point for that purpose.

In August, a parlor-concert was given by several ladies and gentlemen residing there assisted by friends from St. Patrick, Cacouna and Portage, in the large room at the The concert was in every way a grand success, the room was more than crowded and the sum of seventy dollars was realized; a few days later a garden party was held by the ladies of the Point, Rivière-du-Loup and St. Patrick on the the grounds adjoining the hotel. Great preparations had been made and every effort put forth by the willing hands to make the affair a success, but owing to the unpropitious state of the weather, the grounds had to be abandonned and shelter sought under the verandah of the hotel. A very large number of people had come by train from Rivière-du-Loup and with vehicles from the adjacent The Fraserville brass band played on the upper verandah, whilst the ladies were busy disposing of the many good things provided for the occasion. In a short time all was sold and the handsome sum of one hundred and sixty dollars netted. To all the kind ladies and gentlemen who assisted at the concert and garden party I tender my hearty and sincere thanks. The amount received at both entertainments were given towards Church work in this Mission.

The Saguenay and North Shore have received two visits from me this season. I was sorry to be called in May last to minister the last rites of the Church to the beloved wife of G. N. Forest, Esq., at Sault-aux-Cochon; she died on the 19th May and was buried in the Quebec Cemetery. This good lady was a faithful Church member and will be missed by all who knew her. A kind mother, a faithful wife and a devoted friend to the sick and needy.

The small settlements along the I. C. R. have received each two visits and the ministrations of the Church. must thank the Rev. A. W. King, formerly pastor in this Mission and now in Waterville for his services rendered at

Father Point during his vacation there,

The Women's Auxiliary are doing a good work in a quiet mith and steady way. Meetings have been held frequently during the year. A sale of work was held in August towards the new Church completion fund, in the Jarvis' good hapel warm clothing was sent to the poor of Greenspond Mission, Newfoundland.

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In answer to the Venerable Archdeacon Roe's appeals to all Missions in the Diocese for contributions to assist the Church in Newfoundland, the sum of fifty dollars was collected.

In conclusion, I must offer my sincere thanks to the Wardens, officers and all members of the congregation for their kindness to me and mine during the past year. True sympathy and kind good will between Pastor and flock have been experienced by all. For the success which has crowned our feeble efforts let us one and all offer to God our most humble and hearty thanks. I must also thank the Messrs. R. A. Davy and J. B. Fergusson for acting as Lay Readers during my absence from the Mission, and to Mr. J. Hill, for his valuable services rendered in connection with the Sunday School.

To the members of the Choir, I tender my warmest thanks for the assistance rendered by them at all the Services and entertainments. I trust that the present interest taken in the Services of the Church may long continue, for a hearty Service and good singing tends to draw to Church many who would stay away if the Service was dull and cold.

Mention must also be made of our faithful organist, Miss Hill, and also her sister, Jessie, for the valuable assistance they have both so freely given at the Village and Station Churches.

SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. Geo. T. Harding reports:-

Until last October, the whole work of what has been known as the Sandy Beach Mission, was under my charge, and was kept up in the same way as before reported.

Since then, as your Society is aware, the Rev. H. A. Brooke has had charge of the new Mission on the north side of the Bay of Gaspé, comprising the congregations at Peninsula and Little Gaspé. The gain to the Church, on both sides, from this extra strength is already great. The reports which come to me from Peninsula indicate a considerable advance in the life and work of the Church there. All the signs, indeed, are encouraging, and I am inclined to think that under God's blessing, which seems already to be on the new enterprise, great things may be looked for in the near future. It is but reasonable to expect this: for the people, both there and here, are really good, sound churchmen, with a strong religious and devotional bias, and as I think only need increased ministrations to make them advance rapidly. I should like to mention here an incident, which will serve to illustrate the prevalent Church spirit, as it will probably be interesting and edifying to the Diocese generally:

An old member (over eighty) of the Church at Peninsula, who, to my knowledge, never missed an opportunity of receiving the Holy Communion, was taken sick last Summer and could no longer come to the regular Services, when I offered to bring the Sacrament to him at the house, he said he should take it of course, but that he wished to receive it once more in the House of God and would come for that purpose if I could arrange matters to suit his case. His disease was such that he could not remain more than a few seconds kneeling at the Altar, and asked if I could give to him, of both kinds, first and allow him to depart at once. Of course I gladly consented. He came a Sunday or two afterwards; was driven to the Church (half a mile) at the time of reception; was helped up the aisle, knelt for a moment, received of both kinds before all the others, as the Church directs in the case of the Clergy; left the Church immediately, and was driven home. A few weeks afterwards he died. All this, let it be remembered, was from the departed brother's own mind and knowledge, without prompting or instruction from me, and such a character of Churchmanship is by no means exceptional. The incident, of course, could not but be touching in the eyes of all, but yet would be looked upon here only as just a right and natural thing to be seen in the Church.

On this side of the Bay also, I am beginning to see what I hoped and expected from the additional strength which

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your Society has given us, namely, greater facilities for the good work of edifying the Body of Christ, and a due and thankful appreciation, on the part of the people, of the better Service which may now be rendered. There is no chance, here, it is true, as there is on the north side of the Bay, for expansion in the way of out-stations, &c. In front of us is the sea; at our back an endless forest; touching us, on one side, is the Mission of Gaspé Basin; and between us and Malbaie, on the other, is a wholly Roman Catholic population. But there is a great spiritual work to be done within our borders, which I am every day more clearly realizing; and I only hope I may have strength to carry it A good many of our people, from their location, age, infirmity and other causes cannot attend the Church, and yet are eager for the means of grace. Some of these I am now trying to minister to, and for this purpose have, since October, begun Sunday afternoon Services in what is called the Barachois School House, about three miles from the Parsonage. These are extremely well attended, the School House being sometimes crowded, although the roads, thus far, have been very bad. A Sunday School was started at the same time in connection with them, where over thirty children are being carefully instructed by means of the Calvary, Church, and St. Paul series of Catechisms: more teachers than were required willingly offered themselves for the work, and I have now good hopes of its success. Once a month, too, I have here a Catechising Service, which old and young alike attend, and take a part in; and this also gives promise of being successful, I intend, besides, to open a week-night Bible class there, to take the place of the one I used to have every Winter at Peninsula. I am thankful to see all the heads of families in the district take a strong interest in this movement generally, and am much strengthened by the evident zeal of some. Already there is talk of building a small Church, and I am inclined to think it would be to the interests of the Mission generally, and would tend to bind these people in particular more closely to the Church if they had a House of God in their midst: although properly speaking, they are a part of the Sandy Beach Congregation. But, of course, it is an enterprise not to be hurriedly entered into, and there are many things, besides financial matters, to be considered before undertaking it.

Since I was relieved of the work on the other side of the

Bay, I have been able to provide for two Services at the Sandy Beach Church every Sunday, excepting once in two months, when the Rev. M. Brooke takes me to Little Gaspé for celebration of Holy Communion; and this will prove, I have no doubt, a great advantage, as the two Services are

needed here, and both are well attended.

The Saints' Days were not as regulary observed this Summer as formerly; partly on account of extra work in connection with the new Parsonage, moving, settling, etc., I could not devote sufficient time to preparation for them; but they were observed last Winter as usual. Also, during the Winter, Cottage Services were held in different parts, a Bible Class at the parsonage, and special Services during Lent and Holy week in the Church. For two months, also, in Summer, a daily evening Service was held in Church, which was well attended. The average, I think, was twelve, and we have had as many as twenty-five present on some occasions. I noticed, too, that a few walked quite often a distance of about three miles to attend them.

In regard to temporalities, our one great work on this side of the Bay has been the new Parsonage, to which allusion was made in my last report. The work has been successfully carried on this year, and I fully expected would have been finished before this; but there were many

unexpected hindrances.

I wish to repeat here what I said, in substance, in my last report, that our people have shown an excellent spirit generally regarding this work. Nearly every one in the Parish has given altogether about a week of labour upon the house, besides what they all gave in money and materials. But, when finished, the building will be a credit to the Mission. A pleasing feature, too, of the whole undertaking is that we have not incurred a particle of debt in carrying it on.

I should like here, also, to acknowledge the great kindness which has been shown to myself and family by the people generally. They have, from the beginning of our residence among them, done what they could to show their good will, and this year especially, when help and sympathy were much needed by us on account of the troubles and confusion attendant upon our moving into the new and unfinished house, both were given without stint, freely and glady; and I beg to thank them most heartily for all their kindness.

In regard to financial matters, our condition is encouraging. It must be borne in mind that the accompanying statement concerns only the congregation at Sandy Beach, as the Rev Mr. Brooke reports separately for Peninsula.

I am glad to see that we have not fallen back but rather advanced this year. The amount collected for outside objects is eight dollars more than last year, there being a slight increase in all the items—except for the Church Society, which is a few cents less—besides an unusual collection for the Diocese of Newfoundland; and yet the amount of the Church collections (ninety-three dollars and forty-five cents,) for general purposes exceeds, I think, any hitherto received. And this, notwithstanding the fact that we have been using every effort to complete the new Parsonage. All this is a cause of great thankfulness to Almighty God, and a further confirmation of what I have frequently pointed out before, that we do not lose but steadily gain by listening to the calls for help which come to us from other places. SCOTSTOWN AND LAKE MEGANTIC.

The Ven. Archdeacon Roe reports:-

Scotstown and Lake Megantic have continued under the care of the Archdeacon during the past year. He has also had for the greater part of the year the charge of Barnston, left vacant by the withdrawal of the Rev. Joseph Eames. Over Hereford also he has exercised a joint superintendence with Mr. Murray. The outlook in all these places is encouraging.

1. In Scotstown the two Services and Sunday School every Sunday have been kept up regularly throughout the year with the exception of two Sundays during the Mid.

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Summer vacation—It was matter of much regret that no reader could be found for the Summer vacation work in Scotstown. The Reader at Lake Megantic was therefore instructed to give every alternate Sunday to Scotstown. The Rev. Professor Wilkinson, however, came to our relief after his return from England, and took duty there for five Sundays in August and September.

The Services in Canterbury three Sunday's out of four

have also been rendered regularly.

The burning down of the Pulp Mill early in the year was a serious blow to Scotstown, and led to the removal of a number of our families. Nevertheless the assessment has been paid regularly and all the necessary expenses of the Mission cheerfully provided.

The erection of Scotstown and parts adjacent into a separate Mission is still in the future; it is to be hoped it is

in the near future.

2. The Mission at Lake Megantic has been served during the entire year by Mr. N. M. Bayne. The Sunday School has improved, and a class of five prepared by him is ready to be confirmed in January. The voluntary organist, Mrs. Lloyd, whose indefatigable efforts in the promotion of good and hearty singing are deserving of grateful record, has removed from the settlement. Miss Wilson has with great kindness and efficiency supplied Mrs. Lloyd's place. I must again express my appreciation of the efficient labours of the Church-Wardens, sidesmen, and committee of devout women who cared in their several capacities for the well being of the Church, so that this year again exhibits manifest tokens of healthy growth in the Church's life.

The little settlement in the back ranges of Ditchfield has also been supplied with Services once a fortnight for the

greatest part of the year by Mr. Bayne.

3. The Mission of Barnston has been served on Sundays for most of the year by Mr. E. K. Wilson, and for the Summer vacation by Mr. Kean. Owing to the faithful and acceptable labours of these two Readers, and the devotion of the people to their Church, the Mission was handed over to the Rev. C. H. Brooks in a healthy condition.

SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Canon Thorneloe reports:-

The death of our beloved Bishop in the month of April last, has been felt in more ways than one in the work of this Parish.

It has been our custom for some years past to work through Lent towards Confirmation, which has usually taken place in the month of June. This year our Confirmation was of necessity postponed; and our class of some thirty candidates is still in preparation.

For many years our Parish was content with the traditional two Services on Sunday and one in the week with the usual special Services in Lent and on the Chief Holy But, when Bishop Williams, preaching before the Diocesan Synod in 1888, drew attention to the importance of a more complete observance of the Church's round of Services, as provided for in the Book of Common Prayer, we immediately began the observance of daily Morning and Evening Prayer, and added one or two extra celebrations of Holy Communion. But in the same sermon, the Bishop dwelt emphatically upon the value of weekly celebrations and of the due observance of all Holy Days. Among other things he said: "I would urge you my brethren to consider with yourselves whether you are not bound to carry out the spirit and intention of the Prayer Book by endeavouring, wherever the same is feasible, to partake yourselves, and to give your people the opportunity of partaking every Sunday, of the spiritually strengthening and refreshing food of the Body and Blood of Christ." And again: " Every Clergyman who is charged with the cure of souls ought to be careful to observe the Holy Days appointed by the Church." When at length the Great Head of the Church summoned our dear Bishop to his rest, it was felt that we should no longer delay the complete performance of a duty of which he had so earnestly reminded us, and which in our case at least was so easy of fulfilment. We have, therefore, acted upon the suggestions referred to, and have now, in addition

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to the ordinary Sunday Services and the daily Morning and Evening Prayer, a celebration of Holy Communion in the Parish Church on every Sunday and on all Saints' Days and Holy Days for which the Prayer Book has made special

provision.

During his visit to England consequent upon the Bishop's death, the Rev. L. W. Williams completed the arrangements for his proposed Parochial Mission to be held by the Rev. Canon Bullock, of Leeds, in the Parish of St. Matthew's, Quebec, and, in the name of the Missioner, suggested to us the holding of a similar Parochial Mission in the city of Sherbrooke This suggestion, placing at our disposal the services of an eminent and experienced Missioner, seemed like a Providential effer of blessing, and was thankfully adopted. The work of preparing for the Mission has begun and the Missioner is to be with us on the third Sunday in Lent. It is our earnest prayer that God may make our efforts to extend His glory fruitful in blessing both to Sherbrooke and to the whole District of St. Francis.

I cannot help thinking that our Church's bereavement and the goodness of God in sending to us so experienced and able a successor to Bishop Williams have resulted in a quickening of the religious interest and zeal of our people. On All Saints' Day, at the call of the Rector, the workers of the Parish were called together and appeared in large numbers to discuss the work and needs of the Church in our midst. At no period since he took charge of the Parish has the Rector observed on the part of his people a warmer interest or more abundant tokens of a desire to work for God and His Church. It was felt to be an excellent plan for the workers in Christ's Vineyard, thus to meet together that they might know each other and hear of each other's doings. A resolution was therefore passed amid much enthusiasm to the effect that a similar gathering of Parochial workers should be held annually on Michaelmas Day.

Nor did the spirit thus evinced pass away with the meeting. The various agencies of the Church show signs of quickened fervour, and are doing their work with a heartier will than usual. And as practical results of our conference may be mentioned the taking of steps to establish a St. Andrew's Brotherhood in the Parish and the providing of music for the daily evensong at St. Peter's.

It was found necessary, this year, to make permanent provision for the increased expenditure consequent upon and the sand secial

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manent nt upon the appointment of a Curate in 1888; an expenditure which till this time had been met by special effort. This was done by increasing the rental of the pews in the Parish Charch. There were some who felt, with the Rector, that the necessity for this step was much to be regretted, and who expressed the hope that the day might not be far distant when the pews could be made entirely free to all. With this in view it is much to be desired that measures should be taken at an early day for establishing a Parochial Endowment Fund, without which the change to the free seat system would be attended with some pecuniary risk.

The sketch plans for a new St. Peter's Church, of which mention was made in our last report, were presented to the Easter Vestry Meeting, but were not entirely satisfactory. They were therefore returned to the architects, Messrs. Taylor and Gordon, of Montreal, who were requested to alter them in several important particulars. The altered designs have not been presented. In the meantime nothing has been done towards increasing the Fund for

rebuilding.

At St. Pèter's, the average attendance at Sunday Service has been about the same as last year. At the daily Prayer there has been an average, in the morning of four and in the evening of six.

Great advances have been made by the Choir, in which an excellent spirit prevails. The character of the music has

been greatly improved,

The Sunday School is in thorough and efficient working order. The Guild and Women's Auxiliary were never in more active and successful operation. And the other agencies for good, without exception, continue their efforts and in many cases are thriving.

Beautiful Book Markers have been presented to the chancel of this Church by a member of the congregation.

The ladies of the Guild have given expression to their kindly feeling towards the clergy by presenting the Rector with a handsome stole and the Curate with a surplice.

The Church of the Advent is becoming a more thoroughly organized Mission. It has a Guild, Sunday School and Choir, all in good working condition. It has this year undertaken to pay annually to the general funds of the Parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, and it is now duly represented by a delegate in the Diocesan Synod.

The congregations at this Church, though not vet large,

have been somewhat more regular than last year. They have averaged thirty-four in the morning and sixty one in the evening.

By the devoted efforts of the ladies, the Hall or School Room of the Advent has been completed and paid for, and is proving a great benefit and convenience both to the

Sunday School and congregation.

A few members of the congregation have raised money and purchased an organ for this Hall. Two zealous ladies have collected respectively fifty dollars towards a bell and nineteen dollars and twenty five cents for chancel chairs.

The two out-Missions of Brompton Line and Magog River have been maintained with fortnightly Services throughout the year. In the work of these Missions, the clergy have been indebted, as in former years, to the kind offices of several gentlemen who have served very acceptably as Lay Readers.

The Parish still retains the faithful services of the Rev. R. J. Fothergill, who, besides taking his part in the general work of the Parish, has the chief care of the Magog River Mission.

The clergy have again received invaluable aid from a devoted band of Church workers.

In addition to the amounts repeated below, various sums have been collected in the Parish for outside objects, among which may be mentioned more than one thousand dollars towards the Bishops Williams Memorial Fund.

STANSTEAD AND BEEBE PLAIN.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe reports:-

The work of the Church in this Parish has during the past year, been mostly of a quiet uneventful nature, leaving not much to chronicle, but still I believe not without signs of a steady growth.

The continued grant from the Diocesan Board has enabled me to have the help of a student from Bishop's College for Sunday duty. Mr. H. A. Brooke most efficiently helped me until his ordination. Of his eighteen months, work in this Parish I cannot speak too highly. Since his departure several students have come for Sunday work.

The Services at Christ Church, Stanstead Plain, have been maintained the same as last year. The Holy Communion has been celebrated weekly, with very few breaks, occasioned by my absence from the Parish. The number of communicants at the early celebration has increased. The average of congregations at both the Morning and Evening Services on Sunday has been larger than in the past few years. Our Choir has been reorganized and, though composed mostly of young beginners, has succeeded in brightening and improving the musical portions of the Services. The Lenten and Holy-week Services were the same as in previous years and were attended by very good congregations. Holy Days were observed by special Services.

The financial condition of the Parish may now be considered satisfactory. We are now endeavouring to liquidate the debt contracted by repairing and beautifying the Church last year. We have instituted the plan of special Lenten offerings by the Church members as a proceed of labour or self-denial during that Holy Season, and for two

years the plan has worked well. A Literary Society has been organized to bind together the Church members in Social intercourse, and to promote a love of literary pursuits. During this past Fall we have altered the hour of Sunday School to the afternoon and organized a Bible Class in connection with it. So far the change has proved beneficial both in increased numbers and interest. The Church Day School has been removed to a larger and more commodious building, and the old Church School-room has been repaired and provides a convenient place for Week-day Services in Winter, Guild meetings, etc., etc. The Church School is

under the care of Miss Gilmour, of Côte St. Paul.

The Church at Beebe Plain has suffered during this last year from the same evil as during the past few years, viz: the departure from the village of Church families. During the last two or three years there has been a wholesale exodus of Church people from this place. We hope, however, we have now come to the lowest ebb and are waiting in faith for the turn of the tide. At the time of writing this report, I hear of the return of two families. The opening of quarry work in the neighbourhood has brought a number of new people into the village, amongst whom a Missionary work might be done. The little congregation has, however, held together during this time of adversity. The Church has been carpeted, and the furnace repaired and improved. Service has been held nearly every Sunday, morning and evening.

The fornightly Services at Judd's Mills' School-house have been held with a very few breaks, and with fair and

interested congregations.

The Services at Marlow School-house, on alternate Sunday afternoons, have been held with few breaks during the year. From various causes the congregation has not been so large as last year, but we hope for a revival of interest and sympathy. I have had to relinguish, for a time, the Services at Griffin's Corner, as the Universalists, by whose courtesy we occupied the Union Church, required the building for their own Services. I hope, however, to resume our Services at some future time.

The Services at Libby's Mills have been regularly held during the year, on alternate Sundays, and although our Service comes immediately after a congregationalist one, we always have a fair congregation. The work here is

encouraging.

Taking a view of the whole work of the past year, especially of the more distinctly Missionary work, my decided opinion as to the Church's future in this section of the country is expressed in one word: "Hopeful." There are, and will be, many discouragements. Progress must be slow. By faithful, self-denying work, the Church must grow and increase. The great instrument in this Missionary work is visiting. This I cannot give to the outlying parts of the Parish as it ought to be done. We surely need another Clerical worker in this Parish, if the Church is to grow as it ought.

We mourn the loss from our midst by death of N. T. Sheap, Esq., a member of Christ Church congregation from its first organization, a regular attendant at Divine Service, a faithful Churchman, and a staunch friend of the clergy-

man.

THREE RIVERS.

The Rev. H. C. Stuart reports:-

St. James' Church.—Considerable progress has been made during the past year. The Church Services have been fairly attended, and the interest manifested by all our people in everything connected with the well-being of the Church is very encouraging. Probably the best test of Church life is supplied by the list of communicants. At the Christmas celebration, forty communions were made. This is a marked increase on the number at previous celebrations of this Festival, and as the Parish consists of but twenty families, I think it may be considered as satisfactory. Our Sunday School is also increasing, numbering now about forty Both teachers and pupils are interested in their work, and the School is progressing favourably.

It is pleasing to report that our Chnrch debts, which have

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held our one, re is so long prevented us from attempting new work, have at last succumbed to our united efforts, and we are now able to turn our attention to the long-needed repairs in the Church. This necessary work has been nobly begun already. In July last, the electric light was introduced into the Church and Chapel, with admirable results. This improvement was effected by Miss Newton, whose energy in collecting subscriptions for the purpose, is deserving of all praise. This was followed by a beautiful pulpit of polished

oak and brass, erected by Mrs. Henry Fearon.

We are now organising our limited forces for the work which must necessarily occupy our attention for some considerable time to come. The congregation has undertaken the re-seating of the Church, Mr. Robitaille and myself have undertaken to raise a fund for the new floor, and the Chancel fund will be forthcoming, we hope, from collecting boxes kept by all members of the congregation. Mrs. Rickaby has already given a contribution of two hundred dollars towards the repairs. This sum will probably be utilized in the painting of the interior of the Church. Provision has also been made, through the will of the late Mr. Henry Fearon, for a metal roof for the Church buildings, a thousand dollars having been bequeathed for this purpose. The address of the secretarytreasurer of our Building Fund—for such it really is—is Mr. G. S. F. Robitaille, Quebec Bank, to whom may be sent any subscriptions towards the important work of renovating our historical Church so nobly undertaken by the few struggling churchmen of Three Rivers. Next year I hope to report considerable progress in this work.

In previous reports mention was made of the dilapidated condition of the Cemetery. The ground was donated in 1808 by Mr. Louis Gugy, father of the late Col. Gugy, subject however to a ground rent payable annually to the owner of the Seigniory. A few years ago, a successful effort was made to pay off the arrears which had accumulated, and to free the ground from all future claims. Thus, after a lapse of eighty years the Cemetery is at last ready for consecration. To Mr. Reynar, Rector's Warden, is due the credit of getting this ground into good condition.

The Radnor Forges.—During the year, a very important work has been done here. The Canada Iron Furnace Company has now about twenty families of Protestants at this place, and the number is steadily increasing. Recognizing

the inexpediency of attempting to maintain the services of the various Christian denominations to which they belonged, the people made up their minds to unite together and ask for the ministrations of the Church of England. The immediate result of this praiseworthy decision was the appointment of Mr. Stephen Mallinson to the post of Lay Reader and Teacher of the English School. A beautiful Church has already been erected, and is now nearly com-The interior is being finished in various Canadian woods, with very pleasing contrasts and harmonious effect. It will seat about a hundred and fifty, and if more room is required, the large doors opening into the school-room can be drawn aside, thus accomodating as many more. The school-house is already in use, and the Church will be opened at an early date. The expense connected with this work has been assumed by the congregation, who not only pay Mr. Mallinson's stipend, but they have assessed themselves for a period of three years for the entire payment of both Church and School. The work at this new selfsupporting post is indeed of great importance and interest. The moving spirit of this undertaking is Mr. John Drummond, Manager of the Company's works on the St. Maurice.

Lake St. John Indian Mission —I have visited this Mission regularly for monthly celebrations during the year. In June, Mr. Wilson removed from the Hudson's Bay Post at Pointe Bleue to Esquimaux Bay on the Labrador Coast, thus depriving the people to a large extent of their Sunday Services which they so highly valued. Occasionally during the Summer, American Clergymen, resorting to Lake St. John, conducted Service on Sundays, and their ministrations

were most acceptable.

The Indians inform me that we may expect a considerable increase in numbers this Summer, owing to their preference of Lake St. John as their headquarters for disposing of their furs. There is no doubt that the Church privileges now provided for our Indians at this place has had much to do with this decision, as these people are warmly attached to the Church, and they are gratified at having a Church erected for their sole benefit. We hope that the Church will be consecrated during the coming Summer.

VALCARTIER.

The Rev. S. Riopel reports:-

Our record this year is little else than that of the ordinary

routine Missionary ministrations.

A few repairs were made in the Church Building, which have enhanced the comfort of the worshippers. The design, for some time determined, of putting the last finish to our beautiful little Church was prevented by the heavy municipal taxation, to which our people are being subjected. An iron bridge, across the Jacques Cartier River, which was undertaken through the recommendation and promises of Government, has entailed upon the municipality a very heavy and unexpected expense, rendering it unusually difficult to collect even the assessment of the Diocesan Board.

The attendance, at Divine Service, continues to be encouraging and the number of communicants has considerably increased.

Good will and harmony prevail among our people. There is an evident desire among them to do the best possible.

Stoneham is still served in connection with Valcartier. The road, joining the two Parishes, remains in such a condition that it needs being travelled over to be appreciated.

In May, we had the pleasure and profit of a visit from the Archdeacon, who was on his way to Stoneham to help the congregation there to recognize their responsibility to the Diocesan Board. They were evidently pleased with his words and willingly promised to carry out what was desired of them.

Altogether we are happy in the consciousness of Heaven's continual mercies and blessings. There has been, with us, no striking change loudly inviting attention, but, neither has there been loss or retrogression. A quiet but steady progress towards rectitude of conduct, with greater zeal and devotion in religion, has been quite noticeable.

WATERVILLE.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:

Immediately after the anniversary meeting of last year I was stricken down by a sharp attack of Catarrhal

Pneumonia, and consequently was unable to do any work in my Mission from December the seventh until the first

Sunday in May.

Through the kindness of the Diocesan Board, and under the direction of the Venerable Archdeacon, the Services were supplied first, by students of Bishop's College, and later by the Rev. Professor Yates, who always will be a welcome visitor to this Mission. On the first Sunday in May I resumed my work, and since then all three stations have had regular Sunday Services, and Holy Communion evey month. During the Summer months I gave early Communions, so as not to interfere with the regular Services.

Waterville has had a regular week-night Service, and fortnightly Services were given at the house of Mr. Harvey Cass, in North Hatley, and occasional Cottage Services at Lower Capelton and at Stimson's School House,

near Eustis.

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These last Services were well attended, and quite an interest was awakened. The attendance at Waterville and North Hatley has been about the same as last year, but at Eustis the attendance has been much larger, and continues to improve at every Service. Unfortunately the Sunday School at this Station could not be continued for want of a Superintendent and Teachers, and now, I am sorry to

say, it has passed out of our hands.

During the months of July and August, the visitors at North Hatley conducted quite a prosperous Sunday School, which was attended by a large number of persons, but when the visitors left, the School was closed, there being no one in the place ready to assume the responsibility of managing it. Bound as I was to hold so many Services every Sunday at so many different points, it was simply impossible to give attention to Sunday School work. I incerely hope that my successor will be able to accomplish more in this respect than I have been able to do. The Sunday School at Waterville has gone on regularly, and a few faithful teachers have continued their loving efforts for the good of the children in spite of many discouragements.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited this Mission on the 5th of October, and preached a Thanksgiving Sermon at Waterville, confirmed four persons at North Hatley, (who became communicants the following Sunday.) In the evening of the same day, he baptized five adults, and confirmed sixteen persons at Eustis, fourteen of whom are now regular communicants. It is not without sincere regret that I sever my connection with this Mission, for I have made many warm friends, and have received much kindness from the people, and what is more attractive still, new and unexpected openings, which I should have been pleased to develop, but the work is beyond me, and must now pass into the hands of some younger man. I sincerely hope that an energetic devoted man may be found to build upon the foundations which, in much weakness, I have endeavoured to lay.

EXTRACTS

FROM THE REPORTS OF THE VENERABLE ARCHDEACON ROE, GENERAL MISSIONARY AGENT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD.

The Board has thought that a few extracts from the Archdeacon's Reports would be of greater interest to the members of the Church than a synopsis of the whole. The following refer solely to the Archdeacon's work in two Missions, i. e. Scotstown and Hereford.

September 5, 1891—To Scotstown, and on Sunday celebrated the Lord's Supper and addressed the Scotstown congregation twice, and that at Canterbury in the afternoon; also administered the Sacrament of Baptism in the evening. Mr. Wm. Barton, of the Bishop's College Brotherhood of Readers, has been resident here during the vacation and has done good work. The congregations were large and the interest marked. There were twenty communicants. The Sunday School at Scotstown is well kept up; there ought to be one also at Canterbury. I think it very much to the interest of the Church that Canterbury should be served from Scotstown as it is being served now.

September 10 to 15—Spent at Lake Megantic. On Sunday we had three most cheering Services at Agnes. The little Church was crowded to its utmost capacity in the morning. Eleven communicated. In the afternoon, there was a Service for Baptisms, the Litany with address; a sudden storm of rain, however, came up and no children were brought. The Sunday School is doing very well, and Mr. Bayne, the student in charge, has an encouraging Bible Class, which I took. I have seldom spent a happier Sunday.

The number of families belonging to us in this Mission is as follows: At the Lake, twenty-four families, besides five individuals not counted in families, who profess to be Church people, also six-families who belong to us more than to anything else. At Ditchfield, seven miles from the Village, five families belonging to us and two who attend

the Services. At Three Mile Lake, ten miles distant, one family and one on the way there. At Three Lakes (i.e. the head of Lake Megantic) five families—probably more. At Keen's Mill, three miles beyond Ditchfield, three or four more families. In all, there are from forty-five to fifty families whom we reach in this settlement. We have twenty-eight communicants in the place; and the people pay in cash about \$150 towards the expenses of maintaining the Services. The success of the work done in this Mission, though with the Sunday Services of a Reader only for nine months of the year, a resident Reader for three months during vacation, and occasional visits of the Archdeacon, is very marked indeed.

September 26 to 30—Given to the Rev. G. H. A. Murray's Mission on his invitation, with the view specially of ascertaining whether the project, long under discussion, of providing for the permanent reopening of the Hereford Church can be carried out. Hereford, distant from Dixville some twelve miles, and for many years served from there, was closed about seven years ago for failure to pay its assessment. A proposal has been made that a resident Clergyman should be stationed at Hereford, who should give a portion of his time to the pastoral care of members of the American Church residing in the neighbouring Dioceses of Vermont and New Hampshire, his stipend to be jointly provided by the two sister Churches. The first object of my visit was to ascertain exactly what is the nature of the field on our side of the line and the want to be supplied.

I find as the result of personal inspection on the spot that there are, within a radius of four miles from the old Hereford Church, on our side of the line, some thirty families who claim more or less to belong to the Church, besides a good many who favour the Church, though they belong to no denomination. From them we must not expect too much, nor too soon. It will take some time to mould them into sound intelligent members of the Church; and, in the meantime, we must be content with small returns in the way of money contributions. They are all pleased at the prospect of the old Church being permanently re-opened, and their kind feeling towards us and willingness to respond to our efforts are undeniable. They have, of their own accord, re-shingled the Church and are about to paint it, and contemplate other improvements.

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October 3 to 5—Spent at Scotstown and Lingwick. The Scotstown congregation had procured a very good bell, and invited me to dedicate it. There was a very large congregation and a hearty Service. In the afternoon Mr. George Layfield came for me from Lingwick and I took the Service there. There were about twenty-five present, all of them Church people. They assured me that their finances were sound; but the smallness of their numbers and their distance, 12 miles, from headquarters were depressing. There can be no doubt that this congregation would be much better off if served from Scotstown, which is only seven miles distant with a very good road.

October 10 to 12.—Returned to Hereford by appointment via North Stratford and the Hereford Railway. morning unfortunately turned out stormy with a fall of wet snow. About twenty adults appeared at the Service. After Service I requested all to remain, when a conference was held upon the question of continuing the fortnightly Services lately resumed, and upon the larger project of planting a Clergyman here, who shall serve on both sides of the Line. It soon appeared that the only difficulty was that of paying the expenses of the Services, or a portion of them, and there was great hesitancy towards committing themselves, and strong fears, engendered by past failures, that it would be extremely difficult to obtain subscriptions that would warrant them in engaging to pay any sum worth mentioning. It was finally decided that an effort should be made to ascertain by a house to house canvass how much could be secured; and an offer from me to come down again and help them in the canvass was thankfully accepted. I trust the Board will see in all these difficulties and discouragements only so many urgent calls to occupy this field, proclaiming as they do the crying need on the part of these our long neglected brethren of that personal pastoral care and continuous instruction, which alone will open the heart to its need of the grace of God and the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ. These are just "the Sick" who need the "Physician," the "sinners" whom He came to "call."

October 28—I proceeded to Hereford, and spent the next two days there in visiting from house to house with the Committee appointed to ascertain how much could be e

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raised. 1st, towards the expenses of the fornightly Services, and, 2ndly, towards the support of a resident Clergyman. The result is that about \$100 a year can be relied upon from the Canadian side of the line towards a resident Clergyman, and about one half that amount for the fortnightly Services. I think this ground ought on all accounts to be occupied at once. Besides the thirty families mentioned above who are willing to accept our Clergyman as their Pastor, there are a good many who acknowledge no allegimee to any form of religion, whom we ought to win back to Christ. The field is open to us as it is nowhere else in the Eastern Townships. There are no other religious Services of any kind on our side of the line, except a Sunday morning Advent Prayer meeting at Hall's Stream, nor on the American side, except Sunday Services in the two villages (which are really one) of Canaan and West Stewartstown. I am not yet in a position to bring definitely before the Board the project of maintaining a resident Clergyman at Hereford. I am satisfied, however, that this is a field which the Board must, sooner or later, enter upon, and in provision made for new fields of labour it ought in the meantime to be borne in mind.

* * * * * * * * *

October 22 to 24, 1892.—Given to Scotstown. On the Sunday a Celebration, and also Morning and Evening Services; and, in the afternoon, Service and sermon at Canterbury. Also Sunday School at Scotstown before the Morning Ser-At the Evening Service baptized two fine boys, children in a family which we have been cultivating from the first. As they professed to be of no religion, we claimed them, but apparently with little hope of success. Now one of the daughters brought her two children to Baptism, and asked to be baptized with them herself. I had two most interesting interviews with this young married She had spoken to Mr. F., one of the most zealous members of the Church here, about having her children baptized; he inquired if she was baptized herself. On her saying no, Mr. F. told her it was very wrong and that she ought to be baptized with her children. This word spoken in season decided the mother. But now a fresh difficulty arose; she had had no sort of preparation for Baptism, and . understood nothing about it. She had the idea that she

could be baptized simply as a profession of interest in religion, without pledging herself to any religious body, much less becoming a member of the Church, or deriving from the Sacrament any real spiritual benefit. I told her that I would of course very gladly baptize her, but I explained the serious nature of the Sacrament, and the necessity of preparation both of head and heart. I offered to arrange for her a short course of instruction, and to come back and baptize her in a fortnight. However, on full consideration, she preferred to defer it. I accordingly gave her a Prayer Book and other books and tracts, and arranged a course of instruction, and I baptized her two children, whom she now fully understands to be members of the Church and undertakes to bring up as such. It is especially in cases like these that one feels how inadequate is the religious help we are able to give to these people by Sunday Services only, and those in most cases the services of a young layman. I beg most earnestly to express my conviction that the time is fully come for the planting of a clergyman in Scotstown, and setting off that place together with Canterbury and Lingwick, as a new Mission. Of course this will involve a considerable outlay, but is not that just what the funds entrusted to us are for?

If a resident Clergyman is placed in Scotstown, his pastoral care would be extended to Lake Megantic, which is distant twenty-five miles by rail. For Sunday Services, the Lake Mission would still depend upon Readers as it does now; the Reader however might exchange periodically with the Scotstown Clergyman so as to afford the Lake Megantic congregation regular administration of the Sacraments. Of course, the Clergyman could be easily summoned by

telegraph from Scotstown in case of emergency.

December 9 to 13.—Most interesting Services and Conferences in conjunction with the Bishop at Scotstown, Canterbury and Lingwick. At each of these three places there is a considerable number of families eager for the regular ministrations of the Church; and at Scotstown there are many more, who, if they can have a resident Clergyman, will soon be brought in. In the meantime, those who are already Church people offer to the Board \$250 per annum, a larger sum than is paid by several of our existing Missions.

January 18 to 21, 1893.—Confirmations, Services and Meetings at Hereford, Hall's Stream and Perryboro'. At all three places the people were most hearty and enthusiastic; and at Hall's Stream, where our Lay Reader's Services are at present held in an ugly School-house, the people are setting bravely to work to build a handsome Church. Moreover, the Hereford and Hall's Stream residents now offer \$150 per annum for a resident Clergyman, and this amount is sure to grow. I feel therefore that the time has at length come, when we ought to make a new departure and place a Clergyman at Hereford: and, if we do so, I am convinced that this will prove a great work for God.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING COMMITTEE OF THE DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY, 1892.

The amounts contributed during the year are:—Domestic \$1,698.94, and Foreign \$2,259.80, making a total of \$3.958.74. Compared with the previous year, this amount shows a gain of \$632.41; and restores the contributions to the amount raised in the year ending the 31st July, 1890, with \$37.66 additional.

The Committee are gratified at being able to announce this result; but they consider it their duty to point out that a large part of the amount given to Foreign Missions is still derived from a source that eannot be expected to be permanent, and that the increase arises chiefly from this source. If the Diocese is to continue to accomplish in the future as much as it has done in the past, it is plain that greater zeal must be aroused and that there will be need of more widespread individual efforts than are now made.

In Domestic Missions there is a net increase of \$78.98. In the sum contributed to Algoma there is a falling off; but the total amount contributed shows that the Dioceses of the Great North West are attracting some of the attention which their growing importance demands. The details, compared with those of last year, are shown in the following table:—

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and confirmed, after which the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were read.

SECOND ANNUAL REPORT ASSOCIATION OF CHURCH HELPERS.

The work of our Association has gone on increasing in interest, its objects are well known, and its assistance much appreciated, as shown by the number of applications received by us during the past year, and the grateful letters written to us in acknowledgment of help given.

We number one hundred and seventy-six members,

seventy-four of whom hold mite boxes.

Two general meetings, in May and October, ten committee meetings, and one special meeting have been held.

Our Association sustained a great loss in the death of our beloved Bishop, who was chiefly instrumental in the foundation of our Society, and whose ready help, sympathy, and valuable advice, so materially aided us in organizing and commencing our work. A special meeting of the Executive Committee was called, to express the grief of the whole Association, and our sympathy with Mrs. Williams, in her bereavement.

Our Annual Fair took place in October, and we were well satisfied with the result, the sum of \$276 being realized.

The collection for the Church Society was again undertaken by members of our Association. In 1890, by the old system of collecting, the sum amounted to \$2,202. In 1891, when the Church Helpers undertook to do it, the result was \$2,383.20, or an increase of \$181.20 over the previous year. The collections for 1892 amount to \$2,727.80, or \$354.80 more than in 1891, being a total increase of \$535.80 for the two years, in which we have undertaken the work.

At a general meeting held in October, at the suggestion of our President, a resolution was carried by a standing vote, that \$150 of our funds be contributed to the Bishop Williams Memorial Mission Fund.

l'arcels of clothing, cutlery, house linen, and furniture have been sent to different clergymen for the use of themselves and families. A parcel of warm clothing was also sent to the Rev. H. C. Stuart, for a destitute Indian family at Lake St. John. We wish to thank members for valuable donations of clothing, which have been sent in from time to time.

At the request of Mrs, Williams, our Association distributed the bales of clothing sent out to her from England, she furnishing the names of those to whom they were to be sent, and we take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Scott, of the Express Office, and the agents of the Quebec Steamship Company, and the agents of s.s. "Beaver," for their kindness in delivering our parcels, free of charge.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese has kindly consented to become Patron of our Association, and Mrs. Dunn has accepted the position of Honorary President.

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The following is the report of the meetings of the Executive Committee:—

In February, \$10 were voted to the Rev. P. Roe. Inverness, towards repairs on Church; also, \$20 to the Rev. G.

Harding for same purpose.

In March, a hymn book with tunes was sent to the Rev. P. Roe for use in one of his missions. The Rev. G. Harding, a surplice, stole and cassock. Books to the value of \$10 were sent to the Rev. J. C. Cox, Windsor Mills. Two dozen symm books were sent to Canon Richardson for use of Longregation at the Jail.

In April, a surplice and stole were sent to Rev. Jas. Pykes, Eingsey; also, a stole to Rev. & Walters, Gaspé.

In May, a stole was sent to the Rev. J. C. Cox. At the general meeting sets of Communion vessels were voted for the missions of Dixville and Fitch Bay. \$50 were voted towards the expense of furnishing the Clergy House of Rest at Cacouna.

In September, \$20 were sent to the Rev. W. T. Forsythe, towards paying a lay reader during the Summer months.

In October, \$20 were sent to the Rev. C. H. Brooks, through the Archdea on, towards repairs on Parsonage at Barnston Corners. At the general meeting the same month, the sum of five dollars was added, to supplement the grant of \$20 made to the Rev. C. H. Brooks; \$30 were also voted towards purchase of solid silver Altar vessels for the Church at Sandy Beach. A grant of \$60 a year to a clergyman, for education of his children, was renew to.

December—A bible, for use in one of his missions, was

sent to the Rev. J. Debbage, Bourg Louis.

In January, \$20 were sent to the Rev. J. Debbage towards repairs on roof of his Church. A set of fair linen was ordered for the new Church at Beattie's settlement; also, a set of plated Altar vessels for same mission.

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

TO THE

DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary, for the year ending May 1892, contains the following information

and record of its growth.

"Three new Branches have been formed, making twentytwo Senior Branches, two sub-divisions of Branches and four Junior Branches, containing 1133 members, an increase of 173 over the previous year, notwithstanding the loss of many by removal and death.

The education of the daughter of the Revd. A. Allman,

Diocese of Algoma, has been continued.

The sums of \$100 for the Lady Missionary at St. Paul's Industrial School for Indians, Diocese of Rupert's Land, and \$50 for the Piegan Reserve Home were paid, as promised.

Quebec's share in the expenses of Miss Sherlock, our Canadian Medical Missionary to Japan, which amounted to

\$150, was also contributed.

The Rev. E. Wilson's Indian Homes received a fair share of assistance and \$45.97 were sent to the Zenana Missions.

Money has been sent in varying sums to Algoma, Athabasca, Qu'Appelle, Moosonee, McKenzie River, Saskatchewan and Rupert's Land.

The total sum raised was \$1,687.71, not very far from doubte that of \$898.56, which was recorded two years ago."

At the Annual Meeting held on the 12th May, 1892, a resolution was passed expressing the grief of the Woman's Auxiliary at the death of our beloved Bishop and their heartfelt sympathy with Mrs. Williams and her family.

In token of their love and gratitude a Memorial has been raised by the Woman's Auxiliary in the form of one handsome and two plaine; sets of silver Altar Vessels for the Diocese of Mackenzie River, in which our late Bishop took so keen an interest.

At the request of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Bishop of Mackenzie River came to Quebec to address a Missionary Meeting and take part in their Annual Service.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese has kindly consented to be Patron, and Mrs. Hunter Dunn, President, of the Quebec Diocesan Branch.

Those parishes in this Diocese which have not formed a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary are earnestly invited to do so at an early date.

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The Triennial Meeting of the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary was held in Montreal in September last, when delegates from the six Dioceses of Quebec, Montreal, Ontario, Toronto, Niagara and Huron were present. A membership of close upon 10,000 was reported and the sum of \$44,481.02 was recorded as raised during the past three years. The number of bales, barrels, &c., of clothing and comforts sent to the North West and elsewhere during the same period was 940.

FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

I. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures, for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italies say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Mission Fund.

Or,—Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen

of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, called

the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,—For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday-Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.


Or,—For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of Churches according to the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage-houses,—the setting apart of burial-grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and devise unto "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and lifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., (describe the real estate clearly) to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.








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IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.

Same as in No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say:—upon the trusts to hold the same for ever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the place adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.
