Tue sum of $\$ 1,500$ has been voted by the citizens' committee for the crection of a building for the display of Manitobn products at the furthcoming Dominion Exhibition in this city.
The eas-lighting of the city of Quebec is progressing slowly. $1 t$ is reported that a large number of lamps, chicfly in upper town, has not yet been rephaced.

Messits. L. Delar \& Co., Annapolis, N.S., propose to build another ship in their yard this season. This Compuny have been ship-buildjug since 1873.
It is numoned that an enterprising eitizen of Montreal intends running a steamer from Annapolis, N.S., to England this latl, to carry apples.

There has mefn some talk of opening a subscription in this city to raise $\$ 10,000$ to be presented to Mr. Danserean, late proprictor of La Minerve, and now joint clerk of the Crown, for his services to the Conservative cause for many sears past.

Tine Nova Scotia Fonge Co., New Glasgow, N.S., have engaged to supply a new shaft for the steamer "Carrol," which was disabled by the breaking of h:r shaft in Northumberland Straits, a few days ago. Heretofore, when such an accident bappened to $n$ vessel, she could not be repaired nearer home than Boston. Part of


the repairing is being done at J. Matheson \& Co.'s Foundry.

Mr. Fomesstri, of Milchell, Ont, is doing a large business in flax this year. He is now busy threshing it, and, in the langmage of a correspondeat, "cirealating his money amongst the poor and needy, who find that flas-growing is a lacrative basiness. He circulates about $\$ 30$,000 anmuilly amongst the farmers resiting near
the torn."

IT is reporied that a beet root sugar factory is to be started in St. Johms, Que. The JIon. F. G. Marchand, in company with un expert from France, has visited vatious parts of the comntry to examine the capabilitirs of the soil, ete. The News thinks a sugar factory at St. Johns would be a grand thing, but suggests that it might be advisable to await the result of the experiment in Farnham and Conticoole before sinking further capital in the enterprise.
Since the late fine at Annapolis, N.S., a local Fire Insurance Company has been malked of, but nothing has yet been aecomplished. That portion of the town destroged already shows signs of resuryam. Gearge Runciman \& Son have commenced the foundation of a threestory brick building, A. W. Durgie is re-building a carriage factory and furniture war house, and other parties are commencing the erection of new structures.

Tus Woodstock, Ont., Sentinel-Reviev publishes a wail about the thrifiy housewife receiving only from seven-and-a-half to nine pounds of sugar for a dollar under the National Policy : to which the Orillia P'uthet replies that, if such is the case at Woodstock, the "thrifty housewife" must not blame the N. P., but the grasping and unscrupulous or very unenterprising merchants of that old-fashioned town. In Orillia
the thrifty housewife is invited week by week, theough the local pulers, to come and get good bright sugar, 13 lbs . for a dollar ; or very bright, 12 lbs . for a dollar.
Tue menchants of Mitehell, Ont, still complain londly of the scarcity of small silver for "charge." A correspondent says it is not unusual to see half-n-dozen persons in that town running around at one time for change for four dollar bills or tweaty-tive cent pieces. It appenrs that the new issue of smath silver coins has not yet reached Mitchell, whose citizens should rest thankful that they have the four dollar bills and twonty-five cent pieces, which will certainly purchase the new Ganadian silver now being circulated by the Banks. It has been stated that the scarcity of the smati Candian silver was eaused by the withirawal of harge quantities from cirealation for conversion into that chass of jewellery now so fashionable in this country.

Ths impending adrent of the Omnium Securities Company (limited), with its $\$ 3,000,000$ to be sentiered hrondenst among aligible bor-
rowers, has some what "fluttered the dovecotes" rowers, has some what "fluttered the dovecotes" of loan societies, and private capitalists who land money on mortgnges. The rate of interest seems to have tuken a sure and steady turn downwards. One large company. having funds for investment has been loning at seven per cent. for some time, and complains that even so the demand is limited. A solicitor in Hamilton, Ont, has deposited in one of the city banks sume $\$ 50,000$ for which there are no borrowers, and a legal firm in that city a day or two since advised a client to nccept six per cent. on alarge loan on the very reasonable ground that he might lave to wait long and put up with inferior security before he could get a
better rate.

Thoagh the enrnings have been ratably less, the losses liave been as nothing, and hence the balances on deposit and actually wating for investment now represent the extraordinary sum stated. The five years of comparitive stagmation were also years of stringent economy,an economy that was more or less a necessity at first, and which was adhered to long after it censed to be enforced. Large accumalations were the result, and prudence in making investments bas since then been the rule: Before the depression in business, speculation was always sible to entice inrestments upon promises of large


dividends and sudden wealth. Those who lost their moner when the collapse eame, and baukrupteies with little or no dividends to ereditors were the rule, have so far hoarded their surpluses, and are even yet slow to embark in new enterprises. The money on deposit is $n$ solid reality, even hough it yield no prolit, and those who own it are twating for something outside of the old beaten track before they renture again to invest. ## THE WORLD'S COMMERCE.

The letter of Mr. Evarts, American Secretary of State, transmiting the report for 1879 of the commercial relations of the United States with foreign countries, just issued, contains a complete statement of the world's trade, based upon the reports of the American consuls and upon the oflicial reports of the several countries. Secretary Evarts has gronped the world's trade under the usual continestal beadings, Africa, America, Asia, Australia and Europe. Not only is the total trade of each continent given therein, but also details concerning the trade of each country, with comparison of the trade of Englind, Prance and the United States with each, and extracts from consular reports showing the state of American trate in all countries. 'loo much praise has, perhaps, been bestowed upon Secretary Eyarts' interesting statement when it is brought to people's reoollection that, two years ago, Professor Neumann Spallart of Vienna issued a treatise on the commerce of the world which contains a carefully compiled statement of the imports and exports of all countries for the year 1876 . the similarity of totals arrived at in both statements gives a great authoritative correctness to the figures, and implies a great deal of care given to their collection.

According to Professor Neumann Spallart, the imports and exports of the world for the year 1876 amount in round numbers as follows:

From these totals, it will be seen that the foreign commerce of all nations combined amountor, in 1576 , to $\$ 14,000,400$, 000. 'The tolal commerce of the globe is distributed among the several geographical divisions as follows: Europe, 71.25 per cent. for the whole; America, North and South, 15.82 per cent.; Asin, 8.07 per cent.; Austradasia, 3.20 per cent.; and Af:ica, 2.07 per cent.

If we take the averige of all nations, their exchavges of commodities with foroign countries amount to 511.08 per head, but large divergences from this common average are seen in comprating the several geographical divisions. For Europe the foreign conmerce averages sid.52 per head of population; for America, $\$ 25.20$; for Asia, 81.40 ; for Australasia, 3256.77 , and for Afica, 83.62 .

These ratios indicate what course the future exprasion of the world's commeree must take, and they also show what a vast field exists for such expansion. Asia, with her $807,000,000$ of population-wwo-thitds of the whole population of the globe-exchanges with the rest of the world only $\$ 1.40$ per head of prolucts. If Asia's trade could be brought up to the atwerge of that of Europe ( 34.52 per head), it would aggregate $\$ 27,857,000,000$, or double the present total of the world's commerce. This fact illustrates the enormous capa. city of this one division of the world's population for commercial expansion, and demonstrates the importance of all efforis for gaining access to that vast mass of consumers and producers. The obstr uctions imposed by the ancient civiliantions of $\Delta$ sia are steadily and surely yielding to the peaetrating agencies of modern enterprise, all the ports of Chind have recently been thrown open, and nothing can prevent Western merchants from opening up vist markets with these eight hundred millions of Asiatics. Upon every ground of geographical position and natural resources a large share of the future commerce of Asia should fall to this continent, and it depends upon us to secure it by bringing to on early completion our Cana.
dian Pacific Railway and opening to England the shortest hansit road to the Asiatic markets.

## THE REDUGTION OFTHE SUGAR. DUTY. IN FRANCE.

The alleration of the fiscal poliay of the French Government in regard to sugar may bring about, at least for somo years, a complete change in the sugar trade of the country. Instead of being the largest exporter of the refined article, France may tind sufficient work for her refineries in supplying the home demand with produce of which consumption had heretofore been limited by excessive laxation. With an average crop of 400,000 tons of beet sugar, an cunual receipt of 100,000 tons from her own colonies, and about 150,000 tons of foreign importation, Frunce did not consume one fourth of the quantity required by lingland every year. 'the duly on lame, colonial or foreign sugars was equivalent to 125 per cent. of the value, and while tho exportation amounted to 400,000 tons, the consumption of the country was not over 260,000 tons.

Early in June, the French Minister of Pinance submitted to the Government a bill for reducing the sugar cluty from about 70 finnes, its present average rate, to 40 francs per 100 kilos, equivalent to a reduction of 30 frucs per 100 kilos, or 12 shil. lings per cwt. Inglish, to take cflect on and after October tist next. The high rates of duty now chargeable are the out come of the FirmcoGerman war: they were originally imposed in December, 1871, and, with sundry slight alterations, have continued up to the present time.

The dillerence of the fiscal policy to England and liance and its results have never been illustrated with so much eviclence as in the present case. In England under a duty of 15 s . per cwt. successively reduced to 5 s. , and entirely taken oft in 1873, consumption has contimually inereased. In 1844 it amounted to 210 , 000 tons ; in 1850 it had increased onethird ; in 1800 it had doubled; in 1863 it reached 490,000 tons : in $1572,611,000$ tons ; and in 1876, sugar being a free article, the consumption was over 900,000 tons. In Franco, consumption, under a liboral tariff, from 188,000 tons, advanced to 270,000, But the high duties were in -
troduced; they put a stop to the increase of consumption, which has since declined to 250,000 tons a year. The reduction of the duties will bring about a similar increase in the demand to that taken place in England. The advantage to consumers who use sugar only in its refined form will be very great, as they now pay 20 cents per pound at retail, and vast will be the demand should the selling price fall to 12 c per lb. A larger quantity of the beet root sugar, if not the whole protuction, will have to be retained for home consumption, to the abridgment of the surplus that would otherwise be available for shipment to foreign ports.
The consumption of sugar is so unequally distributed, that it is yet for some countries quite an article of luxury. The forlowing table, based upon the customs returns, and exhibiting the consun plion per head in the most important conntries in $187 S$, may be of some interest to our readers:

## INDUSIRIAL INSURANCE.

The scheme propounded by the Rev. W. Lewey Blackley for establishing a system of compulsory National Instarance has been by many considered as visionary, but has of late attracted more attention from the fact that it bas been to some extent countenanced by the Earl of Carnarvon, astatesman who is highly respected for his philanthropy and prudence. Mr. Blackley himself describes the reception generally accorded to his scheme by stating that it was pronomeed "visionary, "Utopian, extravagant, fanciful, eontrary " to the spirit of Enclish legislation, to the "dicta of political economy, to the free"dom of the race, to the logic of facts, "to the possibilities of execution." The manner in which Lord Carmarvon's introduction of the subject to the House of Lords was received has given Mr. Blackley great oncoumgement, and he was likewise much gratified by an expression of opinion from Lord Derby to the following effect: "I remember that thirty: ycars ngo "the idea of compulsory education " would have seemed quite as imprac,
"ticable as that of compulsory insur"ance." On this Mr. Blackioy remarks: "The speaker in his utterance "went further in support of my propesal " than I had veniured to hope any lead"ing statesman would have felt himself " warmated in doing, at least or the next "foul or five years. They put the seal " more or less to the record of my own "experience, which shows that as at intet " the principle of the measure I proposed " was plain, but its practicability obscure, " now its practicability grows clear in "proportion as public opinion becomes " enlightened, and the question of practi"cability is really changing into a question "of time." Mr. Blackley has written more than one article in defence of his scheme of compulsory insurance, but he is very generally looked upon as an enthusiast, and his proposal is in substance, to use the language of one of his critics, "to " throw the support of the improvident "and the ne'er-do-weh on the well-to-
"do aml the industrious, just as does the "poor law." We have been led to notice the subject from the perusal ot an interesting paper contributed to the Ninc. teenth Centary by Mr. H. Seymour 'Tremenhere, who has acted on several Imperial Commissions and who is a high authority on the subject. Mir. Tremenhere, it may be observed, is by no means favorable to Mr. Blackley's views. He commences his paper by admitting that "the earnestness of conviction and the "warmth of heart with which Mr. Blackley "advocated his scheme of National Insurn "ance led him to extreme proposals which "have been severely criticised." It appears that an association has been formed in England, not as Mr. 'Tremenhere points out for the furtherance of the scheme propounded by Mr. Blackley, but "to "disseminate information and create "opinion in favour of some such measure." It is evident from the names attached to a memorial presented a few years ago to the commissioners on Griendly Societies, that the subject is engrging the atiention of many of the most enlightened men in England. Among the names attached to that memorial were those of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, 6 Bishops, 17 lay peers, including Lords Shaltesbury, Titchfield, Eversley; Lyttleton and Ebury, 35 MID's healed by Mr. Gathome Hardy, and Mr. Cowper 'lemple, and many others. The memorialists recommendel that, 1st. The system of Government Life Insurance througis the post oflice; end. The system of deferred ammities; 3rd. The instamace of "small endowments, that is to say sums to be paid at a certain time," should be so
extended as to bring those benchits within the reach of the humbler chasses, and 4 th, that the Government should undertake thir lusiness of payment in sickness. The memorial to which wo have referred was leseribed by the commissioners as having emanated from persons who had given" a great deal of time and thought to the subject of Friendly Societies." Of the recommendation that we have noticed, the commissioners expressed their concurrence in the first three, and of these the first two have been carried into elleet, the third remains still to be dealt wilh, and it is Mr. Tremenhere's opinion that it should receive the early attention of the Govemment. On the the point, the commissioners wore of opinion that " it is not desirable that " tho State should, under present circum"stances at all events, undertake what is "called siek pay business." Mr. 'Themenhere dissents from the conclusion arrived at by the commissioners, and is of opinion that the provision which atthorizes the occupier of a factory or workshop, to derluct from the wages of a child a sum not exceeding one-twelfth of his wages from the period of his entering service at the age of 10 up to 13 or 14 for the cost of his education, might well be extended from the age of 14 to the time when he comes to the age of 21 , such deductions to be lodged in the nearest post office to tho credit of each contributor. Mr. Tremenhere would apply his scheme to the classes comprised within the definitions of the " Factory and Workshop Act," but he admits that olher classes, and especially mining and canal populations, might the incluted. Out chief object in noticing the subject has been to disabuse the minds of those who have believed that the selhemes of Euglish philanh have been intented to interfere with the operations of the Joint Stock Insurance Companies or even with the Friendly Societics. Mr. Tremenhere, at all events holds the opinion that the scheme which he recommends, which differs in some points from that of Mr. Blackley, would be beneficial to the Friend: ly Societies. Mr. Blackley's great object is to find ways and means for doing away in time with the poor rates, and relieving them of a portion of the charge as soon as possible. A society has been formed, entitled The National Providence League, " for promoting mational compulsory insurance against destitution in sickness, inflemity, and old age." The details of the scheme are still open to discussion, but the principle of compulsory contributions is now very generally assented to. Whe subject is of great interest, and al-
though we are by no means satisfied that the introduction ot any soheme of the kind would be desirable in Canada, we have no doutt that there is nothing in the English proposals that ought to exoite opposition on the part of Sife Insurance Companies, as their operations would not be in the least interfered with,

## SIR JOIIN A. MACDONALD AND TEE FREE TIRADERS.

Fall reports of the interview between the Manchester Free Traders and Sir John $A$. Macdonald, who was accompanied by Sir A. 'I. Galt and Hon. Mr. Pope, have come to hancl. There does not seem to have been any display of irritation either on one side or the other. The first subject discussed was the postage on sample parcels, and Sir John professed his readiness to meet if possible the views of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce on this point, and when that was disposed of the tariff cliscussion commenced. The following was the concluding question and answer.

Mr. Agsew-As I understand, your high tarift is imposed more on account of reve. nue than for the purpose of protecting your industries.

Sir John Macdonado-That is so. We were obliged to raise the taviff to meet our obligations, pay our debts, and deve. lop our country, without direct reference to the question of protection, but, as I have already stated, we have deliberately adopted the principle of incidental protection.

The deputation thanked Sir John for the interview, and then retired.

This is substantially what we have repeatedly stated regarding the tariff; and we have pointed out that the avowed policy of the Free Trade party in Canarla is that of incidental protection, or in other words the levying of duties on goods of the same description as those manufac. tured in the country without imposing countervailing duties on the latter.

We notice that Sir John Nacdonald fell into rather a strange mistake, if he has been correctly reported, in stating that "the United States had had possession " of the markets as far as woollens, tweeds " and other articles which we wore manu. "facturing" were concerned. The contrary was the real state of the case. The United States sent few woollen goods to Canada, and the great complaint ot our manufacturers was on account of the competition to which they were exposed by the introcluction of English low-priced goou's, popularly known as Shoddy. Manchester is chiefly interested in cotton manufactures, and the chairman of the delegation, Mr. Armitage, M.P., is in that trade. Mr. Armitage said that the duties on cotton goods for domestic use were 30
per cent., and we must assume that he is right, but he ann scacely be right in his further remarle that they were"in very few instances uss than 25 per cent." The actual duties on cottons are less than 22 per cent., taking the actual values and duties received. Adopting the same rule as to woollens the duties will be found to be over 27 per cent., or rather more than $\overline{2}$ per cent. in excess of cottons. The inferonce that we draw from the practical effect of the tarift is that low-priced woollens are imported notwithstancling the taviff, but that the importation of low priced cottons such as would have to pay 30 per cent. has been serionsly inter. fered with. These are the two leading descriptions of our imported goods.

Sir Tohn's cheval de bataille was the American combination to sell goods cheap in Canada, and he dwelt lepeatedly on the "rings" and "corners." He pointed out the difliculty of rasing a revenue by divect taxation owing to the Provinces and Municipalities being specially authorized to raise their revenues in that way. Sir John's supporters in Canmin will be ather surprised to leam what, after all that has been said and written in Canada, the N.P. is " essentially a revonue tariff." He added, hewever, " while the tariff" which "wo adopted is a revenue tariff in sub"stance, and for the purpose of enabling "us to meet our obligations, it was thought " wisely or unwisely, that it could be so " adjusted as to assist the infint manu"facturer's of Canadr, and, as regards the "farmers, to prevent tho great occasional "local disturbance in values of agricul"tumal products in Canada by the inter" jection at particular points for particular "purposes of the great American capital" ists who form 'rings' and 'corners' "of all kinds for the purpose of the "disturbance of the trade of their "people."

We think that Sir John Macdonald takes a very erroneous view of the state of public opinion in the United States when he describes it as favorable to reciprocity. We feel assured that we are correct when we assert that three formths of the people and of their representatives care nothing about the tracle relations with Canada, and that the great majority of the other fourth are opposed altogether to any reciprocity except Commercial Union as a mere prelude to annexation. Those favorable to any feasible measure of reciprocity are a mere fraction in the Jarge commercial cities.

## TRANSHIPMENT AT KINGSTON.

The St. Catharines Journal has recently been complaining of delay in the tranship.
ment of grain at Kingston, Ont., in articles which reflected upon Kingston forwarders, and Montreal shippers as well. Ilie Joumal could not have obtained its information from a very reliable source, as there are seldom delays at the port of Kingston, at least they have not been frequent this season, and such as have occurred are attributed to causes over which the Kingston forwarders had no control. There have been but two occasions this season when the rush was great ; once when almost the whole traflic between Kingston and Montreal was stopped for several days by the break in the Inchine canal, and again quite recently, at the commencement of an inmense movement of grain for Europe, the owners and consignees evidently wishing to ship it with all possible haste to the foreign markets, to avoid deterioration in value by coming in open competition with the European crops. But after all there could not be said to have been a blockade, 'The Jownal suggests a remedy in the erection of a large stationary elevator, but this was tried several years ago and proved a failure. It passed from Mr. Edward Berly into the hancls of two ol three forwarding companies in succession, but was never found to be a paying institution, and for six years it lay idle, and depreciated in value from 57,000 to $\$ 6$, 000 , for which sum it was finally sold by the Merchants' Bank, and a few days later it was burned. It bas also been stated that the barge accommodation of the forwarding companies should be increased by at least $1,000,000$ bush., and that the St. Lawrence canals should be deepened and enlarged so as to permit of the largest craft sailing down Lake Ontario when the new Welland canal is opened to continue their journey, if necessary, to this city and discharge into the ocean-going vessels. The Kingston Whig says the grievances complained of are more imaginary than real, and replies to the latter suggestions as follows:-

As regards the barge accommodation, it is certainly equal to the demands of the trade. The amount of grain transhipped here annually is between 12,000 ,* 000 and $14,000,000$ bushels. The Mon' Ireal 'ransportation Company has capacity for 700,000 ; the Kingston and Montreal Company 300,000 bushels, and the St. Lawrence and Chicago Company about 400,000 businels, a total of $1,400,000$ bushels. 'The barges make an average of fourteen trips per season, so that it they be kept in active service, and suffer no detention of an unreasonable character, they can annually carry to Montreal 19,600,000 bushels, or $5,600,000$ bushels more than have entered the port during the most prosperous year. When such is the case, how absurd and unprofitable it would be to add capacity for another 1,000,000
bushels. It should be understood that despatch is one of the chiel' features of the transhipping business here, and that the monotonous hum of the elevators (the best in the country) will convince interestel persons that there is no disposition to tarry so long as the business is urgent. Why, one company alone discharged twenty-six vessels in live days, the ageregate quantity of grain handled in that time Leing nearly 500,000 bushels. Quicker despatch could not be expected-even at smart St. Catharines.

## THE REVENUE STATEMENCS.

We have waited patiently for the revenue statements, believing that there could not have been any intentional delay in furnishing them to the public, and although there is a deficiency, notwithstanding the very considerable amount taken from the revenue of 1879 , we are inclined to hope that the tarifl will be found sufficiently productive, provided the expenditure can be kept down to $525,000,000$. It is very diflicult to pronounce any satisfictory opinion on the tarifl until after the publication of the trade and navigation returns, which will not take place for several months, but the anticipations of the Minister of Finance scem on the whole to have been as reliable as could well have been expected under the circumstances. Credit is taken for $\$ 700,000$ collected from customs prior to the new tariff coming into operation, and $\$ 600,000$ from excise. The latter seems a very large estimate on a total revente of $\$ 4,282,000$. The excise revenue for 1879 was $\$ 5,302,763$, and in the estimates of 1879 it was placed at $\$ 5,213$, 400 , of which only $\$ 329,000$ was estimated as collected on account of the years 1879-80. We presume that there must have been a revised estimato during the session of 18S0, as, according to the original estimate made in 1879, excise was $\$ 4,614,000$ with $\$ 358,000$ collected in 1879 , or an aggregate of $\$ 4,972,000$. The deficiency is considerable under this head. The original estimates for customs was $\$ 14,000,000$, with $\$ 500,000$ on account of collections in 1579. The netual receipts were $\$ 14,151,505.64$, to which $\$ 700,000$ appear to have been added, being $\$ 200,000$ beyoud the original estimate. Of course in the case both of customs and excise these estimates are wholly unreliable. It is a matter of secondary importance whether the deficit of 1879 be increased and that of 1880 reduced, but it is of some importance for the Finance Minister to satisfy himself as to the productiveness of the two chief sources of revenue. The minor sources of revenue seem to have produced near about the estimates, which were not materially different from
the revenue of the preceding year. The chief trouble we apprehend before the Finance Minister will be to keep some check on the spending departments of the Government.

## COMDERCE OF MONTREA.

The siatement of imports at the port of Montreal shows a very considerable increase in 1880 over 1878 and 1879 , and there can be no cloubt that the principal cause of this increase is the new tarifr. Under the old tariff, sugar, the commodity which yields the largest revenue, was Iarcely imported from the United Siates, and was entered at Toronto, Hamilton and other Western ports. Under the present tariff the raw sugars are imported direct to Montreal, where they are refinced, and the daty accounts for a late portion of the increase. It is probable that teas are also imported direct in larger quantity than formerly. Another article on which a considemble amount of cluty is obtained at Montreal moder the new tarif is coal, formerly free, Notwith. standing the increase on the sugar duties at the port of Montreal, we apprehend that it will be found that this important source of revenue will yield much less under the new than under the old taiff:

## THE BANK RETURNS.

It would certainly be desirable that the Bank returns should be published earlier. There is no special reason why the Banks in the Maritime Provinces should not furnish their statements as soon as those in Ontario or Quebec. The Bank of Montreal has agencies at ILalifax and St. Jolm, and cannot complete its general retum until it receives the returns from the agencies. It might be desirable that the names of the banks which are remiss in furnishing their statements should be published. The default of one bank leads to delay in publication, and if we are not mistaken, the Banks with the largest number of agencies, some at a great distance, are more regular in sending in their monthiy statements than those of less importance. The Dominion note returns for 31st July are published in the Gazelle of the 21st. There is an increase in the circulation of about $\$ 120,000 \mathrm{in} 1 \mathrm{~s}$ and 2 s , and $\$ 107,000$ in 500 and 1,000 notes.

## SPURIOUS STATISTICS.

The proverb asserting that "figures never lie" cannot be accepted without a distinction. True figures recently and honestly collected are reliable; but figures gathered at hap-hazard in old publica. tions, worked together to establish an already planned and preconcerted couclu-
sion, do decidedly lie. To show the unreliability of statistics too often paraded in the daily press, and which, owing to long atray and lengtly coltums of figures, impress the realer with a feeling of confidence in their worth, we take as an example a cut from the Chicago Inter-ocean, reproduced in the IIontreal Gitactte of the $25 \mathrm{th}_{1}$ instant, on the subject of "The Grainproducing Countries of Europe compared with America." The articlo pretends to give the population of the comatries, and the total cercal production of each. As the statisties of population and production are both erroneous, opposite to each statement we shall place the correct figure obtained from ollicial sources, and let the reader draw his conclusion:

showing a difference between the population accorcling to the Iuter-onean and the Gazelte and the ascertained population through the latest census, of $19,113,353$ inhabitants.

The second colum of the article quoted gives the total cereal production of the countries, taken at random, or, perhaps, in the years of deficit, so as to compare as unfluorably as possible with the American crop, taken at its highest figure in 1879, and amounting to $2,434,573,000$ bushels. In the issue of the Joursil of Commerem of the 30th of July it was stated that the average anmual cereal production of the United States for the last twelve years amounted to 1,S33,000,000 bushels, and that, according to an official French document, the mean average of production in the seventeen European grain-growing countries was $5,220,000,000$ bushels. We may oppose these ligures of the ofticial statisties to the figures exhibited in the article under review:

After having redued by $601,573,000$ bushels the American preduotion to its mean annual average, we find yet an excess of $178,615,179$ bushels in the production of Europe and Ameriea over the figures given in the Gazclle. So much for concocted statistics.

Manufactusems of woollen geods should be interested in the following extract from at German paper, in reference to comphants that the colors are not so durable as fomerly. 'lhis, says Dess Deutsede Hollingeacror, is princ:ipatly due to imperfect wasbing. Whw all the grease has not been removed from the hatr, the dye naturally natheres to $i t$, and camnot sufticiently penetrate the substance of the fibre; when, therefore, such wool is milled, it will lose through the retion of the sotp the greater part of this grease, and also with the latter the dye taken up by it, making the colh look dather. It will not atherwards give off ang more color but will not have the same brightuess as before the milling. Where the cloth is mot much milled, it will with this extrat colling of tat lose much color and went by contitet, and lio djer be blamed for bad work, when in reality he lass actually been obliged to put more dys on the eloth inna he ofl iwise woulh. this refers principally to black, dark blac, and brown. Whincipally to black, dark blac, and brown. it often linpleas that this has not been well washed out in tepid! water ; as a conseduence the wool is covered by a thin censt of silicate of soda, which has ath the mitantoges connected with ingerthet washing, and even in a higher degree than where the woul has been wathed by the ulder methot. Where the wool has bien" well washed on the back of the animat, is still happens that it sweats more or less during the next four to six weeks if stored; if, ther, it is wasbed afterwards, the grease will come well off. If, however, the wool atter being clipped is not allowed any time for sweating, but is at unce sent to the wash, it will sweatabillemferwards, and in this way also creato the evil mentioned above. This grease when left it will to a certain extent be decompozed later on by contact with the atmospheric itir, anm in this manner also make the dye fugritive, fll of which points to the conchusion that many colurs wonld be faster if the wonl was more thoroughly washed in the first instance. Nor is an extra washing a loss 10 a manufacturer who wants reliable dyeing, for cloih made from such perfectly eleatused wonl will requive less nlkalinat focty eleansed won will require ind wishing, and will give in every respect more satisfictory results.

'Iomaceo.-Remilers who have for some time heen holding onf, and only purchasing what was absolntely necessary, finding the packagesystem thoromplly estuhtished, are now buying freely, and bisiness is consequently brisk, sales aremging from 7 a to 100 per cent. more that last monh. Non. L. F. (r. baby, Minister of Intermal lievenue, this weok vistied the several mathlifactorios with a view to somating the feeling with reference to the package law. Manufacturers express themselves genernlty sntisfied, provided the law be rigidly enforced. There is, however, "difference in the llon. Ninster's reating of the law and that of the manaficturee, which may lead to some litigation. Mt. Baty chaims that the privilege of manafacturing roll and twist from Camdian grown tobaceo umder the 4 per cent. duty is restricted to the grower, leaving to the minutacturer the right (1) purchase leaf for the purpose of cutting only; on this the duty is 14 e per ib. Howerer mach this may liave been the intention of the lats, mannfacturers cham that, as it now reads, there is no such restriction, and it is possible that the matier may be tested in the courts.

Wool.-The home market has continued inactive, unchanged, and uninteresting. No increased activity may be expected until some chathe oecurs in the leading American markets, which are also reported very quict and unsutisfactory. The demmat as well as the offerings of donestic wool here during the week has been limited, and in the nbsence of business prices remain unaltered, quoted at 28 c to 30 c for flecee, at 25 c to 35 c for pulled, nud at abou 30 c to 36 c for supper, as to quatity. In foreign wools there is nothing doing either of a reportable character; Cape sells occasionally in small lots at 10 c to 20 c for ordimery, and real fine washed qualities at ase to $50{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{c}$. Australian is nomimally
quoted at 30 c to sac. A London despatch to. dhy from Melbourne and Sidney states that the wool clip is most promising ; ahthough min is much required, nevertheless there will be an increas ad yield over last yent.
