Dougall thought they need not seuss the action of the Government. and not show such a vote in favor of pro-hibition as would justify the introduction by the Government of a prohibitory measure, and the fact that every province of the Dominion but one, recorded for prohibition a substantial vote and a large majority, there ought to be enacted legislation that would give effect to the strongly expressed will of the people; that while still strongly main-taining the desirability of total national pro-hibition, which must be the continued object of prohibition workers, your committee lehibition, which must be the continued object of prohibition workers, your committed lelleve that at the present time the temperance reform would be materially aided by the enactment of legislation upon the lines bereinafter set out, namely: (1) An act totally prohibiting the importation, sale or warehousing of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes in any province adopting or bringing into force such an act by a vote of the duly qualified electors. (2) Voting upon question of bringing of such legislation into force in any province to be at the time of the holding of a general election, in order to save expense and secure the largest possible vote upon the question. (3) Such legislation when adopted by any province to be unrepealable for a period of time long enough to ensure a fair test of its effectiveness.

It is submitted that the enactment of such legislation is certainly in the power of Parliament, inasmuch as it would be merely a further extension of the principles embodied in the Canada Temperance Act, the constitutionality of which has been affirmed and which act might be so amended as to include the further legislation suggested.

Mr. Moore said he did not propose to re-lieve Parliament of its duties. Parliament had not yet confirmed the Government's decision. Parliament had promised the peo-ple to give effect to the declared wish of the people. Let Parliament decide; when it refused they might step in.


John Miller of Wroxeter Shot Himself With His Own Weapon and Died.

The provisions of the Paris treaty would thus be carried out. The Spanish commission, however, hesitate to enter the Filipino lines, fearing treachery, although Aguinaldo has guaranteed the safety of the commissioners.

The release of the Filipinos held by the Americans might be distinctly advantageous, as they all chim to have been converted to the American cause by the good treatment they have received, and announce themselves to be anxious to influence their friends in favor of the policy of the United States.

Pulpits Most Envied.

The Episcopalians and Presbyterians pay larger salaries than any other denominations, but the pulpits most envied in the United States are those of the Collegiate Reformed Dutch Church of New York city. There are seven or eight churches of that denomination under the same management and supported from an endowment that is exceedingly rich. Its income is next to that of Trinity Church, and amounts to several hundred thousand dollars a year. The pastors of the Collegiate churches are paid \$10,000 for life and are allowed to retire from active pastoral work when they reach the age of 65 years.

Trinity parish is the richest in the world, and has an income of about \$300,000 from buildings and other investments. It supports five or six churches, several schools, hospitals and other investments. It supports five or six churches, several schools, hospitals and other charitable institutions and pays the manager of its business a salary of \$10,000 a year. The rector of Trinity Church receives \$12,500. The same salary is paid by St. Thomas' and St. Bartholomew's. I was informed by good authority that five clergymen in New York City received \$10,000 a year. The average pay of a clergyman in New York City, excepting the pastors of mission churches, is probably \$6000.

Some \$10,000 Editors.

A few physicians in New York make very large fees. There are two or three specialists whose incomes will exceed \$55,000 a year; perhaps ten make \$25,000, and perhaps twenty make from \$15,000 to \$20,000. Ten thousand dollars a year is considered a large practice.

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

Cables Report Business Slow — New York is Quiet.

New York, April '20.—Beeves—Receipts 1058, all consigned for slaughter and export. Nothing doing; feeling steady. Cables slow. American cattle 11½c to 12¼c per pound. Live sheep 12c to 13½c. Lambs 14c to 14½c. Herrigerator beef lower, at 9½c per pound. Exports 145 cattle, and 85 sheep. Calves, receipts 61; market steady; common to prime veals, \$5 to \$6.50. Sheep and lambs, receipts 1113; market firm; prime wooled sheep, \$5.50; no clipped here; medum to prime wooled lambs \$6 to \$6.50; good to prime clipped do., \$5.40 to \$5.60; clipped cults, \$4.50. Hogs, receipts 2772; market firmer at \$4.35 to \$4.40.

Montreal Cattle Market.

Montreal, April 20.—The receipts at the East End Abattofr this morning were 400 head of cattle, 200 calves, 25 sheep, 25 lambs. The demand was somewhat limited, and prices were about the same. Cattle—Choice sold at from 4½c to 5c per pound, good sold at from 4½c to 5c per pound, lower grade from 2½c to 3½c per pound. Calves sold at from \$2 to \$10, according to sizes. Sheep brought from 3½c to 4c per pound, for old. Lambs sold at from 4c to 4½c per pound. Yearling lambs from 4½c to 5c per pound. Hogs brought from \$4.20 to \$4.50. Montreal Cattle Market.

Chicago Cattle Market.

Chicago, Ill., April 20.—The demand for cattle to-day was hardly equal to the supply and the result was a dull trade, at gradually declining prices, sales being largely 10c to 15c lower than at the close last week. Faucy grades brought \$5.60 to \$5.85; choice steers, \$5.25 to \$5.55; medium, \$4.65 to \$4.85; beef steers, \$4 to \$4.60; oss and helfers, \$3.40 to \$4.25; bulls, \$2.60 to \$4.10; Western fed steers, \$4.20 to \$5.30; Texas steers, \$3.70 to \$4.85; caives, \$3.50 to \$5.60. With such small offerings of hogs, buyers were at the mercy of sellers and prices underwent a further advance of flive cents, sales being made at the highest figure since last September. Poor to best grades sold at \$2.75 to \$4.10, the greater part at \$4 to \$4.05. Pigs, \$3.50 to \$8.85. The demand for sheep continued active at ruiling prices, shora lambs, \$5.75 to \$5.87½; spring lambs, \$7 to \$9 per 100 lbs; yearlings, \$4.80 to \$5. and sheep, \$3 to \$5, chiefly \$4.75 to \$4.85. Receipts of cattle 9500, hogs 18,000, sheep 10,000.

Wheat—Trading in our speculative wheat market was on a much smaller scale than yesterday. Liverpool was firmer to-day, closing 1½d higher than yesterday. Northwestern receipts continue small, 209 cars, as against 105 cars a year ago. The bulk of the business transacted was done in July. New York says foreigners are doing but little. Exports have dropped back to very small dimensions lately. Yesterday they only aggregated 181,000 bushels of wheat and flour. There is quite a strong bear element in the deal at present, and but for repeated reports of damage prices would be sold down. Kansas sends out additional reports to-day and Chicago says No. 2 red wheat has been sold to go to Kansas. Minneapolis reports a good cash demand, with 70,000 barrels of flour sold yesterday. News, from the west was very unfavorable, high winds and dry condition and in the Northwest in several places low temperatures and bilzzards. Reports say seeding is being delayed by snow, and that it will not be general until towards the end of the month. The Southwest is likewise builish on its advices. The bulk of the buying to-day was by commission houses and the selling by professionals. The foreign situation is not strong and an estimated loss of say 200,000,000 bushels of wheat will warrant, especially in speculative times, as at present, much higher than 75c for 60 pounds of wheat. Estimated cars for to-morrow 60. The range to-day was between 75c and 76½c, July.

Corn-Only a moderate market in corn, prices ruling fractionally lower. The range to-day was between 75c and 76½c, o00 bushels. Cables were ½d higher. The trade is mostly changing over from May 300 July. This is an irregular and restricted influence. Receipts 433 cars. Cash demand fair. We are friendly to corn on soft spots. Estimated cars to-morrow 185.

Provisions—Ruled quiet, but steady to-day. Trade moderate. Packers sold little pork. Offerings were light, 18,000 hogs. Estimated hogs to-morrow 15,000.
