LYING STORY CONTRADICTED BY WAR SECRETARY BRODRICK

No Orders Were Issued for Boers
More Liberal Attacks on the Government in
—Reinforcements for Kitchener.

London, Feb. 19.—In the House of Commons today Secretary Brodrick gave an official denial of the story that orders had been issued that all Boers captured in khaki uniforms were to be shot.

Colonial Secretary Chamberlain informed the House that a proclamation setting forth the intentions of the Government in the administration of the new South African colonies had already been drafted, but had not been issued, in deference to the opinion of Gen. Kitchener and Sir Alfred Milner, that the time was not yet opportune.

Debate on the Address.
When the debate on the address in reply to the King's speech was resumed, Mr. Herbert Henry Asquith, Liberal, the former Home Secretary, characterized the speech of Mr. Chamberlain yesterday evening as a revival of the "Billingsgate of the general election." He repudiated the suggestion of the two Republics, but he said a settlement would not be accelerated by truculent language, but by the combination of a strong army capable of commanding respect, and terms not derogatory to either the victors or the vanquished.

Leniency a Failure.
War Secretary Brodrick, who followed, declared that the terms offered the Boers were better than ever tendered to a vanquished enemy. Leniency to men on parole had been a disastrous failure. He appealed to the Opposition to stop the delivering of mischievous speeches and the circulation of pamphlets which did an immense amount of harm in South Africa.

In defending the Government against the charge of failing to reinforce Gen. Kitchener, Mr. Brodrick said 20,000 horses had been sent out within three months, and they hoped by the end of March to have increased Gen. Kitchener's mounted force by 20,000 men.

SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS FOR PAST AND COMING SHOWS

Supplementary Estimates Appropriate \$30,000 Each for Paris and Pan-American—New Chairman of Committee Seated—Salaries Discussed in Supply.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—(Special.)—The supplementary estimates were laid on the table today. They cover an additional sum of \$120,000, \$30,000 for Paris-American Exposition, \$30,000 for Ottawa Buildings, \$10,000 to improve logging facilities on St. Maurice River, \$20,000.

Mr. Peter Maclean took his seat as permanent chairman of the committee of the whole for the first time, and the House went into supply half an hour before the speaker left the chair at 6 o'clock.

Salaries of Civil Servants.

Great Northern Railway Men Have Secured an Interest in Montreal Terminal Co.

Montreal, Feb. 19.—There has been a reorganization of the Montreal Terminal Railway Company. Mr. W. Dale Harris and Mr. John McGee of Ottawa; Mr. R. Carstairs, Kingston, and Mr. J. B. Brewster, Montreal, are the new directors. Harris was president and Mr. Brewster vice-president. Their stock was purchased for \$500,000 by Mr. Charles Magee of Ottawa; Mr. Dennis Murphy, Ottawa; Mr. H. H. Melville, Boston, and Col. McNaught of New York city. Mr. Melville, a Boston broker, and Mr. McNaught, a New York lawyer, are among the purchasers. Both gentlemen are interested in the Great Northern Railway. The new officers and board will be Mr. Dennis Murphy, president; Mr. H. H. Melville, vice-president; and Messrs. Charles Magee, Charles Beaumont, C. H. Cattell, J. J. Mulvaney and Col. McNaught, directors.

EVIL OF KEEPING BAD COMPANY.

Young Vincent Latimer, Who Was Arrested in London, Ont., the Chairman of a Hard Character.

London, Ont., Feb. 19.—Vincent Latimer, the youthful burglar, who said he belonged to Toronto, and who was captured the other night after Grocer Dopp's safe was blown, pleaded guilty to two charges of burglary in Kingston, Ontario, and this morning, and was remanded a week for sentence. Latimer's counsel presented several extenuating circumstances in his behalf, and showed that the youth was in no sense a professional burglar, but that he was the victim of a vicious man whom he had met by chance. Letters were produced from Latimer's former employer, showing he had been industrious and trustworthy up to the present. Latimer's companion at the time, who is known to be a hardened criminal, is still at large.

VERY DETERMINED SUICIDE.

Robert W. Connor of St. John, N.B., Fired Five Shots into His Head and Body.

St. John, N.B., Feb. 19.—Robert W. Connor, of this city, agent here for the Consumers' Cordage Company, suicided this morning in a barn attached to his residence on Adelaide street, North End. He fired five shots from a revolver, some at his head and some at his heart. His father was founder of the well-known Connor Rope Walk. A brother is John Connor, Government contractor of Ottawa.

W. W. White Dead at 82.

GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP ONLY CURE FOR RAILWAY EMERGENCIES MENACING CANADA

Parliament Discusses Gravity of Situation Which Threatens to Place the C.P.R. and the G.T.R. Under Control of American Trust.

Motion of Member for East York Receives Support From Leading Conservatives—Minister Blair Thinks State Ownership Means Political Interference—Liberal Majority Called in to Squelch the Topic.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—(Special.)—Government ownership of railways and political interference in the administration of the Government railways were the allied subjects which today held the House in hot debate for over two hours. The Minister of Railways showed that the Government would like to see the discussion framed down; but he quickly got a lash from the independent tail of his own party, and before the last word had been said it was clear enough to the House that the Government could not continue to ignore the serious facts of the transportation problem, which the member for East York had laid bare to the eyes of the country.

On motion to go into supply, Mr. W. F. Maclean brought on the Government railway. He had called attention to this matter last week, his object being to secure a prompt expression of opinion from the country. That he had succeeded in this, the opinion had been expressed. "Today," said Mr. Maclean, "I have at my disposal an expression from the people of Canada that fully vindicates the importance which I attached to this question."

Gravity of the Situation.
Mr. Maclean said the chief object of his motion was to call attention to the gravity of the situation which threatens the great railroads of the country, liable, as they are, at any moment to come under the control of the great American trusts. He went on to sketch the influence of the power of Messrs. Morgan, Rockefeller, Vanderbilt, Harriman and others. They also looked to controlling the ship building of the United States.

"To show how easy it would be for these powerful trusts to get control of the Canadian railroads, Mr. Maclean read the interview with Mr. T. G. Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, by a Montreal paper. The two Canadian roads are even now making American cliffs their own ports. It would not be necessary for the American financiers to buy the Canadian railroads. They could secure in their own right by leasing them to the Canadian Government. The Montreal Witness, The Toronto Globe, The St. John Gazette, The London Advertiser, The London News, all declaring that the situation was one which must be faced. He quoted the letter of the Minister of Public Works to the Montreal Board of Trade, calling attention to the cheapening of American railway rates, and also read the testimony of the Winnipeg Free Press and The St. John Telegraph. Mr. Maclean read a letter which had been received from a life-long reformer expressing pleasure at the stand taken for the cause of Government ownership of railways, and expressing the opinion that it would be difficult to limit the another way of keeping the Canadian roads free from the influence of the gigantic American railway trust.

A Suggestion Offered.
Mr. Maclean said he felt called upon to offer a suggestion for remedying the evils which he had called attention to. "This," he said, "is the radical suggestion which I would offer. There is no other cure for the evils than Government ownership. Perhaps I will be told that Government ownership will involve a very large financial proposition. I said the other day that \$50,000,000 would secure the stock of the C.P.R., but I was then rather wide of the mark, and have since found out that less than \$20,000,000 only would have to be brought out on an option that \$20,000,000 would secure control of the shares of the G.T.R. That is a very simple proposition. I say all that is necessary is that the Government of Canada, which now controls the international system, can lease the Grand Trunk Railway and the C.P.R. for \$1 a year each, and can get the lease for a term of 999 years. But Canada, if she would have to do something else, viz., assume the liability of these roads. MR. MACKENZIE AS PRESIDENT D. D. MANN AS VICE-PRESIDENT

That is the Program Said to Be Mapped Out for the Canadian Northern Railroad—Mr. Hugh Sutherland Says Mr. Roblin's Bargain is a Good One for the Province.

Montreal, Feb. 19.—(Special.)—It is quite well understood that Mr. William Mackenzie and D. D. Mann, who have been chosen president and vice-president of the Canadian Northern as soon as the thousand miles are completed in October next, uniting Lake Superior with the River Saskatchewan. Mr. Dan Mann will at the same time be made vice-president of the road, and when this change is brought about these two gentlemen's contracting days will be over.

Mr. Hugh Sutherland of the Canadian Northern, who left this evening for Winnipeg, said that the papers had been publishing a statement to the effect that the Northern Pacific Railway had worked their Manitoba lines at an annual loss of \$100,000. He said in reply to this that the Northern Pacific's method of bookkeeping might be open to criticism, but he could state that the gross receipts last year were \$400,000, and if the C.P.R.'s rate of working expenses in Manitoba, of 45 per cent, were applied there will be quite a handsome surplus.

"Never," he added, "will the province of Manitoba be called upon to pay a dollar in connection with the deal, which is a most favorable one for the province, and I believe it will meet with an almost unanimous approval at the hands of the representatives in the Legislature."

"Are Mr. Roblin's supporters solid on the question?" he was asked.

"Yes, the Government supporters are unanimous in support of the measure. I hear, however, that our friends the enemy declare they are going to smash the Government."

"Do you believe they are able to do this?"

"Certainly not," quickly replied Mr. Sutherland. "The only way they can defeat the Government would be to buy out the members, and they are a splendid body of independent men, such a proposition is too ridiculous to be thought of. I hear that Mr. Shaughnessy is going up to Winnipeg, and Mr. Mann will also be there till the question is definitely settled."

A CUDAHY KIDNAPPER CAUGHT—IDENTIFIED BY THREE PERSONS

The Lad Who Was Carried Off Says He is the Man Who Abducted Him, and That There is No Doubt About It—Prisoner's Name is James Callahan.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—The police have under arrest James Callahan, charged with complicity in the abduction of Edward Cudahy, Jr., on the night of Dec. 18. Callahan was arrested last Saturday, but the police have kept him a secret until today, in the hope of securing other arrests. Young Cudahy has positively identified him as the man who abducted him near the Cudahy residence and represented himself to be a sheriff from an adjoining county, and that during the time which it is claimed he spent guarding young Cudahy, he was at the home of his sister, a Mrs. Kelly, living at Poppleton-avenue and 53rd-street, which is a short distance from the Melrose Hill house.

Mrs. Kelly tonight was asked concerning the whereabouts of Callahan at the time of the abduction, and said the day following the deed he was at her home, but acknowledges that she does not know his whereabouts since that night.

She said that a servant in the employ of J. N. Patrick, of whom the kidnapers rented a house, was the third person to identify Callahan, and says he is the man who paid a month's rent in advance for a cottage in Hazy Hollow, which the abduction was abandoned two weeks before the abduction, fearing discovery.

Callahan was arrested by Patrolmen Dewberry and Dwyer, both of whom are old acquaintances of the prisoner, one of them having gone to school with him. They also knew that he was a close friend of "Pat" Crowe, for whom a large reward has been offered, as leader in the kidnaping.

Callahan denies absolutely that he had anything to do with the kidnaping, but admits he was a close friend of Crowe. He says he can prove an alibi, and states that during the time which it is claimed he spent guarding young Cudahy, he was at the home of his sister, a Mrs. Kelly, living at Poppleton-avenue and 53rd-street, which is a short distance from the Melrose Hill house.

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U. S. WILL NOT FIGHT

The newly married couple received over 900 presents. King Edward, Queen Alexandra, the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York and the Duke and Duchess of Connaught being among the royal guests.

DEWET STILL MOVING NORTH

Lord Kitchener is Prepared for a Bushing-Back Move.

London, Feb. 19.—Lord Kitchener, commander-in-chief of the British in South Africa, telegraphing from Pretoria to the War Office, under date of Feb. 18, says: "Dewet is reported still moving north and is now west of Hopetown. He will probably double back to the southwest. The troops are prepared for him. A train was despatched between Vereeniging and Johannesburg this morning, but the Boers were driven off before they secured much."

OFFICERS OF HIGH RANK TO GO TO S. A.

London, Feb. 19.—The Daily Chronicle says it understands that several officers of high rank from India are going to South Africa, and that Lord Dundonald, Gen. Clarke and Gen. Buller are also going out again.

According to the same authority, it has been practically decided, in connection with the scheme of army reform, to increase the force by 150,000 men, to secure whom it is proposed to reform the pay of the soldiers.

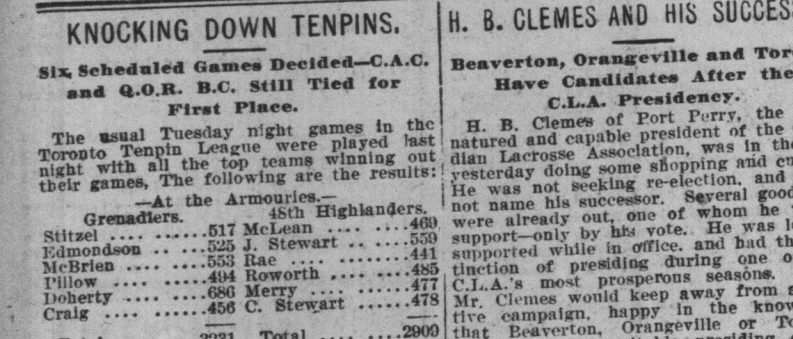

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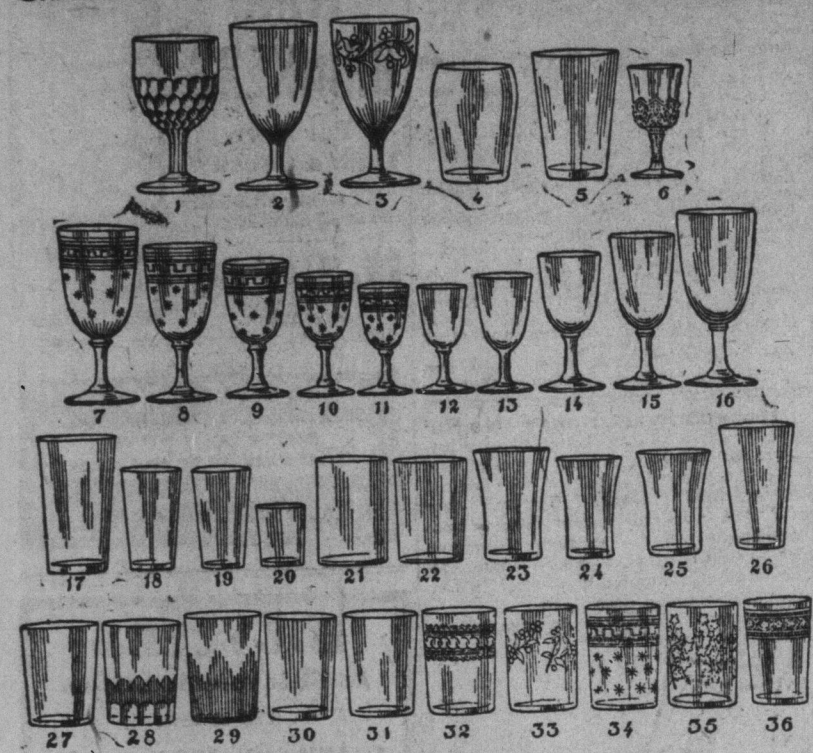

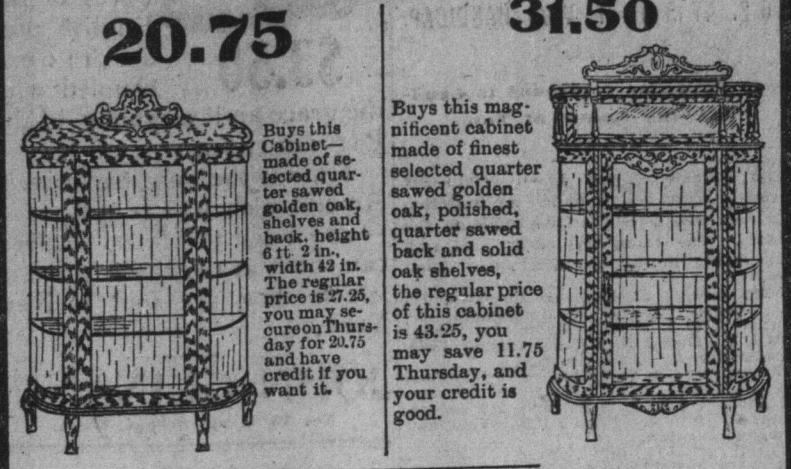
