GREATER CABLES IMPERIAL NEED

Freer Communication Between Mother Land and Colonies an Urgent Reform, Says Earl Crewe.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) LONDON, June 7.—At the Imperial Press Conference which is taking place at the foreign office, Earl Crewe took the chair. In his opinion the empire would not be completely united until the time comes when the western provinces of Canada, say, are in a position to learn and understand what are the problems facing the India Government. The original in Australia was in the position, if he cared to, to learn all about the development of our great protectorate states.

It was extremely difficult now for every speech to be reported all over the empire. Only last week his office suffered from a difficulty of this kind. Col. Seely made a statement in the house. There was nothing in the speech to cause uneasiness, but the form in which the speech was cabled to South Africa caused very real uneasiness.

Towards the question of cable development the attitude of the government is of a thoroughly sympathetic character, and we shall look forward to your business discussions in the hope to find a solution of the question," said Earl Crewe. The great development of wireless telegraphy they must also bear in mind.

What the empire needed above all other things was easy communication between the mother country and the dominions over the seas. Intercommunication between the dominions was every bit as important.

Referring to the accuracy in cabling reports of speeches, Lord Crewe said it was very important when reporting speeches of ministers, which almost entirely consisted of quotations; it took almost immense genius not to avoid being misleading in sending reports of this kind by cable, and when there was added to this the other fact that the man at the end of the wire might represent someone with purposes on one side or other, which may be used to garble the message, it stood to reason that anything like perfect accuracy was exceedingly hard to obtain.

They were constantly receiving suggestions in regard to wireless development, the latest of which was a motion to Western Pacific, Sir Sandford Fleming of Ottawa, and Henniker Heaton. Lord Crewe referred to as the two evangelists of intercommunication.

Stanley Reed of India moved the following resolution: "That this conference regards it as of paramount importance that telegraphic facilities with the various dominions be improved by cable, and when improved, so as to ensure fuller intercommunication than exists at present, and appoints a committee to report to the conference at its recess on or before June 25, as to the best means to attain this object, the committee to consist of Messrs. Thomas Ward, Templeley, Fowler & Coker, Sir Robert Nelson, Phillipson, Stowingswell, Crompton and Hoyer."

DROOKES FARM UP YONGE ST. IS SOLD

Barrister W. M. Boulton Gets 150 Acres for \$30,000—Rosedale Golf Club Acquires 160 Acres in Don Valley.

The Brooke's farm, six miles up Yonge-street, lot 9, in concession 1, east of Yonge, and the one immediately south of York Mills hotel, has been sold by the estate to W. M. Boulton, barrister, for about \$30,000 for 150 acres. The rear 50 acres are still held by the family, who have owned this 200 acres for many years.

A mile of the Don valley runs thru the property and has been the scene of landscape artists for many a day. The sale of John Muirhead's 42 acres in the second concession, east of Yonge-street, to the Rosedale Golf Club, to Jos. Kilgour was completed yesterday.

The North Toronto Golf Club has rented land for a great many years and adjacent properties for links on the west side of Yonge-street and in rear of the Ansley residence. Men are at work laying out the grounds and holes and tennis courts.

Property Going Fast. "I have had property in North Toronto for sale for a great many years, but I sold more of it during the last twenty-five days than during all the previous twenty-five years."

These spoke Nicholas Garland, of the New York Tailoring establishment yesterday, when discussing with The Toronto Globe the real estate market in the north end of the city, which is being bought up by investors at the present time.

Things must be stirring up there. I have received four cash offers this morning by telephone for a piece of property. Quite a few lots which I sold recently have been bought over by purchasers at good profits. One young lady who purchased a hundred feet on Glen Grove last fall at \$12 per foot, was offered \$200 for it yesterday, but she refused the offer. Sales are being put thru there fast now at an average of \$200 per foot.

Let there be no holding back or delay in pushing on the hydro-electric power scheme. It is the greatest undertaking that this great province of Ontario ever had in hand. Ratepayers Roll Up Hands—Majority of 613 for the Government's Project; Reject Other by 170 Votes.

HAMILTON, June 7.—(Special.)—The Whitney-Beech power project and municipal ownership scored another notable victory to-day when the ratepayers voted down the Cataract Co. by-law by a majority of 170 and passed the hydro-electric bylaw by the handsome majority of 613.

The result is a tribute to the public spirit of the voters, who, despite the very determined campaign of the local papers—save perhaps The Herald, which a few days ago seemed to repent of its first defection from the government project—resisted the frenzied appeals to "put Hamilton first" and throw down the project of the united municipalities of Western Ontario, which Hamilton first endorsed in the municipal voting of January, 1908.

The victory to-day was the more notable because the company had a complete organization, and all kinds of tricks were used to help the company out. The Cataract contract that the people voted upon to-day was much better than the one railroad thru the council last July, and which was set aside by the voters.

What They Voted On. Only fresh riders and tenants with long leases were allowed to vote. Two bylaws were submitted on the question, one asking the ratepayers if they approved of a contract with the Cataract Power Company, and if they were in favor of entering into a contract with the hydro-electric company.

THE DEFENCE OF THE EMPIRE.

The new movement in England as disclosed by the Lloyd-George budget is to increase the taxation of the rich. The defence of the empire which calls for enormously increasing estimates must come more and more on the rich man and the big interests. The poor man is now taxed to the limit and he is saying more and more that his stake in the country is little and therefore his contribution should be accordingly.

UNIMPROVED REAL ESTATE SHOULD BE TAXED TO THE FULL.

Toronto should spread out, but not to any extent more than necessary. It does not look right for people to be building near the limits of the city when there is still a lot of vacant land nearer the centre. When this takes place the city is unnecessarily spread out, more streets have to be built, people have to travel more, and fire, police and other protection comes higher. Water mains, too, cost a lot. Taxation should be so apportioned that an owner must sell or improve his land; he has no right to increase the area of the city at the cost of the city, and to wait for his land to appreciate in value without any effort on his part. He does two unfair things: he broadens the area, when it is unnecessary and he secures an increment on the value of his land which he does not create.

STATE-OWNED ALL-RED CABLES.

Appropriately enough the first topic brought before the Imperial Press Conference was that covering the improvement of the cable service among the British states and dependencies. In nothing has the strength of imperial sentiment been more elicited and aided than in the keen interest evoked by the rapid dissemination of news affecting the mother country and the dominions generally. The attention with which important political and other movements are watched all over the empire, the growth of knowledge regarding them and recognition of the reciprocal influence they exert are not merely valuable educationally, but directly deepen the impression of solidarity without which closer union would be impossible. But for this purpose communication must be both easy and cheap, and, furthermore, accurate.

WHY DR. CHOWN DIDN'T MAKE APPEAL TO KING

Learned That Archbishop of Canterbury Had Not Succeeded in Putting Ban on Racing

PEMBROKE, Ont., June 7.—(Special)—In an address before the Montreal Methodist Conference this afternoon, the governor-general was criticized for patronizing the Woodbine races, and betting generally came in for condemnation from Rev. Dr. Chown, secretary of the department of temperance and moral reform.

Abolition of the Casino. Dr. Chown was optimistic in his sentiment in Canada, and to the prohibition of liquor from military camps. The militia council had been called and that sentiment was such that the church people might prevent their going to camp.

Needs an Assistant. The need of an assistant secretary in the department and the conditions in the slums of Toronto were among the other matters dealt with.

Temperance Reforms. In the evening the Board of the temperance committee was received. It said: "We recommend that inasmuch as the laws of the provinces already give power to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors, this conference memorialize the Dominion Government to amend the laws to give the provinces authority to prohibit the manufacture and importation of intoxicating liquors."

Anglicans Reluctant. The new features of the report of the committee were embraced in the negotiations with the Bishop of Quebec, representing the general synod of the Church of England, in which the resolution of the Lambeth conference is quoted, demanding that any basis of union "respect the convictions of those who had not received Episcopal orders without involving any surrender on our part of the principle of the Ordinal as attached to the Book of Common Prayer."

Disciples of Christ. The convention of the Disciples of Christ, the greatest of the sects, closed yesterday morning. It was decided to send a delegate to the Sunday school convention at West Toronto on October 1st.

Want to be Naturalized. VANCOUVER, B.C., June 7.—(Special)—The greatest number of applications for naturalization in Vancouver rolled in upon Judge Grant today. They number over 350. Practically all came from the German and Italian colonies.

The Westminster Confession. Much in The Westminster Confession was antiquated and things were erroneous. There was more religion and less philosophy in the new articles.

Principal Patrick pointed out the advantage of a united church in dealing with the questions of morals. He said, "I am not ashamed," he said, "to say in regard to the Roman Catholic Church that we ought to meet the united church with an energy and that great church with a vigilance and energy as unrelenting."

Quotations Not Respected. Rev. Dr. Duval seconded the motion. He was confident that the spirit of John Calvin would support union. The selfishness of the Roman Church and the contrast with the sixties and seventies, which Protestants were at.

Dr. MacKay's speech was subsequently treated as the greatest piece of special pleading he ever heard in the assembly, setting up mere men of straw against the living and putting of words in men's mouths.

Dr. MacKay declared that there was nothing in the Westminster Confession which would be against union. He quoted Lindsay and Denney and others, and Principal Forrester, who had been quoted by Dr. Patrick, as saying that they were now in the united church.

Dr. MacKay's words were points were that in three years, with the trend of modern exegesis, not a single man would vote for union. Foreigners came here to work and to live, and they were not to be excluded from the church.


