# The Home of the World

## RELIY FOUND BY POLICE AT HOTEL DIEZ HOSPITAL

### Finally Run Down and a Guard Placed Over Him All Night—Shibley Still a Disappearance—Interest in Bogus Ballot Box Case Does Not Die.

Kingston, Nov. 22.—(Staff Special.)—An unsuccessful search was made today by Dominion Detective Chamberlain in Frontenac at the residence of Francis J. Reilly, teacher at Regiopolis College, and only succeeded in finding him in Hotel Diez Hospital at midnight to-night. The flight of Shibley has created a sensation quite as remarkable as his arrest if such could have been accomplished, for it emphasizes the probability of the prosecution being able to prove that case and show that there was a thoroughly conceived plan to rob the voters of their franchise.

If the story related by the officers in the witness box at Belleville on Friday was untrue, Shibley would assuredly have remained on the streets, and the stigma that attaches to him. This afternoon Inspector Chamberlain drove to Harrowsville, the home of Shibley, with a warrant for his arrest. The officer was accompanied by Albert Greer of the Ottawa government secret service, who has just been sent from Toronto to cooperate with Dominion officials. At the home of Shibley it was learned that he had gone, none knew where, nor was any trace of him to be seen. He would return, Shibley's stake in the community is small, and therefore his flight was not so serious as that of Byron O. Lott, who is reputed to be worth \$25,000.

### Why They Skipped.

The word called at Francis Reilly's home this afternoon. His name was visible to where he is. The Chief of Police Baillie had a warrant for his arrest on Sunday night, and a college professor and election worker did not leave the city till Monday night, and the matter was not taken up by the officers while Reilly was visible about the streets cannot be explained, as the chief of police is not a man who is given to guessing. Some attempt to account for it by the fact that Reilly has been a powerful worker in the party ranks in Kingston and the county, and by the statement in his confession that he could only clear himself by implicating other party workers. In order that the party might pass off successfully, that Reilly should fade away gracefully, and no obstacle was placed in his way.

### So He Went to Hospital.

Mr. Reilly is a popular graduate of Queen's and has been a member of Regiopolis College about two years. He is about 36 or 37 years of age, and had been a moving spirit in the college. The Conservatives are looking up evidence to the extent of at least a dozen ballot boxes were used in Frontenac County. They believe that there were methods at least in Kingston, and returning officers operated the device to the disadvantage of their candidate. Every day, and they come to the conclusion by an analysis of the vote. Frontenac has never been a Conservative, and the majority always has been substantial. This time it was pulled down to 22. In several polling divisions there were surprises, but as Mr. Avery had won beyond chance of success, the Conservatives were very well satisfied. Now it may be to trace the fraud.

### Shibley Got 2000.

Some of the polling divisions where the Conservatives believe the bogus boxes were used were in the town of Vermy, where Reilly's brother was the deputy returning officer, and Bradshaw, a schoolhouse. These boxes were entirely upset the calculations of the Conservative workers. It seems that Mr. Shibley was one of the few who thought he could win. He got a letter from the central organization, but he would have to shift for himself, as he had no chance and the funds were used for close night work. He replied that he would win sure, and he must have convinced some one, as related to the campaign fund, about \$3000, to see him. He made a bet of \$10 with Hon. William Hartly on his own election, so confident was he. Shibley was the sitting member, J. S. Gallagher, and made such a good run that he easily got the nomination in the federal contest just closed. At the recent convention to nominate a Liberal candidate for the Legislature, he was second man, Howard Reynolds, who was his agent in the last contest, beating him out. Mr. Reynolds has stated to some friends that he will possibly drop out, and the nomination of the last few days may be a surprise. He regards the Liberal chances as hopeless, even if the ballot box irregularities had not been exposed.

### A Rough Candidate.

Shibley was a candidate of a distinct type. He always appeared on the platform in rough, stogy boots, and was generally unshaven, and his appearance was unique in that a portion of his last meal was generally visible on his shirt front or waistcoat. Nevertheless, Shibley thought he could win. He has not returned to explain just how he intended to convert a Tory majority of several hundred into a verdict for the government in pure and undiluted. If he does not return the general public will be left in the dark.

### The Most of the Prominent Liberals of Kingston left this morning for the big convention in Toronto. J. McDonald and Mowat, the sick Reilly's solicitor, was one of the delegation, but it was stated at his office that he had no word of his client's whereabouts. J. B. Pense, the sitting member, has also gone to Toronto, but he told The World before getting aboard the train that the Liberals had no desire to shield the perpetrators of the ballot box frauds. The case looked very black for those implicated, he observed. It was said to-day Shibley and Reilly were said to understand that, in view of the coming convention in Toronto, it would be unwise for the Liberals here to attempt to shield those connected with the matter with the case and so.

## Fatality Inquest.

### CONFLICT OF EVIDENCE BETWEEN TWO MOTORMEN

#### Inquest Begun on the Recent Queen St. Fatality—One Employee Blames Car Equipment.

The enquiry into the street car fatality on Thanksgiving Day opened last night at Poulton Hall, before Coroner Cotton. The accused were James Becknell, K.C., and James Bain, for the Toronto Railway Co.; T. C. Ross, K.C., for Motorman Armstrong; William Johnston, assistant city solicitor; W. A. Skeens, for the family of Russell Brower; W. B. Johnston and J. Harbord Denton for others of the injured, and W. W. Pope for the Grand Trunk Railway. Crown Attorney Drayton conducted the examination of witnesses. The hall was entirely inadequate to accommodate the crowds and the provision made for those interested was wretched. There was no attempt at ventilation, and the atmosphere was soon heavy enough to cause nausea. Among the interested spectators were Manager Keating and Chief Coroner Johnson. Detective Wallace also watched the proceedings.

### Motorman's Story.

Motorman Armstrong told his story calmly and with every evidence of truth. He said the brakes and reverse had failed to work and that the regular man had reported the equipment bad. He did not look well and walked with a perceptible limp. His only apparent nervousness was the twitching of his hands but he was evidently great and his voice could not be heard even by the jury, coming repeating his answers.

### Motorist's Story.

Motorist Armstrong contradicted Armstrong in regard to the condition of the car and in their conversation about it. The coroner, at the request of Mr. Kay, Fred Linn swore to overbearing the conversation between Armstrong and Armstrong, and William Johnston, a surveyor, put in a plan of the scene of the accident.

### Willis Armstrong, the motorman of the wrecked car, detailed his movements on the fatal day. He had left his boarding house, 151 Sackville-street, about 2:15 p.m., and came down to Young-street. He then went to Sherburne and Queen, and took a glass of lager and ale. Then he went to Sherburne and Queen, and took another glass of the same beverage. He went home and had supper at 8:45 and took the car from the crossing from Leavelle-street to the C.P.R. crossing, finding no difficulty. At Broadview-avenue he had the controller in No. 5 position. The car then ran over the points on the switch. He had trouble in stopping, but succeeded in doing so before the car turned on the switch. At the next stop he slowed up and the brakes were working all right. He got the bell at Saultier-street, but did not attempt to stop, as he was too close up. He could see the crossing from Leavelle-street and had noticed the gates down a couple of blocks back. He put on the brakes as usual, but seeing they were not biting, then he pulled back the reverse, having confidence in the power. This checked the car and then he turned on the power again.

### IRON MISSILE OF DEATH FLIES 200 YARDS

#### WM. STRICKLAND, AS HE WALKS, IS SLAIN

##### Diagram Showing How Wheel Exploded Travelled 200 Yards and Killed a Man

Bursting of a Fly Wheel at Rogers Coal Yard, Pape-Ave., Killed Pedestrian on Distant Street, Whose Companion is Unhurt—Engineer Has a Marvelous Escape.

"What that?" said William Strickland, and in the space of a twinkling of an eye thereafter his brain and his life's blood were scattered in all directions. Fully 200 yards distant a fly-wheel had broken into pieces and hurled by the whirling momentum a portion of it, weighing, perhaps, 15 pounds, had hit his forehead. The fatal missile came from the engine building in the Elias Rogers coal yard, on Pape-avenue.

### When Japs Lost 500 Men.

Zandagga, Manchuria, Nov. 22.—(By courier to Mukden, Nov. 22.)—The Japanese lost 500 men in the attacks of Nov. 17 and 18 and were evidently disheartened. When they renewed the attack Nov. 19 the Japanese sent out several battalions from Double-Humped Hill, but their movements lacked direction. The Russians opened fire from Poutilef (Lone Tree) Hill and a neighboring eminence. Several shells burst in the midst of the advancing Japanese columns and quickly checked them. The Japanese also tried a turning operation at Chamlinin, but there also they were dispersed. There was a slight encounter Nov. 20. Russian scouts penetrated a short distance into the Japanese lines, but without much result.

### Port Arthur Falling Down

#### Jap Miners Destroy Walls

##### Defenders Compelled to Retreat When Inter Defences Are Shattered by Enemy's Shells.

Tokio, Nov. 22.—The fall of Port Arthur may now be regarded as imminent. The Russian forces practically are all on the southern side of the city, encamped on the hills running out to the bay. On Sunday morning the Japanese miners were able to destroy the defences on the southern side of Quail Hill and southwest of Bullin Mountain.

### FEARS FOR SEVENTEEN MEN.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 22.—The steamer St. John's, from Sydney, C.B., for St. John's, with a crew of seven men, is now seven days out, whereas the passage usually occupies only 48 hours. It is feared that the steamer is founder in the gale on Saturday and Sunday. The schooner Orpheus, 100 tons, from Labrador for St. John's, with a crew of ten men, has met with the same fate.

HOW HAMILTON LOST \$5000 TO THE CATARACT POWER CO.

Board of Works Asks for a Reduction of \$25 on Each Lamp Per Year.

Hamilton, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Through neglect, or, somewhat worse, the aldermen of Hamilton have allowed the Cataract Power Company to take at least \$5000 from the city that it was not entitled to.

The board of works took the matter up this evening, and decided to ask for a reduction of \$25 on each lamp per year. On this basis the city has been billed for over \$1000 a month that it should not have paid.

The Kramer Irwin paving case that has been dragging along in the courts for years is practically settled. The company laid asphalt pavement on King and James-streets nine years ago, and undertook to see that it was kept in good repair for ten years.
