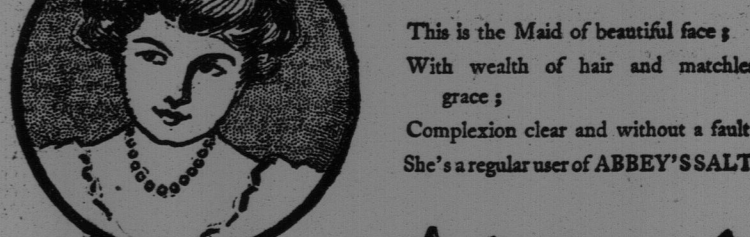

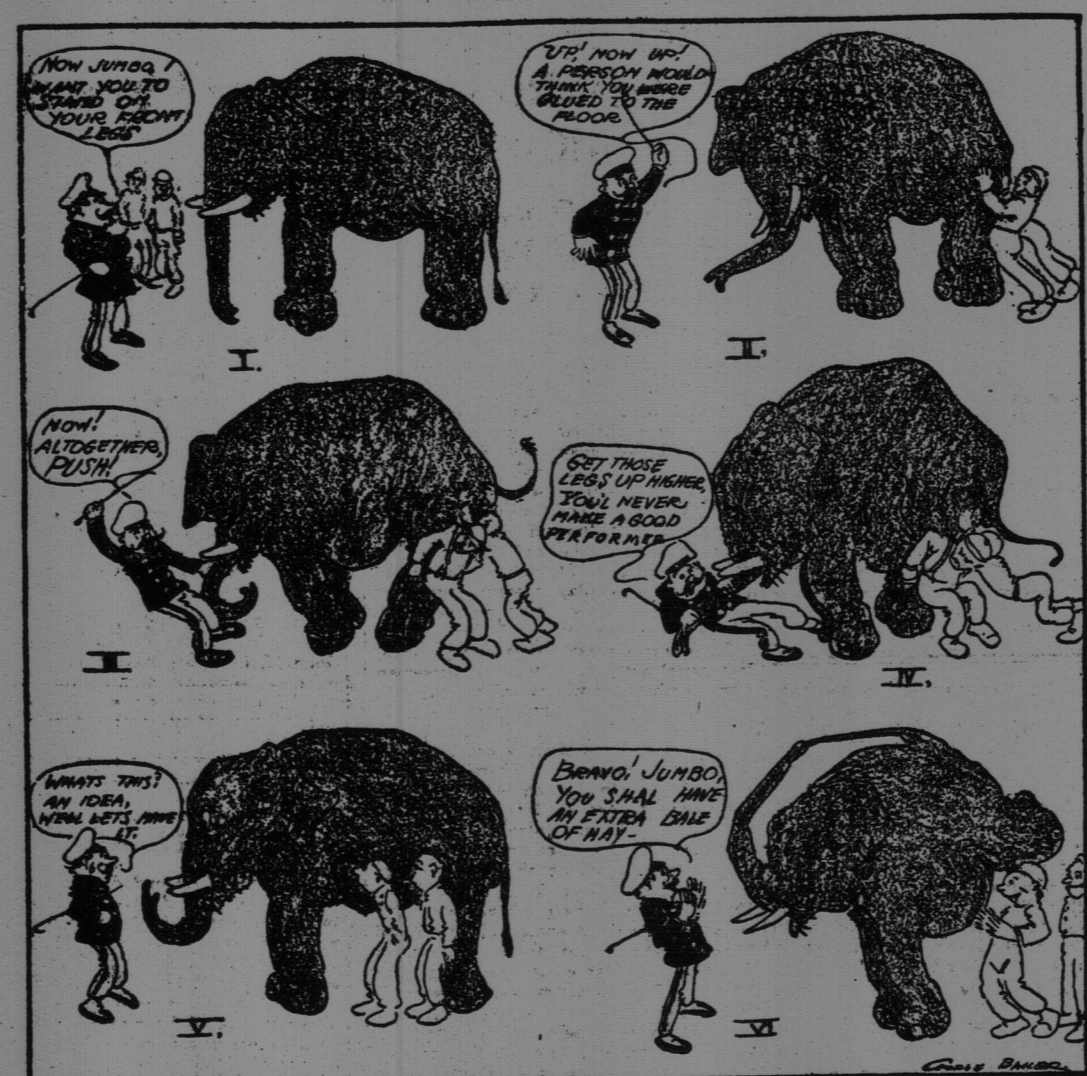

SUDDEN SPELLS OF HOT WEATHER NOT HURTFUL

Scientists Declare the Opinion That Heat Brings Disease is Erroneous--How to Combat the Discomforts of High Temperature.

When the first hot weather came a few days ago the disgraceful doings of the climate last summer were forgotten and forgiven, and there was practically universal rejoicing at the old-time summer heat.

Without quite knowing why, the average man in the street has a firm opinion that the degree of heat we have experienced during the last few days is not good for his health.

Contrary to the general opinion, the heart and lungs bear little of the stress of the hot weather. The most universal belief that our lungs must increase their work at such times is due to a hazy idea that, just as a dog pants when heated, we presumably must resort to our perspiration system to a degree for reducing the excessive temperature of our body.

Among these systems, through whose functions we keep the body free from the effects of auto-intoxication, the skin plays a very important part. During the greater part of the year, unless a man belongs to that small minority who go on active daily exercise, his skin and the glands within it are practically dormant.

Any part of the body not actually used will tend to degenerate; therefore it is easy to understand that we northerners have rebelled against in these hot few days, should be looked upon as a slaying out of the myriads of tiny channels which

cannot but be the better for this all too short period of activity. The depressing effect of heat on the digestion is also a blessing in disguise.

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC WILL COST MORE THAN EXPECTED

The Minister of Railways Now Estimates the Winnipeg-Moncton Section at About \$115,000,000--Line Will Be Completed in 1911.

Ottawa, July 6.—According to a statement made by Hon. G. P. Graham, tonight, he expects the Transcontinental to be fully completed by December 1, 1911, while the cost he now estimates at \$83,437,000, not including allowance for interest for the 1804 miles between Moncton and Winnipeg.

In regard to the rebuilding of the Quebec bridge the minister furnished no information.

By agreement of March 1, 1907, between C. N. R. and G. T. P. and the government, the value of C. N. R. lands at Winnipeg, where the union station is to be built, was placed at \$2,625,000 upon which the G. T. P. and the government are to pay equal shares, one half.

As to the G. T. P. the prairie section from Winnipeg to Wolf Creek, 119 miles in length, has been located. The estimated cost of construction has been set down at present at \$61,520,000. The government's total liability for the Quebec bridge is \$6,678,200.

PEARY ALL READY FOR THE CONQUEST OF NORTH POLE

General Opinion is That This Time Intrepid Explorer Will be Successful.

New York, July 6.—With the Peary Arctic Club permanent funding from the main trust and flying the Stars and Stripes at her mission, the Arctic explorer, Robert E. Peary, left his headquarters at 24th street today, carrying Commander Robert E. Peary who is to head an expedition in quest of the North Pole.

The Roosevelt will head for Sydney, C. B., where she will stop to take on coal. Before the ship starts, Peary expressed the hope of reaching the North Pole before his return. "I have done so much work in the Arctic region," he said, "to believe that I can make the trip without strenuous work. I am not foolish enough to say that I am going to do it, but I am certainly going to put into this trip every bit of energy, mental, moral and physical—that I have in order to succeed in my undertaking."

On board the Roosevelt, in addition to Commander Peary, Mrs. Peary and their children, Marie and Robert E., Jr., were also on board, including its president, Thomas D. Hubbard, vice-president Zenas Crane and Herbert L. Bridgman, secretary.
