





HALF OF PITTSBURG'S BABIES DIE, AND THEIR


MOTHERS ARE BLAMED PITTSBURG, July 6—That fifty per cent of the babies born in Pittsburg die before reaching the age of one year was startling information thrown at the heads of Pittsburg methors by the Burges of

the chief cause for this wholesale slaugh-ter of the innocents is said by the Bureau of Health to be charged to the mothers themselves, through ignorance of how a child should be fed and clothed. The bureau has set out to distribute circulars printed in four languages showing how babies should be taken care et, particularly in the very hot weather.

It is set forth that over-feeding or the ignorant use of improper foods and the wrong sort of clothing is responsible for the increasing death rate of the children.
