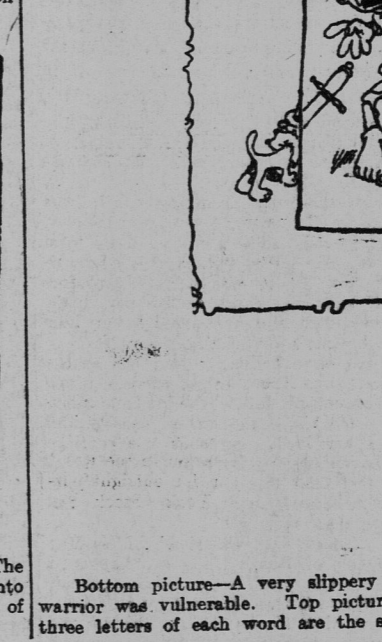

"Don't, don't do it!" she cried, passionately. "Don't!" said Sir Hilton. "What have I done?"

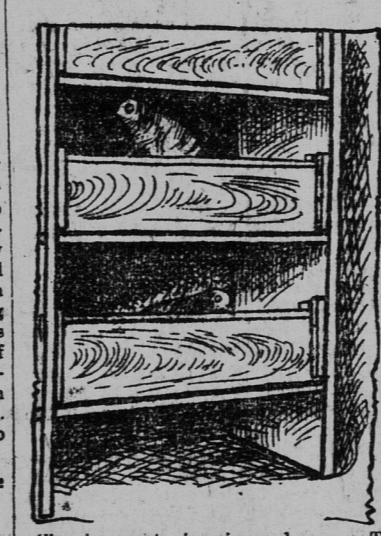

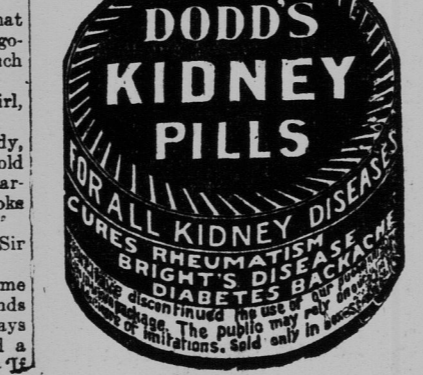

Grieve tried to reach land by swimming but failed in the attempt, while one of his companions who tried to get to his assistance, had all he could do to get ashore himself, encumbered as he was with his clothes.

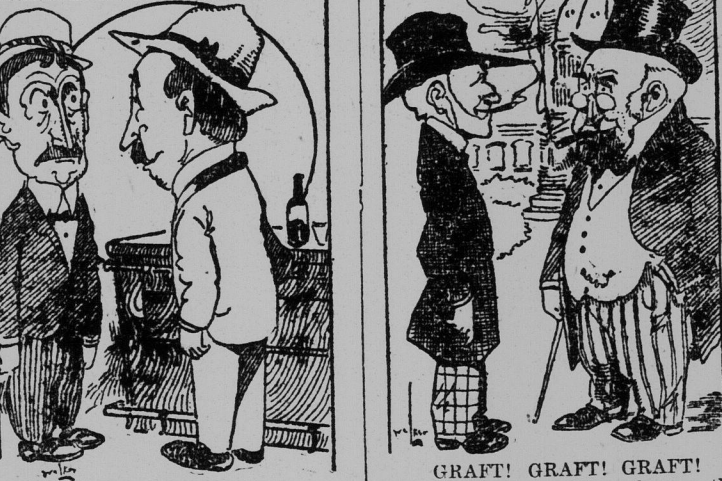

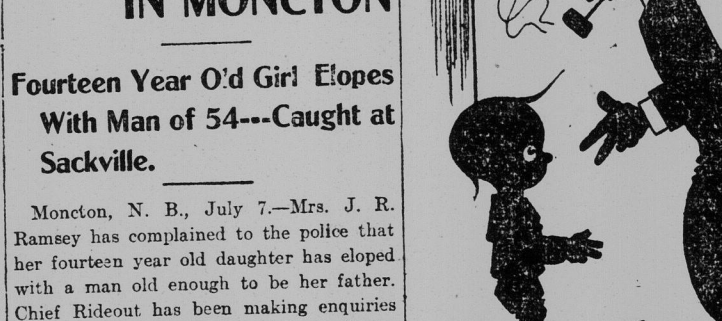

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HOW TO PREPARE SOUPS AND STOCK

Soup Badly Made Spoils the Effect of An Entire Dinner—Even Canned Soup May Be Made Palatable With a Little Care—A Recipe for Cream of Chestnut Soup.

A clever Frenchman once said that soup was to a dinner what an overture is to an opera. The oysters that precede it to partake of them alone and forget whatever might follow.

Corn Soup—Take a quart of corn cut fresh from the cob and boil in three quarts of water until tender. Mix a tablespoonful of flour and two of butter to a rich paste, stir into the soup and boil five minutes more.

Cream of Chestnut Soup—Take three pounds of French horse chestnuts, shell them and fry lightly in butter over a medium fire. Save a handful of whole nuts and put the others into two quarts of white stock and boil for half an hour.

Mulligatawny Soup—Have two rabbits cut in pieces; fry them in a quarter of a pound of butter with some sliced onions. When done put into three pints of clear stock and boil for an hour.

Black Bean Soup—Soak a pint of beans in two quarts of water overnight. Drain the water and add another quart of water.

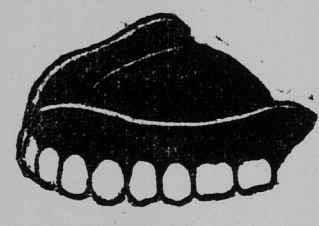

THE SALVATION ARMY

(Montreal Witness.)

Brigadier Howell, head of the Salvation Army's immigration department in Canada, with headquarters in Toronto, was at the Canadian Pacific Railway office this morning, on his way to England, in connection with the army's next year's programme for directing British workmen into Canadian fields of industry. He stated to a Witness representative that the present year's work in regard to immigration, had proved highly satisfactory. Already something like 13,000 people had been brought over from England and settled in various parts of Canada—the majority of them in Ontario and the Northwest, but a number also in the Maritime Provinces.

Next year, he said, it is expected that this number will be much exceeded. Indeed, the brigadier said the Salvation Army immigrants would only be limited by the amount of steamship accommodation which it would be possible to get. The demand for British labor in British Columbia is insistent, and Mr. Howell said that next year the army for the first time in its history in Canada, would do something to meet the demand, by extending its field for immigrants to the Pacific Coast.

CHIPMAN HOUSE SOLD

The historic old Chipman house in which the present King of England has slept, was on Saturday last, sold by Auctioneer Lantian at Clubb's Corner, to Harry J. Garson, fuel and junk dealer for \$28. The conditions were that the building be torn down and removed within six weeks from date of sale and the basement filled up level with the surrounding surface. There seemed to be but little interest in the sale and the mahogany banister and two Franklins brought only a small sum.

Mr. Garson says he will call for tenders at once for the tearing down and taking apart of the ancient structure. The brick and such parts of the wood as are valuable will be sold for building purposes and the broken pieces of wood will be sold for kindling.

Thus an old landmark of the city will be removed.

LOTS OF STRAWBERRIES

(Montreal Witness, Friday.)

The feature of the market today is the abundance of strawberries, and dealers who have followed the market for years say that the quantity has seldom been exceeded. The fruit is of a very good quality, being grown for the most part in the vicinity of Montreal, and consequently in fine condition when offered for sale, and prices range from 8c to 12c per box, with the bulk of the sales at 9c and 10c. There will be a big demand during the next few days to meet the requirements for preserving, and in three weeks strawberries will be scarcer than they have been since April.
