FREDERICTON, Jan. 20—The N. B. Assused of Revolutionary Action—14 Executed in Train
Bandit Affair

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 20.—It is reported here that Alfonso Noyola, former lieutenant governor of the state of Jalisco, has been executed at Guadalajara for alleged complicity in the so-called revolutionary movement there. Special despatches say that Gilberto Chavez, a ranch owner in the state of Jalisco, has been court martialed and shot because he concealed some bandits who committed the recent outrage on a passenger train near Guadalajara. Fourteen men have thus far been officially reported executed for the Guadalajara crime.

Mexico City, Jan. 20.—It is reported the Legislature had amended the act for protection of sheep from dogs in such a way that county councils had been able to make the act inoperative in certain counties. No reference to the association had been made before the change was made and the expressed will of 10,000 farmers was disregarded.

Nova Scotia, he predicted, would follow suit in the establishing of packing plants and pointed that the annual importation of meat products by Nova Scotia amounted to between 52 and 55 million, pounds. He deplored the specialization in apples in Nova Scotia and potatoes in New Brunswick, as ruinous, advocating greater interest and effort in stock raising and mixed farming.

BOARD OF TRADE LAUDED.





Timely Views On World Topics

"THE shooting of Chinese students by foreign police has done great harm to the cause of the foreigner in China," said Dr. Royal Mecker, former commissioner of labor statistics and chief of research of the international labor office at Geneva, in a recent speech. He has returned from a five-month tour of China as a member of a commission on social research. "The Chinese have always felt kindly disposed toward foreigners," Dr. Mecker said. "The efforts to stir up feeling against them have been attempts made by political strategists which have been largely unsuccessful, but the whole feeling of the people has changed since this untoward incident."

ADVOCATES ESTABLISHING SOCIAL INSTITUTE

The commission attempted to sound out the advisability of establishing an institute for social and economical research in China, to be started and partly financed by American capital and to be given wholly to China ultimately.





A ND so when Mary wants to gad about instead of staying at hom darning stockings; when she asserts her right to her own opinion to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness in her own way, then fights and ructions. Or John is bored stiff when his clinging vine proto follow the nature of clinging vines and hangs on, and has to be ported, instead of developing the strength to stand alone.

And Mary's case is no whit different from John's. John captured her maiden fancy by his dashing ways, and his reputation of being somewhat of a rounder, but the minute the ceremony is over she begins to try to lop off all the little personal idiosyncrasies that made John John.

SHE nags him about the very things for which she fell in love with him, and wears herself out trying to change a gay, happy-go-lucky, generous, pleasure-loving man into a drab, serious-minded plodder, who is as like every other man she knows as a pea in a pod.

It is with their children, however, that people get in their most deadly work in slaying personality, for to the average parent it is not more of an affliction to have a son or a daughter born with a humped back than it is to have one born with individuality.

Those who try to rob us of our personality do us the greatest injury that one individual can do another. Sometimes they ruin our lives and make failures of us, because through weakness, through love, through our hatred of hurting and disappointing those we love, we give up our own aspirations and hopes and desires, and let them make of us what they will.

So WE become poor doctors or lawyers or preachers to please mother, or we are misfit merchants who never learn how to trade, and we fail and are miserable and discontented because we are thwarting our own natures and stifling his own talents.

And we are always unhappy because happiness consists in doing the little things you like to do in the way you want to do them, without argument or criticism. It is having to watch our step all the time; it is having to change our habits that gets upon our nerves. It is having to conform to some other person's standards that makes us slaves.

PERSONALITY is the kiss that our fairy godmothers give us in the cradle. What a pity those with whom we live try to wipe it off our mouths!
