## Canadian Family Is Growing Smaller; **Quebec Only Province Showing Increase**

Ottawa, Nov. 21—Canadian families are growing smaller, according to a report dealing with dwellings and families in the Dominion, exclusive of the Yukon and Northwest Territories, which has been comoiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, and is based upon the sixth decennial census

ompleted in 1921.

Not only are the number of persons to a family growing smaller when compared with returns made for previous decades, but the number of persons to a house shows a marked decrease. In 1881 the average size of a family was 5.33 persons, as against 4.62 in 1921. With the exception of Sas-

of the total number of dwellings reported in 1921, 84.91 were single houses and 8.24 were semi-detached, while less than two per cent. were classed as apartments. Montreal reported 12,815 apartment houses, as compared with Toronto's 2,188, Vancouver's 1,380, Halifax's 937, Winnipeg's 892, Ottawa's 880, St. John, N. B., 862, and Hamilton's return of 672.

thing for the British people?

The answer is certainly in the negative. Any unprejudiced man of affairs, uninterested in the party struggles of Westmin-ster, will agree without hesita-tion. The infliction of an elec-

tion is a crime.

Putting aside all questions of party or personal advantage we are bound to conclude that Mr. Baldwin wishes to embark the Baldwin wishes to embark the country upon a hazardous experiment, even if we view this election with blurred eyes incapable of piercing the November mists that lie over the Dover Straits and the North Sea.

Arguments Are Clear The arguments used by the Tory or-

remedy for existing conditions is pro-tection, and that Mr. Baldwin is ound by Bonar Law's pledge not to adopt protection, then the excuse is found. What more plausible than an election to release the cabinet from a pledge which hampers their desire and determination to perform prodigies of

pledge which hampers their desire and determination to perform prodigies of statesmanship?

Protection, to be sure, is a two-edged sword. English agrarians must not be helped by taxes of food, for the urban vote outweighs by twenty to one that of the rural community. Our great exporting trades must not be hampered by tariffs on their raw material. So, whittled down, protection may seem not an engine of high power. But in the present desperate straits the Government must gamble.

War Chest Is Empty The Labor war chest is empty. There is no time for the Liberals to unite, so let us rush an appeal to the people as fast as we can. That is not an unfair summary of the arguments that have led to the present situation.

Labor may lack funds, but Mr. Baldwin's bad record to date, together with increasing distress among all classes, will increase Labor's representatives at Westminster, not to the point where Labor might be able to take over Downing street, but if it be thought that this extreme peril is a real one, then the Tories are responsible for bringing it upon the country.

There are likely to be more Labor men in the new Parliament and more Liberals, consequently less Tories. If this forecast be accurate, it will be impossible for any one of the three great parties to rule, and we shall be faced with the alternative of a new and probable unstable coalition, or another appeal to the country.

Following such a period of political chaos and such an even upheaval anything can happen.

The Government for the supposed advantage of the Tory party is risking landing the nation in the worse political chaos it has known for generations past.

Funds Stressed.

The Women's Council is preparing for its annual Rosebud Day effort for the benefit of the Confiden's Aid Society and at the meeting of the Council yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms, A. M. Belding, the president of the society was present to explain its work and to tell of the reason for the negent need of funds.

Mr. Belding explained that the work of the Ordideen's Aid could not be taken ever by the Protestant Orphanage because it was essentially different. It dealt with all children, Catholic and Protestant, and had been called into being after the Children's Protection Act was passed so that St. John might take advantage of the Act. He related how a Home was opened in Elliot How first and proved so successful that the larger Home in Garden street was opened. Towards the maintenance the municipality contributed \$5,000 a year but the expenses amounted to \$9.475 last year and it was feared \$1,500 of the city grant would not be paid. Unless there was a good response from Rosebud Day the work of the Home was in grave danger.

The real business of the society, Mr. Belding said, was to care for neglected and delinquent children who were committed to its protection by the courts. He told of the proceedure by which children are taken from unsuitable surroundings and unworthy parents and of the supervision given when they are placed in foster homes. The society did upon occasion care for compassionate cases such as are dealt with by the orphanages but this was only done when the orphanages had no room or for some special reason.
