TORONTO MAN, OLDEST V. C. IN EMPIRE, DEAD IN LONDON

London, Jan. 29—Sergeant George Richardson, V.C., veteran of the Indian mutiny and the Fenian raids, oldest wearer of the V.C. in the British Empire, died last evening at Westminster military hospital, where he had been a patient for some weeks. The body will be sent to Toronto for interment with military honors.



Luxor Excitedly Awaits the

Luxor, Egypt, Jan. 29—An air of suppressed excitement pervades the whole upper Nile valley as the day approaches for the opening of the inner or mortuary chamber of the tomb of King Tutenkhamun, recently discovered in the valley of the kings.

Not since the American Egyptologist, Theodore Davis, unearthed more than a half dozen tombs in the same valley has the Egyptian populace shown such pronounced interest and curiesity. Pressure is being exerted by the local population to have the mummy of Tutenkhamun, if it is found in the inner chamber, kept in the tomb instead of being removed to Cairo. They make no secret of their motive in the matter, declaring that, if exhibited to the public view in the tomb, the mummy of Pharaoh would attract thousands of tourists to Luxor and stimulat trade, the hotel business and the sale of antiques.

At present, in all the tombs of the imperial necropolis, there remains only one royal mummy, that of Amenophis II., which is on view in its original burial place. The whole Theban burial area, including the valley of the kings and queens, contains the bodies of countless generations. Here all, from the mighty Pharaohs to the humblest of citizens, sought their final rest.

It is January, dog licenses must be paid, and there is much unemployment. Hundreds of breadwinners, unable to find the seven shillings six pense, have passed through purgatory before facing the ordeal of sending the family pet to the nearest lethal chamber.

Five hundred stray dogs which have been collected in the London streets are being temporarily sheltered at Battersea. Many of them have been turned adrift and, failing a visitor taking pity on them, the alternative after eight days is the lethal chamber. The National Canine Defense League, of 27 Regent street, W. I, has been in undated with the most pathetic appeals for help from poor folk. Charles R. Johns, secretary, received 3,000 applications by one post, begging for help toward paying the license for the dog.

This side of the league's activities began during the war to save the service man's dog, and over 12,000 licenses were paid for by 1918.

"But even during the days of the greatest war distress the appeals," declared Mr. Johns, "never approached the dimensions of this year, due unquestionably to unemployment. We are snowed under, and must take on a fresh staff to handle these human appeals. It goes to one's heart to refuse any one. This morning's post oag alone represents £500 in dog licenses.






