**FAIRVILLE SHOWS
INTEREST IN TAX
REFORM MATTER**

J. R. Brown's Address on Land Tax Heard With Close Attention

The meeting held in Temperance Hall, Fairville, under the auspices of the Lancaster Board of Trade, and addressed by J. R. Brown on single land tax last evening, was well attended and close interest was manifested throughout. W. J. Linton, president of the board of trade, was in the chair and P. L. Potts of St. John, was also on the platform and spoke briefly.

Mr. Brown said he believed it home rule in every phase of life from the individual to the community and nation, and congratulated the tax payers on their efforts to become self-governing. He then explained the system of single tax as giving a man a dollar's worth of goods for his dollar. The town gives lighting, pavements, sidewalks, etc., but no more to the rich man than the poor, so why should a man who has made some progress pay in proportion to what he has made?

Social service increased or decreased all values in a community and the land is affected ought to pay, not what was on the land or who lived on it. If a tax-payer desired to live in a section where the greatest improvements were in town service and land values were high because of this he ought to pay for his privilege or get out of it at a fair price.

On being informed that a square mile would be a fair enough estimate of Fairville's size for argument's sake in discussing the matter, Mr. Brown stated that there were enough lots in that area, if only taxed at an average rate of \$2, to bring in a revenue of \$16,000 per annum. This elicited hearty applause.

One questioner asked if lots were not already taxed in Lancaster and at a fair valuation, some said at \$400, paying 38. "Not by any means," replied the speaker. "A lot worth \$200 should bring in a rental of \$20 per annum, being 7 per cent on investment; so he should be receiving benefits from water, sewerage and other town improvements and the assessors are letting him off with \$20 no little." The only thing that made real estate valuable was town service and the owner of any individual property did no more to make that service than the next citizen; so he should pay his proportionate share, and the assessors should value it, enhanced his property.

The meeting at times became quite enthusiastic, and Mr. Brown's replies were very well received. There is a strong local feeling and it is steadily spreading that there is something the matter when land syndicates, and the city corporation, bid property here until they get fabulous prices before selling to home seekers.

The board of trade advanced a step further in the estimation of the Lancaster residents by its prompt action in securing Mr. Brown for a lecture on such a timely subject.



OPPOSE GRANTS TO EXHIBITIONS

Legislators Criticise Some Of The Features TO AID STOCK-RAISING

Local Market Depleted by Foreign Demand—The Movie Censors and the American Flag—Discussion on Supply

Fredericton, March 13.—The house met at 8.30. Baxter presented the petition in favor of a bill to vest the property and trusts of Masonic bodies incorporated and to dissolve the New Brunswick Hall Company. Hon. Mr. Morrisey introduced a bill to incorporate the Barnaby River Boom Company. Hon. Mr. Fleming introduced a bill to confer a grant of crown lands. Hon. Mr. Murray presented the annual report of the agricultural department. The house went into committee of supply. On the item of \$4,000 for the encouragement of stock raising, Mr. Black asked how the money was to be laid out, as he noticed it was greatly in excess of the amount spent last year. Hon. Dr. Landry said that it was intended this year to make another importation of stock. Last year they had not imported any stock from abroad, but they had paid a bonus to farmers who had stock for sale and would conform to certain conditions. Hon. Doctor Landry said the dominion grant was for agricultural education, and all items for that purpose would be charged to that fund. Hon. Mr. Fleming pointed out that, in the item of \$7,000 for exhibitions, \$1,000 had been spent last year for farming institutes and educational work. Mr. Slipp said he did not think that agriculturists were deriving much advantage from the money granted to some of the big exhibitions. This was true particularly of the St. John exhibition, where there was not much of an agricultural show given, the exhibition being devoted largely to a show of exhibits of machinery, and goods from commercial houses and the stores. Mr. Tilley said if the member for Queens attended any of the St. John exhibitions. Mr. Slipp said that he did until he became disgusted with them from an agricultural standpoint. Hon. Mr. Wilson said that the St. John exhibition was the best agricultural show in the country. Mr. Tilley said that he was not surprised at the statements of the junior member from St. John, but that the hon. president of the council was old enough to know better. He also felt that the government grants should not go towards subsidizing exhibitions which had midways and horse racing as the principal features. Hon. Mr. Fleming said the hon. member for Queens was so prejudiced against St. John that probably the only time he ever visited the city was when there was an exhibition on. The St. John exhibition was the big exhibition of the province, the one that drew the most people. It helped to advertise the province, and he felt sure that the committee would not withhold the grant which was now given every second year to the St. John exhibition. Hon. Mr. Wilson said that agriculturists who should know more about it than the hon. member for Queens had stated publicly, and had been quoted in newspaper reviews, to the effect that the agricultural show at the St. John exhibition was the best in the province. There were many subjects to be found in this country which would be eminently suitable for pictures. Hon. Mr. Wilson agreed with Mr. Black, and from conversation with him also, and they were referred to supply pictures that had been sent them for review. They were doing good work, and he would like to see them get more salary. The committee reported progress. Hon. Dr. Landry moved that supply be made the order of the day, for Monday, at 8.30 p.m. The house adjourned at 6.30 p.m., until Monday at 8.30 p.m.

BUSINESS IN ST. JOHN IS BETTER

Bank Clearings Show an Increase and Merchants Speak of Improvement

The tide of business seems to have turned, in this city at least. During the period of depression St. John suffered very little ill results, but the long duration of the dull times finally made its effect felt here to a slight extent during the last few months. During this time the bank clearings showed a noticeable decrease and the last week was the first occasion in six months when the clearings were higher than during the corresponding week a year ago.

This is regarded as a very good showing, especially in consideration of the fact that the amalgamation of the Banks of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia would have the effect of greatly reducing the clearings even if the volume of business remained the same. There were no especially large transactions to swell the clearings this week and the increase apparently is due to more active conditions in business.

This corresponds with reports from various business men who say that they find a decided improvement in business. With the great amount of building work which is to be carried on here this year there should be plenty of money in circulation and St. John should have one of the most prosperous years in its history.

DAUGHTER OF MRS. AMY BLIZZARD SPRIGHTLY ON 97TH BIRTHDAY

Formerly Resided in St. John—Mother Lived to Be 107 Years Old

Mrs. John W. Scribner of Houlton, who has just passed her 97th birthday, despite her years, has never been disabled and can still see plainly, even at a long distance.
